## David Wilken Elected President of Idaho Future Farmers of America For 1972-'73

Burley — David Wilken of the Kendrick FFA chapter was elected to succeed Zane Hanson as the president of the Idaho Association of the Future Farmers of America, at the annual convention of that group held in Burley last week. David, a senior at Kendrick High School is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Wilken of Camron.

David has previously served as the Kendrick chapter's reporter and president, and also as president of the North Idaho District. Dave is the first state officer in the history of the Kendrick chapter. He was also active in several other areas of state competition.

On Wednesday evening, at Burley, the state public speaking contest was held with the winners of each of the eight districts in Idaho competing. After all speeches were presented, David emerged winner for the state of Idaho. By winning of this category, David will represent Idaho at the national public speaking contest in Kansas City, Mo., next October.

After winning the public speaking and the state president office, the KHS senior had still more honors ahead of him. He was awarded a \$400 Union Pacific Railroad scholarship to be used at the Land Grant college of his choice. This scholarship is awarded to an outstanding FFA member in each county in Idaho where there is a vocational agriculture program and FFA chapter. The scholarship is based on scholastic standing, FFA activities, and school and community activities.

Wilken then was announced as the

State Proficiency Award winner in Agricultural Mechanics. This award was presented by National FFA President Tim Burke, and was accompanied by a \$100 dollar check from the National FFA foundation. David won this award because of his outstanding work in the construction and repair of farm machinery in the Ag Shop and his home shop. By winning this award for Idaho, David will automatically be competing for the National Agriculture Mechanics award that will be presented in Kansas City during the National Convention.

Other honors going to the Kendrick chapter members was the awarding of the State Farmer degree to Steve Hoogland. Steve, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hoogland, Kendrick, was one of six members from North Idaho and one of 69 in Idaho to receive the State Farmer degree. The State Farmer degree is based on the boy's farming, livestock, or agricultural occupations work as well as on their leadership abilities.

Other awards included the Kendrick chapter being awarded the superior chapter award. This is the second straight year Kendrick has received this award. The Bonners Ferry and Moscow chapters were the only other North Idaho chapters qualifying.

Other members attending the State convention from Kendrick chapter were Dale Taylor, Ron Silflow, and Steve Eichner.

Dale and Ron were official delegates from Kendrick and sat in on all business sessions which determined State FFA policies for the coming 1972-73 year.

## Hill and Valley Garden Club To Assist In Develop Plan For City-Wide Landscaping

## Potlatch Phone Co. To Convert to Direct Distance Dialing

This new equipment will enable all subscribers to call station to station, anywhere in the United States or Canada, without going through the operator.

The tentative date for subscriber use is set for Thursday, April 13, says Otto Schupfer, manager of the local utility.

Each subscriber will be receiving an insert sheet of calling instructions concerning direct distance dialing. This sheet is to be attached to a gummed strip which is inside the front page of the current telephone directory. This gives specific dialing instructions, and also an Area Code map to refer to.

The installation of the equipment is being done by Don Eichner and Michael Rishling, employees of the Potlatch Telephone Co.

## Flood Control and Repair Were Topics At Genesee City Council Meeting

Genesee—The Genesee City Council held their April meeting Monday evening in the City Room with Mayor D. P. Scharrhorst and councilmen, Leonard Singhose, L. W. Sorenson, Wm. Pharr and Walter Moden, Jr. present.

A resolution was approved and signed by Mayor Scharrhorst authorizing Councilman Sorenson as the official representative for the city on Disaster Relief.

Building permits were approved for Ron Zeigler and Marian Musgrave.

Phil Hermann, commissioner of the rural fire department appeared at the meeting to propose that the rural department pay 50 percent of the installation charges for the fire phone and buttons, plus \$75 per month toward the fire chief's wages.

The Council also voted to share with the rural department the cost of the purchase of an air mask.

Glen Utzman, Moscow, city auditor, presented his annual financial report for the year ending December 31, 1971 and told the city they were doing a good job of staying within its budgetary limitations.

Street commissioner Sorenson reported that a corps of engineers had examined and reported that about 680 tons of material would be required to repair the streets in Genesee washed out by the recent floods.

Also approved by the council was cleaning two sections of Cow Creek. New by-laws for the fire department were presented by Councilman

Moden, and approved by the council. The city council also approved the engineer's recommendation for a 10-horse power water pump to be used on Boech Street.

The City Clerk was instructed to send a letter to the State Highway Department, stating they approved the North Fork Hatwai Creek Route.

The council considers this route to be the shortest, most advantageous to the Genesee area, least costly, less destruction to agricultural lands and wildlife habitat and will be increased economic value to all Idaho.

Robert H. Jobb's name was approved by the council as a potential fireman and sent on to the fire department.

Councilman Singhose reported that the CEDA will accept the City of Genesee's membership, as was previously approved and budgeted.

Singhose also stated that LeRoy Harris has contacted over 40 residents on the disaster relief condition in this area and has informed them where to write for disaster relief forms.

## Panhandle Lake Fishing Open For Big Mackinaw

General lake fishing in the Panhandle region of Idaho runs from April 29 through November 30, although mackinaw fishing starts in Priest Lake on April 15 and runs through December 15. Kokanee fishing is open on the big lakes year round, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded anglers today. Gaff hooks are prohibited in landing mackinaw from a boat—April 15 through 30 and December 1 through 15.

Giant mackinaw trout in Priest Lake and Kamloops rainbow trout in Lake Pend Oreille and large Dolly Varden trout in both lakes attract trophy fishermen from many parts of the United States, Canada and other foreign countries. As these species grow big and carnivorous, they feed primarily on schools of small, landlocked blueback or kokanee salmon. Fishing for kokanee is year-round with a daily limit of 50 fish at Lake Pend Oreille and 25 fish at Priest Lake, with no possession or weight limit.

The general season for the taking of fish in waters of Area 1 shall be May 27 through October 31 for streams, and April 29 through November 30 for lakes. The general fishing season statewide is May 27 through October 31, unless otherwise provided.

If your work is sedentary, exercise may help. Walk often and take up a sport such as golf, swimming or bowling.

Make an energy budget with priorities for things to be done—including rest periods.

Check your living and working conditions for excessive noise, bad lighting, poor ventilation and oppressive heat or cold.

Take a breather when you feel yourself becoming irritable—the first sign of fatigue.

A break in daily routine, a change of pace, can be invigorating.

If you feel tired habitually or unexplainably, look for a physical reason. See your family physician for a checkup. Poor vision can cause fatigue, so have your eyes checked.

If you are dieting, try a slower reducing plan with the aid of your family physician.

## Tax Relief Is Available To Flood Victims, IRS Says

The President's declaration that Latah County is a disaster area as a result of the flood makes special tax benefits available to disaster victims John C. Andulza, Public Information Officer of Internal Revenue for Idaho said that victims may deduct their casualty losses on their 1971 Federal income tax returns instead of waiting until next year.

Taxpayers who have already filed 1971 returns may still deduct their losses by filing an amended return or a Claim Form 843. The deadline for doing this for calendar year returns is July 17, 1972.

Amended returns should be filed on Form 1040X. Copies of the form and instructions for its use are available at local IRS offices.

Mr. Andulza advised taxpayers suffering losses in the flood to prepare and retain records and information establishing the amount of their losses.

Nonbusiness casualty loss deductions are limited to the amount over \$100 for each casualty.

IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Thefts," describes procedures for claiming casualty losses.

### Water Diet

Water is just about the most important single need of man for health and to just stay alive.

It belongs in the classification of essential nutrients. A nutrient is defined as a part of food essential to growth, development and maintenance.

Water qualifies.

The normal body loses from 2 to 2½ quarts of water per day. Without replacement it would take only a few days to dehydrate the body.

Death would follow. Even a 10 percent loss is serious. Diets in which fluid intake is drastically reduced, are unsound and produce no physiological benefits, says Esther Wilson, nutrition specialist of the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

Water is the means of an efficient delivery and transportation system for the human body. It carries nutrients to the tissues and carries off waste. It is a solvent and without it the chemical reactions for basic needs of life cannot function. It is a part of all body cells. In fact, most of our cells contain 2/3 water, while muscle cells may be as high as 70 percent water.

It controls and regulates the body temperature by throwing off unwanted heat through evaporation from the skin and lungs and transports heat from one part of the body to another.

Unless specially dried by one means or another, most foods contain considerable water. Breads are 16-20 percent; meats, 60-70 percent; fruits and vegetables, 80-90 percent, and milk about 90 percent water. Therefore, it would appear reasonable that a mixed diet of a variety of foods plus drinking from 4 to 8 glasses of water daily is advisable for all humans.

**Mackinaw Trout Season**  
 Priest Lake special fishing season for giant mackinaw trout runs from April 15 through December 15. Gaff hooks are prohibited when landing fish from a boat April 15 through April 30 and December 1 through December 15. This special season for mackinaw applies to Priest Lake and Upper Priest Lake. The waters at the mouths of streams for a radius of 300 feet into both lakes have the same seasons as the streams. Daily bag limit for sportsmen is 25 kokanee. There is no possession or weight limit. The general season for taking of fish in the waters of the Panhandle (Areal) not otherwise listed in the regulations this year is May 27 through October 31 for streams, and April 29 through November 30 for lakes.

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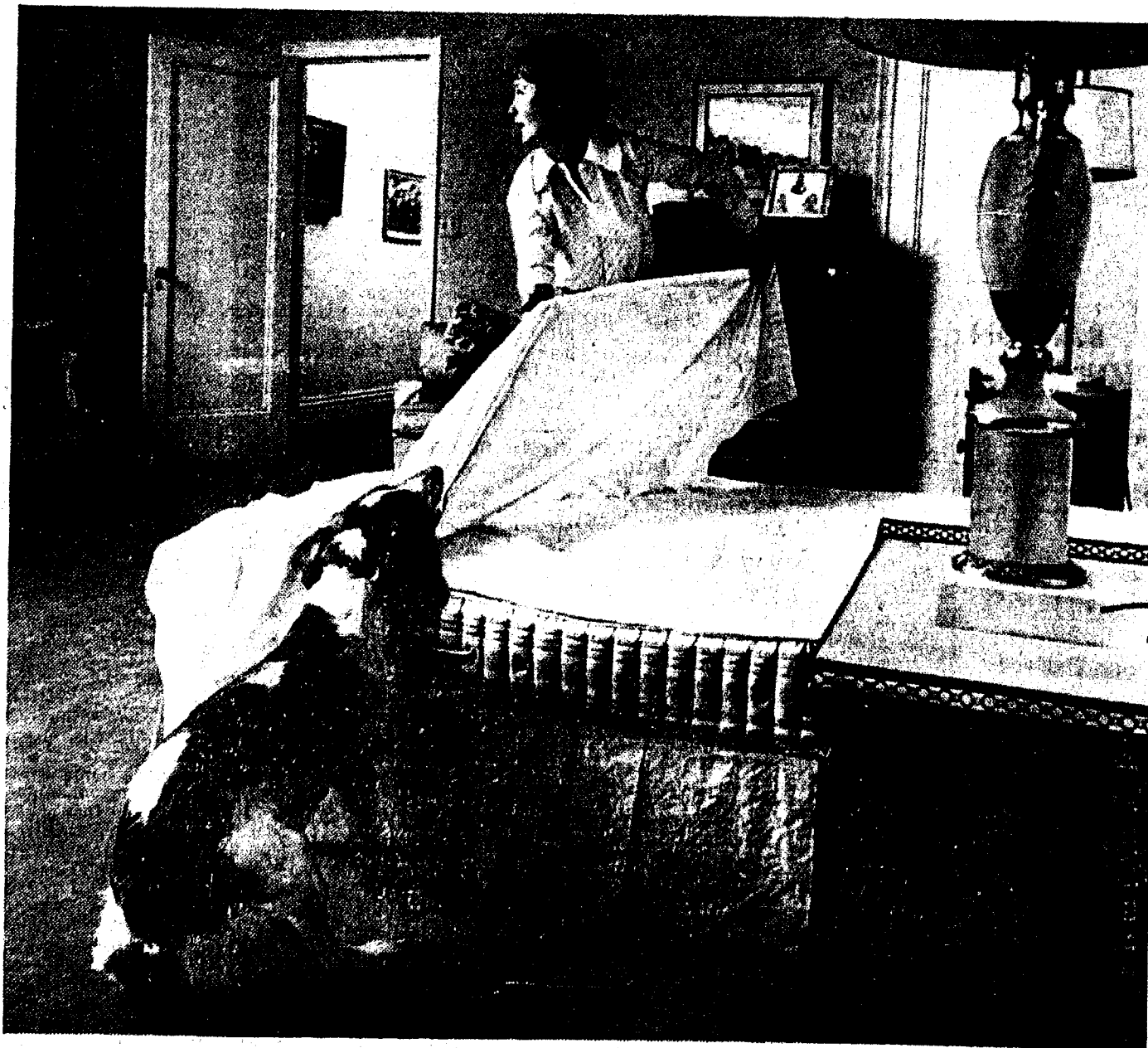
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## Home Cookin' . .

### APRICOT-BEAN CASSEROLE

- 3/4 lb. hamburger
- 2 tbl. shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 cup canned apricots
- 1 lb. can baked beans
- 1/2 cup chili sauce
- 2 tbl. brown sugar
- 2 large onions

Mix hamburger, salt, pepper, and mustard together and make into 18 small balls. Brown in shortening.

Mix together beans, chili sauce, sugar and apricots. Add meat balls and place in casserole. Top with onion rings and bake 30 to 40 minutes in moderate oven.

### BARBECUED STRING BEANS

- 3/4 lb. strips bacon until crisp. Drain and crumble.
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup catsup
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- pinch salt

Mix ingredients together and simmer about 10 minutes. Add to 3 cans French string beans. Simmer 15 or 20 minutes longer.

### Salty Springs

A sluggish engine is not just a winter problem. Getting your car under way smoothly can be just as difficult in the spring or summer as when frigid temperatures sabotage your engine.

James Richards, road service manager of the Inland Automobile Association points out that there are other reasons for those few moments of hesitation before a surge of power results when the driver steps on the accelerator.

Richards cited four major factors — improper carburetor adjustment, failure of pistons to fire in proper sequence, defective spark plugs and failure of the driver himself to depress the accelerator completely.

In addition, the motor club official said the general condition of the carburetor, plugs and pistons can affect engine performance. For instance, if a plug has a substantial carbon

## Idaho Wildlife Week Coincides With Wildlife Federation Meeting

The 37th annual meeting of the Idaho Wildlife Federation this year ended March 19, the third day of the meeting at Idaho Falls, and the start of the state and national Wildlife Week, March 19 through 25. This is a reminder of sort that the National Wildlife Federation prides its state affiliates, including the strong Idaho Wildlife Federation, to push fish and game conservation 52 weeks a year.

Idaho's organized sportsmen do more than just talk—or gripe about what the Fish and Game Department does, or does not do. Knowing that the department operates under state laws and with money collected from sportsmen under these laws, Federation members through their legislators actually control how much of a program for maintaining and expanding the fishing and hunting potential can be developed, and how much money can be spent in the process.

Long-time members can point with pride to such signal triumphs as the Federation-backed initiative petition to establish a commission form of administration for the Idaho Fish and Game Department in 1938, or even the voter approval of the dredging initiative proposal of 1965.

These milestones of historic significance do not dwarf important continuing Federation projects such as the annual statewide conservation essay contest, the voluntary hunter safety training program in the public and parochial schools, and the close cooperation with the Idaho Landholder-Sportsman Council to promote better farmer-hunter-fisherman relations.

buildup it won't operate efficiently. (Poor compression ratios in either high or low compression cars can result in the far more serious condition of a completely stalled engine.)

"A motorist who expects smooth performance from his car," he said "must make certain every engine component is in the best mechanical condition and performing its specific role properly."

was organized on a statewide basis in 1934, with the late R. G. Cole of Boise as president. He had served the Ada County Fish and Game League in the same capacity. Along with other pioneers of organized sportsmen 40 years or more ago, he knew that a club affiliated with a state organization is more effective than an isolated one. This influence is multiplied again when it is affiliated with a national conservation organization such as the National Wildlife Federation.

Nonetheless, the majority of Idaho sportsmen even today belong to no club at all. Though large in numbers, they have relatively little influence on conservation programs compared to organized sportsmen. If effect they let others speak for them, rather than joining a club and making their own voices heard collectively.

If all sportsmen, all outdoor people, would get together (basically everybody wants the same things) they could insist that natural resources be used so cover for wildlife, clean waters for fish, developed areas for multiple outdoor recreation any many other items are taken into account. They could then collectively swing the pendulum from purely economic considerations to those involving long-range benefits for future generations.

Clubs can do this by becoming conservation clubs instead of being organizations of rod and gun guys exclusively. Sportsmen's clubs can be formidable forces for conservation or they can be powerful pains in the neck. Most clubs probably range some places in between. But with a little more forethought and proper planning most clubs could positively get on the "good" side. This would make it much more pleasant for the average club member and would undoubtedly attract more worthwhile members. The end result—more satisfaction for everybody.

Although about three-fourths of the residents of most Idaho counties are hunters and fishermen, only a handful attend meetings regularly of the local sportsmen's clubs. Most of those in attendance are officers of the club. They spend part of the meeting time discussing whether it is worth going on trying to give county sportsmen a voice in matters of vital concern or just call it quits. Generally, they go on, but do it without depending upon the sportsmen who won't get out to meetings and provide the support the club needs. The officers and directors of the club will make the decisions that should be made by members.

Any good sportsman's club must have legal projects to stay alive. Many clubs do get behind such activities as maintaining or improving public access to a stream or lake, developing a water fowl area, building a clubhouse, opposing a Salmon River canyon road, helping with gun safety courses and many others.

In addition to getting behind hunter safety work, club members can get active in youth work. The ways are numerous. Going all the way, clubs can sponsor Boy Scout troops, initiate youth conservation clubs, donate conservation books to public and school libraries, send a teacher to a conservation workshop so the knowledge can be taught in school, send boys and girls to available conservation camps and sponsor conservation contests for children.

Through their resolutions and their legislative programs sportsmen organized in the Idaho Wildlife Federation promote what they want in conservation. They are willing to study the department's conservation plans, needs and shortcomings to become well informed conservationists.

What not become one of them?

### Extended Unemployment Benefits Available

The payment of Extended Unemployment Insurance Benefits to Idaho's unemployed will cease with the payment for the week ending April 1, 1972, according to Frank J. Hartstein, Manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Hartstein said that during the current period of Extended Benefit payments, a total of 52 persons received such benefits through the Moscow Employment office, for a total of 253 weeks of benefits. Duration of such benefits ranged from a minimum of five weeks to a maximum of 13 weeks. These payments were in addition to the regular benefits that had been exhausted by long term unemployed persons. The period of extended payments began on January 2, 1972.

Hartstein explained that the extended benefit program comes into being whenever the economy of the state or the nation meets certain criteria regarding unemployment. When unemployment is substantially and consistently higher than corresponding periods in previous years, and also when the percentage of unemployed reaches certain points, extended benefits are made available. The Federal Government participates in the payment of these benefits, and controls the on and off dates for the extended periods, he said.

### Nitrogen Problem Develops Below Dworshak Dam

Idaho Fish and Game officials this week voiced concern for the future of the North Fork Clearwater River steelhead run. High water flow into the reservoir behind the yet to be completed Dworshak Dam has results in early spilling of large amounts of water at the dam. The spilling has resulted in a buildup of nitrogen levels to 119 percent of saturation. Snowpack conditions are such that this problem could remain critical in the North Fork throughout the period that adult steelhead are returning to the hatchery.

Terry Holubetz, Lewiston, regional fishery biologist for the Fish and Game Department, indicates that if the adult steelhead linger in the North Fork or move slowly through this stretch that many may die from nitrogen disease. However, if they move rapidly through this stretch of water and directly into the hatchery many may escape adverse effects of the supersaturated water.

Holubetz also explained that stocking of catchable rainbow into Dworshak Reservoir has been delayed due to the spilling. The outlet at the dam is approximately 18 feet below the water surface and it is feared that a large percentage of the rainbow would leave the reservoir thru this outlet under the present circumstances.

Dworshak Hatchery has been plagued with problems this year; losing 1.5 million young steelhead to disease last September and 90,000 young steelhead to nitrogen supersaturation this spring.
