The defeat of House Bill 631 on a re-consideration vote by a 37-32 margin claimed top interest for residents in this area. Rep. Geo. F. Brocke reported the defeat of the bill by telephone to the Gazette late Monday morning, just after the balloting had taken place.

A random sampling of about 13,000 license, bird hunters for 1971 seasons been mailed questionnaires, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reported today.

This means that questionnaires were

mailed to about five percent resident and ten percent nonresident hunters in the ramdom sample. The purpose is to collect important information to be used in the management of migratory waterfowl, upland game birds and small game animals such as rab-

bits.

2.000 combination hunting-fishing every week. licenses have been sold at \$135 in the past three months. A quota of 9,552 of these nonresident fish and game licenses are available this year (the same as the 1971 quota) and approximately 7,500 remain unsold, according to A. Kay Belnap, chief

Of the \$75 nonresident deer only licenses, approximately 175 have been sold from a quota of 3,821, leaving a total of about 3,650 available at this time. This license entitles the purchaser to hunt in any general deer unit that is open in the state.

Nonresident hunters may obtain Idaho licenses by mailing their requests to the headquarters office of the Idaho Fish and Game Department (600 South Walnut Street, Boise, Idaho, 83707) with a certified check or money order for the exact amount of the license class desired-\$135 for the nonresident fish and game license, or \$75 for the nonresident deer license only. The license request should obtain a physical description of the applicant age, height, weight, sex, etc. These licenses are also available at vendors




