Littering, of course, is contrary to aw. Other states and Canadian law. provinces also enforce heavy fines and other penalties for littering public places.

The Idaho State Department of Highways spends more than \$250,000 and that's over a quarter of a million dollars a year to pay for the cleanup of 5,000 miles of primary highway systems, on which there are in excess of 1,000 litter barrels. The Fish and Game Department in southwestern Idaho services 60 public access areas and five wildlife management areas. Two men and their trucks are kept busy full time through the summer months cleaning up public access and management areas. Two of the management areas, the Boise River and Fort Boise WLMAs, split the cost of hiring a man. The others are busy from Walters Ferry to aCscade.

If these costs for cleanup purposes could be budgeted for other work, the department could do more restoration work in fish and game management. Money is spent on litter barrels and equipment and manpower to empty them regularly. But. as the Lewiston couple says, there are people who stand right beside a litter barrel and toss a sackful of picnic garbage or other rubbish into a lake. Most people have seen it happen. It's commonplace. Empty beer cans are floated behind trolling fishermen in boats to mark their course.



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

The larger the number of calls, the greater potential for a good pheasant population since this is a general index of population numbers prior to

and during nesting by the hens. Some of the best information obtained during the summer where the number of hens with young is taken from numerous observations. This is a direct indicator of the hatching success by each hen. Usually, the number of young per hen is around 4 or 5.

Finally, the collection of harvest data at checking stations and from hunter questionnaires is the fourth and last method for collecting data for pheasant management. All of this information is pulled together and is called the Population Index for submission to the Fish and Game Commission to set closing dates for the fall bird hunting seasons.


