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



Start with the simplest treatment, sometimes sponging or soaking in foold water loosens spots and is all that is needed. Before you begins to cope with the spot, always test for color fastness on a seam allowance or hem. Work from the out-side to the center of the spot to avoid spreading, keeping an absor-bent cloth under the stain. Never press stained fabric before the stain is removed; heat "sets" some spots. Always work in a well ventilated area and follow directions carefully. When garments are to be sent to the drycleaner, carefully label the garment as to fiber content and what type of stain is present.

A bulletin on stain removal is available from your county home economist. Ask for Home and Garden Bulletin No. 62, "Removing Stain from Fabrics."

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

Imagine a breakfast of algae toast, lunch with soybean sandwiches and dinner with peanut "meat" loaf.

This is an example of a possible "vagan" dist, said Esther Wilson, University of Idaho extension nutrition specialist. A vegan, as a strict vegetarian, eats no animal products The usual vegetarian, in contrast, drinks milk and eats eggs and cheese, but avoids meats.

British research reports that to-day's strict vegetarian, or vegan, eventually may develop weakness of the limbs with some spinal pains, Mrs. Wilson said.

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


