Former Resident Dies At Salt Lake

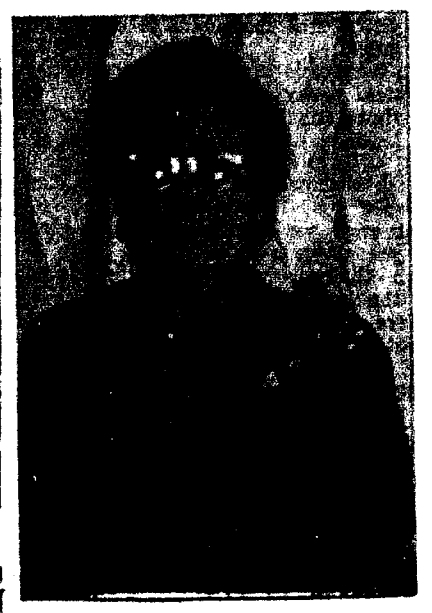

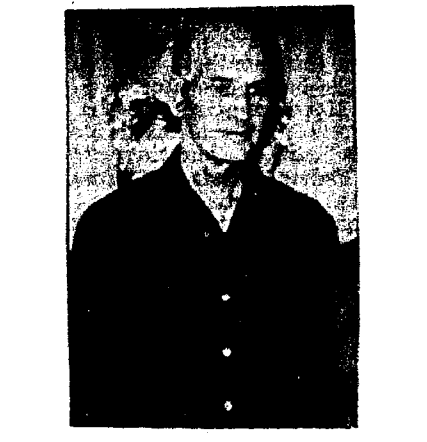
No Methodist Church Services Sunday

Heart Attack Claims Roy R. Whittum

Roy R. Whittum, 59, rural mail carrier at Juliaetta, died Monday, June 12, at 2:30 p. m. at his home here after suffering a heart attack.

Whittum had been the mail carrier on the Teakean Star Route since 1970. From 1950 to 1970 he was a self-employed logger at Juliaetta. He was born July 13, 1912, at Missoula, Montana, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Whittum. He attended school in Montana and as a teen-ager moved to the Coeur d'Alene area where he worked as a logger for two years before enlisting in the Army in 1930.



From 1930 to 1933 he served with the Army and was stationed for a time in the The Philippines, returning in 1933 to Portland, Ore., where he worked for a short time in the shippards.

Whittum returned to the Coeur d'Alene area later in 1933 and worked in logging and mining operations until he moved to Juliaetta in 1950.

He was a 22-year member of the Eagle Lodge at Coeur d'Alene. He married Carolyn Seever at Coeur d'Alene in 1934. She died in 1943. In 1954 he married Marjorie Otto at Lewiston.

Survivors in addition to his widow include three daughters, Mrs. Kenneth (Alice) Gruell, Lewiston, Mrs. Thomas (Rosalee) Gray, Schweinfurt, Germany, and Shere Lyn Whittum at the family home; a son, Ronald Whittum, at the home; two stepsons, Ralph and Ray Otto, both of Lewiston; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Bud (Marcella) Smith, Cullides; five brothers, Earl and Lester, both of Priest River; Clarence, Renton, Wash.; William, Hermiston, Ore., and Walter, Auburn, Wash.; two sisters, Madeline Hansen, Priest River, and Mrs. Stanley (Irene) Salerno, Spokane; his mother, Mrs. Nora Whittum, Edgemere, Idaho, six grandchildren, 14 step-grandchildren and a step-great-grandchild.

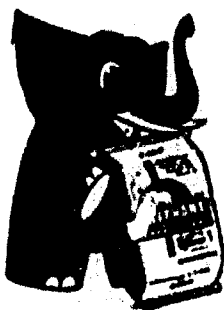

Kokanee Egg-Taking Site
The Idaho Fish and Game Dept.
has developed a successful fishery in
Salmon Falls Reservoir over a per-

developed by the U. S. Bureau of
Land Management, Nevada Fish and
Game Department and the Idaho Fish
and Game Department, will be used
as an egg collection site for spawn-
ing kokanee migrating upstream
from Salmon Falls Reservoir. This
will allow Salmon Falls creek and its
tributaries to be treated for the elim-
ination of rough fish above the barrier.

Record Hunting Seasons
Some 249,300 doves were harvested
by hunters during the 1971 season—a
record of 11 percent increase from
1970 and a long-term average. This
information is based on annual hunt-
er questionnaire surveys since 1954.
Approximately 697,700 ducks were
harvested during the 1971 season —
a long-term record harvest and 8
percent above the 1970 figures.

Annual hunter questionnaire survey
show a steady increase in the number
of doves harvested each year since
1954. The record shows that 125,000
doves were taken by hunters in 1964.
For the period 1959-1963 the average
dove harvest was 155,900. The av-
erage for the season beginnings 1964-
1968 was 190,500. For the year 1969
the dove harvest was 220,200; in 1970
the harvest was 223,900; and for 1971
the harvest was 249,300.

The duck harvest does not show the
same type of steady growth over
the years. The average from 1954-
1958 was 542,80 ducks. For the sea-
sons in 1959-1963 it dropped back to
405,600; between 1964-1965 the av-
erage was 405,200. In 1969 the har-
vest jumped to 529,000 ducks taken
by hunters. In 1970 the harvest for
one year was 648,500 and in 1971 the
hunters reported taking 697,700.

Other small game harvests during
1971 as recorded on the annual hunt-
er questionnaire survey are as fol-
low:

Phenants, 542,600; a 24 per-
cent increase from 1970; forest
grouse, 141,200 birds, a 6 percent in-
crease from 1970; Hungarian part-
ridge, 86,400, up 62 percent from '70;
chukar partridge, 158,800 down 6 per-
cent of the '70 harvest; quail, 106,800,
two percent below '70; sage grouse,
79,800, up 12 percent from 1970; Can-
ada goose, 24,400, 20 percent below
'70; snow goose, 900 birds, the same
as 1970.

Recreation Needs Pose Many Problems

There are two main problems to be solved in this land of ours, this America. One of them is work and the other is leisure. Both of them are necessary, though really 2 sides of the same coin. Of the two, leisure is by far the more important.

Webster says that recreation is "refreshment of strength and spirits after toil diversion." His key words are "after toil" and this places "recreation" as the antonym or opposite of "work."

Some dedicated men do put in 10 to 12 hours of work a day and find it difficult to take time off for vacations and might well know the answers to many of the problems that appear to be developing in the use

of leisure time. Of course, the real problem is the failure of society to provide a smooth transition from work values to leisure values. Traditionally in American society, work has provided the central focus of the value system. Certainly this makes it most difficult to develop a leisure-centered value system, or to find meaningful roles in leisure-time activities. Values largely are determined by insti-

tutions, especially schools, churches, and governmental agencies. But the big problem remains the conversion of leisure time into an asset instead of a liability. It is quite evident that industrial workers, at least, have vacation time and are getting more of it. The past 100 years, for example, the average work-week in industry has dropped from 72 hours to less than 40 hours per week. The number of vacation weeks has grown from 20 million to 100 million in the past 30 years or so. Some labor unions even have negotiated sabbatical leaves for senior workers. Automation has eliminated production line jobs, shortened the work week, increased vacations and forced earlier retirement. Those hardest hit are the ones with the least education and consequent inability to cope with leisure.

Much of Idaho is already in the public domain and available to cope with leisure. Much of Idaho is already in the public domain and available to help meet the needs for outdoor recreation, including fishing, hunting, camping and swimming, to name a few. It is obvious that fishing, hunting and the nonconsumptive uses of wildlife are as broad, or broader, a base for outdoor recreation as, say, swimming, camping, picnicking etc. Nature walks and study, wildlife viewing and similar recreation occur with increasing frequency on lands once considered primarily as key wildlife habitat and public hunting areas.

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Several mule deer and elk herds are in serious danger because their comparatively small critical winter ranges are becoming even smaller due to the construction of highways and reservoirs, urban sprawl and land overuse. Posting and draining has reduced the places shot-gunners can ply their sport. The most obvious way out of the predicament is to acquire more key lands and to develop them and the ones already owned to carry more animals and fish.

The department's land management policy rests on two main points. These are (1) to give hunters and fishermen an opportunity to participate in their chosen sport by providing the access public lands and waters that can provide the recreation, and 2) to provide the necessary habitat for endangered big game herds or other wildlife populations.

All of the lands purchased by the department specifically for wildlife were paid for by the hunters and fishermen, from license monies and from federal excise taxes on arms, ammunition and fishing tackle. Acquisition through purchase, lease or agreement is the first step toward the department's goals. Most Idaho laws favor the acquisition of lands and waters for fish and wildlife and the hunting and fishing public. Some laws need changing.

Sometimes it is necessary to buy an entire small ranch or farm just

to get the access rights to a stream. When this is done, the lands surplus to the recreation needs are sold, thus returning them to the tax roles and to the agricultural economy of the community. Occasionally an acquisition and development project does not provide the recreation that the original planners supposed. In such cases, all of the land is sold.

for the nonhunters. Several thousand and animal months of grazing a year are permitted on fish and game lands. Many acres of agricultural lands are farmed by sharecrop agreements; with the state share of any food crops left in the fields for wildlife. Each acquisition and development seems to attract more sportsmen and tourists with their dollars to that community.

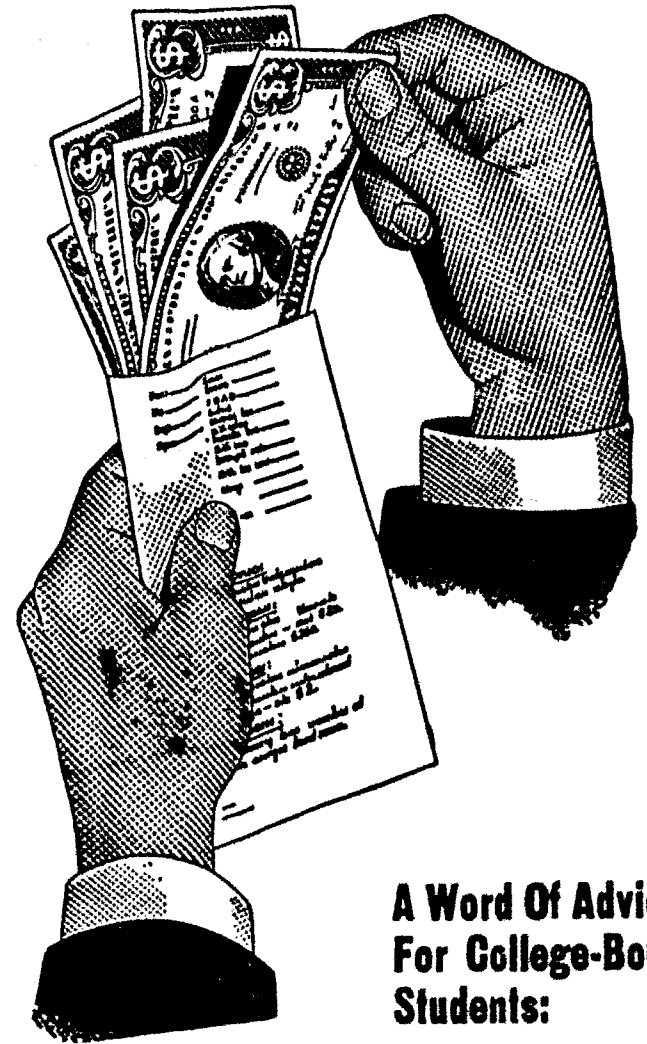

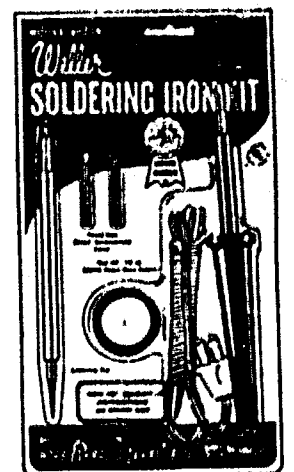

AN ORDINANCE VACATING THAT PART OF THIRD STREET LYING AND BEING BETWEEN AND CONTIGUOUS TO BLOCKS TEN (10) AND ELEVEN (11), ORIGINAL TOWN OF KENDRICK, IDAHO, AS SHOWN ON THE RECORDED PLAT THEREOF; RESERVING CERTAIN EASEMENTS FOR WATER AND SEWER LINES; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO THE OWNERS OF LANDS ABUTTING ON SAID STREET, AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. That all of that part of Third Street lying and being contiguous to the East line of Block Ten (10) and the West line of Block Eleven (11) in the Original Town of Kendrick, Idaho, as shown by the recorded plat thereof, be, and the same is hereby vacated: PROVIDED HOWEVER, that there are hereby RESERVED unto the City of Kendrick, easements over, under and across the above described street and land for the location, construction, installation, removal, maintenance, repair and replacement of water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections, and for all other purposes of every nature pertaining thereto, together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said premises for the purposes aforesaid.

Section 2. That the Mayor and the Council of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed in the name of and on behalf of the City of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated street good and proper deeds conveying to said owners the one-half of said vacated street abutting on the lands of said owners, subject, however, to the reservations set forth in Section 1 above.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.
