

Juliaetta News — Housing Units For Elderly In Juliaetta Still Possibility If Enough Interest Shown

Plans to build housing facilities for the elderly in Juliaetta have been underway for over a year now and despite administrative setbacks and discouragements, latest word indicates that there is possible hope for the project if sufficient interest can be shown.

Approval for the project was indicated in January following which the city of Juliaetta went ahead with the sale of city property to assure adequate land for the purpose. Then,

two months ago, the Federal Housing Administration indicated their agency might withdraw approval.

Under the direction of Mayor Harold Freeman, the Juliaetta city council joined with the Clearwater Economic Development Association to work with Rep. James McClure and Sen. Frank Church to convince the FHA to reconsider the project.

According to Lonnie Williams, of the CEDA in Moscow, he received notice last Friday that the FHA would reconsider the project on a smaller basis.

At present it will be necessary to evaluate the demand for this type of housing in the Juliaetta area. The project, named Johnson Manor, would be a project of housing for the elderly. Depending on the income level of those qualifying, the units would rent from \$40 to \$80 monthly.

The project hopefully will contain 20 to 30 units, depending on demand. Those interested in this type of housing may contact the Clearwater Economic Development Association, Box 265, Moscow, and are also welcome to discuss the project with Mayor Freeman at Juliaetta.

If enough interest is shown, a public meeting is anticipated at some future date. It is also expected that a survey of Juliaetta and a questionnaire to evaluate demand will be used.

He enlisted in the U. S. Army at Boise April 5, 1917 and received his discharge at Camp Dodge, Iowa, Jan. 3, 1919. During World War II he worked in shipyards in Alaska, Louisiana and Hawaii. Patty was never married.

May Rainfall Over Two Inches

Rainfall for the month of May exceeded the two-inch mark in both the Genesee and Kendrick areas this year, according to reports received this week from observers who maintain rain gauges for the Soil Conservation Service.

Richard Benscoter, who maintains a rain gauge on American Ridge, reported that he totaled 2.61 inches for May of 1972.

Over in Genesee, John Luedke reported that his May figure totaled 2.33 inches to being the total for the year to date to 14.15. Luedke added that the rainfall for May of 1971 was 2.10 inches with 10.78 inches at that time for total year figures.

The year 1971 was a wetter one than average, according to Luedke's records. The total for the year was 26.92, well above the 18-year average of 20.93.

Job Placements In Latah County Rise

The placement of job seekers continues to rise slightly in the Moscow area. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Dept. of Employment reported today that his office assisted 25 workers in securing gainful employment during the past week. This, said Hartstein, is an increase of 2 over last week's 23 placements but is more than double the number of workers given job finding help during the same week a year ago.

Hartstein indicated that his office received calls for 29 workers during the week, and that at the end of the week there were still 21 jobs available. Although there is a continuing increase in the number of jobs being filled, he said, there are still large numbers of young people seeking work. Many are seeking summer jobs with the expectation of returning to school next fall. It appears now, there will not be enough jobs for all of those who are seeking work, and employers are urged to call his office whenever a worker can be used. We have lots of young, eager workers, some with experience, but all with enthusiasm, he concluded.

Hartstein's report indicated that the number of persons filing claims for unemployment insurance declined considerably during the past week. He said that the total now seeking jobless pay is only 331 compared to 378 at the end of the previous week. A year ago the total was 278. Only 20 persons filed new claims for benefits during the week, compared with 60 during the preceding week, and 69 during the same week a year ago.

Hartstein reported that the closure of the U. of I. coming earlier than last year accounted for a portion of the difference. Most of the 67 persons who discontinued claims for jobless pay had returned to work, although a few had exhausted all benefits, and some were declared not eligible for various reasons. Of the total number of workers claiming insurance throughout the county, 140 are in the immediate Moscow area; 10 are at Genesee; 101 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill vicinity; 7 in Kendrick and Juliaetta; 69 in the Potlatch area and 4 at Elk River.

Second Half Taxes May Be Paid At Bank

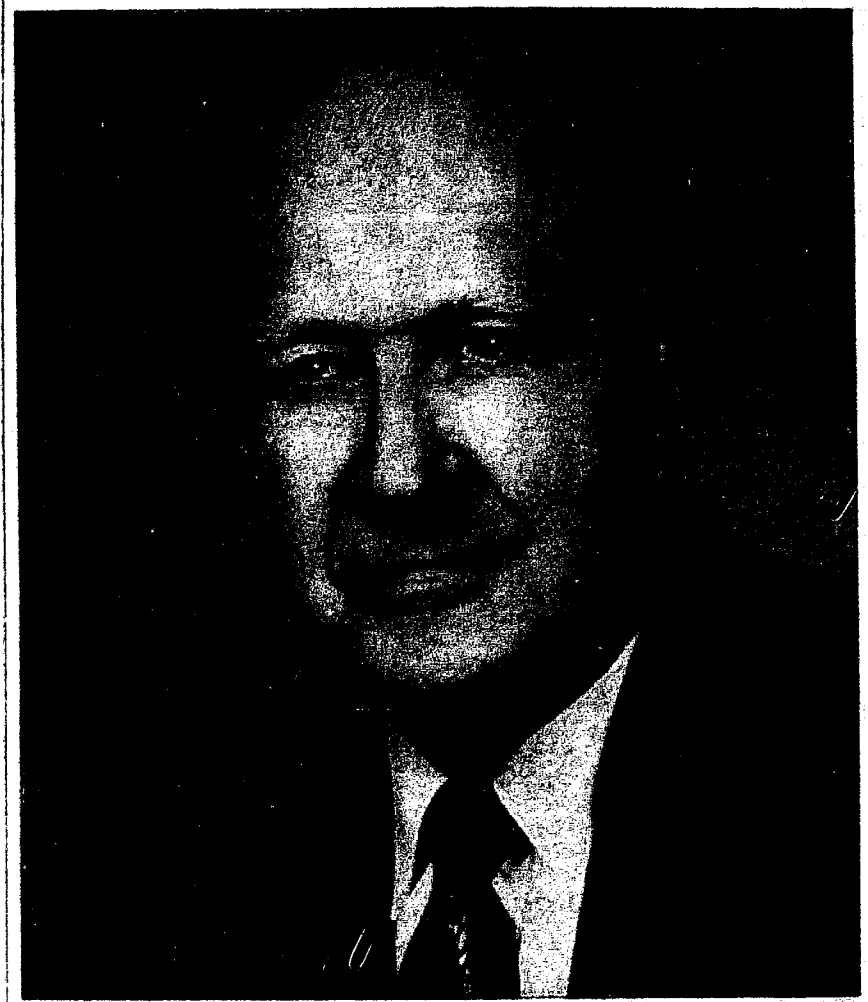

BETTER HUNTING ETHICS DEFENSE AGAINST ANTIS

 Idaho Fish & Game Dept.
 Some of the underlying causes for hostility toward hunters were suggested by a clinical psychologist with the U. S. Veteran's Administration about 1 and one half years ago at the winter workshop of the American Association for Conservation Information in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Dr. Joseph Schenkel said that a person suffering from lack of love from parents, for example, may switch to animal for affection. Hence, if the hunter is killing his equivalent of a mother and father. Other anti-hunters may have excessive need for feelings of self-righteous, which are manifested in their emotions against hunters.
 Hunting as a behavioral pattern has been with man from the earliest record of the hominid some fourteen and a half million years ago. Most anthropologists tell us that it was hunting and the availability of the meat diet that enabled man to compete with and surpass the vegetarians of the ape family. They also suggest that man has come up the ladder through stimulation, excitement and identity. In other words, through adventure.

What has all this got to do with today's 17 million American hunters. In his new book, Social Contract, Robert Ardrey says, "Adventure may or may not have been the motive that began the human way. Whatever it was that set us on our course, still for too many millions of years we found our daily satisfaction in violence. We attacked or we starved. We dared or we were selected out. We adapted anatomically and physiologically, to the hunt. Our muscular buttocks, unlike those of any other primate, provided us with the strength to throw, to stab, to crush. Our flattened feet provide speed and endurance in the chase. Glands that once directed the timid primate to flee rearranged their chemistry to direct the hominid to attack. We became creatures adapted in all ways to the excitement of violent action. Until 5,000 years ago there was no

 2 tablespoons shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Sift 6 or 6½ cups flour

Bear Season Closed

In order to improve the management of black bear in certain areas now open to hunting, some additional game management units will be closed for black bear hunting one hour after sunset May 31; and other units will be closed for hunting black bear June 30. Black bear seasons and regulations are essentially unchanged from 1971. It is illegal to use dogs to "trail, pursue, hunt or kill" black bear in any management unit during a general or in controlled deer or elk season or in specified units or periods of time.

Salmon Run Potential High

For what it's worth, the spring chinook salmon count at Bonneville Dam is very high, but there is a gauntlet of hazards to run in the Columbia and Snake river systems. The count at the last dam on the Snake River is not yet unusually high. Runs during the last three years have been relatively high at Bonneville but large losses have occurred between this dam and Idaho. Many salmon were lost prior to reaching the last dam and between 35 and 50 percent of the spring chinook passing the last dam died before reaching the spawning grounds, or Idaho's major fishing areas. Nitrogen supersaturation of the water was the major cause of this excessive mortality.

The count is approaching 40,000 fish at Little Goose Dam, the last of a series of concrete and steel barriers blocking fish passage and fishery technicians are cautiously optimistic. Between 10,000 and 15,000 spring chinook salmon are expected to return to Idaho hatchery streams this year. This means that a total of 45,000 to 50,000 fish is needed past Little Goose Dam to insure adequate numbers of "wild fish" in the Salmon River. Biologists will closely monitor the spring run to determine the number of wild fish returning to the Salmon River and their condition.
