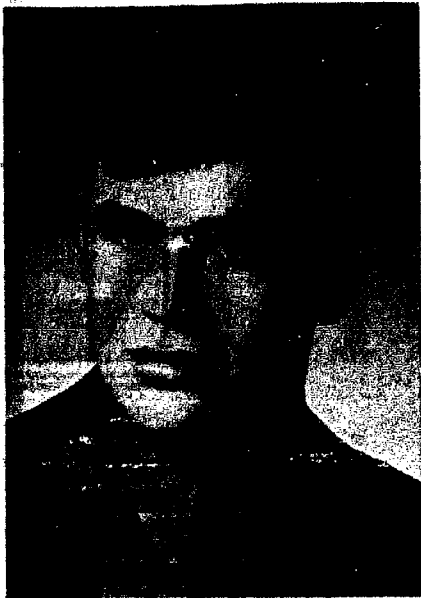
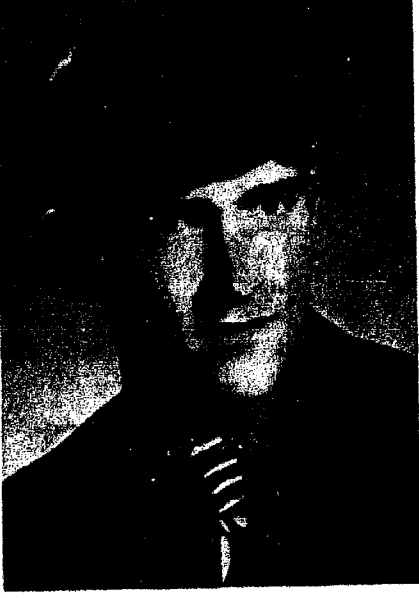


Honor Students Named At Genesee High

Direct Dialing For Kendrick Apr. 13; Juliaetta Apr. 20

All telephone subscribers of the Potlatch Telephone Company in the Kendrick exchange (those having a prefix of 289-) will be able to dial directly anywhere in the U. S. or Canada beginning Thursday, April 13.
Customers in the Juliaetta exchange, those with a 276- prefix, will have this service available to them on Thursday, April 20.

With direct distance dialing, you can dial station-to-station long distance calls to telephone numbers which have seven numerals or two letters and five numerals.

If the operator asks for your number, give the number of the telephone from which you are calling. Otherwise your telephone number will be automatically recorded for billing purposes. To place calls which are collect, credit card, person-to-person, or to be billed to another number you must place the call through the operator.

If you reach a wrong number dial "operator" immediately and tell her what happened. She will arrange for credit on the call. If you need any assistance the operator will be glad to help you.

If you are calling within the state of Idaho, all you need to dial is "1" then the telephone number you are calling (7 digits). For calls outside of Idaho you must dial "1" then the area code and area code maps are being distributed to all customers.

Genesee—The Ninth Biennial State Convention of the Catholic Daughters of America was hosted by Court Mother Cabrini No. 1778 of Genesee and Moscow, April 7-9. Our theme was "YOU ARE THE CHURCH."

Registration and a State Board meeting began Friday at 3:00 P. M. at St. Mary's School, followed by a social hour in the hall from 5:30 to 6:30. Dinner was served at Carter's, Genesee, at 7:00 P. M. Mrs. Dale Becker presided. The invocation was offered by Rev. Victor Lustig, State Clergy Consultant, Greencreek. Rev. Edward Cope, Pastor of St. Mary's, and Mayor Dick Scharnhorst gave the welcoming addresses. Miss Mary Ann Dunnigan, Past State Regent, Coeur d'Alene, responded.

Following the introduction of guests a delightful reading, "Definitely Mixed" was read by Mrs. Stanton Becker. Mrs. Robert Kinzer, accompanied by Mrs. Wm. Helbling, both of Moscow, sang several numbers.

Rev. Morse Later, Pastor of St. Mark's, Boise, addressed us with the topic: "Adult Education." He stated that until 400 years ago Catholic education was aimed at the adult. Then, in our enthusiasm to teach the youth, adult education was all but forgotten until 20 years ago. Many ideas have been, and are being tried; such as institutes, corsillos, searches, study clubs, etc. However, results are not too encouraging as only a few are taking advantage of these. A new idea of teaching parents to teach their children, to prepare them for each Sacrament, is budding. We pray for it's success.

Saturday we began with a Memorial Mass for all our deceased members at 8:00 A. M. at St. Mary's Church. Rev. Victor Lustig was celebrant.

Coffee and rolls were served before the official opening of the Convention by Mrs. John Skelton, State Regent, Lewiston. Our Boy Scout Troop, No. 352, presented the colors. Delegates were seated, the nominating committee was elected, and other committees were appointed. A panel of State Chairmen, with Mrs. Vincent Vassar moderating, presented the "Seven-fold Program of Improvement."

A "salad bar" luncheon was served at noon. Mrs. Harry Eglund, Jr. presided. An inspiring "Memorial" was read by Mrs. Stanton Becker. Mrs. Kenneth Pelo, President of the Lay Senate, Spokane, spoke to us on the changing role of women in the church today, but reminding us that the old roles are still important, and needed.

At the 2:00 P. M. meeting, resolutions were presented, minutes and correspondence read, and State officers gave their reports. A panel followed, on the revised constitution and bylaws, by the State officers, with Miss Mary Ann Dunnigan, moderating, and a regent's meeting.

Social hour at 5:30 P. M. was followed by the banquet at St. Augustine's Center, Moscow. Mrs. Ray Johann presided. His excellency, Most Rev. Sylvester W. Treinen, D. D. was detained in Boise, and Rev. Andrew Schumacher, Pastor of The Center, graciously filled in as guest speaker. His topic: "What Is Church?" encouraged us to be a living, holy people, called together to be reconciled to each other, and to celebrate together as a family, in joy!

We were all delighted to have our own Mrs. Ravlene Kasper chosen as Idaho Catholic Daughter of the Year. Entertainment of musical selections by St. Augustine's group was most enjoyable.

Sunday's Mass was celebrated by our beloved Bishop, Most Rev. Sylvester Treinen. The Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus formed an Honor Guard. Our Youth Choir sang folk hymns. Coffee and rolls were served to the Knights and the Daughters after Mass.

Our final session consisted of committee reports, and election and installation of State Officers for 72-74. Installing officer was Mrs. John Kennedy, Past National 2nd Vice Regent, from Tacoma, Wa.

Mrs. Gertrude Hudson is our delegate to the National Convention in Atlantic City, N. J. from July 15 to 21. Alternate is Mrs. John Skelton. The final luncheon was served by the Altar Society. Mrs. Les Allen presided. Guest speaker was Rev. Wm. Wassmuth, Diocesan Director of Catholic Education, Boise. He urged us to "Keep the Faith." It is not changed; only ceremonies and teaching methods are being updated to make them ore meaningful to the people of today.

News Items From Genesee Schools

Genesee — A \$327,715.01 tentative budget was approved by the Board of trustees at their regular meeting Monday, April 10th. This compares with a \$325,42.53 last year. This budget is temporary until voters either approve or fall a 3 mill override levy. The election for that special levy is set for May 8th. The 3 mill levy over ride is the same as last year's. The district has had the 3 mill over ride for the past two years. This does not raise the millage for the coming year. The maintenance and operation part of the budget is \$293,401.81 as compared to \$261,460.85 last year. The remaining \$34,313.20 of the budget is for Bond and Interest, Lunch, Driver Ed., and Federal Funds. The total budget will be published before the budget hearing set for May 8, 1972.

Mr. Joe Kalafus announced his retirement effective May 31 of this year. Mr. Kalafus has been head custodian for 33 years here at the Genesee Schools. The board agreed that Mr. Kalafus would be hard to replace for he has provided the district with excellent care and service, applications are being taken by the board and can be picked up in the office of the Superintendent. Deadline for applying is April 27 as the Board would like the replacement to work at school a month with Mr. Kalafus, while school is in session.

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Natural Resources Youth Camp To Offer Conservation Training

A week long outdoor camp designed to help young people understand the interrelationships among the soil, forest, range, wildlife, water, and recreation will be held June 11-17, 1972.

"Called the Inland Empire Natural Resources Youth Camp, the camp is open to all eastern Washington and northern Idaho high school youths. This is the first year the camp has been co-educational and will be held at Camp Helburn on Lake Chatcolet in northern Idaho," Gordon Dalley, Latah County Extension agent said this week.

Those young people who attend the camp will receive training which provides them with the basic knowledge about the environment and the interrelationships and management of natural resources.

"There are openings for 125 persons. In addition to the training they receive, youths will have the opportunity to take advantage of the recreation facilities at Camp Helburn. The fee is \$35 and application forms should be completed by June 1," he said.

Application forms and information are available at the Latah County Extension office, Courthouse, Moscow.

Common Vinegar Has Many Uses

Vinegar isn't just for salads and pickles. It can be your helper for cleaning, brightening and deodorizing your home, says Willma Shryack U. of I. home furnishings specialist.

Vinegar is especially useful for cat and dog accidents.

Make a solution of three tablespoons vinegar and one quart warm water and a bit of detergent. Using an absorbent cloth, sponge the affected area with the solution, following up with a clean, damp cloth to remove the vinegar solution.

To remove tarnish from brass and copper, apply salt, then vinegar and rub with a paper towel. Rust stains on washables also respond to vinegar and salt.

Vinegar is a deodorizer when it is poured into a hot pan after frying food that leaves odors, such as fish.

More Than 4 Million Cutthroat Eggs Taken

Some 4 1/2 million cutthroat trout eggs have been taken from fish making a spawning run up Hatchery Creek at Henrys Lake Hatchery in the Island Park country near Yellowstone Park this spring, the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

Most of these eggs will be incubated and "eyed up" and shipped to other hatcheries for use in the statewide stocking program in lakes and reservoirs. The bulk of the fish will be released as fingerlings. Most cutthroat trout eggs are obtained from Henrys Lake stock and shipped to

state hatcheries at American Falls, Clark Fork, Grace, Henrys Lake (for restocking), Mackay, McCall, Mullan, Sandpoint, Twin Falls and Warm River.

Walt Bethke, Boise, state hatchery supervisor, said that all 14 hatcheries operated by the Fish and Game Department are getting ready for the heavy fish planting work ahead. Production is expected to exceed 1 1/2 million pounds, or more than 23 million fish of all species, the amount raised in hatcheries last year.

The big tanker trucks and trailers already have been busy hauling trout for stocking lowland lakes in northern Idaho ahead of the special early season beginning April 29. Other

fish have been planted in drain ditches, reservoirs, lakes and some streams as water conditions permit. High snow runoff conditions now

affecting many streams will delay the statewide planting program in some areas.

Cougar Becomes Game Animal
 Spring Bear Hunting
 This spring on April Fools Day the cougar, or mountain lion, will change his status. He will no longer be listed as a predator, but will, in fact, become a big game animal. This largest of Idaho cats, will not, of course, change his predatory interests or habits but will, by legislative law, be classed as a big game animal in Idaho effective April 1, 1972.

Because of this change in classification he can now be managed by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. Seasons, bag limits and other methods of control can now be enacted for his protection or harvest as in the case of the bear—also a predator by nature.

Like the bear, the present bag limit on cougars, also going into effect April 1 is one mountain lion per person each year. No seasons have yet been set, except the complete closure on killing cougar in game management Unit 28 which ends on June 30, 1972. There is, however, a requirement that a resident must have a current hunting license and a non-resident must purchase a \$135.00 big game license, as well as a \$10.00 non-resident cougar tag to take one cougar. There is no cougar tags required for residents of Idaho.

A further stipulation in the law provides that nothing in this act shall make it unlawful to trap, kill, or otherwise dispose of bears of any kind or mountain lions molesting livestock; and it shall not be necessary

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or a prerequisite to obtain from the Fish and Game Department any permit for the killing or taking of such bears or mountain lions. Livestock owners may take steps they deem necessary to protect their livestock. All mountain lions must be reported to the Fish and Game Department.

Hunting of mountain lion and bear have long been a great hunting sport for those Nimrods who wish the rigorous chase that is necessary for this activity. I am glad that the mountain lion has now gained the necessary status to be classified a big game animal in Idaho—a position he should have had years ago.

Spring Bear Hunting
 Spring bear hunting is an important event in the Clearwater Region. As soon as these animals come out of their long winter's sleep, they are eagerly sought by hunters. In much of the area of the state, the bear season runs year around. Now in many areas the season opens in early September and runs through the spring months.

Here in the Clearwater Region in hunting units 8, 10, 10-A, 11, 11-A, 54, 15 and a portion of 16, the season on black bear runs through May 31, 1972. Big game units in the back country including 12, 16-A, 17, 19 and 20 and that portion of unit 15 lying north and east of the Selway River runs through June 30 1972.

Hunters should check the 1971 Big Game Hunting Season and Regulations for details of these areas. Also note that these regulations apply only to black bear species, including all color phases of the bear—the grizzly bear is protected and cannot be hunted in Idaho.

Those sportsmen going out for spring bear hunting should try for a quality hunt. There will usually be the opportunity to see several bears and the hunter should look them over and take a good animal. A pair of field glasses or scope-sighted rifle will enable a close examination of the bear to insure a good pelt—also to see if the animal is large, small or the animal he wishes to kill.

Precautions must be taken so that the hunter does not kill a female bear with cubs in the spring of the year. The Idaho law specifies that after December 15, each season, it is unlawful for any person to kill or capture a cub bear or to kill a female bear with cubs at side. This regulation applies to all units open to spring bear hunting. It is intended to protect the mother bear with young cubs that are born in January or February each year.

The meat of the bear at this time is very good eating and sportsmen should utilize the meat. It has less fat than in the fall season, and according to those that use it, it is ex-

New Job Listings In Latah County Rise Slightly

New job listings rose slightly during the week, but the number of workers finding jobs in the Moscow area declined slightly. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment reported that his office placed eleven workers on jobs during the week, compared with 17 given job finding help during the previous week. 14 jobs were listed with the office, he said, compared with 11 listed during the week before. At the end of the week there were 19 jobs still open. Among the workers needed were a secretary, a bookkeeper, general office clerks, farm workers, domestic workers, carpenters and a janitor.

Hartstein's report indicated that currently, there are 475 workers seeking unemployment insurance benefits. This is a decline from the 463 of the previous week, but is up from the 411 persons seeking such payments during the same week in 1971. Thirty-one newly idled workers filed new claims for benefits during the week compared with 40 new claims filed during the previous week and 40 during the same week a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area the total jobless pay workers stood at 181, last week, 188, and last year 155. At Genesee the totals were 13, 10 and 10. 171 checks were going into the Troy-Deary-Bovill area compared with 173 last week and 145 during the same week last year. At Kendrick the figures were 8, 8 and 11. In Follath there were a total of 94 seeking benefits. A week ago 93, and during the same week in 1971 the total was 77. 8 are still seeking benefits from the Elk River area compared with 11 last week and 13 last year.

The hide of a bear is always a prime trophy and can be used as a rug or wall-piece when properly taken care of. If a large bear is killed, the skull should be brought out for measurement and entered into trophy competition. Care of the hide by salting is necessary to keep it from spoiling. The skull can be prepared for measurement by burying in an ant hill as ants will remove the excess flesh from it.

Bark Mulch Makes Landscaping Easier

Bark mulch may be what you need to help make your home landscaping more attractive as well as easier to maintain.

Experiments by the department of agriculture show that bark improves texture of the soil by enriching it with natural humus. Bark mulch is entirely organic. Plants use fallen bark and other natural debris as a protective coating against heat and drought. It also eases the blows of alternate freezing and thawing in winter.

Many home owners, the department points out, enjoy the rustic look of bark mulch and the russet-colored appearance that lends another dimension to garden and home landscaping plans.

Another point is that weeds are smothered by the mulch so you do less weeding and trimming along borders. It prevents clay soil from packing. That means less work with the hoe. There is less evaporation so less water is needed.

However, bark must be used judiciously, scientists emphasize. There are some areas where it may smother vegetation. Desirable plants deserve a chance to grow. Sometimes the bark treatment is not the best answer.
