The Kanikkebergs On Their Golden Anniversary



A buffalo meat dinner led to the acquaintance of an aspiring young assistant bank cashier and a shy, little school teacher in December of 1919 at Fessenden, North Dakota. It later blossomed into fifty years of happy marriage for Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Kanikkeberg, who will celebrate their golden wedding anniversary on Sunday, June 25, at an open house at the Kendrick High School from 2 to 4:30 p. m.

'Kanik', the name he has familiarly been known most of his life, was serving tables at the annual Masonic dinner at the Lutheran Church in Fessenden, when by chance he met his future wife, Mamie Erickson, who was accompanying her father at the dinner.

During the summer of 1920 they became engaged and she continued her teaching career in Fessenden County until the end of the school term in 1922. By this time 'Kanik' had been transferred from the First National Bank in Fessenden to a bank in Cathay, some 30 or 40 miles away where he decided to live. Since this was farther to drive to court his future bride, Mrs. Kanikkeberg recalls with a chuckle, "the bank president told 'Kanik' he should get married and save the wear and tear of running back and forth between Cathay, my home, which was near Fessenden."

Assumably they took the president's advice and on June 14, 1922, were married at the home of her parents in Manfred, N. D. A honeymoon trip took them to Fargo and Devils Lake. They returned to Cathay where they made their home for the next several years.

Apart from banking work 'Kanik's' chief interest was playing baseball. "He played baseball every Sunday, every summer," Mrs. Kanikkeberg remarked, "we always knew where we were going on Sunday."

He was quite a proficient pitcher when a young man; however, an injured shoulder prevented him from entering the minor leagues.

He often recalls playing against the famous Satchel Paige in the early 30's. "I did not have the opportunity of having a personal visit with him," 'Kanik' remarked.

For about a year, around 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Kanikkeberg played in a dance orchestra; he played the saxophone and she the piano "which the interest was high and their object-busy week," she said.

In 1936 the depression forced the Kanikkebergs to leave North Dakota. They came to Kendrick as a result of an ad 'Kanik' placed in the Spokane Chronicle seeking employment in the banking field. He was called by one of the directors of the Farmers Bank in Kendrick. He was interviewed on a Friday and began

work at the bank on Monday. The family moved to Kendrick where they have lived continuously since 1936. At that time O. E. Havens, well-known to everyone in this area, was cashier of the Farmer's Bank.

In 1939, the Farmers Bank took over the Kendrick State Bank and 'Kanik' was promoted to cashier. When the First Security Corporation bought the Farmers Bank in 1964, he remained as manager for two years, retiring in 1966, but still had an office in the bank and served in an advisory capacity.

Mrs. Kanikkeberg was born near Harvey, North Dakota on November 7, 1901. She graduated from high school at Fessenden and attended State Teachers College at Minot, N. D. for one year. She then went into the teaching profession in a one room school in Wells County where she taught until 1922.

Having a keen interest in community affairs and her work in the Methodist and Lutheran Churches, Mrs. Kanikkeberg organized and was president of the first homemakers extension club in Cathay with a membership of 20. She said, "As the membership grew the club had to be divided into two clubs—this was rewarding to me," she continued, "as the interest was high and their objectives as members were well done."

She has also been a member of the Order of the Eastern Star since 1926 and is a Past Worthy Matron. She taught Sunday School from the age of 15 until 1954 and served as Sunday school superintendent for several years. She is past secretary of the VFW auxiliary and during World War II was President of the local Red Cross Chapter. She has served as president and treasurer of the local PTA and of the Methodist Women's Society of Christian Service and is currently president of the Lutheran women's group, the ALCW at Juliaetta. Both she and her husband are members of the Juliaetta-Zion Lutheran Church.

Mr. Kanikkeberg has been a member of the Masonic Lodge since 1924 and received his 25 year pin from the Kendrick Lodge in 1971. He is past Post Commander of the American Legion and during World War II served in the Idaho Volunteers Reserve. In 1949 he was elected president of the Latah Chamber of Commerce. He has been a school board member and/or clerk since 1939 and is currently clerk and treasurer for Joint School District No. 283. He has also been city treasurer for Kendrick for 25 years and still maintains that position. He is an avid bowler and bowls in two leagues during the season with an average in the 170s.

A kindergarten program for Jt. School District 283 has been assured for next year, according to Supt. of Schools Don Blakeley.

Four new teachers have been added to the staff of School District No. 283 for the 1972-73 school year. These newly hired educators will fill positions being vacant by retirement or by resignation of former teachers.

Noreen Stefonek, a graduate of Lewis-Clark State College with 10 years of teaching experience, will be the only new teacher in the elementary school this fall. She will be replacing Mrs. Norla Callison as fourth grade instructor.

Jeanette Wolf of Moscow will be teaching Girls PE, drill team and sociology at the high school. She graduated from Lewiston High School and has attended LSCC and the U of I where she received a BS degree this spring with credits in physical education, health education and psychology. Her record also shows that she is able to direct girls track, tumbling, gymnastics and drill team. Jeanette will replace Mrs. Terry Peterson who has accepted a position in the Moscow Schools.

Teaching general math, biology, earth science and algebra I will be Raul Hunt of Troy. He will fill the position vacated by the resignation of Arthur Boe. Hunt's credentials reveal that he received his master's degree from the U of Idaho this spring and is qualified to teach agronomy, biology, chemistry, spanish and math. He has attended technical industrial school in Chile, foreign language camp at Sun Valley, participated as a group leader for 19 high school students for a study trip to Chile, and at present is conducting a European tour for a group of college students.

Mrs. Bessie Kolva will be working with Genesee, Potlatch, White Pine and Kendrick school districts as a speech therapist. Eighty percent of Mrs. Kolva's salary is funded federally, the remainder is divided between the four districts. Mrs. Kolva attended Goldendale, Wash. high school and studied associate arts at Yakima Valley College. She received a B. A. degree in speech from WSU in 1970 and her master's from the same school in 1972. Mrs. Kolva will replace Mrs. Danielle Parker who served as speech therapist in these districts the past two years.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Winnie Baker, Kendrick; a son, Richard H. Building Project Discussed At Juliaetta Meeting

Proposed plans for the construction of a housing project for elderly persons in Juliaetta was discussed and explained Monday night at a special meeting called for that purpose by Harold Freeman, Mayor of that town.

Lonnie Williams, Moscow, director of the Clearwater Economic Development Association, who is helping with the proposed project, said the housing could become a reality within a year, if enough interest and the proper support is obtained.

Almost fifty interested persons heard Williams and Gary Oelrich of Spokane, sponsor of the project, describe qualifications of residency and facilities they hope to have in the 20 to 30 unit complex. An estimated cost of \$250,000 has been placed on the project.

The Juliaetta project is one of four in the area which the CEDA is promoting. Similar projects have been projected for Lewiston, Kamiah, and Grangeville.

Rental for the units, designed primarily for the aged, would range from \$47 to \$80 per month, depending on income. Mr. Oelrich of Spokane had plans of the units which he showed to the group.

Mayor Freeman said Tuesday morning that the step toward construction would be to get enough applications of interest. These are papers from qualified persons indicating they would be interested in residing in this type of unit. Mayor Freeman said the applications would not be binding on the person making them, but they would be used as an indication that the project did warrant serious consideration for Federal support.

Juliaetta Council Meeting Mayor Freeman also reminded that because of the July 4th holiday, the council will meet July 11.

Military Personnel Angling Privileges

Nonresident military personnel visiting Idaho are classified as nonresidents and in this case must buy nonresident fishing and hunting licenses. However, military personnel who were residents of Idaho at the time of entering the armed forces, assigned to permanent duty outside of Idaho but visiting on furlough may buy the regular civilian license of their choice, or obtain a free furlough permit good only for the days specified in his orders. These permits are obtainable only from conservation officers or department headquarters in Boise.

Nonresident military personnel and immediate families newly stationed in Idaho may purchase resident hunting and fishing licenses

without waiting the usual six continuous months to establish state residency. These licenses may be obtained from any regular hunting and fishing license vendor upon presentation of military orders.

Bighorn Range Improved

The Morgan Creek management program for bighorn sheep near Challis is an excellent example of cooperation between two federal agencies and one state department, plus the private livestock interests involved. This plan resulted from research in the late 1960's which showed two basic causes for the dwindling bighorn sheep population in Morgan Creek. These causes were (1) livestock grazing in key bighorn sheep winter range and (2) too many mule deer for the capacity of the range. The wild sheep population had dwindled from over 200 animals down to about 60 in a short span of years.

Cooperating agencies were the U. S. Bureau of Land Management, U. S. Forest Service and the Idaho Fish and Game Department. The project demonstrates that properly managed livestock use can be successful in rehabilitating ranges and benefitting wildlife. Livestock can be used to trample seed into the soil, thereby promoting more forage and better soil cover; to remove old growth which can increase plant vigor and stimulate new growth; and to reduce fire hazards.

The cooperative range rejuvenation project near Challis shows that livestock grazing at certain times of the year can cause big game browse plants to produce a growth most suitable for winter range use. Hopefully, all of this effort will result in better productivity of the ewes and survival of bighorn lambs and an increasing herd which will provide additional opportunities for the hunter and viewer in the future.

A MATTER OF MEDITATION

Meditation is a matter of life and breath. Maybe, even a matter of breathing easier and living better.

New experiments at the Harvard Medical Unit at the Boston City Hospital—reported in full in a recent issue of Scientific American—explored the physiological reactions of practitioners of Yoga. The results were amazing.

Subjects were taught by the Medical Unit a technique called transcendental meditation which requires inner concentration on a 'suitable' sound or thought. During 30 minutes of this kind of intense concentration, the body undergoes drastic changes. Breathing patterns are altered; oxygen consumption falls off sharply; so does the amount of carbon dioxide being exhaled. The heart rate slows. Blood pressure drops. Skin resistance to an electric current increases sharply. The pattern of brain waves change markedly.

But with all this downbeat of the metabolism, a curious thing happens. The delivery of oxygen and the blood flow to the muscles of the body are speeded up. The subjects felt deeply relaxed and intensely alive. The experimenter believes that the autonomic nervous system, supposedly not under voluntary control must be involved.

Conscious changes in breathing and concentration clearly affect the entire body say the Harvard researchers. They believe yoga techniques may be one way to increase well-being.

SUMMER SUFFERING

A hot July day. Some people are swimming and surfing camping in cool woods, or sailing along with a soft breeze. Summer is to enjoy. But millions are miserable with summer colds.

Actually, young children have the most colds. Preschoolers get an average of 6 to 12 colds a year. Parents of young children have about 6 colds a year, whereas other adults have only 2 or 3. People over 45 have the fewest colds.

According to the Common Cold Research Unit at Harvard Hospital in Britain—where they have injected more than 11,000 healthy volunteers

As uninhibited, uncovered sneeze travels at the incredible speed of 103 miles per hour say researchers at the Cold Unit. Some of the viruses die after a few minutes in the air. Others live for hours. Watch out for anyone with sniffles and sneezes. And cover your own.

Wildlife Viewpoint

Some 30,000 hunters talk about their successes and failures at checking stations located at strategic points in Idaho's 92 game management units and subunits. About the same number of people fill out hunter report cards each year and return them to the Fish and Game Department in Boise.

These men and women are scattered throughout the state's 83,600 square miles—two-thirds of which is in the public domain, either National Forest or Bureau of Land Management. They are a large cross section of more than 200,000 hunters who bought licenses and brought out over 61,800 deer and 13,400 elk during the 1971 seasons.

Information obtained first hand from hunters at checking stations and from hunter report cards from every management unit in the state gives perspective on a day to day basis on how the hunts are going statewide. Data processing machines at Boise headquarters office of the department punch information taken from hunter report cards received daily, and a weekly printout summary shows the number of animals taken by species, by sex and by management unit. This report is cumulative, adding new data each week to the old, until it is, in fact, an annual statistical report of about 800 pages at the end of the hunting seasons.

These cooperative hunters, some 50,000 to 60,000 in all, give the kind of perspective and intimate detail required for good game management planning. It largely offsets the heated controversy that is sometimes developed and promoted by a handful of people. Historically, with only a few minor exceptions, Idaho deer hunting always has been "any deer" hunting, with no buck law or other sex restrictions. All seasons open Saturdays. A few management units open in mid-September in the Primitive Area, primarily for elk. Deer hunting there usually is incidental to elk hunting. The balance of mule deer hunting seasons start either the first Saturday in October or the 3rd Saturday in October. White-tailed deer hunting in the Idaho Panhandle region opens the first Saturday in November.

Levi L. Mohler, wildlife research coordinator, recently released some data on sex ratios in harvested deer. He reveals that the long-time season average (1942 through 1970) for 10,000 checked mule deer per year was 55 per cent males, with individual years varying from 51 percent to 60 percent males. More extensive information is available via deer report cards which have supplied informa-

tion from all hunting areas on the basis of the present system of management units from 1969 to the present. An average of about 20,000 mule deer kills per year have been reported for the dozen years, and males have outnumbered females in the harvest each year, varying from 57 to 61 percent males in different years.

Deer brought out to check stations showed a slightly larger population of males in the older deer than among the fawn. Deer of undetermined ages averaged 54 percent male in 7 seasons from 1942 to 1950.

Fawns in 19 seasons from 1949 and 1953 through 1970, inclusive, averaged 53 percent males in samples which included from 329 to 2,028 fawns in different years. Before 1953, fawns seldom were sexed at check stations, according to Mohler. Deer more than one year old, including yearlings averaged 55 percent males in 28 seasons.

Mule deer in Idaho reached their highest percentage of the reported kill on November 8th, according to 10-year daily averages prepared by Mohler. This data falls within the period of approximately three weeks which generally is considered to be the main breeding period of mule deer in Idaho.

All of the western states include some of the period from mid-October to about November 10 in their open season, and several states hunt earlier or later or both. Oregon and Utah mule deer hunting usually ends about the time that it is just getting under way in the other states, and New Mexico hunts mainly in mid-November. California, Idaho and Wyoming open their hunting earlier than most of the other mule deer states, while Idaho and Montana also use late fall for hunting in some units.

When a local area will be hunted depends mainly upon local conditions including varied topography. Dividing a state into management units enables each local area to get the hunting treatment it requires independent of other units with different conditions.

Since deer hunting can be done some where in Idaho from September into December, the choice of hunting time is likely to influence what the successful hunter will bag in any particular week. For example, chances of bagging a buck instead of an antlerless deer are considerably better in November than earlier or later. Ten-year daily averages, for nearly a quarter of a million deer reported by Idaho hunters, show that males make up a higher proportion of the harvest in the second week of November than at any other time.

Mohler concludes that a herd consisting largely of does, and producing fawns at ordinary rates, is likely to contain less than 25 percent antlered animals in the fall. In extreme cases does could comprise more than 80 percent of the adult herd. In that situation the frustrated hunters find "lots of deer, but not many bucks." The Utah findings show something of the extent of the illegal kill which bucks-only regulations bring about. It appears that either sex hunting

provides a more efficient use of deer. It also provides a preponderance of males in Idaho's annual harvest.

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

Sportsmen Spent \$256 million in '71
A growing army of wildlife protectionists and animal lovers, many of them with the best of intentions, have to take a back seat when it comes to the matter of "putting your money where your mouth is." American sportsmen, the guys and gals who tote the guns and carry the flinching rods, contributed some \$256 million last year when they purchased licenses, tags, permits and bought sporting equipment. Hunters spent \$108 million in license fees, while anglers totaled \$100 million in fees. Together they contributed another \$47.8 million in manufacturer's excise taxes. These monies are used by the state fish and game departments to manage all wildlife, not just the harvestable fish and game. The number of hunters increased by 3.8 percent last year to 16,977,588, which is faster than the population growth of 1.3 percent, an indication that hunting is growing in popularity across the nation.
