## Defending Hoop Champs Host Rams Saturday Night

Genesee's Bulldog basketball team, the defending state A-3 basketball champions open the 1971-72 season Saturday night against the Clearwater Valley Rams on the Genesee hardwood.

This is a time when neither Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg nor his team plan on improving the record of last year... they couldn't. Last season the Bulldogs ran up a perfect 26-games winning streak on their way to the State Title.

Only four of last year's squad is back: Bill Schlueter, Craig Busch, Dean Kinzer and Rich Green. Up from the Junior Varsity ranks are Jerry Meyers, Doug Moser, Craig Kanikkeberg, Rod Tiegen, Dave Stout, Ray Morscheck and Jim Hermann. The call for the center spot will probably go to 6-4 Hermann, who will have to replace the talented Mike Eglund, lost this year because of graduation.

While he can't improve over last year's performance, Coach Kanikkeberg still feels he has a good team this year. "We got a good ball club with good talent," he said.

"We've been looking a little spotty right now," he added but said he figured the team would be shaping up well. Ozzie said he still hadn't picked a starting five.

## Tigers Open Against Timberline Friday Night

With just one player measuring in at 6-2 in height Coach Wayne Dust views his coming basketball campaign with the Kendrick High Tigers with cheerful optimism.

"Look," he said, "this is the first time we've had somebody over six foot to work with."

With his one 6-2 center and six returning lettermen back from last year's team, Dust and his squad open the 1971-72 basketball wars against the Timberline Spartans at Timberline Friday night, December 3.

Back this year are John Deobald, Dale Taylor, Kim Trout, Dave Hutcherson, Dave Wilken and Eddie Osborn. To round out the varsity squad Coach Dust has brought up Frank Groseclose, who is his "tall man", Miles Souders, Steve Hoogland, Tim Felton, Marty Clemenhagen and Steve Rishling. Felton is a 6-1 transfer from Benton City, Wn. All the rest of the squad is under six foot.

While short, Dust does have experience and depth in his team. He said Tuesday afternoon he was still having trouble selecting a starting five. "I'm having a tough time choosing a first string," he added.

Injuries and missed practices have hampered the squad up to now. Three of his varsity have been on FFA trips, and Groseclose and Osborn have both had minor injuries. Dust indicated that it would be about Christmas time before the team rounded into good shape.

The Tigers debut before the home folks next Tuesday evening when they host the Kamiah Kubs. The JV game begins at 6:30.

## U. of I Landscape Expert Speaks At Garden Club

Walter I. Ashland, associate professor of landscape architecture at the University of Idaho, Moscow, spoke to the Hill and Valley Garden Club on the value of landscape architecture in connection with environmental problems.

Characteristics of the land and activity of the people are important factors to consider in landscape architecture. Professor Ashland explained there was an increasing demand for students graduating with a degree in landscape architecture. He urged members to encourage students to apply for a scholarship toward a degree in this field.

Scholarships are sponsored by the Idaho Federation of Garden Clubs. For information, students may contact Mrs. Richard Benschoter of Kendrick or Professor William H. Snyder, associate professor of landscape architecture at the University.

## Cemetery, Fire District Elections Set For Monday, December 6

Four elections are set in the Genesee and Kendrick areas this coming Monday, December 6, as cemetery and fire protection districts in Latah and Nezperce County hold elections to choose commissioners for four year terms. This would also have been the year for highway district elections, but the recent move to consolidate the highway districts in Latah County has postponed those elections.

The taxing units involved in the Monday elections are: The Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District, Genesee Rural Fire Protection District, Nezahat Cemetery Maintenance District, and the Potlatch Cemetery Maintenance District.

Nezahat Cemetery District—Election within the Nezahat Cemetery Maintenance District will choose one commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 for a term of four years in balloting to be held Monday, Dec. 6 at the City Hall in Kendrick. Polls will open at 1:00 p. m. and will stay open until 5:00 p. m.

The term of Andrew Cox expires this year and Mr. Cox, who is also secretary of the district is the only candidate on the ballot.

Potlatch Cemetery District—Residents of the Potlatch Cemetery Maintenance District will vote to elect a commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 in an election to be held Monday, December 6 at the Latah Church Basement between the hours of 1:00 p. m. and 5:00 p. m.

Leo Lohman, the incumbent commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 will be on the ballot for re-election. His is the only name on the ballot.

Genesee Cemetery District—James J. Busch, incumbent commissioner from Sub-District No. 3 of the Genesee Community Cemetery Maintenance District is the only candidate on the ballot for that position as the electors will vote Monday, Dec. 6 in the City Room of the Genesee Fire Hall between the hours of 1:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m.

Holdover commissioners are Ed Morken and John Meyers.

Genesee Fire District—Two Commissioners will be elected by residents within the boundaries of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District as they vote in the City Room of the Genesee Fire Hall on Monday, Dec. 6. Polls will be open between the hours of 1:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m.

Incumbents Gordon Iverson from Sub-District No. 2 and Harold Klass from Sub-District No. 3 will both be standing for re-election for another term of four years.

Nov. 29, 1971 Editor— There is a real important question that should be answered by the people of school District 283. In fact all school districts in Latah County should be concerned about the problem.

Each school board in Latah County asked the county commissioners for the money needed to run their school; and this request was granted.

But on the advice of the State Tax Commission, the county commissioners levied four more mills for schools.

One was for the state and three more mills for the board of education. This four mills is above what the school boards asked for.

In District 283 and other districts this makes Latah County people pay four more mills toward school than the people living in Nezperce County.

The tax commission and the state board of education are not taxing units and do not have the power to ask for an increase in mill levies.

This makes it unconstitutional and something should be done about this grabbing of power.

I think it is time that the people make it clear to their elected officials that only the people should have the right to ask for a mill increase.

This problem should be discussed by the people of Latah County and especially those districts and people who are being segregated for tax purposes.

Isn't a 12 percent increase in your taxes this year something to be concerned about?

There should be a meeting to decide what should be done about this injustice. I will gladly support any effort for action on this issue. Werner Brammer
