## Genesee City Council In Session Monday

Genesee—Roger Booth, Bob Shinn, and Tom Brooks, representatives of Craftwall, Inc. were present at the May 8th meeting of the Genesee City Council, held in the city room, for clarification with the city of sewer and water hookup and street repair deposits on the Bielenberg Development area in the west part of Genesee. Craftwall, Inc. are erecting two more new homes in that area.

Duane Roach also appeared before the council in regard to the condition of the street also in that area.

Dogs were also discussed and the city will check on fees for housing the animals when they are picked up.

Also discussed was the proposed ordinance for open burning. This was tabled until further study is made by the committee.

Leonard Singhose reported to the council that the city dump is filled and that there is no room left to make more trenches for disposal. These conditions will make the transition easier for residents to go to the proposed county deal. Use of the present dump ground facilities has been extended from June 1 to Oct. 1.

City Clerk Martinez announced that the city will place "parallel parking only" signs on the south side of Ash street between Jackson and Birch. It is hoped this will relieve the traffic hazard in that area.

Building permits were issued to Kenneth Koontz, new home; Leander Johann, front porch; Douglas Alexander, garage; Bob Irby, remodeling home; L. W. Sorensen, remodeling garage, and Genesee school district, new storage shed.

Clerk Martinez told the council that the City of Genesee was presented an award of merit from the state insurance fund due to no lost time accidents in the past year.

Chet Green, Genesee police chief, will attend an Idaho Law Enforcement Planning commission meeting in Moscow at the New Idaho Hotel on May 19.

Councilman Sorensen was voted to be a delegate to the annual association of Idaho Cities Convention to be held June 22, 23, and 24 in Pocatello.

It was also reported that the trees in front of the city park and around the pump house had been topped.

Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst has proclaimed May 15 to 27 as Clean-Up days for Genesee. Any garbage, cans, papers, etc., to be picked up during this period are to be placed near the curb, or edge of alley or street for easy pickup. No heavy appliances, such as refrigerators, washers, etc.

## Heavy Rains Halt Farm, Woods Work

Heavy rains which began last Sunday evening put a sudden stop to farm work across the region this week and forced loggers out of the woods as there has been an almost steady downpour since early Monday morning. Genesee reported .64 of an inch on Sunday alone and that was not counting the heavier rainfall on Monday and Tuesday.

Farmers were getting a good start on spring work and many already had gotten their peas into the ground and much of the fertilizing was done but the downpour has reduced the fields to mud ponds again and it will be several days at least before work can begin again once the rain stops.

April rainfall on American Ridge totaled 1.65 inches according to Dick Benscoter. Chas. Bower reported 1.74 inches for the same period over on Big Bear Ridge. John Luedke recorded 1.83 for the Genesee area in April to bring the total for the year to date to 11.82 inches.

## Dist. 283 Trustee, Mill Levy Vote Set For May 23

Eligible voters within Joint School District No. 283 will be asked to approve a three-mill tax levy for maintenance and operation of the district schools and will also be selecting two members of the board of trustees at an election to be held in Juliaetta and Kendrick on Tuesday, May 23.

The three-mill levy the voters have been asked to approve again is the same as previously approved by the taxpayers and will not be a special increase. The M&O money has been included in the budget and its rejection would mean serious cutbacks in back operation in this district. It is for this reason that both school trustees and school administrators are urgently requesting approval of the levy.

First Woman Seeks Position Of special interest in the trustee election this year is the candidacy of Mrs. John (Gwen) Deobald, for the position of Trustee from District No. 2. As far as can be determined Mrs. Deobald is the first woman to seek a Trustee position in this district. Mrs. Deobald is the mother of five school-age children and works part time at the Kendrick Post Office and the Kendrick Gazette. She will be opposing incumbent Richard Benjamin, District Fire Warden, who is seeking his second term on the board.

A three-way race for the Trustee from District 1, Juliaetta, has developed. Incumbent Floyd Heimgartner has declined to seek another three-year term, but filing for the office has been Chas. Taylor, a Juliaetta farmer; David Steigers, associated with Browning Cut Stock Co. in Juliaetta, and James Cuddy, a logger from Juliaetta.

**LITTER SEASON NEARS AS WEATHER IMPROVES**

Going camping this summer? Well remember the mark of a good camper is to leave a clean camp. Civilization's debris, such as tin cans, paper and bottles, doesn't belong in the wilderness and should not be left to clutter up the area when the camping period is over.

Look at it this way. The fellow who leaves a clean camp sets an example for the next camper. Even though the two have never met, or ever will, the outgoer will unknowingly win the respect of the incomer.

There are many state and federal-owned camping spots throughout the country in many beautiful areas. These are for the public's enjoyment. The purpose is to give everyone who wants to, and can take advantage of them, the opportunity to spend a few days and nights in the open away from the busy bustle and frustration of city life.

Some people treat camping areas as if they owned them—for that is exactly what they do. Even though the state or federal government handles the upkeep, taxpayers pick up the tab. That is the reason why the better campers treat the place where they slept out under the stars as if it were their own front yard at home. They leave it as clean as they found it, and cleaner if possible.

Put tin cans and other castoffs in one place. When breaking camp, throw the burnable stuff into the fire. Paper and some food remnants will burn. Mash cans flat, bundle them up, and take them out to the car and home. Items made of aluminum, plastic and glass will be around long after the 20th century has disappeared, silently damning its people for discarding them.

Burying camp debris is not a good idea. Wild animals have a habit of digging in search of food remnants and scattering it in all directions. When soil is disturbed, grass is killed, and erosion will uncover the pit sooner or later.

Gene deReus, state land management supervisor for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, says that it costs as much to replace an outdoor toilet as it does to build a goose nesting island at Market Lake or in Boundary County.

Arnie Coleman, western regional land manager, says that painted latrines of single, marine plywood construction with plexiglass roofs on concrete footings, cost an average of \$500 installed. More expensive materials such as cinder blocks could run the cost up to \$3,500.

Even in the best of construction and building materials will not always withstand the destructive efforts of vandals. There is no case in which the criminal acts of vandals and or even littering is justifiable. To say the least, most cases are downright stupid.

Whether through thoughtlessness, negligence or contempt for the rights of other people the monthly cost of cleanup resulting from such misbehavior is staggering.

For example, J. S. Walker, 1118 Alder Street, Lewiston, is retired and spends a lot of time with his wife fishing at Spring Valley Reservoir, Waha Lake, Soldiers Meadow Reservoir and Winchester Lake, among others. Last year he fished Spring Valley Reservoir the second or third day after the season opened. It looked like a dump ground, he opined. Likewise the beautiful Snake River beaches are littered with cans and broken glass. It is dangerous to walk barefooted. Fish are cleaned on the beaches and offal left to pollute the beaches, water and air—unsightly and just plain odoriferous.

Walker says that he and his wife take time on each trip to help clean up camp areas which have been littered by people who were there ahead of them. They hope that the next camping party will follow their example, thus setting up a chain reaction of good examples.

Littering, of course, is contrary to law. Other states and Canadian provinces also enforce heavy fines and other penalties for littering public places.

The Idaho State Department of Highways spends more than \$250,000 and that's over a quarter of a million dollars a year to pay for the cleanup of 5,000 miles of primary highway systems, on which there are in excess of 1,000 litter barrels. The Fish and Game Department in southwestern Idaho services 60 public access areas and five wildlife management areas. Two men and their trucks are kept busy full time through the summer months cleaning up public access and management areas. Two of the management areas, the Boise River and Fort Boise WLMAs, split the cost of hiring a man. The others are busy from Walters Ferry to aCacade.

If these costs for cleanup purposes could be budgeted for other work, the department could do more restoration work in fish and game management. Money is spent on litter barrels and equipment and manpower to empty them regularly. But, as the Lewiston couple says, there are people who stand right beside a litter barrel and toss a sackful of picnic garbage or other rubbish into a lake. Most people have seen it happen. It's commonplace. Empty beer cans are floated behind trolling fishermen in boats to mark their course.

**IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT**  
Twenty area workers were placed on jobs during the past week by the Moscow office of the Department of Employment. 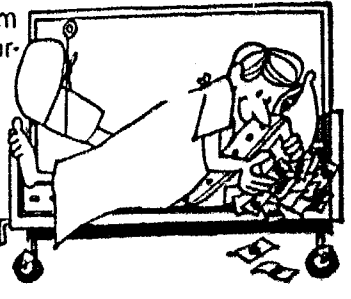

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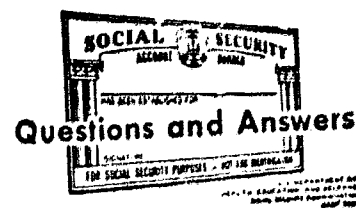
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**Questions and Answers**

**REPRESENTATIVES**

**Q** My mother, who's 80, has gotten so sick that she can't handle her own money any longer. I have her power of attorney, but I'm not sure what I should do with her monthly social security checks. Should I try to cash them?

**A** No, you should not cash her social

security checks. You should call the social security office immediately. We can arrange to send her checks to you as her "representative payee" with the checks carrying your name as well as your mother's so you can cash them.

**SURVIVORS**

**Q** Before her recent death, my wife worked under social security for nearly 11 years. Even though I plan to continue working and supporting our two children, ages 9 and 12, could they get monthly social security benefits on my wife's work record?

**A** Yes, The children may be eligible for social security benefits on their mother's record regardless of the surviving father's work situation. You

should file an application for the children.

**LUMP-SUM DEATH PAYMENT**

**Q** My brother, who had worked all his life in a job covered by social security?

**A** If your brother was insured under social security and living with his wife at the time of death, his wife gets the payment. If your brother wasn't married, the person responsible for the burial expenses can request that the death benefit be paid directly to the funeral home. If, however, the burial expenses have already been paid, the person who paid them can claim the death payment.

**EARNINGS TEST**

**Q** I receive both a retirement benefit from social security and a pension from the U. S. Army. Does my army pension count as earnings?

**A** No. Only wages and self-employment income count as earnings. Other income—such as another pension, dividends, or interest—does not affect your social security benefit payments.

**RETIREMENT**

**Q** I get monthly retirement benefits from social security, and my wife also draws benefits on my work record. My wife is planning to start working at a part-time job. Will her earnings affect my monthly benefits?

**A** No. If she earns enough, your wife may have part or all of her own monthly cash benefits withheld,

but this will not affect your monthly payments.

**MEDICARE NO. 3**

**Q** I am enrolled in both parts of Medicare, but I haven't needed to use it yet. If I forget my Medicare card can I give a doctor or the hospital my regular social security number when I need medical services?

**A** No. Your Medicare card shows your complete claim number and this number is needed to process your claim for payment of medical or hospital services. But this shouldn't delay your treatment. Just bring your card in later or phone the number in.

**DISABILITY NO. 1**

**Q** I am confused about when to file for social security disability benefits. I have heard about both a 6-month waiting period and a 12-month waiting period. Can you explain which is correct?

**A** You should file an application for benefits as soon as it is determined that you are likely to be disabled for a year or longer. The 6-month period is the waiting period. You can file your application during this period but no monthly payments can be made for the first 6 full calendar months of a disability.

The 12-month period refers to the expected duration of the disability. Social security can pay benefits only if the disability is expected to last for at least 12 months or longer and is serious enough to rule out any substantial gainful work.

**Larry Waterbly Demo.  
Candidate For  
Latah County Sheriff**

Larry Waterbly, 46, a seven year veteran of the Latah County Sheriff's Office, announced this week he will seek the Democratic nomination for Latah County Sheriff in the August primary election.



Waterbly will oppose Edwin Peterson, present Latah Sheriff, who was appointed to the office following the retirement of R. C. Lange last year.

Born in Spokane, Washington, Waterbly was raised and schooled in eastern Washington and northern Idaho before entering the Army at age 18. He served in the South Pacific during World War II and elected to remain in service following the war. About two-thirds of his service was spent in the combat arms and for the most part he held the position of either a First Sergeant or training instructor. He also participated in army sports as a member of the boxing team.

In 1961 he was selected to attend the Army Career Counseling course at the Adjutant General's School at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana. His training there included interviewing, counseling, background investigation and public relations. He was then assigned as a Station Commander to the U. S. Army Recruiting Station in Lewiston and served in this capacity for approximately four years.

"Working with the public is a gratifying challenge and after serving twenty years in the army I decided to undertake a new career," Waterbly said. "I chose law enforcement because it is an interesting field and closely related to my past experiences."

He received formal police training at the Spokane Police Academy and has been employed at the Latah County Sheriff's Department for the past seven years. During this time he has attended numerous law enforcement courses, usually conducted under the direction of the FBI.

In addition to his regular duties, he has served as a training officer and provided instruction of tactical subjects and leadership for the Latah County Sheriff's Department and the Moscow City Police Department.

Larry, his wife Beverlee and two of their sons, Mark, 3, and Quinn, 7, resided at Potlatch. They are also a registered Latah County Foster home and have taken care of several children in the past seven years. He also maintains a strong interest in scouting and other youth activities.

He is a member of V. F. W. Post 2905 and the Moscow Grange.
