WATER HAZARD HIGHER THIS YEAR

Statistics don't drown people generally, but Idaho anglers would do well to note that the estimated stream flows this year are about 130 percent above average, a fish and game spokesman reported today.

Noting that the drownings in Ida-ho exceed firearms accidental deaths at a ratio of about 3 to 1, the department reminded anglers to use extreme caution in wading along the extra heavily laden streams this spring. It was also pointed out that If a fisherman insists on putting on his waders and striking out across a rapidly flowing, springtime flood-ed stream, he should be sure to wear a life jacket, the department advis-ed. In addition, the wader would do well to follow the practice of the old timers and take along a pole or small sapling to steady himself through the more treacherous part of the stream.
