

Open House Sunday, October 1 Will Honor Gus Krugers On Golden Wedding Anniv.



"We didn't send many letters back in the depression years, because stamps were hard to come by. One year I sold wheat for 27c a bushel, and dry beans for \$1.10 a hundred pound bag. A five-gallon can of cream went for \$1.80, and eggs for 10c a dozen." Mr. and Mrs. Gus Kruger, 510 Airway, Lewiston, recall some of the hard times they had during their 50 years of wedded life. "Of course, there were good times too, like the many big family gatherings, the winter card parties, and we had each other and our family."

Residents of Lewiston for the past eight years, they will celebrate their golden anniversary at an open house from 2 to 5 Sunday afternoon, at Grace Lutheran Church, 3434 6th St., Lewiston. They request "no gifts." Their children are hosting the occasion.

Gustav Kruger, youngest of nine children of Albert and Bertha Kruger, was born January 5, 1897, at Imanhoff, Pommern, in Germany. In December 1913, at the age of fourteen, he sailed for America with two sisters, Bertha and Martha. Arriving at Cameron, they made their home with Otto and Carl, two brothers who had immigrated earlier. Gus finished his schooling, and then joined his brother in farming operations. On October 4, 1922, he married

Martha Sillow at the Cameron Lutheran Church. She was born May 23, 1898, one of seven living children of Ferdinand and Ida Sillow, at Cameron. Prior to their marriage she had been employed at the DeWinter & Gouvard Dept. Store at Leland. "At that time," she stated, "Leland was a prosperous town, with several stores, Churches, an Odd Fellows (I. O. O. F.) Hall, and a school. Farmers came from miles around and did all their trading there."

"I bought my first car, an Overland, shortly before we were married, so I could transport my bride around in style," he commented. "This was before the depression hit."

They farmed in the Cameron area for 23 years, with an interlude in 1926 and 1927, when they owned and operated the local store and also had charge of the Post Office.

Their first farm was near the breaks of Potlatch canyon, overlooking Kendrick from the east. Along the road in front of their house, farmers with horses and wagons hauled their loads of sacked grain and beans to the tramway. Here the sacks were loaded on the cable carriers, and "shot" a mile down the canyon to the warehouse below. This road is still known to old-timers as the "Shoot-road."

Mrs. Kruger said, "Our second farm, two miles north of Cameron, had rattlesnakes. I was afraid to go to the garden. Our daughter was two, so I couldn't leave her at the house alone, and I didn't dare take her with me."

In 1928 they bought a farm at the top of Wancher Gulch grade, which they operated until 1934, when he retired because of ill health. They made their home in Kendrick for 10 years, before moving to Lewiston Orchards.

Kruger relates one frightening experience when he had a "runaway" with a four-horse team pulling a disc. "Something spooked one of the horses, he shied, and suddenly they were all running wild-eyed, and out of control. I knew I couldn't stay on for long, and if I was bounced off front-wards, I would be cut to ribbons by the disc blades. I let go the reins, and hurtled myself over the back end as hard as I could, barely missing the machine."

"During harvest I worked on the stationary thresher as a sack-sewer, going from farm to farm. It took eight teams and wagons to keep her running. The entire crew made up 28 men, quite a table-full for the housewife to feed three times a day, with a mid-morning and afternoon lunch besides."

He stated that during the depression he put his car in the shed and left it there for a whole year, during which time they did their "going" with team and buggy, or bobbed. "Since they lived right beside the main road, they often had hobos stop and ask for a handout. They never turned them away. Mrs. Kruger will never forget the time she was serving two at the table, when a third came to the door. She said it was beginning to look like a boarding-house. "We always had enough to share though, even if it was just simple food."

"Gradually prices picked up, and times got better. I bought my first tractor in 1935," he added. "Electricity came through in 1938."

The Krugers have always been active in the Lutheran Church, for years singing in the choir; he serving on the Church Council, and she working with the Ladies Aid, and the Missionary Society. During one period she played the organ for church services.

The Krugers have a lovely home, and still raise a big garden. She does a lot of canning, bakes bread, and does fancy work. They enjoy trips to the mountains to fish and pick berries when his health permits, and they occasionally drive to Southwick to have dinner with their oldest daughter, and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. John (Rosalie) Blankenship, at their farm home.

They don't get lonely, since their other two daughters live in Lewiston, and drop by nearly every day. They are Mrs. Ted (Rilo) Freeman, 1311 N. Street and Mrs. Dorothy Sinclair, 631 Airway. They have 11 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

Customers now served by either the Southwick star or rural routes will have change of address to Kendrick 83537.

James Reece, present Southwick rural carrier, will serve Kendrick Route No. 1—the Leland, Cavendish and American Ridge areas. Frank Eveland, rural carrier now on Kendrick Route, will carry route No. 2—Bear Ridge, Cameron, Cedar Creek and Gold Hill.

All efforts were made to arrange order of delivery so as to inconvenience the fewest number of customers as possible, such as later time of delivery, than at present. In some instances, delivery time will be somewhat earlier, Postmaster Magnuson said.

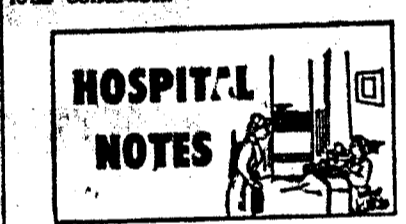

New Garbage Pickup Plan For Genesee

Genesee officially enters the Latah County solid waste disposal system Monday, October 2, when Johnson Trucking Company of Moscow begins collecting garbage within the city limits and transporting to the Latah County Landfill. The new system will replace the dump ground in Genesee which will be closed to all use.

A full copy of the Ordinance covering the solid waste disposal system is printed in this issue of the News. Among the more important topics in the ordinance is that this system is compulsory for every home or business in the city... all must participate. A flat charge of \$2.90 per month, billed with your water bill, is made although in the case of persons living alone the council can grant variances and reduce the cost. Contact any council member or the city clerk about this.

Garbage must be in approved, leak-proof metal or plastic cans or plastic bags not weighing more than 60 lbs. each. As many cans or bags as necessary may be used.

Enclosed burning may be allowed but the burning must be done in metal containers covered with wire screen not more than one inch mesh. Open burning can be done only if a permit is obtained from Fire Chief Chet Green.

The city realizes there will be many problems to be worked out in this initial adjustment period and requests the patience and cooperation of the citizens. The council, clerk and city employees will all be trying their best to work for the good of the community.

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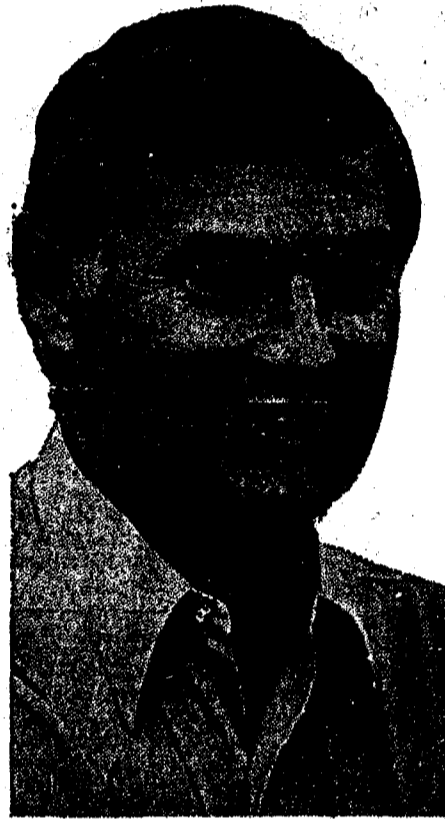

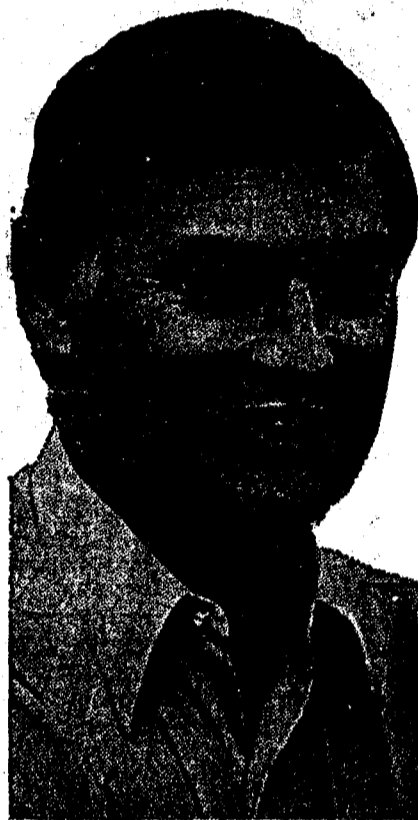

1973 Fish Regulations To Be Told October 16

Fishing seasons and regulations for the calendar year 1973 will be established at the next quarterly meeting of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission beginning in Boise Monday, October 16, department Director Joseph C. Greeley reminded interested sportsmen today.

The Commission also will hold public hearing between the hours of 1:30-5:00 p. m. the afternoon of October 16 to hear testimony and consider evidence with respect to the new fishing seasons, bag limits and other relevant matters. Regional personnel meetings are

scheduled in the next two weeks and special evening public forums will be held at Boise September 28; Lewiston, September 28; Twin Falls, October 3 and Idaho Falls, October 4.

The new fishing licenses will not be effective until January 1, 1973. This year's regulations will remain in effect through December 31, 1972. General statewide trout season ends most places November 30, but many waters in all regions are available for year-round fishing for some or all fish species.

1 Deer-Elk Season In All of Unit 17

Hunters planning to get their elk and deer in the Upper Selway region (Unit 17) are asked by the Idaho Fish and Game Department to disregard the brown shading on the lower two-thirds of the unit as it appears on the big game map printed on the back cover of the 1972 pamphlet of hunting seasons and regulations.

This is an error. There should be no shaded area in Unit 17 this year because season dates are the same for both elk and deer—September 16—November 28 and uniform in all parts of Unit 17.

The brown shading, which last year indicated a closing date different from the unshaded portion, erroneously carried over to the 1972 game map, where it signifies nothing. Just ignore the shaded area in Unit 17 even though it won't go away.

Be Careful In Preparing Poultry

Be careful in selecting, storing and cooking poultry, warns Mrs. Joanne Anderson, extension Home Economist University of Idaho.

Poultry loses quality when not frozen, Mrs. Anderson explains. Even when frozen, it keeps best at zero degrees Fahrenheit.

Take poultry only from refrigerator or freezer cases. If you buy poultry already frozen, make sure it is still frozen when you select it.

Check the package to avoid torn or incomplete wrappers. Torn wrapping allows rapid loss of poultry quality and increase the chance of bacteria contamination, Mrs. Anderson points out.

Once you have bought the poultry, freeze it immediately or use it within 24 hours. This keeps quality loss and bacteria contamination at a minimum. It's usually a good idea to repack the meat before freezing it, suggests Mrs. Anderson. Store wrapping is not always moisture, vapor proof which it should be to keep poultry best.

Be especially careful to cook the bird all at one time, Mrs. Anderson warns. Don't cook it partially one day and finish cooking it the next. That gives bacteria more time to contaminate the meat.

Once poultry has been cooked and served, refreeze the unused portion. Leftovers which will be eaten within a day or two can safely be left in the refrigerator.

A good rule to remember, Mrs. Anderson concludes, is never leave raw or cooked poultry out of the refrigerator or freezer any longer than necessary. A maximum is two to four
