

William L. McCreary, Former Gazette Publisher, Claimed By Cancer April 28



William L. (Bill) McCreary, 67-year-old veteran publisher of the Kendrick Gazette, died Friday, April 28, at Grinnam Hospital in Moscow following a year-long illness. Death was attributed to cancer.

Born April 9, 1905 in Santa Fe, N. M., the only child of Parker C. and Virginia McCreary, young McCreary moved with his parents to Latah County in 1912 where his father purchased the Genesee News.

He learned the printing trade from his father who, along with two of his brothers, became printers and newspaper publishers in Colorado and Illinois about the turn of the century. "I first got into the business when Dad stood me on a dynamite box and taught me how to feed the old Chandler and Price press," McCreary would say when asked how he became interested in newspapering and printing.

Growing to young manhood in Genesee, McCreary was graduated salutatorian from the Genesee public schools before he attended and was graduated from Northwest Business College in Spokane. Following his formal education he worked with his father in the publishing of the Genesee News until it was sold in 1929.

On October 2, 1928, McCreary married Floy M. Griffith at Genesee and two children were born to this union, Patricia J. Stensland, Seattle, and Frank P. (Parker) McCreary, Moscow, who survive. Floy M. McCreary passed away in 1961.

In 1929, McCreary and his father purchased the Stanwood, Washington, News, operating it until October of that year. In December of the same year he purchased the Kendrick Gazette, taking charge December 28, 1929. His father continued in the Kendrick business with him until his death in 1949.

A printer at heart, Bill enjoyed building complicated ruled forms and making sure that the operation and accuracy of his presses could not be matched. During World War II, the night oil was burned long as McCreary contracted for the printing of paper bean sacks for the Kendrick seed cleaning plant. He once estimated that he had hand fed enough bean bags through his old flatbed newspaper press to "fill the hold of Battleship Missouri."

Active in civic affairs, Bill worked hard through his newspaper columns to insure the success of the Kendrick War Memorial swimming pool, a project of the Kendrick Commercial Club and interested citizens of the Kendrick area. The pool was a memorial to those war soldiers who gave their lives in World War II. In 1958, McCreary used his paper to support the construction of a new school for the area.

"It was an uphill fight," he said as he told of losing many subscribers when the paper went on record in favor of the new school. "We had

to have it for the survival of the community," he said in defense of his position. He later recalled that he gained every subscriber but one from the old list and picked up more than 100 new ones during the drawn out campaign.

A charter member of the Kendrick Lions Club, McCreary worked in several positions during the organizational phase of the Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival. In 1971 he was honored as grand marshal of the parade. He was also a member of the Kendrick Grange, and the Methodist Church. An avid outdoorsman, he was an active member of the Kendrick Camper Karavan.

On January 7, 1966, he married Frances Trout, who survives at the family home in Kendrick. Frances joined Bill in the operation of the Gazette until they sold it to Jane and Bill Roth of Genesee. Other survivors, in addition to his son and daughter, are five grandchildren, four stepsons, one stepdaughter, and 10 stepgrandchildren. They include: Claudia and Lisa McCreary; Dedora, Timothy and Mark Stensland; Clifford L. Trout, Milton Freewater, Oregon; Clinton E. Trout, Manila Philippines; Marvin D. Trout, Troy; Kim J. Trout, at home; and Mrs. Dennis Clemm, Troy.

An avid outdoorsman, Bill loved to hunt and fish. He once "made his own headlines" in the national publication, Editor and Publisher. It just said, "Gone Fishing." Gone fishing was the sign that Bill would place in his front window when he took his annual 10 days off for vacation. The short message below the "Gone Fishing" sign told that the office would be closed and where news, advertising and job work could be left.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Shorts Chapel in Moscow. Services will be held at the Kendrick Community Church at 2 p. m., Monday, May 1. Interment will follow at the Kendrick Cemetery. The family has requested that memorials be made to the Cancer Society or the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance fund.

Funeral services were held Monday, May 1 from the Kendrick United Methodist Church with the Rev. Ronald Ozier officiating. Organist was Mrs. Oscar Slind and the hymns, "The Lord's Prayer," "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Trees" were sung by Mrs. Donna Lohman and Mrs. Ann Souders.

Honorary pallbearers were Lester Crocker, Ben P. Cook, Harold Olderness, Fred Richards, E. A. Deobald, Dr. Douglas Christensen, Otto Schupfer and Jack Vandenberg. Pallbearers were Oscar Slind, John Deobald, Richard Blewett, William Roth, Robert Watts and George F. Brocke, Jr.

Burial was at the Kendrick Cemetery.

Genesee School Mill Levy Vote Is Monday

Genesee—School elections are set for Monday, May 8th. To be voted on by the patrons of the district will be a 3-mill levy above the 30 allowed by law. This does not raise the millage over last year. The district has had the 3 mill over ride for the last two years. With the three mills, this will represent only a one percent increase over last year's M&O budget. Persons voting must be citizens of the U. S., eighteen years of age and resided in the State of Idaho for the last six months and in the School District for more than the last thirty days. The Board has deemed it necessary to get the three mill over ride again in order to hold the present program that the school has had.

At the same time the district will elect two trustees. Wayne Hampton had filed for re-election from Trustee zone No. 1 and Marion Holben from Trustee zone No. 5. To vote in the trustee election the requirements are the same as the M&O with the addition that you must be a resident of the Trustee Zone. Trustee Zone No. 1 is all the city of Genesee and Trustee zone No. 5 is all of NezPerce County from the Washington State Line east to the home of Lloyd Wilson and then a straight line south to the end of the district.

The election will be in the lobby of the gym and will be between the hours of 11 a. m. and 7 p. m.

The regular meeting of the Genesee Board of Trustees will be Monday, May 8th. Items on agenda include, program for graduation May 21st, report on a new hot water heater for boiler room, budget hearing, a curriculum report, recommendation of new teachers for the 72-73 school year, hiring a new custodian. A report on State Superintendent's meeting in Boise, April 20 & 21st.

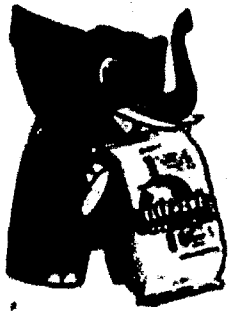

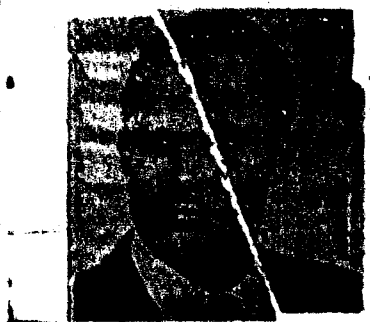

GROWING PAINS

Pediatricians and other physicians who care for small children are frequently asked about 'growing pains,' and they found out that in almost all cases these pains were caused by fatigue.

Usually examination will reveal no disease or abnormality, although some of these children may have a problem such as flat feet, which can often be helped with corrective shoes, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

For those who show no demonstrable cause for these pains, the larger group, the indicated treatment is extra rest and measures to relieve the pain, which usually occurs late in the evening—often after the child is in bed.

A hot bath at bedtime, with massage of the legs, will bring relief. After an especially active day, a mild analgesic, such as aspirin, may be given.

Following the four-year-old thru his daily routine can exhaust a seasoned athlete, so it should be no surprise that children sometimes complain of leg pains in the afternoon and evening.

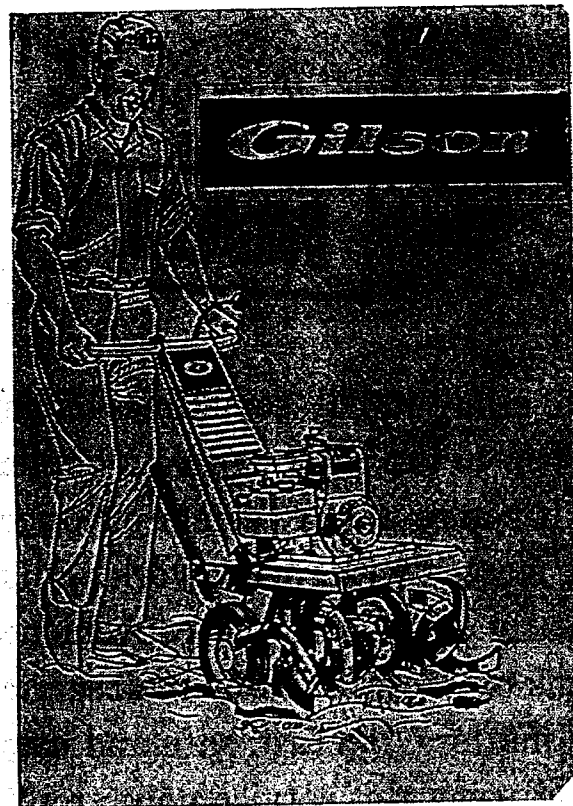

RIDING WITH HEADLIGHTS
Riding with headlights on makes sense for motorcyclists, even in day light, suggests the Idaho Medical Association.

The National Safety Council recently reported the results of three studies dealing with motorcycle lighting. The council concluded that the drivers of other vehicles will notice a motorcycle with headlights on in the daytime more often than one without lights.

Drivers who notice cycles sooner and at a greater distance are in a better position to avoid accidents.

The findings are borne out by experience. In the first five states to enact daytime motorcycle headlight laws, motorcycle accidents decreased by 43 per cent, compared with a nine per cent decrease in other states during the same year.

A break down on the distribution of this donated equipment is as follows: office occupations will receive an IBM electric 12 in. carriage typewriter and a Royal and an Olympic manual typewriter.

Home economics will receive the following: a Frigidaire range, refrigerator, dishwasher, automatic can-opener, knife sharpener and F. H. A. publications.

The agricultural department will get a "Jet" 3/4" drill press, Nasco Life Farm meat cut replicas, Black and Decker variable speed drill.

These material were sorely needed by our vocational departments and will be purchased prior to July 1st, according to Supt. Don Blakeley.

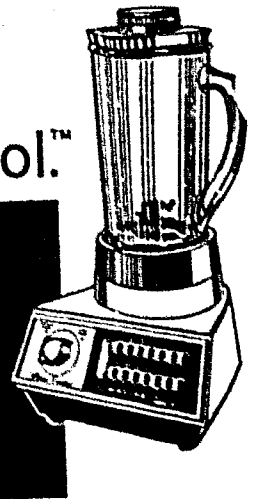
