## Kendrick School District To Receive State Audit

Management compliance audits will be made on the Kendrick, Idaho Falls and Caldwell school districts, legislative auditor James A. Defenbach said last week in Boise.

The legislature's budget-fiscal committee decided a month ago to audit three school districts — one large, one small and one medium-sized, on a trial basis. Kendrick was selected as the small school.

Defenbach met with school officials Thursday of last week to make preliminary arrangements for the audit which is expected to begin October 1. The audit is expected to take about one month and the findings will be reported to the legislature when it convenes in January.

Among the items to come under the auditor's review will be whether the school district is over or under funded; over or under staffed; a review of district policy books and student policy books will be made; high school credit reports will be studied for the past three years; organizational charts studied teacher's credentials reviewed; federal funded programs studied; bank statements audited; teacher evaluation reports checked and board meeting minutes reviewed.

Supt. Don Blakeley told the Gazette Tuesday that he "feels this is an honor", adding "we don't have anything to hide — we're doing everything we can for these kids."

## Kendrick United Methodist Church Plans Dedication

Special dedication services are planned for the Kendrick United Methodist Church for Sunday, Sept. 10. The services will be in honor of the addition of a new dorsal curtain, altar paraments and pulpit antependia. The sermon topic for the day will deal with the meaning of the symbolism involved in the liturgical vestments.

The church recently purchased special cloths, and the ladies of the congregation have been busily assembling the pieces. There will be four sets when completed, each matching the four colors used in the traditional Christian calendar. The symbolism was designed by Rev. Ozler using a traditional motif for the altar paraments and a contemporary motif for the pulpit antependia. The basic dorsal curtain which hangs behind the altar is constructed of white material, and will be covered with a scrim of colored fabric to match the seasonal colors.

Use of the vestment provides a colorful and aesthetic setting for worship services.

Rev. Ozler pointed out that this represents just another step in the long range program to renovate both the parsonage and the sanctuary facilities. A few months ago the church received a \$1,500 grant from the Pacific Northwest Conference to assist the local church in providing an innovative program of worship and renovation of facilities. The local grant was awarded on the basis of proposed programs and potential of the church in the area.

With the grant, and considerable investment by the congregation, the following improvements have already been accomplished during the past year: insulated siding installed on the parsonage, remodeling of the parsonage kitchen, installation of electric heating and new carpeting in the parsonage; purchase of stove, washer and dryer for the parsonage; redecorating of the living and dining rooms in the parsonage and remodeling of the bathroom.

Additions to the sanctuary have included not only the paraments, but also new carpeting, a new electric mimeograph and ministerial stoles.

Future plans call for repainting the interior of the sanctuary, extensive remodeling of the church basement, painting of the parsonage exterior and carpeting of the church study.

## Roy Ramey, Retired Northern Pacific Station Agent, Observes 85th Birthday

With 54 years of service as station agent for the Northern Pacific Railroad Co., Roy Ramey quietly observed his 85th birthday anniversary at his home in Kendrick on Tuesday, Sept. 5, where he has lived for almost half a century.



Born at Wood, Virginia, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Walter Ramey, he came west to Spokane in 1905 via train with his uncle and family of Ohio, arriving in time to take in the Inter-State Fair. Having a favorable opinion of the western countryside, Ramey chose to remain in the area. His desire to become a railroad agent necessitated extra finances for his schooling. In a short time, he was able to find employment on farms near Wilbur, Wash., until 1907 when he returned to Spokane to enroll in telegraph school.

"After six months of pounding out dots and dashes (the Morse code)", he said, "I was hired as relief operator in various towns throughout Washington and Montana before being promoted to full time agent at Creston, Wn., in 1912. He held this position at Creston for eleven years and was then transferred to Kendrick.

During his stay in Creston, the fruit seasons were busy ones, he recalled, remembering the loading of 1,000 boxes of peaches a day into the baggage car destined for Spokane and points in Montana.

At that time and for several years after, all train orders, Western Union messages and company business was handled by telegraph — now it is all done by telephone.

Ramey related that not only was the telegraph used for these purposes but we used to have checker games by telegraph. "As the saying goes, 'where there's a will, there's a way, and we lived up to it,'" he said. "We had our practice sessions, (referring to some of the other agents down the line) and from then on it was down to earth playing," Ramey chuckled.

"In another instance, I had to use the telegraph table for a bed," he continued. "It was quite a change from sleeping on mattress and springs. I spent two days and two nights at the station when Kendrick was deluged with about three feet of water in places around town. The flood washed out tracks and stalled trains for several days before repairs could be completed."

"This was around 1931 or 1932," he said, "and I was unable to get home, which was only a short distance away — when I did make it, there was no friendly persuasion needed for me to sit down and eat a good square meal or sleep on a good bed again."

Being a baseball and tennis enthusiast, Roy organized a tennis club a few months after he came to Kendrick in 1923, which provided many hours a week of recreation to those interested. It took the good cooperation and hard work of the club members to level the ground for a court which was donated, rent-free, by the Farmers Bank, and the Thos. McDowell Store. The lot was located between the two buildings on Main St. and in short time enough fill material was hauled in for the project. A large handroller was used to pack the sand and clay for a smooth court floor and which also helped the muscle structure of those who were not so used to such work. The court was in use until about 1930.

For the baseball fans he organized a team called the "Ramey Sluggers" consisting of junior high school boys. He has always taken an active part in the civic affairs of his town and at Kendrick he has served as city councilman for eight years and mayor for two years.

He was Republican precinct committee man for over 25 years. "Ramey has been well known throughout the community for his singing talent and keen interest in music and home talent plays; having sung at weddings, including his own grandchildren's weddings, in choirs, for funerals and many other special occasions or entertainments. He organized a male quartet known as the "Odd Fellows Quartet" which consisted of Norris Walker, Lester Hill, Thomas McDowell and himself.

Being the genial man that he is, was often a prominent figure in the local home talent plays. His other hobbies were fishing and hunting. He still operates his own car and is a daily visitor downtown when he drives down to pick up his mail and enjoy a visit with friends over a cup of coffee in the local cafe. He travels up the Cameron Grade to have an occasional dinner with his daughters and sons-in-laws during the summer months at their farm home.

Roy married Mae Crosby of Thompson Falls, Montana on June 27, 1912. She passed away in 1966.

Roy, the oldest of three children, has two daughters, Mrs. Walter (Rovena) Koepf and Mrs. Ernest (Jean) Brammer, both of Kendrick, and one son, Roy, Jr., of Rosalia, Wn., six grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

He has belonged to the Odd Fellows Lodge since 1913. He is also a member of the Kendrick Methodist Church, the Kendrick Grange, the Campers Club and has a life membership in Railway Telegraphers.

Roy retired from the railroad station in June of 1961, after 54 years of service to his credit.

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
