Kendrick's Tiger basketball team had two more defeats registered against them in weekend cage play, bringing their record to 1-3 on the young season. Friday night the Tigers were edged out in a close contest 55-52 by the Highland Huskies. Saturday night the Kendrick quintet went to Pierce to play Timberline high and were topped 77-54.

Kendrick made it a close game all the way Friday night against Highland, but were never able to get out in front as they were defeated by the Huskies 53-52 on the KHS court. It was a close first half with Highland just managing to hold onto a two-point lead at the half 27-25. The Huskies came out a little stronger in the third quarter and opened a better point spread before Kendrick rallied and closed the gap back up to one-two and three points.

Marty Clemmenhagen popped the nets for 16 points in the losing effort for Kendrick with Eddie Osborn adding 10 more.

Timberline Wins Tied with last year's State Champs at the end of the first quarter, the Tigers saw their hopes of a major upset go up in smoke in the second period as they went down to a 77-54 defeat at the hands of the Timberline Spartans Saturday night.

Kendrick held the Spartans to an even game in the first period which ended 14-14. The Timberline team exploded for 26 points in the second period while Kendrick managed just 8. The hosts continued their attack in the third period and pumped in 23 more points and were leading 63-32 going into the final quarter. Kendrick came back with a 22-point final quarter but it wasn't enough.

Tim Felton collected 16 points for Kendrick with Dennis Lukacet getting 9 more.

Sub-Zero Weather Still Holds Area In Frigid Grasp

All of the Pacific Northwest was still held in the icy grasp of a frigid air mass this week as temperatures dropped to unofficial lows of minus 20 in the Southwick and Genesee areas and even slipped down to almost 10 below in the Kendrick and Julietta area.

This was the second week that the record-breaking cold spell had hung over the area. Temperatures last week had started down and were below zero in the upper elevations by mid-week, but it was Friday and Saturday that the mercury really plunged downward. Saturday evening Genesee registered from 10 to 15 below, depending on what part of town you were in and whose thermometer was being read. The temperature was much warmer in Julietta and Kendrick, a mere 8 below. Despite some periods of sunshine, the weather never warmed to much above zero Saturday and Sunday as service station operators, mechanics, plumbers and fuel oil dealers were kept busy getting cars started, water pipes unfrozen and oil tanks filled.

Despite the cold weather road conditions were fair to good with no snow in the valley and only a few inches from a previous storm in the higher elevations. The severe cold and lack of ground cover is causing some concern among farmers for their fall planted wheat.

The temperatures warmed Monday of this week, rising to almost 20 above in the afternoon. The warmer temperatures also brought snow again which began falling late Monday night and continued until midnight Tuesday. Genesee received less than two inches of light powdery snow and Kendrick and Julietta now has a slight skiff of white covering on the ground.

By mid-day Tuesday the mercury in Kendrick was just over the 20 above mark, the highest it had been in over five days.

Area weather forecasters are predicting the cold wave to remain over the area for at least the remainder of this week.

**General Trout Fishing—May 26**  
 General trout season is May 26 to November 30, as it has been the past several years and daily bag and possession limit is ten trout or seven pounds and one fish. Kokanee bag limit is still 25 fish per day except local regulations such as the one on the South Fork of the Boise River and its tributaries upstream from Anderson Ranch Reservoir and Fall Creek and Lime Creek where it is 10 fish per day.  
 A statewide limit was imposed on bass (largemouth and smallmouth). The daily bag and possession limit of these species is 25 fish, no more than three of which may exceed 17 inches in total length.  
 Pete Fabela, Eden, got a surprise when a 40-pound Canadian lynx jumped out and hissed at him when he was pheasant hunting east of Jerome this season. He shot the cat with a load of 5's at about 15 yards. The Canadian lynx brings about \$22.00 per pelt and is quite rare in Idaho with an estimated 25 taken by trappers each

**CHRISTMAS STAIN REMOVAL HINTS**  
 At Christmas dinner, the tablecloth sometimes seems doomed. Generally, the fresher the stain at time of treatment the greater the success, says Joanne Anderson, Extension Home Economist, U. of I. There are some suggested methods for treating the most common holiday-type stains:  
 Fruit stains including cranberries: Soak the area in warm water and enzyme pre-soak, then launder. If

necessary, and color and fabric permit, launder again using chlorine bleach  
 Gravy or milk: Use an enzyme pre-soak with cool water or make a paste of detergent and water and work that into the stain. Then launder. Should the stain remain, use a dry cleaning solvent.  
 Wine or soft drinks: Soak with an oxygen bleach in the hottest water safe for the fabric, then launder. If necessary, launder again with a chlorine bleach.  
 Candle wax: Scrape off as much as possible, then place the stain between paper towels and press with a warm iron. Next place the stain face downward on paper towels and press with dry cleaning solvent. Let dry, then launder. If the stains remains, launder again with an oxygen bleach. If the spot is still not removed and color and fabric permit, launder finally with a chlorine bleach.  
 Coffee or tea: Soak in hot water with enzyme pre-soak or oxygen bleach. Then launder and if the stain is not removed launder again using chlorine bleach.  
 A few general hints are: 1) Test any stain remover on a corner of fabric first. 2) Do not add chlorine bleach to an enzyme pre-soak bleach. 3) Treat spots from the back of the fabric. Place the spot downward on some paper towels so the stain will come off the fabric instead of going through it.

**HOME ECONOMIC AIDES**

Home economics aides, working in 17 counties and two Indian reservations in Idaho, are helping low income families learn how to improve their diets.  
 This is done through the Expanded Food and Nutrition (EFNEP) program. It is a joint effort of the U. of Idaho's Cooperative Extension Service and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, says Lois Pace, EFNEP program specialist, U. of Idaho.  
 These aides have the important task of teaching interested homemakers and their families about good nutrition and nutritious ways of preparing foods. They may also help homemakers learn how to stretch their family living dollars, improve sanitation in the home or preserve foods for future eating.  
 Recruited from the communities they serve, aides are University of Idaho staff members. They are trained and supervised by the extension home economics in the county.  
 Because they work closely with EFNEP program families, aides glow with pride when a homemaker puts into practice some newly acquired knowledge. Aides feel personal satisfaction as a family improves its level of living.  
 Especially gratifying are aide success stories such as this:  
 "Through the EFNEP program I have become associated with families of unusual backgrounds. I have been working with a young woman who has a four-year-old daughter. It seems nothing but trouble has been her lot for many years.  
 "This young woman had a deep and sincere desire to become independent to be able to support herself and her daughter. She has progressed to where she now has been employed for two weeks, is a happy person with thoughts of the future and security, with hopes of no moreelfare checks to watch market indicators.  
 Idaho potato producers can use several indicators to help arrive at marketing decisions.

Processors will be looking for potatoes to meet needs above amounts already contracted.  
 An idea of processor demands can be gained from watching U. S. Department of Agriculture reports on frozen potato stocks.  
 However, he urged growers to market potatoes in orderly fashion and not to hold onto their crop too long. "It is far better to move potatoes out of the cellar in good condition and at a profitable price than hold them for more money and have quality drop," he advised. Inferior quality could turn consumers toward substitutes "and we don't want that to happen," Sargent concluded.

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**YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT**

**SPECIAL PERMIT NEEDED**  
 A special permit is needed by ranchers or others who undertake aerial control work on predators such as coyotes. Permittees also must follow through with quarterly reports. The permit requires the maintenance of complete records with subsequent reports to be made as to whether the permit was used and if so, with detailed information as to locations, dates, number and kind of animals killed. Reports must be submitted ten days after the expiration of the permit as well as at the end of any intervening quarter (three months) calendar interval involved.  
 The federal law (92-159) for the use of airplanes for the shooting of certain animals, birds and fish passes the authority for issuing permits and requiring reports to the state.  
**BROILED STEELHEAD RECIPE**  
 Here's a quick, easy recipe good on steelhead as well as on a number of

other fish, including salmon:  
 Finely chop two tablespoons onion, and cream with 2 tablespoons butter; salt and pepper to taste and add one fourth to one-half teaspoon majoram. Spread part of this mixture on three fourth inch thick fish steaks, broil at 375 degrees on a greased broiler pan. When browned, turn steaks, spread other side with mixture and broil until done, (about 5 minutes a side depending on thickness of steak). Garnish with parsley and serve

**FISHING REGULATIONS**  
 Fishing regulations for 1973 are printed and being distributed around the state by the Fish and Game Department. The 1972 regulations must be used through December 31 of this year. All persons over 14 years of age must purchase a fishing license if they plan to fish and bow hunt and spear fish for nongame species during 1973. The only exception is people over 70 who have lived in the state for 10 years or more who are entitled to a free license available

from the Fish and Game Department offices. People 65-70 can purchase a special \$1.00 combination license from vendors if they have been a resident for ten years.  
**1973 SALMON LIMITS THE SAME**  
 The salmon limit is set at one fish per day, two in possession and no more than two salmon may be taken during any seven consecutive day period. Season limit is five fish.  
 Steelhead limits are two fish per day and possession limits of two fish, no more than two steelhead may be taken during any seven day consecutive period. Season limit is ten fish. Both of these regulations are the same as 1972. A steelhead or salmon card is needed to fish for these species. Fishermen are required to list date of catch, name of stream, and stream section on these cards.
