

Gil Erlwine, 76, Claimed Suddenly

Gilbert E. Erlwine, 76, a retired farmer, died of a heart attack Thursday morning, March 23, at 6:30 at his home in Juliaetta.

He was born Feb. 12, 1896, at Crowell, Nebraska, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Erlwine. He moved west to Missoula in 1927 to work as a pack train driver for the federal government, after having served with the Navy in the Atlantic Ocean from 1917 until 1921.

Erlwine married Jessie Butler Nov. 8, 1930, at Spokane. She survives at the family home.

In 1932 the couple moved to a farm at Southwick and lived there until his retirement in 1963, at which time they moved to Juliaetta.

He was a member of Kendrick Chapter No. 28, A. F. & A. M., a charter member of the Kendrick-Juliaetta post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a member of the Hells Canyon Barracks of the Veterans of World War I at Clarkston.

Survivors besides his widow include two sons, Neil G. Erlwine, Orofino, and Gerald Lee Erlwine, Polson, Mont.; two half-brothers, Lester Erlwine, Omaha, Neb., and Oliver Erlwine, Escondido, Calif.; one half-sister, Viola Vasay, Engelside, Tex., and two grandchildren.

The funeral was held Saturday at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with Rev. Lonnie Williams officiating.

Music for the service was provided by Singers Mrs. Jack Lohman and Mrs. Burt Souders, accompanied by Mrs. Max Clemenhagen.

Tax Reduction For Senior Citizens Now Available

The office of the Latah County Assessor is now taking applications for a reduction in the tax bill for all citizens over age sixty-five as of January 1 of this year, who live in their own house or trailer, the value of which does not exceed \$15,000.00 and whose income does not exceed \$4,800 from all sources. This is the word from Latah County Assessor Eugene Taylor.

The law granting this tax relief also requires that the applicant has been a taxpayer of Idaho for the past ten years and the maximum exemption allowance is not to exceed \$75 and applies to the dwelling only. The applications must be made before May 15 and it is recommended that applicant bring his 1971 Assessed Valuation Statement with him. A personal application must be made and any further information required will be supplied by the Assessor. Widow's and Veteran's exemptions are also being taken now.

Senior Citizens are asked to watch the paper for notice of when Assessor Taylor will be in the area to take applications for exemption from those who find it difficult to make the trip to Moscow.

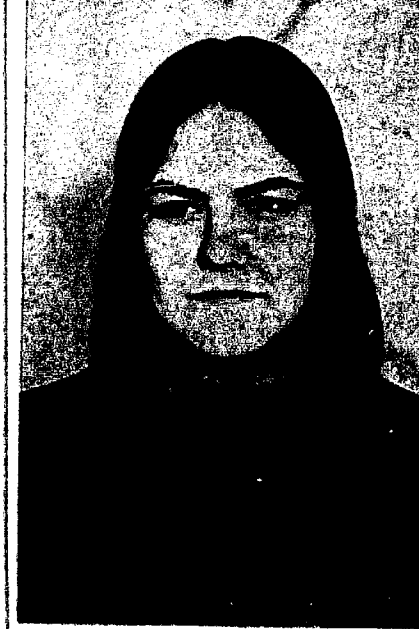

Mrs. Edith Wells Will End 37-Year Postal Career With Retirement March 31

Southwick—"No use to hire you—you'd just get married, have kids and quit me," predicted Emil Schuesler, Southwick postmaster, early in October, 1934. The pretty, pert, 19-year old girl graduate of Southwick High School standing before him had just applied for the position of postmaster's leave replacement.

In spite of the elderly postmaster's misgivings, she got the job, and Schuesler proved himself an apt soothsayer. Miss Edith Bateman was married the following week.

Friday, Mrs. Aaron (Edith R.) Wells retires from the United States Postal Service after 37 years and 4 hours as postmaster of Southwick's fourth class postoffice. Her additional service of four and one half years as leave replacement add up to 37 years in postal work. This impressive total confused even postal inspectors, when faced with the rosy cheeked Mrs. Wells, whose merry brown eyes and light brown hair easily belie her 56 years. "The inspectors usually wanted to know how I could have so much time built up in postal work," she explained.

She was appointed acting postmaster April 18, 1939, upon the retirement of Schuesler, an old pioneer of German stock, who had come to Southwick from Dent. She received her permanent appointment Nov. 25, 1939 becoming Southwick's thirteenth postmaster.

Mrs. Wells came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Bateman to Southwick when she was 11 months old. In 1926, the family left for Oregon, where they engaged in dairy farming for three years until Bateman's death in 1929. Mrs. Bateman and her four daughters returned to Southwick where Mrs. Wells graduated from high school in 1933.

Mrs. Wells related, "When Aaron and I were married we were unable to find a place to live." Rural neighborliness solved the problem when

Debbie, a seventh grade student at Kendrick, won the second place award in her age group with two accordion selections. She represented the Ridge Riders Saddle Club.

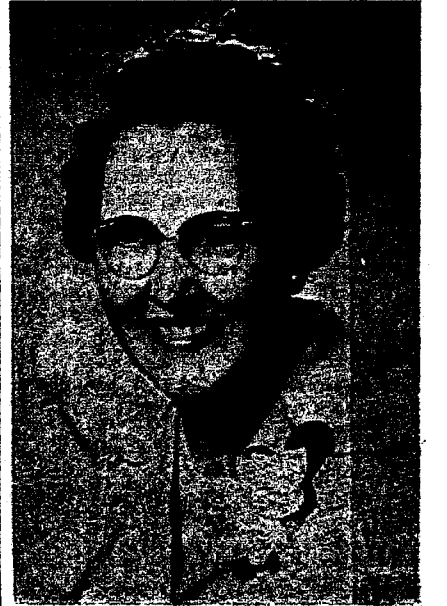
The talent show, held annually, is sponsored by the many saddle clubs of the surrounding areas.

friends, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Travis, now of Grangeville, invited them to share their home. "We lived in the front and they lived in the back, until the Travis' moved away," she stated. The Wells' bought the house in 1936 and still live there.

During her tenure the post office was burglarized twice. While she was on leave, thieves broke in through a window. They removed the small safe and carried it across the street to the blacksmith shop, where they proceeded to break it open. Luckily, Postmaster Schuesler had taken the cash home that evening.

The second time also resulted in a thwarted attempt to steal postal funds as the burglars succeeded only in screwing off the knobs of the safe.

Mrs. Wells notes changes affecting her have taken place in postal operations since the beginning of her career. When she took office, fourth class postmasters were paid by the number of cancelled letters which were dispatched daily from their post office. A dearth of letter writing by postal customers might result in 50 cents remuneration for the day. This was resolved when fourth class postmasters were guaranteed a yearly salary based on annual receipts.



When Mrs. Wells took office there were eight post offices on Pottlatch Ridge. Leland, Cameron, Cavendish, Teakean, Crescent, Linden and Park all have been discontinued.

Because of improved road conditions and modern vehicles, Star Route driver, Roy Whittum of Juliaetta can make the mail run on schedule, from its distribution point, Lewiston Sectional Center, to Southwick's terminal outpost, even in bad weather. Mrs. Wells' daily hours of postal operation, from 9 to 3 are seldom hampered by winter interludes of snow and ice.

This was not so in Mrs. Wells' first several years in the post office. Star Route carrier from Southwick to Park, Thomas Armitage, resorted to the old adage, "get a horse!" when bad weather set in.

With a touch of nostalgia she related, "In the winter months, Uncle Tom Armitage driving a team, came by the house and picked me up before daybreak at 5:30. After I distributed the mail, he went on to the other post offices. When he returned about 6 I rode back with him."

During the rugged winter of 1948-1949, Mrs. Wells literally enacted the slogan of the United States Post Office Department—"Neither rain, nor snow, nor gloom of night will stay these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."—when for two weeks, she walked the one-half mile to work on snowshoes.

"I walked right across the fences," she said. "The snow was so deep there was no way to tell where they were."

During that period, Southwick was the end of the mail run as the roads further on were impassable.

Mrs. Wells' membership in the National Association of Postmasters of the United States has highlighted her long postal career. She missed only three state conventions since 1949 and was elected state president for 1960-61. That year she attended the national NAPUS convention at Miami, where she met former Postmaster General James Farley. This was an especially thrilling event, she said, since she had received her postmaster's appointment during his term in office.

Aaron drives the school bus for children on the Ridge and also is the District Bus maintenance man. He will retire in August.

From then on the couple's life of leisure will include camping, traveling, trapshooting and raising garden. Mrs. Wells, an ardent rockhound, belongs to the Flintstone Rock Club at Kendrick. She likes to knit, sew embroidery and crochet. Her many hobbies leave no time for boredom, but she admits she will miss daily contact with people and seeing fellow postmasters at the district meetings every other month.

In her new role of retired postmaster, she will be a hostess at the association's next meeting in April and has planned a home cooked smorgasbord, prepared by the Southwick Homemakers' Extension Club of which she is a member.

Her mother, Mrs. Wade Candier, and three sisters, Mrs. T. E. King, Mrs. Clifford Brown and Mrs. James Reece all live at Southwick.

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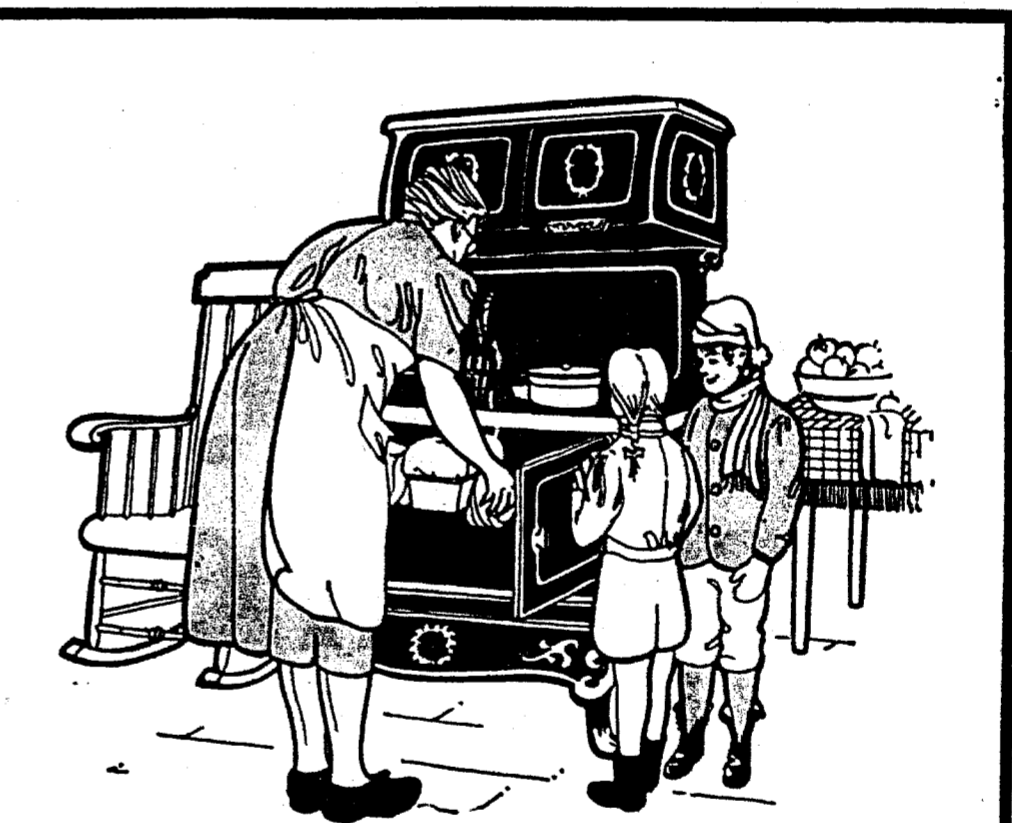

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

3/4 lb. chocolate for dipping

Put gelatin in top of double boiler; add cold water. When gelatin softens, add boiling water and stir well.

Add sugar and salt. Put over boiling water and stir until sugar dissolves completely.

Four into large bowl of electric mixer and beat at high speed until mixture is thick but not stiff as beaten egg whites. Add vanilla.

Meanwhile, spread flour 2 inches deep in a large pan. Push an egg (in shell) into the flour at intervals, making hollow places in which to mold the marshmallow mixture. Drop marshmallow mixture into the flour molds. Sprinkle flour lightly over top and put in cold place until set.

Remove mixture from one mold and you have a half egg. Dip in chocolate. If desired you may stick two halves together with chocolate and have a beautifully shaped round egg.

Decorate with regal icing.

BUTTER - CREAM EASTER EGGS

1/2 pound, plus 1 tblsp. butter

1 8-ounce package cream cheese

3 boxes confectioners sugar

8 ounces semi-sweet chocolate

1 2-inch square wax

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream 1/2 pound butter and cream cheese; gradually blend in sugar.

Shape into small eggs. Cool for about 1 hour. Melt chocolate, remaining butter, wax and vanilla over hot water. Dip eggs in mixture and allow to cool.

Yield: 90-100 eggs.

IDAHO DEPT. OM EMPLOYMENT

Job opportunities rose slightly during the past week in the Moscow area, according to Frank J. Hartstein, office manager for the Moscow Department of Employment.

He said his office received 21 new jobs during the week compared with 17 received during the previous week, and with 14 new listing during the same week a year ago.

Filling the jobs was a little more difficult, he said, as only 7 workers were placed on jobs, compared with 12 during the previous week.

Thirty-three jobs were still open at the close of business Friday. Among the job opportunities were those for farm tractor operators, an upholsterer, auto mechanics, lumber yard worker, various office workers, cooks, waitresses and domestic workers.

Although some construction workers returned to work as a result of the moderating weather during the week, loggers and some sawmill workers were laid off because of muddy conditions of the woods.

A total of 55 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, raising the total number of idled workers to 513. A year ago the total of jobless pay seekers was 417.

In the immediate Moscow area there are now 205 workers seeking benefits, down from last week's 219, but up considerable from last year total of 171.

At Genesee the totals are now, 11, last week 12, and last year 13.

In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, where most of the loggers reside, the current total is 180, a week ago 166, and a year ago only 134.

Kendrick showed no change, with 10 last week and last year. In the Potlatch-Princeton-Harvard area there are now 95 persons seeking unemployment compensation compared with 89 last week and 78 a year ago.

At Elk River the total now is 12, up 2 from last week, but down one from last year. Weather

BEAVER DAMAGE CHARGES LEAD DEPREDAATION LIST

Damage complaints from wildlife depredations were up about 30 percent higher last year than during 1970, the Idaho Fish and Game Department disclosed today.

Beaver led all wildlife species as a cause for depredation complaints.

During the year, 180 of the 585 damage complaints reported or about 31.8 percent, were caused by beaver. Other leading causes were pheasants, 19.1 percent; bear, 15.9 percent; deer, 7.8 percent; ducks, 6.7 percent; other waterfowl, 4.3 percent; geese and elk, 3.8 percent each; other furbearers, 2.2 percent; other nongame birds, other big game other mammals, other upland game birds, coyotes and other predatory mammals less than 1 percent, according to Wes Shaw, game biologist, Boise.

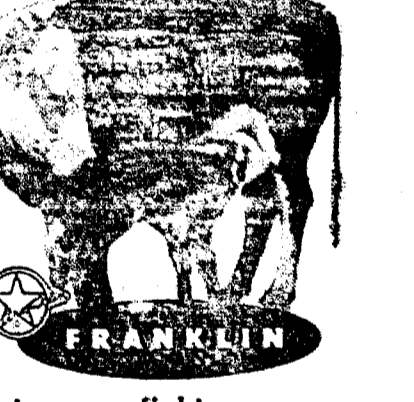
