The Kendrick FFA chapter entered 8 steers, 5 lambs and 2 breeding ewes at the Latah County Fair last week and came home with 4 Grand Champions, 3 Reserve Grand Champions and a total of 30 ribbons, all but one being blue.

Steve Hoogland had the Grand Champion quality steer; Steve Eichner was third and Ron Silflow fourth. Nick Armitage showed the Grand Champion quality lamb, followed by Miles Souders, Bill Thomas, Duane Grant and James Souders.

In Fitting and Showing, Ron Silflow had the Grand Champion, Mike Czmowski had the Reserve Champion, Steve Eichner was third, Mark Mustoe fourth; and Jeff Czmowski, fifth.

James Souders showed the Grand Champion lamb, Bill Thomas showed the Reserve Champion and Miles Souders was third.

Ron Silflow was also overall FFA Showman at the fair this year. Nick Armitage and Steve Eichner both received blue ribbons on their breeding ewes.

**Judging Teams Wins**  
Saturday the livestock team judged and out of about six teams, Kendrick won with a score of 1,610. Colton was second with 1,450. Steve Eichner was 1st high individual with a 575 total; Steve Hoogland was 2nd with 557; Wayne Jensen of Genesee was 3rd with 502 followed by Ron Silflow with a total of 486.

**Tigers Roll Over Deary 38-6**

Paced by the running and passing of quarterback Eddie Osborn and Ron Silflow, the Kendrick Tigers rolled to their third win of the young season without a loss as they defeated the Deary Mustangs 38-6 on the Deary field Saturday night.

Jim Souders put the Tigers on the score board in the first quarter with a six-yard run and then banged over for the two-point conversion. Osborn later hit Silflow on a 20-yard scoring pass and connected again in the game for another 20-yard touchdown play. Kendrick was ahead 16-0 at the half.

Osborn ran a three-yarder over himself and Souders wrapped it up with a six-yard touchdown in the fourth period.

The Kendrick offense racked up 356 yards in total offense and never had to punt while the Tiger defense held Deary to under 100 yards of offense and three non-penalty first downs.

Osborn rushed for 129 yards and passed for 100 more yards on six completions of 15 attempts. Silflow caught five of the six passes for 98 yards and two touchdowns.

Kendrick fans will have a chance to see the Tigers in action on their own field Friday night as they meet the Highland Huskies.

**Reserve License Plate Numbers Now**

Automobile owners in Latah County who like the license plate number they now have and would like to reserve that number when new license plates are issued in 1974 will have an opportunity to do so, according to assessor Eugene Taylor.

Taylor said that as of September 15, 1972 and through October 31, 1972, motorists are able to reserve their existing license plate number for a \$1.00 service fee.

Starting in November, motorists will be able to reserve any unreserved number on a first-come, first-served basis for the same \$1.00 fee. However, Taylor noted that all reserved numbers must end in the same digit as the existing license plate on any given vehicle.

The Assessor also emphasized that persons who want to reserve a license plate number must bring their 1973 auto registration with them. No license plate numbers over 1L 12,600 can be reserved. The Assessor's office will stop taking reserve orders at the end of November.

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**Home Cookin' . .**

We've printed several recipes using zucchini squash and I'm sure our readers have tried and enjoyed them all. This week, a reader told me she had a recipe for zucchini pickles that "tasted just like watermelon pickles." With the huge supply of zucchini this year we are always happy to hear and print another way to serve them. This must be a pretty good, and tried and true recipe for I know the recipe has been passed around by friends and neighbors a great many times.

**ZUCCHINI PICKLES**  
 7 lbs. Zucchini squash (peeled and seeded)  
 Use large squares  
 2 cups slack lime  
 Dissolve lime in 2 gallon water.  
 Soak 24 hours.  
 Take out of water and wash thoroughly in cool water until completely clean.  
 9 cups sugar  
 2 quarts vinegar  
 2 cups water  
 In a cloth bag put the following spices  
 2 tsp. celery seed  
 2 tbls. cinnamon sticks  
 1 1/2 tsp. whole cloves  
 Bring all ingredients to boil, pour over pickles and let stand 24 hours. The next day bring all to a boil and simmer 2 or 3 hours or until clear. Green coloring optional.  
 Two subscribers and faithful readers of our column have contributed recipes for this week. We hope you try them, and we certainly appreciate having them sent in.  
 Mrs. Roy R. Patchen from Oakland, California sends in a "California Quickie." It really sounds delicious, and the nice part of it, is that it has several variations.

**CALIFORNIA QUICKIE**  
 One pound summer, zucchini, yellow (or mixed) squash, or chopped swiss chard, or mixed squash and greens.  
 1/2 onion, thinly sliced  
 4 eggs  
 2 cups cheese, Swiss desired, any will do  
 Salt and pepper to taste.  
 1/2 teaspoon oregano or basil (or both)  
 Steam squash and onion. Do not oversteam. Meanwhile beat the eggs and add the grated cheese. Mash squash (don't puree as chunks are good) and add to eggs and seasonings. If using chard, chop it finely—steam a little first. Pour into greased baking dish and bake covered in 325 degree oven until set, about 30-40 minutes. Variation: For one-meal dish meal, add crab, shrimp, or cut up chicken.  
 Our Ham Loaf recipe comes from the files of Mrs. Margaret Jensen of Spokane. Mrs. Jensen writes: "I surely enjoy the paper. I pass it around to my four sisters. We really enjoy it. **HAM LOAF**  
 1 lb. ground ham  
 1 lb. ground pork or veal  
 1 1/2 cup fine cracker crumbs  
 1 egg beaten  
 1 cup milk  
 Dash pepper  
 Make a loaf. Bake partially. Drain grease. Then cover with the following sauce:  
 Boil together: 1 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1/2 tsp. mustard  
 Note: I put pineapple rings on bottom and sides. Cherries in center. (very pretty).

**IDAHO'S 14-YEAR OLD DRIVER**  
 The Oregon State Police are concerned over the Idaho 14-year-old driver and the legal implications of their presence on Oregon's roads. Idaho State Police Superintendent, L. Clark Hand notes that "Idaho recognizes the agricultural needs for younger drivers and permits properly licensed 14-year-olds to operate motor vehicles on its highways. Parents allowing 14-year-olds to drive in Oregon are subject to arrest. Oregon law does not permit anyone under age 16 without a learners permit to drive. Idaho licensed 15-year-olds are permitted to operate motor vehicles in Oregon if accompanied in the front seat by a licensed driver over 18 years of age. Hand said, "a cooperative effort is being undertaken between the 2 states in an effort to reduce the high number of driving age violations incurred by Idaho youths in Oregon due to the lack of knowledge about the Oregon drivers age limitations law."

**The Search For The World's Most Intriguing Mystery**  
 A newly established non-profit corporation called North American Wild Life Research, using over 14 years of accumulated data and new computer correlation studies, is setting in motion one of the most intensive investigations ever undertaken on the BIGFOOT/SASQUATCH subject.  
 For over one hundred fifty years, stories have been told by mountain men, Indians, early settlers and now by modern man, of giant, hair-covered, human-like creatures that were seen in the remote mountainous areas of the Pacific Northwest and Canada. R. policy is to capture alive and unharmed, and to hold it for the shortest time necessary for expert medical and scientific teams to properly and conclusively identify and place this creature in the animal classification system and to study its life functions. The creature will then be released back into its original environment with an attached transmitting device so that it can be tracked throughout its travels in order to study its life habits contact with other animals, and its geographical domain. These studies will help determine the number and dispersion

of these creatures. Olson believes it is important that this creature be captured in the near future before this very likely diminishing breed becomes extinct.

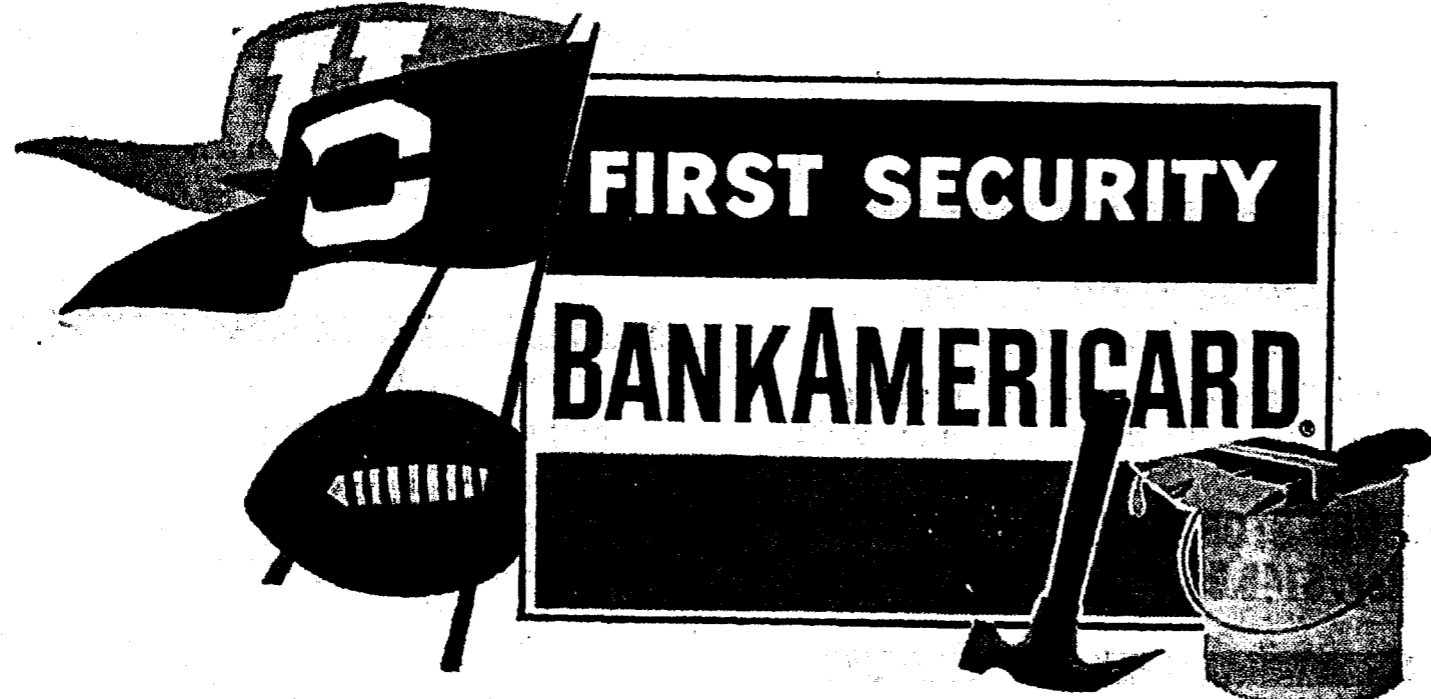

## LETTERS FROM READERS

Because of the support and encouragement I've received recently from numerous citizens throughout the county, I've decided to run as a write-in candidate for the office of Sheriff.

In view of the accusation publicly made by appointed Sheriff Pierson, I wish to relate the following facts: When I first told Pierson I intended to run for Sheriff he suggested I hold off as he only intended to stay in office for two years and would probably step down and retire. I told him my purpose was only to inform him I was running and not to make a deal.

Pierson told me on four occasions afterward he expected my resignation if we were to part as friends. I have good reason to believe that he told each of our present commissioners he intended to fire me if I went through with my plan to run. I respectfully submitted my resignation prior to filing for candidacy.

In spite of what Edwin Pierson would like to have the public believe, there has not been a cooperative effort or concern for outer area law enforcement, especially in Federal spending.

The Lions Share of Federal funds that were intended to improve law-enforcement needs (where it is needed most) is being absorbed as 22 percent of the cost of the new law-enforcement center. It appears at this point that it will only be occupied by the Sheriff's Department.

I fail to see how this project will supplement the needs for associated law enforcement, because the operational cost could become more detrimental than beneficial.

I would be glad to debate any part of the fore mentioned items with Edwin Pierson.

If elected I'll do my up-most to impartially supply and serve the lawful needs of all the people in this county, and work toward having better law enforcement in the future years. I know running as a "write-in" candidate takes a little more time for the voter, but it may be worth their while knowing I don't make deals and intend to serve a full four-year term.

The deal Pierson made with his Chief Deputy Elton Walker to run on both party tickets during the primary with the agreement that the loser would be named Chief Deputy doesn't reflect the kind of ethics needed in law enforcement.
