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

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

People who cannot take aspirin should make the problem known to their physician, who can prescribe other pain relieving drugs. Several varieties are available on prescrip-

Care should be taken in picking pain relievers from drug store or super market shelves, since nearly all such mixtures available without prescription use aspirin as a principal ingredient.

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




