



Federal Funds will probably be lost from budget estimated receipts, due to President Nixon's second veto of the Labor and Health Education and Welfare Appropriations bill. This will mean an estimated loss to Dist. 283 of approximately \$8,662.00 for the current year, and makes for a tough financial situation for 1972-73. Indications are that we will have to tighten our belts on maintenance, programs, teacher budgets. Twenty-four persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week, Hartstein's report continued. He said this was below the number of new claims filed during the preceding week, but that it brought the total up from last week's 164 to the current 178. A year ago there were 185 persons throughout the county seeking jobless pay. In the Moscow area, the current total is now 120, a week ago 113 and a year ago 112. At Genesee the totals are 9, 11, and 8. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area there are now 23 persons seeking benefits, up from last week's 17 due to some curtailments in the logging industry; but still below last year's figure of 33. At Kendrick, the totals are 4, 4, and 3. 22 checks are going into the Potlatch area, three more than a week ago, but down from last year's 29. Hartstein predicted that the number of persons seeking jobless pay will continue to slowly increase during the next few weeks. He said no large increase should be noted unless weather conditions force the curtailment

Among those persons still seeking work, he reported, are a number of University students seeking part time work, and temporary and short time jobs in the area.

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

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
