

# Kendrick's 11th Annual Locust Blossom Festival Will Be Saturday, May 27

Business comes to a stop this Saturday, or almost anyway, as the Kendrick Community prepares to present its 11th annual Locust Blossom Festival May 27. A day full of fun and activities has been scheduled for the event.

The festival gets underway at 10:00 a. m. sharp with the Festival Parade.

Roy Glenn Grand Marshall Area residents were very happy to learn that the Grand Marshall of this year's parade will be Roy Glenn, well-known and respected farmer from Texas Ridge. Roy, in addition to his farming activities, is also a well-known auctioneer, and has also served on many civic and agricultural committees during the years. He and his wife will lead the parade, which has every indication of being the best ever.

Following the parade there will be races for kids in the park; there will be a flower show and display at the Garden Club meeting room and in the old Table Supply building. Also on display at the Temple Building will be the scale model of the town of Kendrick, constructed by Professor Walter Ashland and his architectural students from the University of Idaho. The scale model will be used in discussing and planning improvements and possible beautification of the city.

A painting, pottery and ceramics display will be sponsored by the WSCS of the United Methodist church. The display will open from 11:00 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. All exhibits should be brought to the church basement on Friday, May 26, from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. All pictures should be ready to be hung.

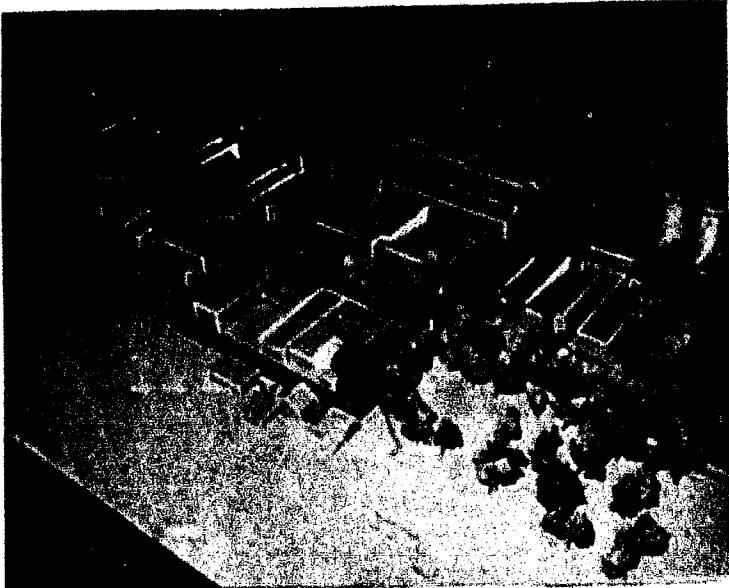

A Babe Ruth baseball game between Kendrick and Lapwai at the high school diamond will begin at 2:00 p. m. The big day will conclude with a dance at the VFW Hall beginning at 9:00 p. m.

## Mill Levy Passes; Deobald, Taylor New Trustees

School District No. 283 voters went to the polls Tuesday, May 23 and approved the continuation of the three-mill tax levy for maintenance and operation of their schools. The issue to continue the levy passed by a seventy percent margin.

At the same time the voters elected this district's first woman to the board of trustees as Gwendolyn Deobald received 48 votes to defeat incumbent Richard Benjamin, who gathered in 37 votes in the close contest.

In Julianna Charles Taylor polled 58 votes to James Cuddy's 23 to win the trustee seat from zone 1. Taylor, a Julianna farmer will succeed Floyd Helmgartner, who declined another term.

### Levy Passes Easily

School trustees and administrators may breathe easier now, as the levy for three mills carried by an 84 to 42 margin in Kendrick and by a 59 to 22 margin in Julianna.

## In Logging Mishap

His injuries are extremely painful and it will be some time before he will be allowed to return to work.

They started raising cattle, but still he sold cars in later years in the Moscow area. They purchased the Dave Gentry ranch at Kendrick, and later selling it, moved to the Harvard area, where they now reside.

Due to illness, Mr. Oylear was forced to give up many of his duties and their son has taken over the heavier duties of the ranch. Mrs. Oylear still does the cooking for all, as well as much crocheting and other hand work. She is a member of the Harvard Sewing Club. In the summer, they spend time at the lake at Harrison, where they have a trailer home.

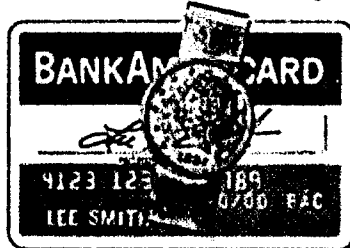

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**Soil Conservation Was Topic At Grange Meeting**

Kendrick Grange No. 412 met at the Fraternal Temple Tuesday, May 16th at 8:00 p. m. with 22 members and two guests present. Grange Ecology Week was May 14-20. In honor of this the Soil Stewardship program was presented. Our most able and interesting speaker was Mr. Carrol Tyler, District Conservationist for Latah County from Moscow.

Mr. Tyler stated that recently we have seen an upsurge of reaction to pollution-environmental decay ecology. It warns us that planning must be done for the orderly development of resources. Both town and country people need to join together in a community effort to resolve the resource problems. They can be resolved only through county, regional and state-wide planning. It concerns people, land and water.

He said Latah County has adopted a comprehensive plan, and your property is being zoned. This county has adopted a county-wide plan for garbage collection with three sanitary landfills. The State Department of Health has condemned several of the present city garbage dumps and is serving notice to businesses and feedlots to clean up or close. The State Department of Water Administration has new laws that enforce regulatory powers of all water including your own farm ponds. There are laws against burning. It is necessary for local road districts, highways and federal agencies to make an environmental impact study for any structured project, involving land or water.

The Latah Soil Conservation District program is geared to assist local people and their local agencies to deal with resource problems. This program was written and adopted by five men elected to carryout this program.

In closing he stated, "This is your land, your water, your home. God gave it to us all, but not for us to abuse and destroy without regard to its heritage. We can only be good stewards when we consider these resources as a part of our community, NOT as a commodity to be bartered and used without love and respect."

Mrs. Tyler accompanied him and was also a guest of the Grange. Plans were made for Locust Blossom festival. The chairman of the Women's Activities, Mrs. Wayne Heimgartner, requests that all Grangers please donate pies for the Pie House. Also that more help is needed to serve in the Pie House on Festival Day.

**SOIL STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY OBSERVED BY GRANGE**

The Rev. Ron Ozler delivered a most interesting sermon entitled, "Dominion Over All The World".

**Instant Breakfasts**

Liquid, or the so-called instant breakfasts supply reasonable quantities of most of the nutrients needed by man, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

They usually come in the form of powder to be mixed with milk, or ready mixed in a can.

A portion—one can or the contents of an envelope mixed with 8 fluid ounces of whole milk—will provide about 300 calories and 17 to 18 grams of protein. While the vitamin and mineral contents may vary somewhat, they are designed to provide from 25 to 33 percent of the day's needs of nutrients, except calories.

There is always concern that such specially prepared foods may lack nutrients needed only in trace amounts. A mixed diet assures that the important major and minor nutrients are obtained.

Since the liquid breakfasts are consumed only as one meal of the day, and in many instances when otherwise no breakfast would be eaten, there is probably small cause to worry about their trace nutrient content.

**Soft Water Aids Skin**

Soft water is better for the hair and skin than hard water.

Salt and minerals in hard water interact with soap to form an insoluble residue that cannot readily be rinsed away and may irritate the skin, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

This residue, clinging to the scalp and hair, dulls the hair and interferes with waving and coloring procedures.

If water is hard, one might use a water softening agent.

Synthetic detergents may also be used, rather than soap. Synthetic detergent bars are available and most shampoos are composed partly or entirely of detergents.

Free access to fishing and hunting sites on the public domain have been acquired, developed and maintained as a continuing program to help sportsmen pursuing their outdoor activities. In some cases the only public access to these waters is provided by the Fish and Game Dept. The program is funded with department funds collected from the sale of license and tags.

## Cockroaches Are Disease Carriers

The cockroach has long been suspected of being a disease carrier, notes the Idaho Medical Association but for lack of evidence, he has escaped the bad reputation that has befallen rats and mice.

Extensive tests spanning 11 years at University of Minnesota School of Public Health, however, give what is described as conclusive proof that the cockroach can acquire, harbor and spread Salmonella food poisoning.

Symptoms generally appear from 6 to 72 hours after the victim has become infected and include diarrhea, abdominal cramps, vomiting, prostration, and sometimes death.

It was found that roaches, which will eat almost anything that humans will, harbored Salmonella bacteria in their bodies for as long as 42 days. The study suggests that some Salmonella outbreaks attributed to mice may actually have been caused by roaches.

There is also published evidence that the virus of infectious hepatitis is carried by the cockroach.

## Association Plans Project Exhibits, Extends Boundary

The Latah County Pioneer Historical Museum Association today arranged its administrative affairs pending selection of a new president to succeed Mrs. Grace Wicks, who has held that office since 1970. Meeting at the McConnell Mansion, Moscow, the directors paid their respects to the retiring leader, who leaves on May 21 for 2 months in Europe. Mrs. Wicks will visit her son, Staff Sgt. Donald H. Wicks and family, on duty with the U. S. Forces in Germany since October, 1970. She will also visit cousins in ancestral areas of Switzerland and France, in search of additional genealogical data to extend the Jain family records now filed at the Museum.

The Association plans to continue the Museum's development program as rapidly as resources will permit. The Board at its last previous meeting voted to include as Latah County Pioneers all residents of adjoining counties whose customary trading center or mailing address during the 1871-1921 period was a Latah County town. This extension qualifies numerous farm families whose lands lie in NezPerce County south of Genesee or east of Jullaetta or Kendrick, and some on Whitman Co. farms west of Moscow and Viola.

The Association plans to have project exhibits and representatives at the Locust Blossom Festival in Kendrick on May 27; the Genesee Community Day on June 10 and other community observances of 1972.

Assistance will be given in completing the family histories now being compiled on pioneer families of the county, and new memberships will be solicited. Association representatives also will explain the workings of the Hall of Pioneers photo record project for which family pictures are being sought. ## IDAHO LEADS NATION IN DEVELOPING COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH

"Idaho is far ahead of the rest of the country in the development of community mental health centers," the executive director of the National Mental Health Association said in Boise on Tuesday, May 16, 1972.

Brian O'Connell, Washington, D. C., the executive director of the National Mental Health Association visited Boise to express his thanks for the work being done by the volunteers of the Mental Health Association of Idaho.

Mr. O'Connell commented that Idaho has five of its targets of seven community mental health agencies in operation. These community men-

tal health services encompass 75 percent of the population of Idaho. Nationally, community mental health services serve only 35 percent of the population.

In other comments, Mr. O'Connell said "Children's services have been badly neglected. To bring them up to standards it will take effort on the broadest front."

One of the most difficult messages the mental health associations have

had to try to help people understand that mental illness is a fleeting illness. Most people feel mental illness is long lived. The facts are exactly opposite. The average stay in a mental hospital is now 18 and a half days, according to Mr. McConnell.

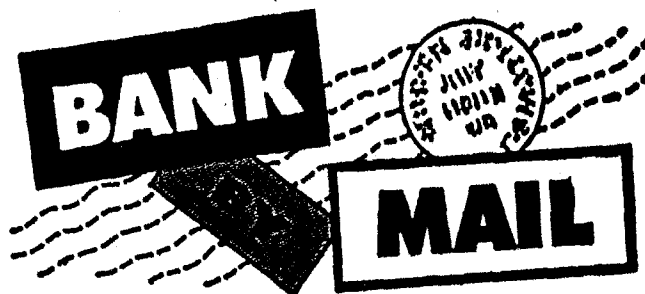
