## Genesee Tops Timberline 59-57; Rolls Over Endicott

Outscored in every quarter but the second, trailing by as much as six points in the first quarter and tied 57-57 with just seconds remaining on the clock, the Genesee Bulldogs still managed to gain revenge against the only team to defeat them this season, as they edged out the Timberline Spartans at Weppe Saturday night 59-57. It was guard Jeff Boyd's corner shot with five seconds left on the clock that gave the GHS team its victory.

Timberline moved out quickly in the first quarter and looked as if they were going to rout the Bulldogs as the Spartans were ahead 18-10 at the end of the first quarter. The Bulldogs slowed the game down and began to hit the basket with a 22-point outburst while holding the hosts to just 10 points. Genesee was in control of the games 32-26 at the half.

In the second half Timberline started a comeback attempt that almost succeeded as they outscored the Bulldogs 20-16 in the third quarter and finally caught GHS in the final frame at 57-57. With 16 seconds left, Genesee took the ball out of bounds and with just five seconds left in the game, passed to Boyd who dropped in the winning shot.

Jim Herman dropped in 21 points for the Bulldogs to lead all scorers. Craig Kanikkeberg and Ron Teigen each chipped in 14 more.

## Weather Warms; Rains Come

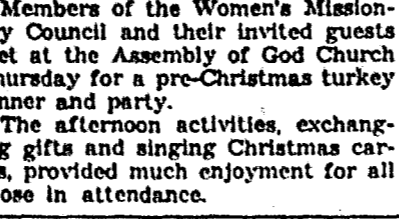
You may dream about a White Christmas, if you want, but unless there is a change in the weather, what you'll get is a muddy brown Yuletide.

## Dist. 283 Trustees Met Thursday

#### Environmental Plan Under Way In State

Boise — The Idaho Department of Highways has set up a special task force to develop a new federally-required Environmental Action Plan which will describe the organization to be utilized and the processes to be followed in the development of federal-aid highway projects from initial system planning through design.

The plan will include social and economic aspects of highway projects as well as environmental or ecological effects.

Action plan coordinator Jerry Dick said that the task force plans to have a draft of the plan ready for Governor Andrus' review no later than March 1, 1973.

The plan must be submitted to the Governor for review and approval as a means of obtaining a high degree of interagency and intergovernmental coordination.

The plan then must be submitted

to the Federal Highway administration not later than June 15, 1973 for further approval. That agency will not give location approval to federal-aid highway projects after November 1, 1973 unless the Action Plan has been approved.

Four basic steps are involved in the Highway Department's Action Plan according to Dick.

—Identification of all environmental effects on proposed highway projects. This includes potential air, water and noise pollution; conservation of resources, aesthetic values, effects on community cohesion and public facilities; effects on employment, property values and taxes; displacement of homes, farms and businesses, and effects on desired community and regional growth.

—An interdisciplinary approach will be applied to all major highway projects.

—Involvement of local officials and the general public to a greater extent and at the earliest possible date.

—Alternative corridors will be fully examined and weighed for projects requiring relocation. Other modes of transportation and the consequences of not having a project will also be evaluated.

Dick said the Highway Department is hopeful that this new process will be helpful in developing future Idaho highway projects.

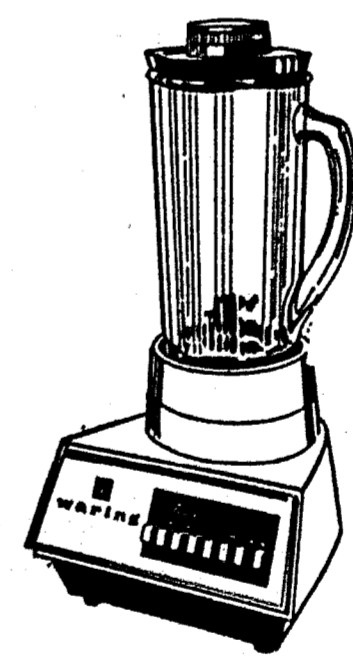

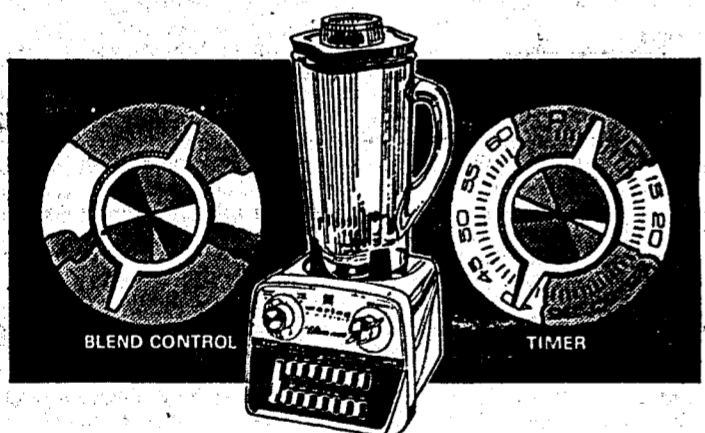

**IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION SERVICE**

R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions who are now in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of the month. Only the following classes are excused from this requirement: (1) accredited diplomats; and (2) persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office during the month of January. Hoffeller said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

**BETTER FESCUE**

The University of Idaho College of Agriculture is participating in a regional project which includes developing an improved fescue. There are some 35 million acres of desert-shrub areas of eight to 20 inches of rainfall and some 70 million acres of forest land in Idaho, Oregon and Washington that could benefit from an improved perennial range grass. There are currently no improved grasses for much of these areas.

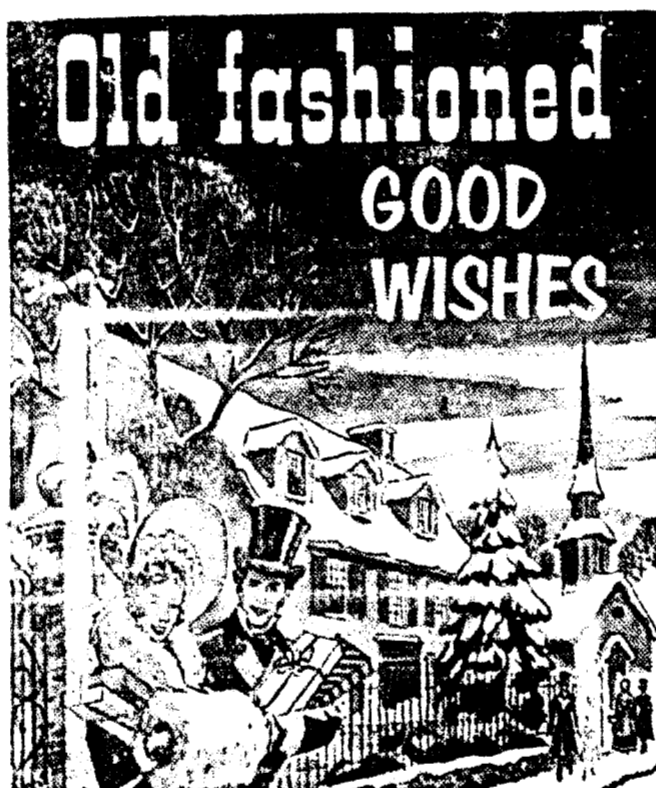

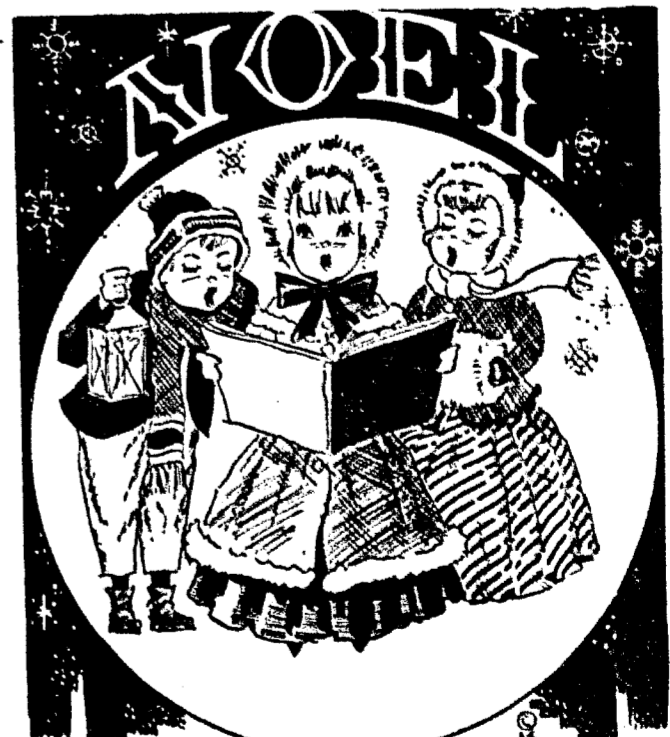

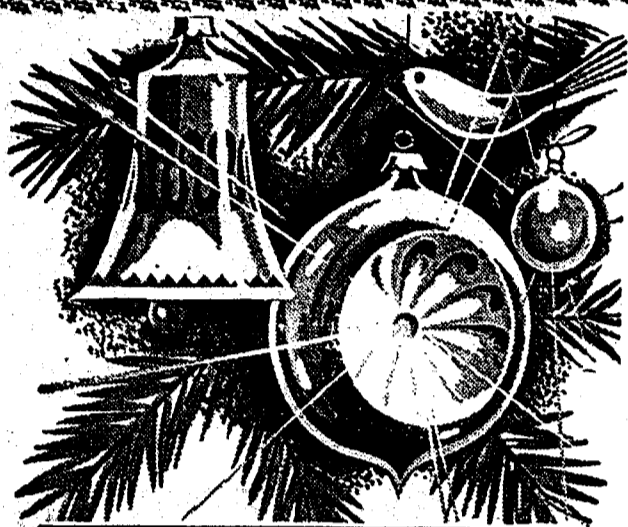

**People Can Earn More  
Under New SS Rules**

Starting in 1973, people who are working while getting social security benefits can earn more but never lose more than \$1 in benefits for each \$2 earned, according to D. Gene Shaw, social security district manager in Lewiston.

The more you earn, the higher your total income will be. Under the new social security law, social security payments will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned over \$2,100 in a year.

Previously, monthly payments were reduced by \$1 in benefits for every \$2 earned between \$1,680 and \$2,880 in a year — and by \$1 for every \$1 earned over \$2,880.

People 72 and over will continue to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings. Under the new law, people under 72 can earn as much as \$2,100 in a year and get their full social security benefits. Different rules apply to people getting social security disability benefits if they work.

**Aliens Must Register**

R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited diplomats; and (2) persons accredited to certain international organizations.

**Kay Shaw Part of New U of I  
Education Program**

Moscow — Kay Abrams Shaw, a graduate of Kendrick High School, has been selected to be master teacher for a new kindergarten program sponsored by the University of Idaho's Department of Education.

The course, which begins Jan 15, will provide observation and clinical experience for University of Idaho students specializing in early childhood education. Mrs. Shaw will teach the kindergarten class.

Currently a graduate student at the university, Mrs. Shaw has taught for one year in Idaho and nine years in Oregon.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Abrams of Kendrick.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or Immigration and Naturalization service office during the month of January.

Mr. Hoffeller said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

In addition, starting in 1973, full benefits can be paid for any month in which an employee's wages are not more than \$175 — or he didn't perform substantial services in self-employment. Previously, the monthly limit was \$140.

Also, starting in 1973, only your earnings in the months before you reach 72 will be used to figure what benefits are due you for those months. Before, earnings in the entire year you reached 72 were counted in figuring benefits due you for months before you were 72.

"Another feature of the new law assures that the earnings exemption for people getting social security payments will go up automatically in future years as earnings levels increase," Mr. Shaw said. The first year there can be an automatic increase is 1975.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible retired and disabled workers and their families — and to families of deceased workers who were insured under social security.

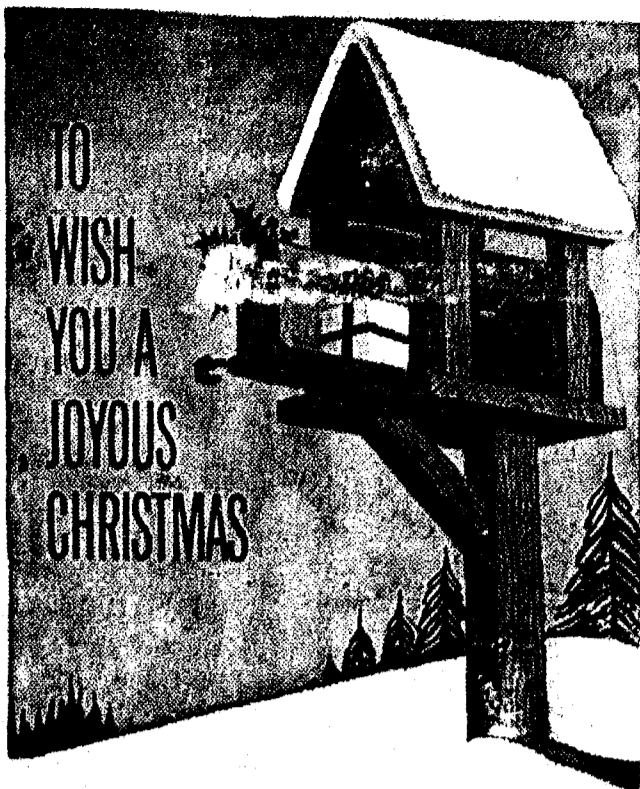

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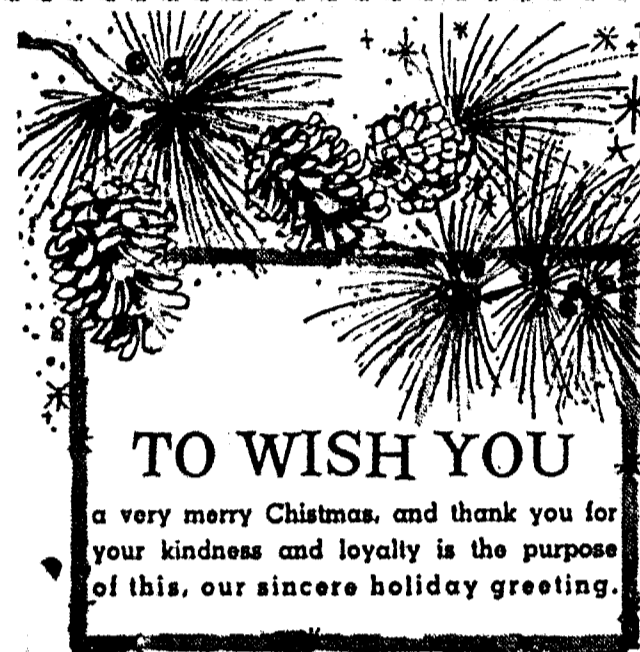

Under a program developed by Latah County officials, solid waste from throughout the county would be trucked to the county sanitary landfill near Moscow.

A group of residents in and around Bovill signed a petition requesting that the local disposal site be maintained.

**LAWRENCE CURTIS ELECTED TO ASC COMMITTEE**

Lawrence Curtis, farmer from Potlatch-Palouse area was elected to a 3-year term on the Latah County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee Monday at the court house in Moscow. The delegates to the ASC convention also elected Roy Glenn, Lawrence Curtis and Clarence Jensen as chairman, vice-chairman and regular member respectively, to the 3-man committee. First and second alternates to the committee are Gary Nygaard, Potlatch and Arthur Fidler, Troy.

Mr. Curtis has farmed in the Potlatch area all his life, raising wheat, peas, barley, oats, alfalfa, cattle and hogs. He has been active for many years in 4-H, grange, fair board and many committee functions. He is especially interested in long range programs so that farmers can plan their work for the future. He has been a community ASC committeeman for many years.

Farm program was reviewed with all committeemen in the afternoon session. A slide presentation emphasized the new direction that will be taken in the Rural Environmental Assistance Program Funds for REAP are expected to be cut 20 percent for 1978, and directed toward priority practices such as pollution, abatement, grass seedings and forestry improvement.

**Long Bird Seasons**

Open seasons for Hungarian and chukar partridge and bobwhite, valley, mountain and gambel quail will continue most places through December 31, 1972.

Exceptions are the counties of Fremont, Madison and Teton in the Upper Snake River Region in Eastern Idaho, where the season ends on November 26, 1972.

The long season for Hungarian and chukar partridge and quail in parts of the Salmon River drainage and the main Snake River drainage runs through January 21, 1973. Daily bag limits are 10 Hungarians and 10 chukar partridge and 10 in the aggregate of quail. Possession limits are 20 hunns, 20 chukar and 20 in the aggregate of quail.

There are two separate hen pheasant seasons. One is in southwestern and southcentral counties ending December 10. The hen-in-the-bag regulation applies from December 2-10. The daily bag will be four pheasants during this period, one of which may be a hen. Beginning December 3 and running through December 10, the possession limit will be 3 pheasants, two of which may be hens.

The same provision for harvesting hens is scheduled November 25 thru December 3 in the southeastern counties of Bingham, Power and Bannock, where the season ends December 3. The bag limit, which is four cocks, becomes four pheasants on November 25—one of which may be a hen—through December 3.

**Midwinter Waterfowl Invent.**  
Idaho's midwinter migratory waterfowl inventory will be made from January 8-12, 1973, weather permitting, in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Game Wildlife Service.

Fewer birds may be found in the state this year than last because earlier concentrations of ducks and geese seem to be leaving the state. Southern Idaho reservoirs such as Lake Lowell, C. J. Stricke, Hagerman, and Mark-Lake are frozen and surrounding countryside is covered with snow. Birds are now concentrated along open waterways and feeding in adjacent fields.

The January, 1972 waterfowl inventory listed more than a million birds. In the past, annual midwinter inventories have averaged from 600,000 to 700,000 ducks, coots and swans. The 1973 count may be well below one-half million birds.

**Cougar Permits**  
Anyone who wants to "trail, pursue and/or 'tree' mountain lions during the closed season must hold a non-consumptive permit, which may be obtained without cost from the state and regional offices of the Fish and Game Department and conservation officers in the field. These permits are now being printed and will be available free about January 1, 1973. Neither licenses nor tags are used for nonconsumptive use provided guns are not carried.

**Whitefish Fishing Fun**  
Whitefish fishing is good wintertime fun. The daily bag limit in most waters is 50 fish (with no possession limit) and the season is long, sometimes year-round. Whitefish may be taken in open ice-free streams where they school up in deep pools or holes. Winter fishing for whitefish helps reduce their numbers and cuts down their competition for food and space. Trout fishing the following summer in such waters actually may be improved by wintertime whitefish fishing. In waters that are restricted for wintertime fishing to one species such as whitefish, trout are sometimes hooked accidentally. If they are deeply hooked, the leader can be cut to prevent further injury to the fish and the hook will disintegrate in a short time.

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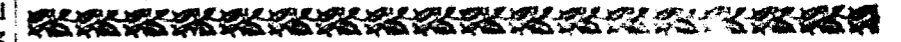

### Unemployment Claims Rise In Latah County

Claims for unemployment compensation continue to rise in Latah County reports Frank Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Department of Employment.

During the past week, 76 new claims were filed bringing the total to 334. This compares to 292 last week and 342 during the same period a year ago. Moscow area residents seeking benefits total 205 in addition to 16 in Genesee, 62 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, five in Kendrick and 46 in Polkatch. Layoff due to cold weather have been the largest contributing factor to the increase in claims.

Job placements declined somewhat from the previous week. Five area workers were placed on jobs during the week compared to nine last week.

Eight new jobs were received and at the close of the week there were 16 openings available. Current listings include office workers, janitor, nurse aide, cook, shoe repairman, furnace installer, pressman, bindery foreman and yardman.

**Kendrick United Methodist Church Conference Held**

The Kendrick church has earned the reputation of being one of the most progressive and successful small-town churches in the Pacific Methodist Church. Because of its success in 1972, and its leadership and plans for 1973 the conference has designated special funds amounting to nearly \$3000 for the development of leadership and programs for 1973. In addition, Rev. Ozier will be attending a special seminar study at Dallas, Texas during a part of July, 1973 designed to develop creative approaches to counseling ministry. All expenses for that trip will be assumed by the District.

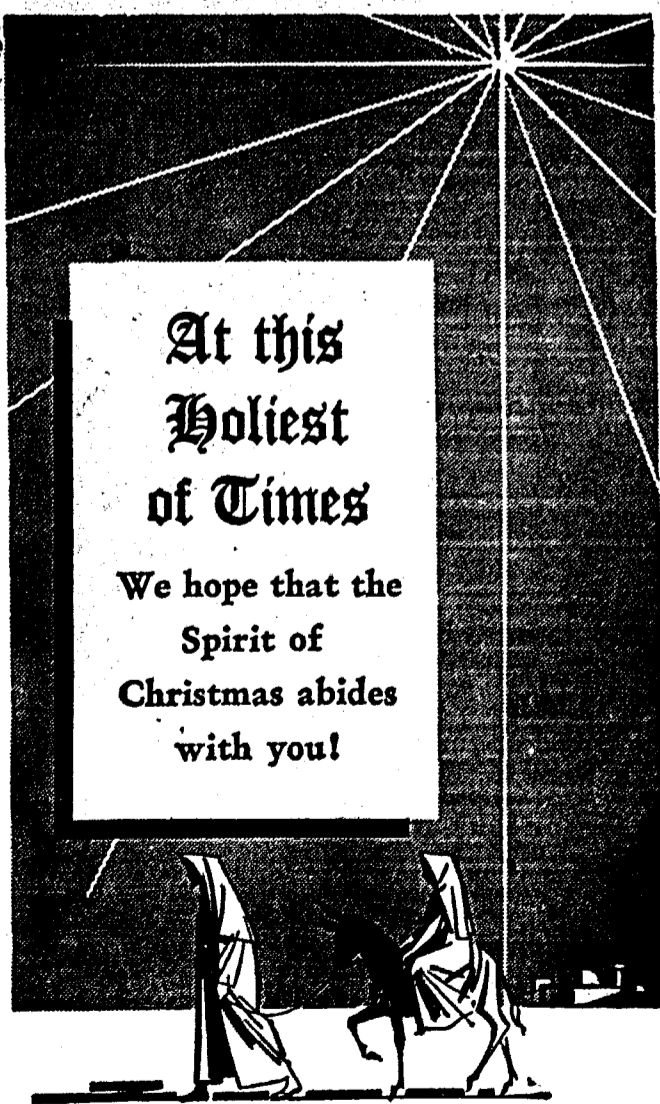
