**SNOW.** About a foot of new snow during the past week, in addition to high winds made travel in Park, as in most of Latah county, very hazardous. Schools in Deary were closed Thursday and Friday. Roads were never completely closed for any length of time, in Park, but visibility was very poor.

Bad roads haven't made noticeable difference in Christmas tree harvesting. Up to 85 cars, pick-ups and other conveyances have been counted on the Park-Helmer road on recent Sundays, with Saturdays nearly as bad. The bad part being the apparent thoughtlessness of the tree hunters. Vehicles were parked where ever a tree is spotted, whether on blind corners, narrow places, or other hazardous areas. Children with sleds, saucers, and all manner of snow toys are left unsupervised on the roadway. Snowmobiles, which, by law, are prohibited from using roadways are seen by the dozen, with their tracks scalloping roadways just as liberally on blind corners as on straight-aways. So far, only one minor accident has been reported. One wonders how long the luck will last, as the number of "near-misses" is counting up rapidly.

## Removing Stains From Fabrics

You use your loveliest linens for holiday entertaining. But you are worried about spots? A lot of the really difficult stains come out in the wash, if you use the proper methods, points out Janice Buckner, extension clothing specialist.

Prompt treatment is the best insurance, as most stains are least stubborn when fresh. Identify the kind of stain and kind of fabric then select a method of stain removal suitable to both stain and fabric. Saving hang tags from items you buy, and information copied from fabric bolts will make fabric identification easier. Today's fabrics are rarely as simple as those of yesterday.

Stains can be classified as greasy, non-greasy or a combination of both. Four types of stain removers to have on hand are absorbent materials like

## Watch for Accidents That Marr Holidays

Holidays can be happier if proper safety precautions are taken, according to Dr. John Mather, Preventive Medicine Director of the Idaho Department of Health.

Holiday decorations can be dangerous, Mather noted. "Berries of mistletoe, and the leaves and flowers of the poinsettia are very poisonous if eaten," Mather said. "They should be kept out of the reach of children at all times."

Holiday fires are all too common, too. The traditional Christmas tree is often the culprit, Mather said. Trees should be kept in water during use and away from sources of flame, including cigarettes. "Be careful with electric lights, don't put too many on one circuit or use strings with broken or frayed cords," he said.

Other decorations using cloth, cotton, or greenery are also possible fire hazards if used near a fireplace, candle or where smokers might touch them with a cigarette, he noted. Simple precautions in placing decorations can avert a possible tragedy.

In recent years there have been several deaths from the use of charcoal for cooking without proper ventilation. "Never, never burn charcoal inside, or even in a garage," Mather said. "Carbon monoxide poisoning can result." The same unhappy result can come from closing a fireplace damper when a fire is still smoldering, and from improper venting of gas heaters.

The kitchen is one more source of possible safety hazards. Grease fires often result from inattention. Mather recommended keeping a kitchen fire extinguisher handy, or soda or salt. "NEVER use water to extinguish a fire in electrical wiring or appliances," he noted. "This can short out wiring, causing a more serious fire."

Another safety measure in the kitchen recommended by the Department of Health is proper handling of perishable foods. "Keep hot foods really hot, above 140 degrees and cold foods good and cold, below 40 degrees. Do not allow foods to stand at room temperatures," Mather said.

The Department of Health has a real interest in healthy, happy holidays for all Idahoans, spokesmen said. It is their hope that this year they will have no cases of food poisoning to investigate, no calls to the poison control center, no burn victims requiring plastic surgery for children, no children requiring surgery to correct paralysis or other problems resulting from accidents while sledding, skating, skiing or snowmobiling, no death certificates to issue because of preventable accidents.

## AUDUBON SOCIETY REPORTS

It is interesting to note that reports received by the Audubon Society from all over the United States and Canada show that there has been a continual decline in the hawk and eagle populations. Declines in these species have been attributed to the effects of DDT and other pesticide residues and loss of habitat for nesting. Also, they report a large number of them still being shot, a fact to the Fish and Game Department can attest in Idaho. They have been protected in Idaho for a good number of years along with song, insectivorous and innocent birds. The only birds unprotected in Idaho are the English sparrow, crow, raven, starling, magpie and feral pigeon.

cornstarch, detergents, solvents, and chemical stain removers, such as bleaches.

Start with the simplest treatment, sometimes sponging or soaking in cold water loosens spots and is all that is needed. Before you begin to cope with the spot, always test for color fastness on a seam allowance or hem. Work from the outside to the center of the spot to avoid spreading, keeping an absorbent cloth under the stain. Never press stained fabric before the stain is removed; heat "sets" some spots. Always work in a well ventilated area and follow directions carefully. When garments are to be sent to the drycleaner, carefully label the garment as to fiber content and what type of stain is present.

A bulletin on stain removal is available from your county home economist. Ask for Home and Garden Bulletin No. 62, "Removing Stain from Fabrics."

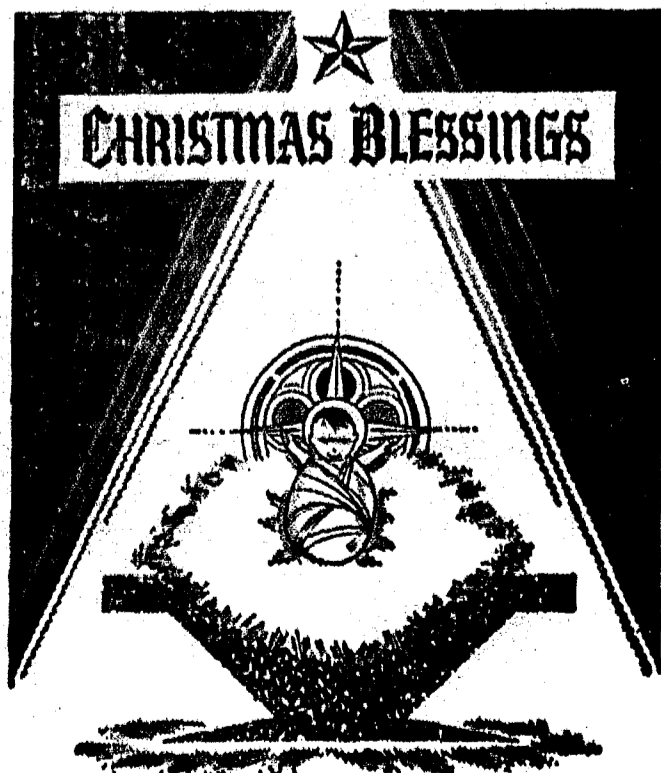

**Snow Shoveler Calls Improve Job Picture In Latah County**

Calls from harried householders and some business establishments for snow shovelers upped the placement activities at the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment last week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that his office placed a total of 32 workers on jobs during the week; many of whom were temporary workers involved in removing the white stuff. There were others, however, who did find full time regular employment through the office, he said. Included in the others were a bookkeeper, warehouseman, service station manager, cafe and domestic workers. Last week there were only 8 job placements made, the same number as made during the corresponding week in 1970. At the end of the week there were 20 jobs still open. This compares with 23 a week ago, but only 2 during the same week a year ago. Still needed in the Moscow area are an experienced fireman, a waterpump sales and serviceman, diesel truck mechanic, (out-of-town), an experienced secretary with good shorthand, a stationery boiler fireman, a dental assistant and a fast and accurate typist. Also needed in the area are workers for local cafe and for domestic household work here according to Hartstein's report. New claims for unemployment in-

surance continue to be filled through his office, Hartstein continued. He said that 63 persons filed new claims during the week bringing the total of those currently seeking jobless pay to 342. Last week's total was 282. Including the fifty-two new claims filed then, and a year ago the total was 345, with 60 newly idled workers seeking benefits. Throughout the county the Moscow area now has 182 persons seeking unemployment insurance compared with 156 a week ago and 146 a year ago. At Pottlatch the current total is 62, last week 46 and last year 54. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there are now 80 workers filing claims for benefits compared with 77 last week and 102 during the same week in 1970. Several Hughes Air-West Employees who are idled by the mechanics strike have applied for benefits as well as a number of construction workers who were laid off due to the stormy weather during the week.

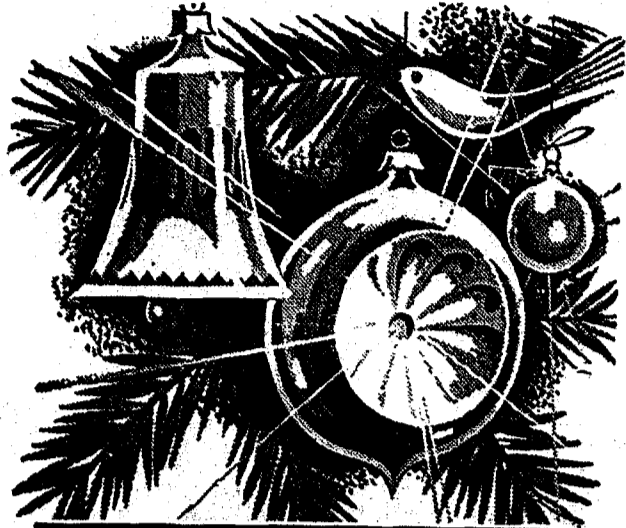

## NEW FISHING REGULATIONS DISTRIBUTED ALREADY

The state's hunting and fishing li-  
cense vendors have been mailed copies  
of the 1972 fishing regulations. The  
new official rules for anglers will re-  
main in effect through December  
1972. As usual, the regulations list  
a number of waters that are open on  
a year-round basis. The general trout  
season opens April 29 in the lakes of  
the northern Idaho panhandle and  
May 27 in all other waters of the  
state. Anglers should also take not-  
ice that in 1972 the trout bag limit  
has been reduced to ten, although  
the poundage limit remains the same  
—seven pounds and one fish.

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**Vegans Are  
Strict Vegetarians**

Imagine a breakfast of algae toast, lunch with soybean sandwiches and dinner with peanut "meat" loaf.

This is an example of a possible "vagan" diet, said Esther Wilson, University of Idaho extension nutrition specialist. A vegan, as a strict vegetarian, eats no animal products. The usual vegetarian, in contrast, drinks milk and eats eggs and cheese, but avoids meats.

British research reports that today's strict vegetarian, or vegan, eventually may develop weakness of the limbs with some spinal pains, Mrs. Wilson said.

Dr. Frederic J. Stare, chairman of the Department of Nutrition at the Harvard School of Public Health, doubts that anyone lives entirely on fruits and nuts as one strict vegan group claims. He suspects these food faddists have an occasional meat sandwich or a glass of milk.

Scientists are attempting to develop a suitable plant substitute for meat, should global protein shortage occur. However, it is difficult to have proper nutrition from plant sources alone, Mrs. Wilson said. One must eat large quantities of high quality vegetable protein to get equal substitution for an animal protein source, and the vegetable starches in such quantities could lead to overweight. Then too, vegans should supplement vitamin B12, which comes almost exclusively from animal sources.

The general health of the vegetarian group consuming milk, eggs and cheese appears unaffected, said Mrs. Wilson. Each of these products has an adequate amount of good quality protein and some vitamin B12.

There is no justification for the claim that vegetarians are healthier than nonvegetarians, Mrs. Wilson adds. Each individual controls the nutritional value of his diet by his food choice and preparation methods.

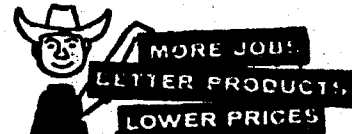

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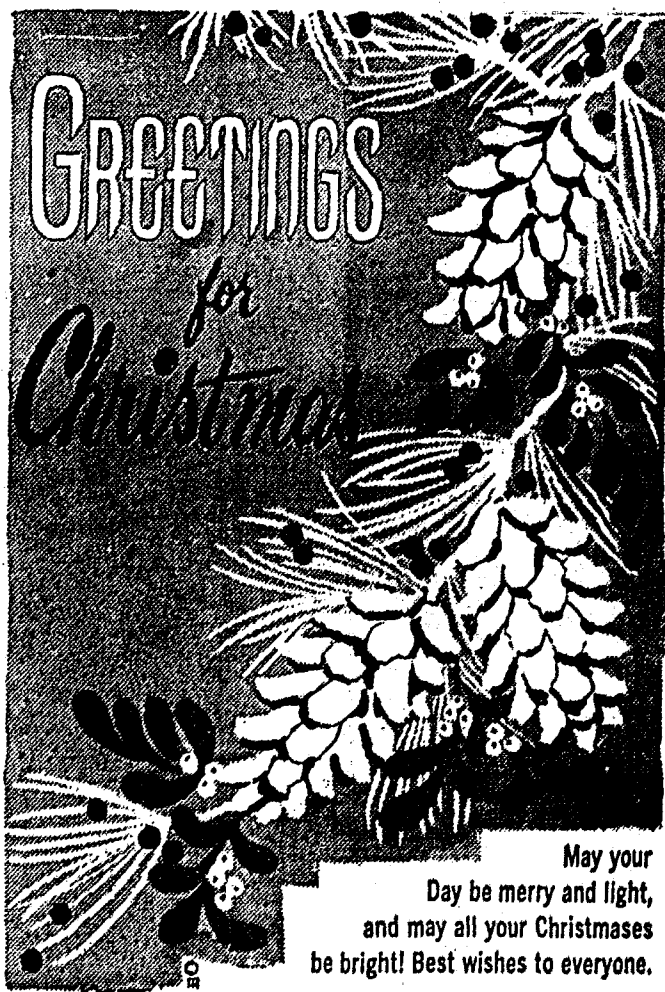
