Locust Festival Great Success

"Near Perfect" was the best description of the weather last Saturday as the Kendrick Community presented its 11th annual Locust Blossom Festival under sunny, cloudless skies which did turn almost hot later in the afternoon. The winning combination of good weather, a large crowd and weeks of hard work and preparation paid off for dozens of community-minded workers, as the celebration was termed a great success.

The festival is sponsored by the Lions Club and the V. F. W. with the help of numerous other groups, organizations and individuals.

Fifty Entries In Parade
With the V. F. W. Color Guard and Grand Marshal and Mrs. Roy Glenn leading the way, the Festival began with the parade down Main Street at 10:00 a. m. Fifty entries, ranging from the lovely floats to colorful riding groups gave the large crowds that lined the streets a spirited event. Boy Scout Troop 149 took first place in the Community Division.

The Scout float was decorated with trees and a contingent of Scouts.

Second place in the Community Division went to the 4-H Four Paws Club. Vicki Brocke, Brenda Taylor, Laura Williams and Ferris Cuddy were on the float together with Pierre, Zap, Sunny and Squeaky their "four paw" friends. Mrs. Maxine Williams is the club's leader.

Abrams Hardware, Inc., with a group of young Abrams' gracing it to the theme of "Old Friends Meet at the Old Fishing Hole" won first prize in the Commercial Division.

Second Prize in the Commercial Division went to Brocke and Sons, Inc for their float.

Music for the parade was supplied by the Kendrick High School Marching Band and the Juliaetta Elementary school Marching Band, both under the direction of Floyd Williams, head of the Music Department of District 253.

Members of the V. F. W. and Auxiliary conducted a memorial service in the City Park in honor of two World War II veterans, John Darby and Gilbert Erlewine, who passed away this year. A wreath was placed on the War Memorial monument in honor of all veterans of our great wars.

Well before the announced serving time of 11:30, lines began forming in front of the barbecue serving stand. Over 1200 hungry people enjoyed and consumed 700 pounds of barbecued beef, a dozen huge pans of baked beans, gallons of cole slaw and pickles, bread, coffee and punch.

The Grange Pie House proved popular, too, as members served over 125 pies, all donated by the Grange. The Grange offered their thanks to all who made pies, served and to everyone who purchased dessert at their stand.

At least 170 Kendrick pioneers over the age of 65 attended the festival and were accorded special honors. The oldest was Mrs. Linnie Ingle, who was born in Kendrick in 1886.

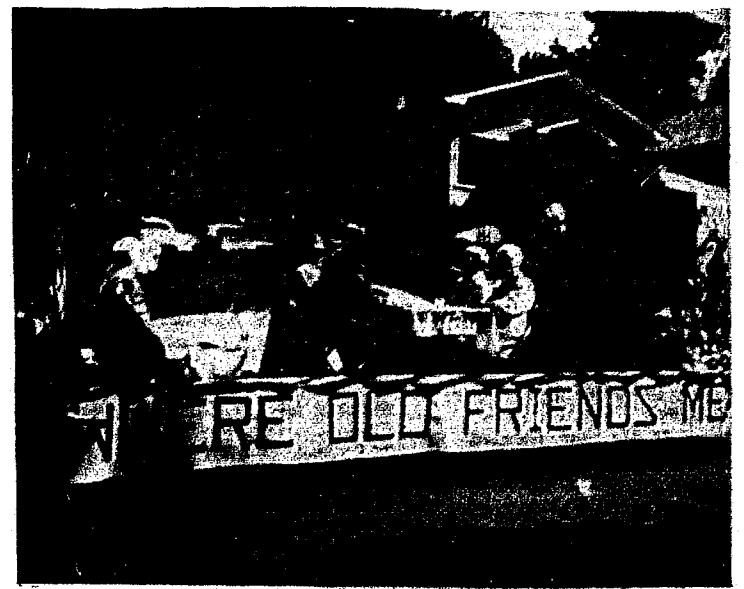

A group of tired, but happy celebrators brought the 1972 Festival to a successful conclusion Saturday night with a dance at the V. F. W. Hall.

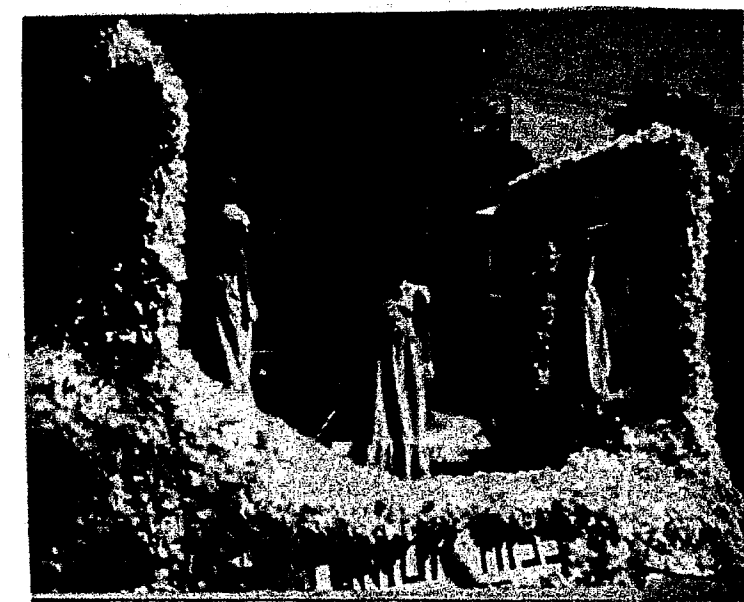

Malnutrition

Malnutrition is often associated with alcoholism, observes the Idaho Medical Association.
 Calories from alcohol can replace a good portion of the calories that should be obtained from foods which supply important nutrients. Appetites for normal foods may be quite poor, frequently because of gastritis produced by the alcohol.

As alcoholism progresses, the small intestine's ability to absorb nutrients decreases to a serious extent. Thus fats, fat-soluble vitamins, B vitamins and proteins may not be effectively used. Alcohol also increases loss of some minerals and amino acids.

Serious liver impairments, such as cirrhosis, are thought to be produced through a combination of poor diet and excessive alcohol consumption. Persons with less severe damage to the liver may recover completely after a few weeks on a good diet and the discontinued use of alcohol.

Hunting-Fishing Day

Year-Round Season For Lions Closed

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission recently closed the year-round season for hunting, trapping or killing cougar, or mountain lion, effective 1 hour after sunset May 31, 1972. A general hunting season for cougar or mountain lion, was established from September 2 through December 31, 1972 except in the following units, which will be closed: Units 10, 10A, 11, 11A, 12, 16, 19, 19A, 20-20A-25-26-27-36-36A and 36B. Dogs will not be permitted for hunting lions during the general or controlled deer and elk hunting seasons. Mountain lion may be "trailed, pursued and treed," January 5 1973 through March 31, 1973 in all units of the state provided it is not killed or captured.

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Patrick Monaghan To Seek County Attorney Post

Patrick Monaghan, Moscow resident and legal intern in the Whitman County Prosecutor's office announced last week that he will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for county attorney.



Monaghan has worked as an assistant to the Whitman County Prosecutor since June 1971. He has been in charge of all District Court cases, served as an advisor to the Whitman County Drug Control Unit, the Whitman County Sheriff's office, Pullman Police Department, Washington State University Police, and the Washington State Patrol. Monaghan has prepared advisory memos for the County Commissioners; handled juvenile court cases, child welfare and support cases; and aided in the prosecution of felons. Over 50 contested cases have been prosecuted by Monaghan ranging from traffic cases to assault and drug prosecutions during his term. He has also participated in training institutes sponsored by the National District Attorneys Association and is a member of the Lewis and Clark Peace Officers Association.

Philip H. Farris, Whitman County Prosecutor, upon Monaghan's resignation in order to seek the Latah County Attorney position stated, "Pat's association with me has been most satisfactory. I had hoped Pat would stay here with us in Whitman County that we might take full advantage of his knowledge and experience, however, despite our best efforts and offers we were unable to lure him away from Idaho."

The 27-year old Monaghan moved to Latah County straight from his tour of duty in Vietnam. He is a recipient of the Bronze Star.

His wife, Mary Louise, was formerly employed as a librarian at the Latah County Library. Presently, she is taking care of the newest member of the Monaghan family, John Aloysius, who was four months old May 25 of this year.

If, however, you do not agree, I will, after soothing my feathers, take that as a sign that the majority of the people of Latah County would rather have me defend them than prosecute them and I will abide by that decision accordingly.

The county attorney is the legal advisor of the county government and the chief law enforcement officer of the community. His dedication and drive set a tone for all law enforcement agencies. He is a partner with the patrolman in service and protection for the people.

There is no place in this office for pettiness or vindictiveness. There is the duty and obligation to the community to enforce the law and an equal obligation to all defendants to be fair and free of malice.

It is not with pleasure that I have ever prosecuted any man or woman. There is no joy in seeing your fellow man fined or incarcerated but in many instances our choices are limited as there is most assuredly little case in contemplating some individuals, with their personal attitudes being free. Game Harvest Figures Revealed

Big game harvest figures for 1972 seasons generally declined from 1970 levels, although the overall picture is still "within the ball park" considering the long term, ten-year averages. Estimated kill figures indicate that the elk harvest of 13,400 last year was down 8 percent from 1970, and the 61,800 deer kill was 25 percent under the record 1970 figure at 83,100. Tag sales also were below 1970 levels—minus 5 percent for elk and minus 6 percent for deer. Figures are based on post-season hunter questionnaires, which have been used to compute big game kills since 1953.

For trophy animal species under controlled hunt, the number of moose taken by 115 permittees was 85 animals; 2,391 antelope permittees killed 1,436 animals—a 7 percent decrease from 1970 hunts; 67 permittees claimed 13 bighorn sheep in 1971, compared with 5 animals in 1970. However, it must be noted that bighorn sheep management changed from mostly general open hunting of this species in 1970 to all controlled hunts last season.

Some 321 mountain goat permit holders (3 percent below 1970) harvested 137 goats (8 percent below 1970). It is possible that a few more kills may be added to the moose, antelope, bighorn sheep and mountain goat kill reports since a few trophy hunters have not returned their report cards.

Of the past dozen years hunters (and other sources) have reported an average of 129 cougar or mountain lion kills per year. In contrast the 1971 reported kill of this species probably will exceed 281. It is believed that the new Idaho law making cougar a game animal, with tags required for nonresidents, resulted in a "last chance" drive to bag the erst while predator before new regulations become effective.

Spring Bear Shooting
Idaho's spring bear season ends May 31 in most management units where there is a season. However, black bear hunting in Unit 22 ends May 14. Other southern Idaho units are open year-round. All prizzly bears are protected year-round under state laws. Some places in the state are open to bear hunting on a year-round basis, but many of the good hunting units close May 31. This includes such country as the Selway and Lochsa regions, the North Fork of the Clearwater and the St. Joe river regions as well as the Oia-Indian Valley areas of the Little eWiser River in Unit 32-A.

Home Cookin'

Home grown rhubarb is plentiful in the garden right now, and there are so many different ways to prepare it. That goes for fresh apples that will soon be coming on. Some delicious ways to prepare and serve this fruits came to us this week by Mrs. Kenneth Jenkins. The Jenkins' raised red crimson rhubarb and it is delicious. I happen to know as Mrs. Jenkins brought us in a generous supply.

RHUBARB CRUMB CAKE
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups brown sugar (packed)
1 egg
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups flour
1 1/2 cups rhubarb cut in 1/2-inch pieces
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream shortening and brown sugar. Add egg and blend well. Combine soda and buttermilk and all alternately with flour. Stir in rhubarb nuts and vanilla. Place in 9"x13" greased and floured baking dish. Sprinkle with topping. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes.
Topping:
Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 TBS. butter and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Sprinkle over rhubarb cake mixture.

FRESH APPLE CAKE with Rum Sauce
1/2 cup butter
2 cups sugar
2 eggs
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoon soda or 1 tsp baking powder and three-fourths tsp soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 1/2 cups chopped nut meats
3 cups finely chopped peeled apples
Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, and beat until blended. Sift flour, measure and sift again with soda, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon. Mix into egg mixture, beating just until smooth. Stir in nuts and apples. (Batter will be real thick until apples are added.) Spread in a greased 9"x13" baking pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 or 50 minutes until cake springs back. Pour hot rum sauce over cake to serve. Yield 12 servings. The cake is darker using 2 tsp. soda than it is with 1 tsp. baking powder and three-fourths tsp. soda.
Hot Buttered Rum Sauce:

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Unemployment In County Declines

17 workers were placed on jobs during the past week through the Moscow office of the Department of Employment. 19 new jobs were received and at the close of the week there were 15 openings. Current listing include cook, waitress, office clerk, television repairman, and domestic workers.

The number of persons seeking employment insurance in Latah Co. has dropped as many woods workers and construction workers return to their jobs. During the past week, 365 persons sought jobless pay. This compares to 395 last week and 294 during the same week a year ago. 34 new claims were filed during the week. Moscow area residents seeking benefits total 133 in addition to 12 in Genesee, 131 in the Troy-Deary Bovill area; 8 in Kendrick, 75 in Potlatch and 6 in Elk River.

General Fishing Season Open Saturday May 27

The general fishing season in Idaho opens May 27 this year and will run until November 30. All the waters in the state not yet open will be open except those that are closed to fishing the entire year. Also, some species are closed at this time in some areas, such as steelhead fishing. These areas are listed in the 1972 Fishing Season Regulations by area. All anglers should check to make sure they have a 1972 fishing or fishing and hunting license before going fishing. Also, pick up a copy of the 1972 regulations at the time you purchase your license. Study these regulations to make sure your fishing trip will be a happy one.

Due to the filling of Dworshak pool, there has been several changes made in the regulations on the North Fork of the Clearwater River for this year. The North Fork is closed to all fishing from its mouth upstream to the Dworshak Dam for all species of fish. This closure is for the protection of steelhead coming into the North Fork and the Dworshak Hatchery area. From the Dworshak Dam upstream to Thompson Creek, open to fishing May 27 to November 30 for all species of fish. This includes the Dworshak pool area and all tributaries running into the pool and North Fork from the Dam upstream to Thompson Creek, which, when the pool is filled, will be the backwater of the Dworshak reservoir.

Trout fishing on the North Fork and tributaries, except Kelly Creek, above Thompson Creek, is open May 27 to September 10 only and a special trout limit of three fish is listed. This same stretch of river is open to white fish and bass the entire year.

Kelly Creek and tributaries, lake excluded has a special fish for fun season, where all fish caught must be returned to the stream and bait fishing is prohibited.

The Army Corps of Engineers has rescinded their order of no boats on Dworshak pool. However, boaters are encouraged to use extreme caution because of the hazardous conditions of debris and floating trees on the reservoir. The reservoir will be stocked with catchable rainbow trout prior to the opening of fishing season May 27. These rainbow are being planted by the Fish and Wildlife Service at the Big Eddy boat ramp. The 280,000 fish average about 1/2 lb. each and were raised at the Dworshak National Fish Hatchery.

Fishing should be fair to good in the lower end of the Dworshak pool. Water in the reservoir is fairly clear from Elk River downstream. Above this point it is quite turbid.

Other changes from last years regulations is the reduction of the trout bag limit from 15 to 10 fish. The bag and possession limit for trout and grayling for 1972 is not more than 7 pounds and one fish but not to exceed 10 fish per day or kept in possession.

Another change from last year is that there is a separate limit on kokanee and coho. Daily bag and or possession limit is 25 fish. This is separate and apart from trout this year. You could catch 25 kokanee and 10 trout a day and still not be in violation this year.

The 1972 Idaho Fish Season and Regulations are effective January 1 to December 31, 1972, and all dates are inclusive.

Inside the folder are the areas of the state and specific regulations by area. For each area there are four sections. First is the general seasons for that area. Second are listed the exceptions to the general season and regulations by area and third lists the waters open to year-round fishing. Lastly, the waters closed to all fishing the entire year are listed.

As an example, if an angler wanted to know when fishing season opened on any particular creek or stream he would first locate the area on the map—the majority of the Clearwater Region is in Area 2. He would then look for the water or waters by name alphabetically in the exceptions to general regulations. If it is not found there or in the waters open to year-round fishing or closed to fishing sections, it would then mean the water is open during the general fishing season.

If there is any doubt about an area being open always make sure to check the regulations, which may be obtained from any license vendor or any regional office of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. The Clearwater Region Office is located at 1540 Warner Avenue, Lewiston.

For her going-away trip, the bride wore a blue and white dress with white accessories, and the corsage from her bridal bouquet.

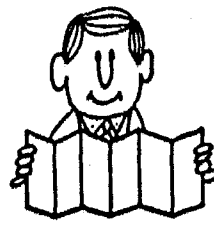
