Grace Emily Souders, 91, a longtime Kendrick, Southwick area resident, died at 1:30 p. m., Thursday, July 13, at Paradise Villa Nursing Home in Moscow where she had been a patient for a year and a half.

Mrs. Souders, a housewife, lived in the Southwick area from 1891 until 1947 when she moved to Kendrick. A native of Nebraska, she was born September 20, 1880 at Riverton, the daughter of Aaron and Elizabeth Wells.

She married Frank Souders at Wallace. He died July 15, 1947.

Survivors include four sons, Elmer and Marion J. Souders, Southwick; Burt Souders, Kendrick; and Frank Souders, Ocean Park, Wash.; a daughter, Mrs. Ida Greenwood, Juliaetta; a sister, Mrs. Susie Baker, Tompkins, Sask.; seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Two sons, George and Marvin, preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held Monday July 17, at Short's Chapel in Moscow. Rev. Clarence Shoop of Lewiston officiated.

## Dist. 283 Votes To Join Whitepine Teaching Program

School Trustees met Wednesday night, July 12th, and voted to join the Whitepine District Federal Multi-Purpose Basic Skills and Resource Teaching Program for 1972-73. Troy Deary, Plummer, and Bovill are also participants. Said program requires the services of a Special Education trained instructor and a qualified Psychologist. Mrs. Robert Heppner holds such a certificate and was employed by the Board as instructor. Mr. Herb Huestic will supervise the program and will provide Psychological services.

Total cost of the program will involve an expenditure of approximately \$12,248.00. Federal and State funds provide practically 100 percent of this amount and our budget for 1972-73 will not be taxed for these services according to estimates.

Trustee, Mrs. John Deobald, was selected by the Trustees as Project Representative of the local district board. Principal Robert Heppner will be in charge of curriculum.

Teacher resignations for Connie Benson, Marilyn Vandenberg, and Connie Gahl were reluctantly accepted by the Board. All of these teachers are following their husbands who have been working on Masters Degrees at the University of Idaho, and have accepted jobs in other localities.

Mary Taylor, University of Idaho graduate 1972, holds a B. S. degree in Business Education and will replace Mrs. Vandenberg. She hails from Mountain Home, where she did her practice teaching and worked in the District Superintendent's Office. She is married and comes highly recommended.

Linda Meshishnek, a graduate of Lewis Clark State College 1972, will replace Connie Gahl as Special Reading teacher at the Juliaetta Elementary School. She has special preparation in the fields of Reading and Psychology, is married, resides at Lewiston, and has one child. She is presently teaching kindergarten at Lewiston Public Schools.

A well-qualified Kindergarten Teacher has been selected by the Board, contingent upon Federal Regulations and will be covered in a separate story.

Shirley Heppner, who has been employed as the Basic Skills Instructor in the Resource Teaching Program, has her B. S. Degree from Lewis Clark State College as of 1971, and will complete her Masters Degree in Special Education at the University of Idaho this January. No other qualified teachers in this field are available in Idaho at this time that meet the Federal Project stipulations. We are fortunate to have such a well qualified person in this field. An Aide will be employed later to assist in this field.

The Superintendent reported that the School Maintenance work was progressing nicely at the Schools and that all would be in readiness for the start of school August 28th. He also told the Board that Aaron Wells was leaving by plane and would pick up the new school bus for the Gold Hill-Cedar Creek route at the factory, July 17th.

In other business the Trustees called for bids on approximately 12,000 gallon of regular gas (80 road octane or better) and 13,000 gallon of furnace oil (No. 2 or better). The next regular board meeting will be August 10th, and such agenda items as bus routes, special bus problems, discipline policies, and dress codes will be discussed. Parents who have questions about bus route problems should attend this meeting.

## Genesee To Increase Water Pressure In Certain Areas, Homeowners Be Careful!

Genesee—Because the City of Genesee must increase the water pressure in the line running from Beach Street to the new residences on Jackson Street, householders served by that system have been notified that some plumbing work to protect their household water systems and water using appliances may have to be performed.

Two of the requirements, Bernard Grieser, city supervisor, said are:—Installation of pressure regulating or pressure reducing valves on water lines leading to houses.

—Making sure that all hot water tanks are equipped with pressure relief valves.

"This is the property owner's responsibility," said Grieser. He said newer hot water tanks are equipped with pressure relief valves. Pressure regulating or reducing valves usually are located in the basement where the main line enters the house, according to Grieser. The valves normally are installed by licensed plumbers, but householders handy with tools can install the valves themselves he added.

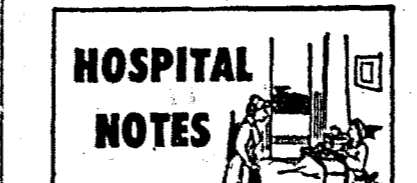

## David Wilken To Attend FFA State President's Conference In Washington

David Wilken, president of the Idaho FFA Association will travel to Washington, D. C. on July 24 to participate in the fifth annual State FFA Presidents' Conference. This year's conference is a special project of the National FFA Foundation, Inc. and is being sponsored by General Motors Corporation. As sponsors of the week-long conference stressing leadership and citizenship, General Motors will provide travel and conference expenses for State Presidents traveling to Washington.

David who was elected State FFA President in April is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Wilken of Kendrick. He will be one of more than 80 state officers participating in leadership workshops, tours of Washington, D. C. and visits to historic and memorial sites.

The purpose of the State President's conference program is to improve leadership skills, develop an understanding of the national heritage, and prepare state FFA officers for more effective leadership roles in their state FFA associations.

The conference also provides a forum for the exchange of ideas among officers from every state in the nation.

A highlight of the week's events will be a breakfast on Capitol Hill with Congressmen and Senators representing each of the state officers. Following the breakfast officers will meet in the offices of their respective congressional representatives for a brief visit. The same day officers are scheduled for a V. I. P. tour of the White House. The officers are also scheduled to spend half a day during the week at the U. S. Department of Agriculture where a "Meet the Press" type of discussion is planned with Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz.

In addition to special tours and

workshops, the officers will be discussing several items of major importance to the FFA members they represent. During the week officers will begin preparing for their role as delegates to the National FFA convention in October by discussing proposed constitutional adaptations and proposed modifications in FFA rituals and ceremonies. They will also discuss ways of improving the convention program, and will have an opportunity to suggest new directions the FFA may take in committee work. In other sessions during the week, officers will get a preview of the forthcoming FFA Update Workshops which are to be presented for officers, teachers, state supervisory personnel and teacher educators across the nation during August and September.

During the week officers will also visit the U. S. office of Education where they will meet with Government officials responsible for vocational education nationally. Other visits in and around Washington will include an afternoon at the National FFA Center near Mt. Vernon, where they will meet with staff members who oversee the daily operation of the National Organization, the FFA Supply Service and The National FUTURE FARMER Magazine. Visits are also planned to several historic and memorial sites in and around Washington including the Smithsonian Museum, Washington and Lincoln Memorials, the FBI and the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. The week's tours will conclude with a visit to Arlington National Cemetery where officers will place a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns and will hear an inspirational program presented by a military leader at the Two Jimas Memorial.

The week-long program will conclude with a banquet which will include entertainment and a keynote speaker.

In the world of lurking dreads, there is a phobia for almost everyone says the Idaho Medical Association. Most people are plagued by at least one—although many may not even know it. If you can't beat yours you can at least label it, since science has a name for many of them.

Common is Claustrophobia, the fear of being closed in a confined space or acrophobia, the fear of heights. Then there is the fear of snakes, ophidiophobia; of spiders, arachnophobia; of the cold, chelidophobia; of heat, thermophobia; of dirt, rypophobia; of darkness, achluophobia.

How about agoraphobia, the fear of open spaces; or pain, osynephobia; drinking, dipsophobia; electricity, electrophobia; blushing, erethophobia; marriage, gamophobia; writing, graphophobia; thought, ideophobia; crowds, ochlophobia; railway trains, siderodromophobia; eating, sitophobia, or of strangers, xenophobia.

If you haven't found your phobia, there is a package deal, phobias, the fear of developing phobias. One of the more common has to be ergasiophobia, an aversion to work, and one of the rarest must be chromatophobia—a morbid dread of money.

**Home Cookin' . .**

Everyone is extra busy these days, but most of us find time for a little relaxation and entertaining. So to get you started here's a menu for your next brunch: Start out with spiced tomato juice, followed by delicious Chicken Jambalaya with hot biscuits. For dessert set out a platter of fresh fruits in season or cinnamon nut coffee cake and coffee or iced tea or coffee.

**CHICKEN JAMBALAYA**  
(serves 8-10)  
6 chicken breasts halved and skinned salt and pepper to taste  
2 cups diced raw lean ham  
1 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
2 cups raw rice  
4 cups chicken bouillon or (2 cups bouillon and 2 cups white wine)  
2 cups drained canned tomatoes  
1 teaspoon basil, 1 bayleaf,  
1 teaspoon thyme  
1/2 cup chopped parsley  
Put onion, green pepper, bouillon and herbs in large casserole. Bring to boil on top of stove. Add rice, ham, tomatoes and chicken and stir. Cover and bake in 350 degree oven 25-30 minutes. Turn off oven, leaving casserole inside and let stand 10-15 minutes.

**Ginannum Walnut Coffee Cake**  
1/4 cup margarine  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 egg and 1 egg white  
2 cups flour  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 cup buttermilk  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 cup shelled walnuts  
2 tablespoons cinnamon  
Beat margarine with 1/2 cup sugar until light and fluffy, add egg yolk, continue beating. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour half of mixture into greased lightly-floured cake tin. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle half over batter. Sprinkle remaining sugar, cinnamon and nuts over batter. Bake 350d for 40 minutes.

Some people react so violently to aspirin that life may be threatened, notes the Idaho Medical Association. Others may react with bleeding from the lining of the stomach, some times enough to produce a chronic anemia. Others may have an "upset stomach" reaction.

People who cannot take aspirin should make the problem known to their physician, who can prescribe other pain relieving drugs. Several varieties are available on prescription.

Care should be taken in picking pain relievers from drug store or super market shelves, since nearly all such mixtures available without prescription use aspirin as a principal ingredient.

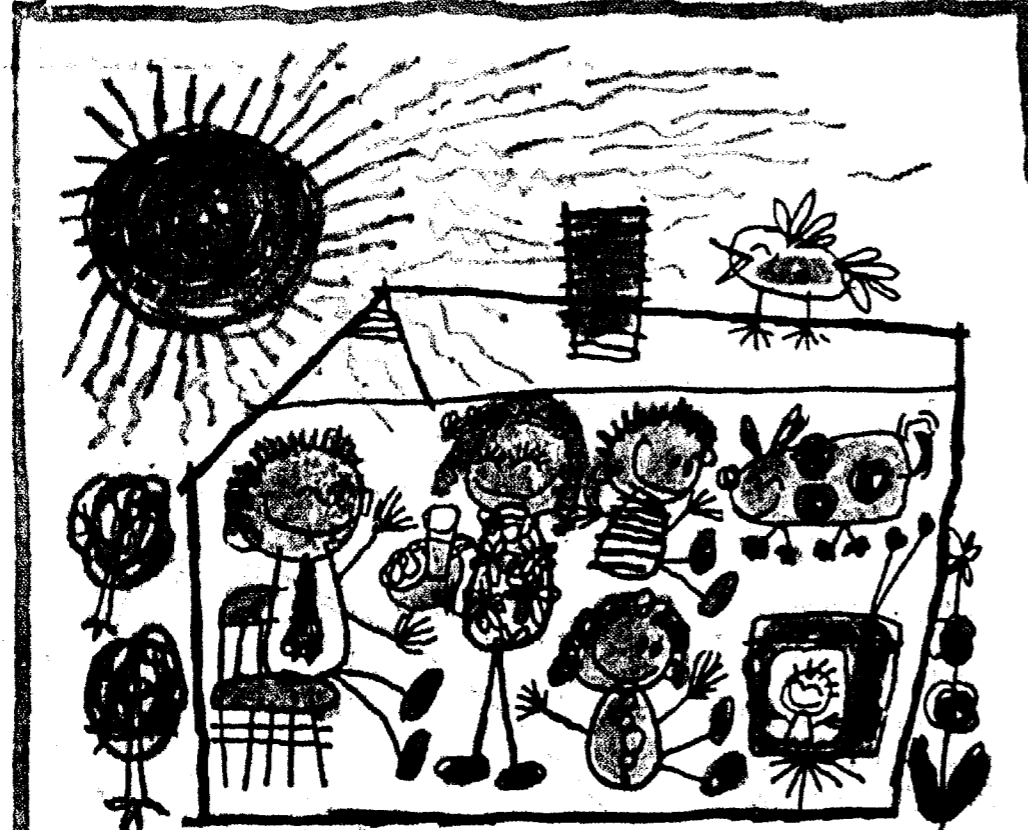

**IDAHO HEALTH MEMO**

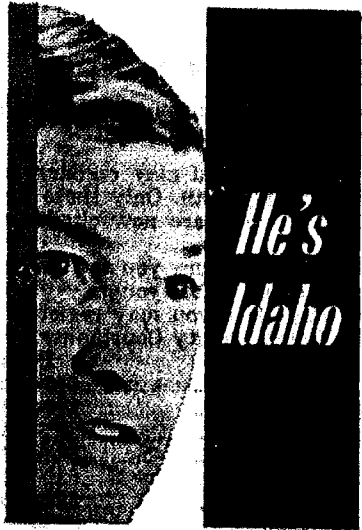

Common is Claustrophobia, the fear of being closed in a confined space or acrophobia, the fear of heights. Then there is the fear of snakes, ophidiophobia; of spiders, arachnophobia; of the cold, chemophobia; of heat, thermophobia; of dirt, rypophobia; of darkness, achluophobia.

How about agoraphobia, the fear of open spaces; or pain, osynophobia; drinking, dipsophobia; electricity, electrophobia; blushing, eruthophobia; marriage, gamophobia; writing, graphophobia; thought, ideaphobia; crowds, ochlophobia; railway trains, siderodromophobia; eating, sitophobia, or of strangers, xenophobia.

**Home Cookin' . .**

Everyone is extra busy these days, but most of us find time for a little relaxation and entertaining. So to get you started here's a menu for your next brunch: Start out with spiced tomato juice, followed by delicious Chicken Jambalaya with hot biscuits. For dessert set out a platter of fresh fruits in season or cinnamon nut coffee cake and coffee or iced tea or coffee.

**CHICKEN JAMBALAYA**  
(serves 8-10)  
6 chicken breasts halved and skinned salt and pepper to taste  
2 cups diced raw lean ham  
1 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
2 cups raw rice  
4 cups chicken bouillon or (2 cups bouillon and 2 cups white wine)  
2 cups drained canned tomatoes  
1 teaspoon basil, 1 bayleaf,  
1 teaspoon thyme  
1/2 cup chopped parsley  
Put onion, green pepper, bouillon and herbs in large casserole. Bring to boil on top of stove. Add rice, ham, tomatoes and chicken and stir. Cover and bake in 350 degree oven 25-30 minutes. Turn off oven, leaving casserole inside and let stand 10-15 minutes.

**Cinnamon Walnut Coffee Cake**  
1/2 cup margarine  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 egg and 1 egg white  
2 cups flour  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 cup buttermilk  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 cup shelled walnuts  
2 tablespoons cinnamon  
Beat margarine with 1/2 cup sugar until light and fluffy, add egg yolk, continue beating. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour half of mixture into greased lightly floured cake tin. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle half over batter. Sprinkle remaining sugar, cinnamon and nuts over batter. Bake 350d for 40 minutes.

Some people react so violently to aspirin that life may be threatened, notes the Idaho Medical Association. Others may react with bleeding from the lining of the stomach, some times enough to produce a chronic anemia. Others may have an "upset stomach" reaction.

People who cannot take aspirin should make the problem known to their physician, who can prescribe other pain relieving drugs. Several varieties are available on prescription.

Care should be taken in picking pain relievers from drug store or super market shelves, since nearly all such mixtures available without prescription use aspirin as a principal ingredient.

**HAIR SPRAY DAMAGE**  
There is little evidence that the long-term use of hairspray or other cosmetic aerosol products might damage the lungs, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Such a possibility was suggested a few years ago, and the Federal Food and Drug Administration and several industrial laboratories undertook extensive tests to find if the theories were true.  
Hairdressers, who in their work are exposed to much more hairspray than normal users, were the subjects of some of the tests.  
None of the tests showed any relationship between the use of cosmetic aerosols and lung disease. Nevertheless, they should be used carefully. Spraying these products into the eyes can cause painful irritation. It is also a good idea to use hairspray in a large, well-ventilated room, not because it is dangerous but because a large whiff can be quite unpleasant.

**TEMPORARY HAIR LOSS**

There are various causes of temporary hair loss, according to the Idaho Medical Association, including severe illness accompanied by high fever.

Other factors which can contribute to temporary hair loss include severe weight loss, certain medications, general anesthesia, x-ray therapy of the head, and childbirth.

Human hairs grow in cycles. A long period of growth is followed by a short resting phase, when the hair stops growing and is shed. A new cycle commences in a few months and the lost hair is replaced.

Some illnesses may cause the hair to become dry and brittle, and to break off close to the scalp. The same thing may occur from excessive bleaching and improper permanent waving. This situation is usually temporary and does not affect hair growth. New hair will grow out to replace the damaged hair that has broken off. Since hair only grows about one inch every two and a half months, it may take several months for the new growth to become evident.

There is no specific therapy for hair loss following illness. Vigorous manipulation should be avoided, as this would lead to further damage and loss. The hair should not be stretched pulled on tight rollers, or worn in styles that pull it. Balanced nutrition with an adequate protein intake, is essential for good hair growth.
