

# School District 283 Trustees Met; Special Mill Levy Vote; Other Topics Discussed

School trustees met in regular meeting Thursday evening, April 13 and again April 14 in the evening to transact regular business and hear a presentation of the preliminary budget for 1972-73.

The board reviewed the budget thoroughly and approved it on the basis that a 3 mill levy for maintenance and operation be conducted May 23 to assure necessary revenues.

Itemized anticipated revenues total \$273,260.39 and are as follows: School district taxes \$99,956.76; county apportionment \$27,823.00; additional county revenues \$9,000.00; state apportionment \$117,193.63; vocational education, \$9,000.00; federal assistance P. L. 874, \$8,862.00; sale of property \$1,425.00; other non revenue \$200.00.

Expenditures to date with a few minor adjustments pending are: Total administration \$21,419.00; total

instructional \$170,584.18; total attendance and health \$100.00; total pupil transportation, \$23,010.06; total operation of plant \$28,340.14; total maintenance of plant \$6,884.41; total fixed charges \$6,363.00; total food—student body services, \$875.00; total capital outlay, \$4,239.71; total debt service, \$10,612.25.

Total fund revenues for 1972-73 are up \$17,848.14. Expenditures are \$16,046.55 greater.

Supt. Don Blakeley stated instructional, maintenance of plant and capital outlay equipment expenditures were reduced by nearly \$4,000.00 to get a balanced budget. He stated that the same quality education could be maintained in Jt. School Dist. 283 schools if the people passed a 3 mill levy which is no increase over last year's 33 mill M & O levy. Without the necessary same 3 mills, approximately \$8,819.71 would be lost, thus necessitating drastic cut backs in curriculum, textbooks, supplies, programs, maintenance and equipment for the students. Even an instructor might have to be deleted from the staff.

The Supt. stated, "It's the same old story—not enough help from the legislature. Our increase out of 3.8 million dollars for education totals only \$5,804.54. A loss of students on the elementary level and a reduction of federal funds under P. L. 874, due to completion of Dworshak workers, is rapidly curtailing our revenues. If this pace continues, staffs at our schools must be cut and many programs eliminated."

In other actions Noreen Stefonek, a graduate of Lewiston State Normal School and 10 years of experience was employed as 4th grade teacher at Juliaetta. She replaces Mabel Callison who is retiring.

Ruth White, Helen Fey and Elsie Onstott were offered contracts in the school lunch department. Mrs. Fey replaces Olive Dammarell, who is retiring. Helen Cowger, Jean Clemenhagen and Delores Polumska were rehired to operate the Juliaetta school lunch program.

No action was taken to hire a replacement for Allie Kremmin, who is the district secretary. This will be decided in a special meeting April 24.

The Superintendent informed the trustees that a federal grant of \$2100 will be given to the vocational departments prior to June 30; \$750 will be allocated to each of the vocational departments; namely, agriculture, home economics and business education.

A committee of teachers presented a school calendar for 1972-73 which the trustees adopted. School will begin August 28 and conclude May 25.

The board and a committee of teachers signed a professional negotiations agreement which gives the teachers a right to negotiate on wages and fringe benefits.

Principal Robert Heppner presented curriculum class schedules which the trustees studied and adopted for 1972-73. Forty nine elective and required courses will be offered.

Maureen Avery was given permission to attend the State Dept. of Education meeting at McCall April 28.

Ronald McCartney and David Jones were approved to attend the IEA meeting in Boise April 28.

Bills totalled \$4,218.67 and were approved.

**Jr. High Chorus Wins Superior Rating**

The Kendrick Junior High Chorus received a superior rating with adjudicator B. A. Carlson when they appeared at the Junior High Large Group Music Festival held Saturday, April 15 at Lapwai.

The chorus, composed of 71 7th and 8th grade students sang "Yesterday", and "Early Morning Rain" to win the superior rating in competition with nine other chorus groups from the surrounding area.

Music instructor Floyd Williams said, "I'm very pleased with what the Junior high students are doing musically", when he stopped by the office Tuesday morning. He also announced that the Jr. H. chorus will be participating with groups from the music department at the concert which will be held following the spaghetti feed this Thursday night.

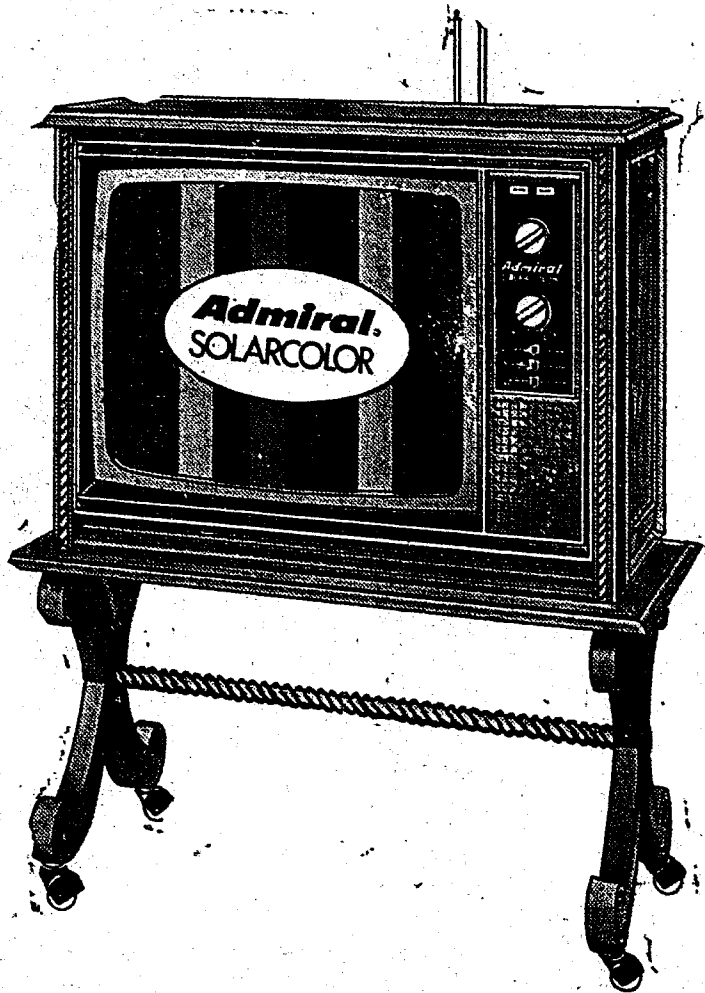

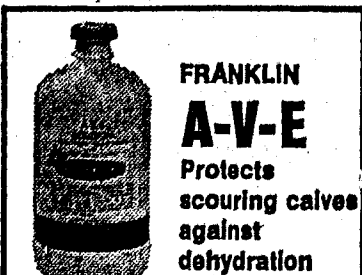

#### GOURMET BEEF PATTIES

2 pounds ground beef chuck  
1 cup dairy sour cream  
1/2 cup bread crumbs  
1 can (4 ounces) mushroom stems and pieces, drained and chopped  
2 tbsl. finely chopped onion  
2 tbsl. snipped parsley  
2 tpsps. salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper

#### WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

#### IDAHO STREAMS

For years Idaho streams have been altered and destroyed by many groups and individuals for many causes, from flood control work to clearing a farm to make more land available to plants crops on. The destruction has been done by Federal, State, County and City Governments as well as by private industry, public organizations and individuals.

In 1967, a survey was conducted in Idaho to determine: 1) What extent the streams of Idaho had been altered and 2) The effects of these alterations on the streams as far as fish are concerned. Forty-five streams were chosen from throughout the entire state. All streams had some alterations. One stream, 20-miles long had been altered 100 percent. Out of 1,138 miles of stream surveyed, 434 miles of stream channel or 38 percent had been physically changed.

Over 60 percent of the channel alteration was connected with road construction, 19 percent with flood control and 13 percent involved mining. Overall, damage to the stream by alteration showed the unaltered stream produced 8 times as many fish as the altered areas. In other words, channel disturbances, on the average, will reduce the productivity of the affecter area by over 87%.

On July 1, 1971 a bill passed by an earlier legislature went into effect in Idaho. This Stream Protection law has made it possible to slow down, and in many cases stop altogether, the destruction of Idaho stream channels. It is administered by the Department of Water Administration. This legislation provides that the stream channels of the state and their environments be protected against alteration for the protection of fish and wildlife habitat, aquatic life, recreation, aesthetic beauty and water quality. No alterations shall be made unless approval has been given as provided in the act.

"Alter" means to obstruct, diminish, destroy, alter, modify, relocate or change the natural existing shape or direction of water flow of any stream channel within or below the mean high water mark.

A permit to alter a stream control is acquired by submitting an application for permit to the Department of Water Administration not less than 60 days prior to intended date of channel alteration. The application may be obtained from the Department of Water Administration or the Fish and Game Department. Upon receipt of the application, the Director of the Department of Water Administration shall furnish

copies to other state agencies having interest in the stream channel. Within 20 days the other state agencies must notify the Director of any unreasonably detrimental affects upon the stream values and any alternate plans reasonable to accomplish the purpose of the proposed stream channel alteration.

Based upon his investigation and recommendations of other agencies, the Director shall send to the applicant his decision. Within 15 days of the mailing date of the decision, the applicant may request a hearing. If he refused to modify his proposal in accordance with the Department of Water Administration recommendations.

When an emergency situation exists requiring immediate action to protect life or property including growing crops, the Director may waive the provision of the act upon request; providing, however, that the extent of the stream control alteration shall be limited only to that amount of work deemed necessary by the Director to safeguard life or property during the period of emergency.

Any applicant who violates any provision of the act or specified conditions of approval by the Director shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not less than \$150 nor more than \$500; provided further, that each day such violation of an order or condition of approval has taken place constitute a separate offense punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 for each day until such activity is abated or voluntarily ceased.

Any party convicted of unlawful stream channel alteration shall, in addition to the penalties provided in this act, be directed by the court to restore the stream channel to as near its original condition as possible or to effect such other measures as recommended by the Director toward mitigation of damages.

Although this act is administered by the Department of Water Administration the Idaho Fish and Game Department takes an active part in investigation of the permits to see that as little damage is done to the wildlife resources as possible. They also assist in checking unauthorized alteration work in the field and to check work done by permits.

### WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

 With spring weather there is an increase in outdoor activities by everyone. This is especially true of the person with a gun who is in search of something to shoot. All too often he shoots an object or an animal that he shouldn't.

Spring is also the time of year that the young of all animals and birds are brought into the world. Shooting of protected birds and animals at this time of year can seriously affect the summer population and future breeding stock. This is why all hunting seasons are closed during this young-bearing season.

Most birds are protected by law in Idaho. Such common birds as the blackbirds,—all species, robins, meadowlarks, swallows, wrens and all song birds, insectivorous and innocent birds are protected and it is a misdemeanor to shoot, kill or attempt to kill them.

The only birds that are not protected in Idaho are English sparrows, starlings, magpies, crows and ravens. Dwight Kilgore, Conservation Officer of Lewiston states it is the responsibility of the person to be able to identify these birds. If a person thinks he is shooting a starling and it turns out to be female blackbird, he is in violation of the law and will be prosecuted.

Kilgore also points out that there are some small animals that are also protected. The cottontail and pigmy rabbits are protected and can only be hunted between September 1 and February 28 each year. Tree squirrels are always protected. Ground squirrels, rockchucks, mice and some of the other animals listed as predators like the skunk, weasel, coyote, and jack-rabbit can be hunted year around. However, a person must have a hunting license to kill any wild animal in Idaho.

A hunting license is also required to carry a firearm in the forests or fields in Idaho. Also, a person must be 12 years of age or older in order to purchase a hunting license and can not have in possession or carry a firearm unless he has reached his 12th birthday.

Even though the law does not prohibit a juvenile under 12 years from using a BB or pellet gun, he still cannot hunt or kill the protected birds or animals with it, Kilgore said. He further indicated that all violations of these laws will be strictly enforced. Those found in violation will be cited into court. All juveniles caught in violation will be prosecuted through the juvenile authorities and adults over 18 years will be brought before the magistrate court.

Shooting of unprotected birds and animals is not the only problem with spring and summer gun toters. Much vandalism is done during this time of year. Roadside signs are shot full of holes, mail boxes perforated, power lines and telephone lines and insulators are shot. Landowners complain of damage and vandalism to their property caused by inconsiderate and malicious individuals.

These types of acts can cause hard feelings which, in turn, cause landholders to post their property closed to trespassers, making fall hunting impossible on their property. All of this causes a loss of available hunting and recreation for everyone.

Hawks, owls and eagles are still being shot by thoughtless gunners. These birds are very beneficial to man because they eat thousands of mice, squirrels and insects that are harmful and damaging to crops. Therefore, hawks and owls are further protected by Federal statutes.

In order to insure safety with fire arms, there have been several laws enacted about shooting from roads and motor vehicles. It is unlawful to shoot a firearm from or across any public road; to shoot a firearm from a motor vehicle on a public road, or to shoot any game animal from any motor vehicle. These are safety laws and should be obeyed as such for your own protection as well as for others. All violators of these laws will be prosecuted by the proper authorities.

So, if you go out this spring to shoot at targets, to do some plinking or hunt unprotected birds and animals be sure to enjoy yourself by being safe, careful and obeying the laws.

#### WEGNER TO TESTIFY AT SAWTOOTH HEARINGS

Republican United States Senatorial candidate Glen Wegner will testify Thursday, April 13, 2:00 p. m. EST before the United States Senate Subcommittee on Parks and Recreation regarding S. 1407, the Sawtooth-White Clouds National Recreation Area bill.

Wegner, who has been traveling extensively throughout the State, will present testimony about the feelings of the people of Idaho as he has heard them expressed.

Covering 6,800 miles in 62 days, Wegner has visited 42 of the 44 counties of Idaho, and talked with many hundreds of Idahoans.

It is anticipated that Wegner will make clear that Idahoans wish to have state control over fish and game regulations for the Sawtooth-White Clouds area because they "do not want any more unnecessary federal bureaucratic involvement" in state affairs.

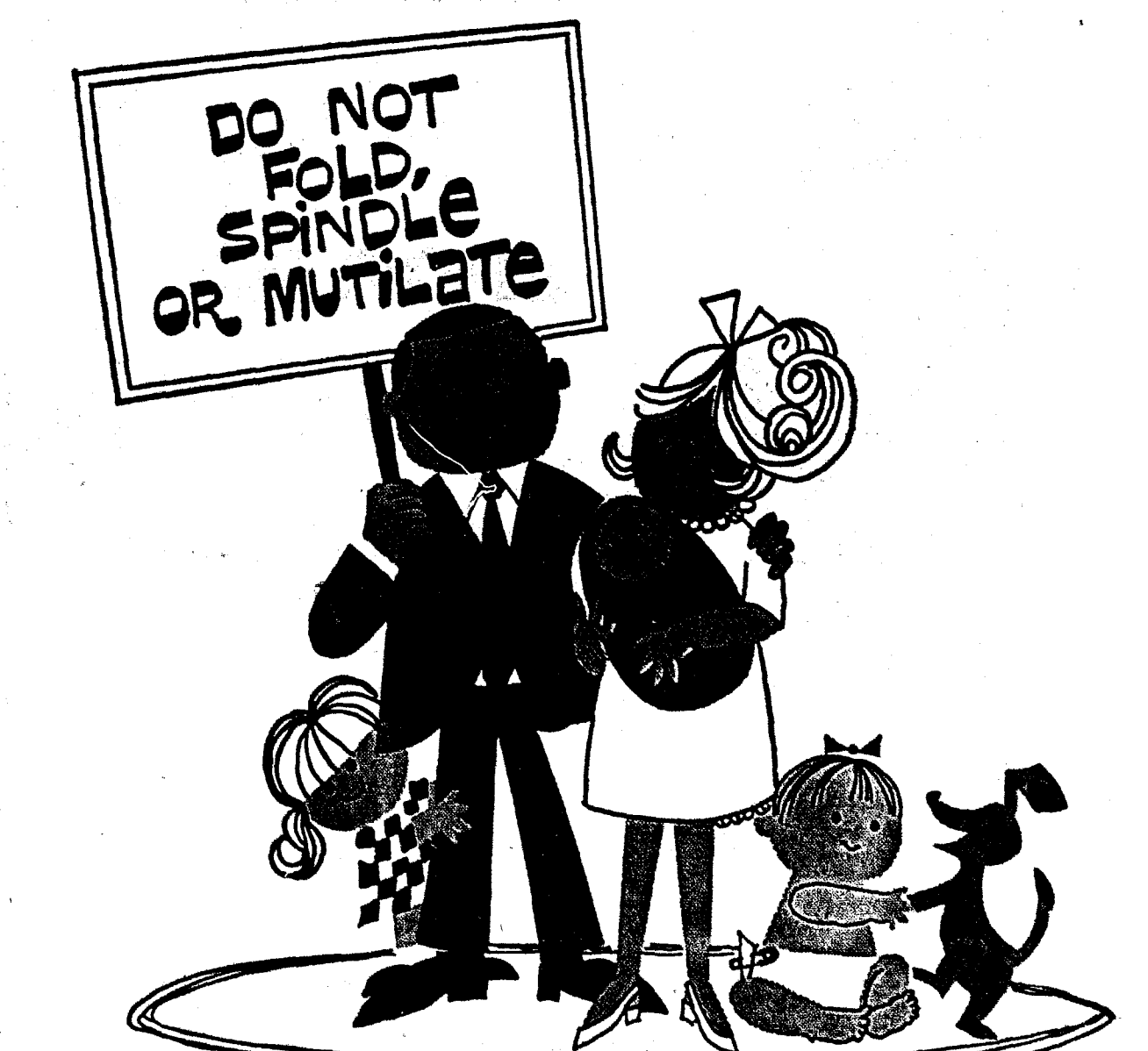

**Pheasant Crow Counts**  
Idaho's rooster pheasants are beginning to defend territory and conservation officers and other workers of the department are laying plans for counting the crow calls on established routes to learn the pheasant density. This work of crow counting starts about the third week of April and the first phase continues through the end of the month. The number of cock pheasants within a half mile of both sides of the counting routes is learned by listening for two minutes at one-mile intervals. Roosters crow at dawn on an average of once every two minutes. Idaho pheasant figures are based on winter inventory work, sex ratios established over the years, crowing counts,

### WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

 With spring weather there is an increase in outdoor activities by everyone. This is especially true of the person with a gun who is in search of something to shoot. All too often he shoots an object or an animal that he shouldn't.

Spring is also the time of year that the young of all animals and birds are brought into the world. Shooting of protected birds and animals at this time of year can seriously affect the summer population and future breeding stock. This is why all hunting seasons are closed during this young-bearing season.

Most birds are protected by law in Idaho. Such common birds as the blackbirds,—all species, robins, meadowlarks, swallows, wrens and all song birds, insectivorous and innocent birds are protected and it is a misdemeanor to shoot, kill or attempt to kill them.

The only birds that are not protected in Idaho are English sparrows, starlings, magpies, crows and ravens. Dwight Kilgore, Conservation Officer of Lewiston states it is the responsibility of the person to be able to identify these birds. If a person thinks he is shooting a starling and it turns out to be female blackbird, he is in violation of the law and will be prosecuted.

Kilgore also points out that there are some small animals that are also protected. The cottontail and pigmy rabbits are protected and can only be hunted between September 1 and February 28 each year. Tree squirrels are always protected. Ground squirrels, rockchucks, mice and some of the other animals listed as predators like the skunk, weasel, coyote, and jack-rabbit can be hunted year around. However, a person must have a hunting license to kill any wild animal in Idaho.

A hunting license is also required to carry a firearm in the forests or fields in Idaho. Also, a person must be 12 years of age or older in order to purchase a hunting license and can not have in possession or carry a firearm unless he has reached his 12th birthday.

Even though the law does not prohibit a juvenile under 12 years from using a BB or pellet gun, he still can not hunt or kill the protected birds or animals with it, Kilgore said. He further indicated that all violations of these laws will be strictly enforced. Those found in violation will be cited into court. All juveniles caught in violation will be prosecuted through the juvenile authorities and adults over 18 years will be brought before the magistrate court.

Shooting of unprotected birds and animals is not the only problem with spring and summer gun toters. Much vandalism is done during this time of year. Roadside signs are shot full of holes, mail boxes perforated, power lines and telephone lines and insulators are shot. Landowners complain of damage and vandalism to their property caused by inconsiderate and malicious individuals.

These types of acts can cause hard feelings which, in turn, cause landholders to post their property closed to trespassers, making fall hunting impossible on their property. All of this causes a loss of available hunting and recreation for everyone.

Hawks, owls and eagles are still being shot by thoughtless gunners. These birds are very beneficial to man because they eat thousands of mice, squirrels and insects that are harmful and damaging to crops. Therefore, hawks and owls are further protected by Federal statutes.

In order to insure safety with fire arms, there have been several laws enacted about shooting from roads and motor vehicles. It is unlawful to shoot a firearm from or across any public road; to shoot a firearm from a motor vehicle on a public road, or to shoot any game animal from any motor vehicle. These are safety laws and should be obeyed as such for your own protection as well as for others. All violators of these laws will be prosecuted by the proper authorities.

So, if you go out this spring to shoot at targets, to do some plinking or hunt unprotected birds and animals be sure to enjoy yourself by being safe, careful and obeying the laws.

#### WEGNER TO TESTIFY AT SAWTOOTH HEARINGS

Republican United States Senatorial candidate Glen Wegner will testify Thursday April 13, 2:00 p. m. (EST) before the United States Senate Subcommittee on Parks and Recreation regarding S. 1407, the Sawtooth-White Clouds National Recreation Area bill.

Wegner, who has been traveling extensively throughout the State, will present testimony about the feelings of the people of Idaho as he has heard them expressed.

Covering 6,800 miles in 62 days, Wegner has visited 42 of the 44 counties of Idaho, and talked with many hundreds of Idahoans.

It is anticipated that Wegner will make clear that Idahoans wish to have state control over fish and game regulations for the Sawtooth-White Clouds area because they "do not want any more unnecessary federal bureaucratic involvement" in state affairs.

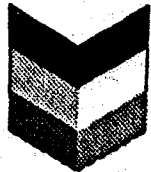

### STATE, FEDERAL LAWS PROHIBIT GRASS CARP

Let anglers start importing exotic "superfish" ballyhooed recently in a couple of national magazines, the Idaho Fish and Game Department warned today, "It's Against the Law." A spokesman for the department explained that state law (section 36-126) requires a permit for any individual or company "to import, transport into, and or release or sell within the state any living animals, birds, fish or the eggs of any living animals, birds or fish."

The subject of the current discussion is the white Amur or grass carp, Ctenopharyngodon idella, to give him his latin name.

This species, dubbed "the perfect fish" by Time Magazine, originally was stocked in 15 Arkansas lakes by the State Game and Fish Commission and has escaped to other wa-

ters, including the Mississippi and White Rivers.

ters, including the Mississippi and White Rivers.

He may be the ultimate answer to aquatic weed control—or he may be a potential disaster to make the walking catfish threat of two years ago pale by comparison.

The White Amur or grass carp eats vegetation. This is what makes this species immediately attractive, for the problem of aquatic weed control has been insolvable, as most late summer fishermen know. Even big lakes, fed by nutrients from pollution, are hard to fish when choked with weeds. Chemical control is prohibitive because of expense and the danger of killing fish and other marine organisms along with weeds.

The grass carp, said to eat up to four times its own weight in a single day, is native to the rivers, lakes and ponds of Siberia, Manchuria, and China. It apparently needs a cold winter, coupled with warming and rising water before it will spawn.

All these conditions exist in some Idaho waters. A certain amount of vegetation is desirable in any

body of water. But there is no guarantee that the grass carp would know when to stop eating, in the event he escapes to other waters and becomes a threat as great as the walking catfish is in some states.

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## KHS Places High In Math Contests

The 23rd Annual High School Mathematics Contest was given on March 23, 1972 in the United States and Canada. There were 3,000 participants representing 42 schools in the State of Idaho.

An award pin will be presented to the individual with the highest score in each school. Kendrick's first place winner for 1972 goes to James Boe.

A somewhat arbitrary classification of the 42 participating Idaho schools based on the enrollment figures found in the current Idaho Educational Directory was made. The three classifications are Group I ((0-300 students enrolled), Group II (301-600 students enrolled), and Group III (over 600 students enrolled). Each school selects the 3 students who scored the highest on the mathematics contest exam and totals their scores which represents the school's team score.
