

Automobile owners in Latah County who like the license plate number they now have and would like to reserve that number when new license plates are issued in 1974 will have

an opportunity to do so, according to assessor Eugene Taylor. Taylor said that as of September 15, 1972 and through October 31, 1972, motorists are able to reserve their existing license plate number

for a \$1.00 service fee. Starting in November, motorists will be able to reserve any unreserved number on a first-come, firstserved basis for the same \$1.00 fee. However, Taylor noted that all reserved numbers must end in the same digit as the existing license plate on any given vehicle.


