Weather Turns Cold

Genesee's City Council met Monday evening in the City Room with Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst and councilmen John Myers, Walt Moden, Bill Phar and Jack Magee present.

City Clerk Mike Martinez read a letter from Robert P. Olson, Boise, of the Idaho Department of Health. In part it stated that the city dump grounds were contributing to water pollution and that the site must be closed and cleaned up by June 1, 1972.

All dumping is to be terminated at the local ground by January 1. Mayor Scharnhorst, a member of the Latah County Sanitary Landfill and Solid Waste Site Committee, stated the committee will hold a meeting Wednesday evening at Moscow Courthouse.

The doctor's announcement will end a medical service to the Kendrick and surrounding areas which began October 7, 1931 when Dr. Christensen came to Kendrick after finishing his internship in Seattle.

Dr. Christensen's years of patient, dedicated service to the people have made him one of the area's most respected and beloved members of the community.

Although his patients, friends and neighbors regret seeing him terminate his practice, they know that no man deserves rest from his labors more than this kindly man who has served so long, so well and so faithfully. We know there is not a heart in Kendrick which doesn't hold the wish for a long, healthy and enjoyable retirement for Dr. Christensen.

The Doctor's retirement announcement was:

"I must publicly announce my intentions to retire on December 31, 1971 after forty years of medical service to this community. I feel that when age overtakes a person, he should bow out gracefully before physical and mental deterioration make him incompetent to give his best. I know it will be a great inconvenience to many people not to have a doctor handy for office and house calls seven days a week, but many small towns are in a similar situation and have adjusted to it. You will realize that it will be difficult to turn down requests for service or information and I hope you will consider that I can show no favoritism or I will soon be in the position of being disturbed enough to spoil my retirement with insufficient remuneration to make it worthwhile.

I love this part of the country and have been content to live here. I love my home and the part of nature surrounding it. I have taken great pleasure with the help of my wife and family in building it up. I hope we can continue to live here happily as friends and neighbors."

UPLAND BIRD HUNTERS GET SPECIES VARIETY

Scatter gunners who do not show partiality to any particular Idaho game bird species will have good shooting in bird parts of the state for quail and many parts through December 31. In partridge through December 31. In parts of Hells Canyon and the Salmon River and Middle Fork in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho, Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley, there is a special season for chukars through January 23, 1972.

Cottontail and pigmy rabbit shooting season continues in all parts of Idaho (except Boundary County) through February 29, 1972. The daily bag and possession limit is eight bunnies in the aggregate of cottontail and pigmy rabbits.

Shooting season for ducks in Idaho counties of the Columbia Basin Mallard area run through January 23, 1972, with a daily bag limit of seven ducks and a possession limit of 14.

The duck season in remaining counties of Idaho outside of the Columbia Basin Mallard area runs through January 9, 1972, with bag and possession limit 7 ducks.

Goose season in northern Idaho runs through January 2 1972 with bag and possession limit three and six, not to include more than one Ross goose. In southwestern Idaho, goose season runs through January 2, 1972 with bag and possession limits three and six, not to include more than two Canada goose or one Ross goose. In the remainder of the state, goose season ended Dec. 5.

Shooting hours for all geese in Idaho, one half hour before sunrise to sunset. Shooting hours for ducks, coots, and mergansers, one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset within the Columbia Basin Mallard counties. Shooting hours in the remaining Idaho counties outside of the Columbia Basin Mallard area, one half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Official sunrise and sunset tables for Idaho's four time zones are printed on the back of the 1971 Waterfowl Hunting Seasons and Regulations. No hunter should be without a copy.

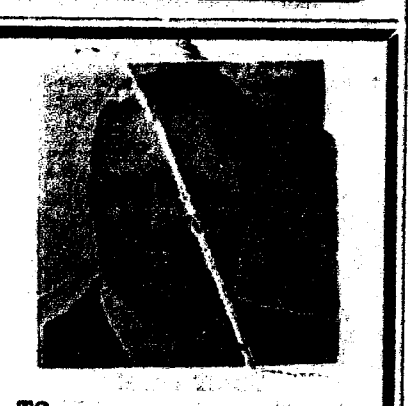

Next week we'll have another fruit cake recipe and also one for bran muffins.
Let's get plenty of recipes in for use through the holidays. We'll get them printed some time.

ORANGE FUDGE

4 cups sugar
1/2 cup orange juice
2 T. butter
3/4 cup sliced almonds, slivered
1/2 cup whipping cream
2 T. grated orange peel
1 cup marshmallow creme
Butter sides of large pan. Add sugar, w. cream, orange juice. Cook over medium heat to soft ball stage (235d). Remove from heat without stirring. Add grated peel and butter. Cool to 110d. Add marshmallow creme and beat until it begins to lose its sheen. Pour into 9-inch pan lined with foil. Store in refrigerator.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

1 pint marshmallow creme
1 cup chunky peanut butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups sugar
2/3 cup milk
Combine in a large, warm mixing bowl, marshmallow creme, peanut butter, vanilla. Combine sugar and milk in a heavy pan. Cook sugar mixture to soft ball stage (235d). Pour over peanut mixture. Stir till mixed well. Spread in buttered 8"x9" square pan. Cool. Cut into small squares.

FRUIT CAKE

Our anonymous cook writes, "It will soon be time for fruit cake, and I have made this cake for over 50 years. It's moist and good while new."
Always on Christmas and Thanksgiving.
2 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups lard
2 cups hot water
1 teaspoon each of nutmeg, cinnamon, cloves, salt
Boil 5 minutes, let cool, then add:
4 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon soda in 4 tbl. water
2 teaspoon baking powder
4 1/2 cups flour
3 cups walnuts
2 cups cut-up dates
2 cups raisins
2 cups cut-up figs
2 cups mixed fruits or citron
Cook in loaf pans, or large pan. Will make from 4 or 6 cakes. Don't overcook.

RIBBON SALAD

(Very good, made day before best)
2 3-oz. pkg. lime jello dissolved in 2 cups hot water. Then add 2 cups cold water. Pour in large container. Chill till set.
Dissolve 1 pkg. lemon jello in top of double boiler. Add 1 cup hot water. Add 1 cup miniature marshmallows, stir until melted. Remove from heat, add 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese and 1 cup pineapple juice. Stir till well mixed.
Then add 1 cup drained pineapple or what's left from juice. Cool.
Then add 1 cup salad dressing, 1 cup whipped cream. Chill till thick, then pour over lime jello.
Dissolve two pkg. cherry jello in 4 cups water (2 ho. 2 cold). Let thicken and pour over the top dressing. Let set till firm.

Cranberries are timely right now, and there are so many delicious ways to prepare them. This Cranberry Nut Loaf is one brought in by Mrs. Elaine Haxton, one she received from her mother, Mrs. G. L. Evans. Guess we'd all better try it. Elaine says its really good.

CRANBERRY NUT LOAF

Grease and flour 9x5x3 loaf pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
Sift Together: 3 cups sifted flour, 3 tsp. b. p., 3/4 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup sugar
With a pastry blender, cut in: 1/2 cup shortening, until mixture resembles cornmeal.
In another bowl combine: 2 eggs, 1 1/4 cup milk (optional: add 1 T. grated orange rind)
Add milk mixture to dry ingredients, stirring until just dampened.
Fold in:
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup whole, fresh cranberries
Pour into loaf pan.
Bake 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from pan. Cool. Wrap and store loaf overnight for easier slicing.

License Plates Expiring

The following Idaho license plates, displaying "71" validation stickers, expire midnight December, 1971.

Farm Trucks and Trailers, Commercial Trucks and Trailers, Motorcycles, House Trailers, Utility and Rental Trailers, City Cabs and Buses, Hearses, Ambulances and Wreckers, Radio Amateur, NG and ANG, Disabled Veteran, Dealer.

The above licensed plates are not on the "staggered system" and "72" validation stickers for these plates are now on sale at your local assessors' license plate office.

License plates on the "staggered system" displaying black on white "72" stickers will not start expiring until the last day of January, 1972 through October, 1972, depending on the last digit of the license plate number.

The "73" red and white stickers for plates on the staggered system are also available at the assessors' offices for those people that are going away for the winter or wish to purchase them early. These would be plates ending in 1, 2, 3, or 4, which expire January, February, March and April, 1972 and are now displaying black on white "72" stickers.

Plates on the staggered system displaying black on white "71" stickers have all expired. Plates ending in zero expired the last day of October, 1971, and were the last to expire in the ten month, January through October cycle.
