The Doctor's retirement announcement was:

"I must publicly announce my intentions to retire on December 31, 1971 after forty years of medical service to this community. I know it will be a great inconvenience to many people not to have a doctor handy for office and house calls seven days a week, but many small towns are in a similar situation and have adjusted to it. 
Wayne Harris Purchases Earl Moran's Interest In Local Equipment Company
