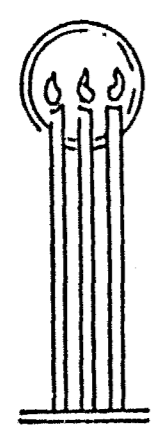

UNDERWEIGHT VERSUS MALNUTRITION

Underweight may or may not indicate malnourishment, states Joanne Anderson, Extension Home Economist, U. of I.

The two terms are not synonymous even though they often occur together. Lack of sufficient calories to replace burnt up energy can result in underweight. On the other hand, lack of food, bad eating habits, or some body error in assimilating food can cause various stages of malnutrition. The degree of the food intake deficiency determines seriousness of the malnourishment.

Due to the present day devotion of many people to the "thinness cult," Mrs. Anderson suggests some members of both sexes are damaging their future health by the way they eat.

Other present day devotees of vegetarianism, organic food and macrobiotic diets, unless they are quite knowledgeable about the combination of nutrients necessary for efficient metabolism, may unknowingly be depleting their bodies. Not only this but future mothers and fathers may be harming their future offspring.

Older people should stay slightly underweight. However, if one lives alone it is easy to not eat regular or balanced meals. One tends to fall into a bad habit of picking up a bit here or there, thus satisfying hunger pangs without properly nourishing the body cells.

It is a constant thing—the building and breaking down of body cells. So Mrs. Anderson reminds us it is a constant and regular need to eat food which supplies adequate nourishment. One should also remember a reserve of a bit of healthy tissue may not be all bad. One may undergo a time of extreme stress, such as a pregnancy, surgery or an extended infectious illness. At times like these a "savings account" of healthy cells can become mighty important.

If you are a light eater and "seldom hungry" or you believe certain foods cause digestive problems, or you don't FEEL like eating, break fast, start changing your habits slowly. Pay special attention to adequate rest and relaxation and force yourself at first to eat small amounts of nourishing food at regular intervals. Build your appetite back to normal at a steady pace. It can be done.

CONSERVATION ARRESTS RUNNING AHEAD OF 1971

Total arrests for violation of state fish and game laws from January through November, 1972 exceeded the full 12 months of any previous year, and it appears that the 12-month total for 1972 will run from 25 to 30 percent over the 1971 total, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reported today.

Hawley Hill, chief of the conservation enforcement division, said that fines and forfeitures for November total \$14,082, compared to \$6,862 for the same month last year. He added that license revocations, a very effective court ordered penalty, also have increased by 20-fold in the last five years. Under terms of the law (36-429 Idaho Code) the revocation of fishing and hunting licenses consists of cancellation of an existing license and or denial of the privilege of purchasing a similar license for the length of time required to meet the revocation period decreed by the magistrate.

Hill explained that any person convicted on a second offense in the same twelve months, faces mandatory revocation of hunting and fishing privileges for such length of time as may be determined by the court.

The law provides for forfeiture of bond to be equivalent to conviction, which is a fairly standard stipulation in most laws having license revocation provisions based on conviction. Otherwise, a defendant will often forfeit a bond as a means of avoiding the loss of privileges which would otherwise result from a conviction. One of the greatest values of the law is the increased flexibility in using the revocation of hunting and fishing privileges as an effective non-monetary penalty in hardship cases or in the case of well-to-do people who take a moderate fine in stride or in dealing with juveniles.

Hill commented that the department's officer force has been increased from 65 to 70 men since July 1, 1972. This, no doubt, accounts in part for arrests increasing from the very first of the current year and running ahead of any previous year.

Data collected in a University of Idaho College of Agriculture study has documented the sequence of events leading to serious flooding in the Moscow area last spring. Various agencies have used information provided by the study to better understand the flood and to design a defense against future flooding. The study has also answered questions of water use by agriculture and possible recharge values.

EAGLES OFFERED TO ZOOS
 Idaho Governor Cecil D. Andrus has offered to give to zoos throughout the Nation, 13 huge eagles, often called by the Indians "Kings of the Wind."
 Andrus made the offer in letters addressed to the Governors of the 49 other states. The birds, Andrus said, are "healthy, but handicapped eagles, all victims of careless or vicious gunmen."
 "Seven of the thirteen are disabled," he said. "Many are amputees, missing parts of wings and feet. All can hop and jump about, and some can even fly; but their ability to hunt has been destroyed. If an eagle cannot hunt, he dies."
 "Idaho is proud of her eagle population. So proud, that as Governor, I am willing to give some away to save them."
 The eagles were rescued after being wounded and were brought to Morley Nelson, of Boise, a well-known eagle trainer-rehabilitator. With the help of a friendly veterinarian, Nelson for many years has been caring for and rehabilitating the big birds of prey.
 But, the cost of caring for the birds he now has is too great, and Nelson told Andrus he may have to destroy those for which homes cannot be found.
 "Unable to soar with characteristic splendor," Andrus said in his letter, "the eagles make excellent zoo

IDAHO'S OFFICIAL AIR POLLUTION CONTROL PROGRAM
 Idaho's official air pollution control program has come under public scrutiny and evaluation by a group of Idaho citizens.
 The Idaho Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association (ITRDA) announced the evaluation as a part of its continuing effort on behalf of the citizens for clean air.
 "This evaluation is something that is being done for the citizens of Idaho by citizens of Idaho" according to Boise surgeon Dr. Robert Holdren, spokesman for the evaluation committee.
 "This is not a witch hunt nor is it going to be a cover-up," Holdren said. ITRDA has brought together a group of competent professionals for the purpose of an objective evaluation. This group includes the professions of medicine, engineering, law and economics. Each of the disciplines will examine the Idaho air pollution control program on the basis of their specialized knowledge. We expect the individual evaluations will be brought together in the form of a comprehensive, objective report at the end of our working process," Holdren stated.
 "We intend to look into as many aspects of the Idaho program as possible," he indicated. This will include administration, funding, enforcement, legal authority, personnel, monitoring etc. This method of evaluation will include interviews with air pollution personnel, studies of published information, including past funding, enforcement efforts, enabling legislation, etc. This will be balanced against an evaluation guideline published by the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association and what we as professionals think levels of performance and ability should be," Holdren said.
 The report of the evaluation committee will be made public and will be available to citizens, administrators of the program and legislators.
 Citizens of Idaho with a specialized knowledge of the air pollution field or disciplines relating to it were invited to provide their input to the committee's work by contacting the Idaho TB and Respiratory Disease Association, 2621 Camas St., Boise, Idaho 83705

1973 LICENSES MAILED TO ALL BONDED VENDORS
 Licenses were shipped last week to 250 vendors and orders are being filled as received, the Idaho Fish and Game Department announced today.
 Based on 1971 sales, nonresident big game license restrictions will be continued for another year with 9,772 combination licenses at \$135 and 3,909 antlered deer only licenses at \$75 available for sale in 1973. License vendors, again, will sell a portion of these licenses. This will make it possible for outfitters and guides to make their plans with nonresident hunters before the quotas are sold.
 Bird hunters, both resident and nonresident, need these licenses to complete waterfowl and upland game bird seasons that extend into 1973 and for fishing in year-round waters during the new year.
 The department reminded resident hunters who have lived continuously in Idaho for the past ten years or more and are at least 65 years of age that they can buy a combination hunting and fishing license for \$1.00 instead of the usual \$6.00.
 Those who are 70 years old or more and who have lived continuously in the state for at least the past ten years can get a five-year courtesy hunting-fishing combination permit without cost. Permits are available quarters. This is essentially the same permit that has been standard for 70 plus year olds with 6-month residency. Applications may be obtained from license vendors.
DANGEROUS TOYS BANNED; CARE STILL NEEDED

 There is no law banning the manufacture of unsafe toys. However, it is illegal to distribute them through interstate commerce, Mrs. Spidahl says.
 Some guidelines to follow when you select toys for a child are: Never allow a child to select a toy without adult help. A small child might love a cuddly, stuffed animal. However, he has no way of knowing sharp tacks hold the eyes and nose on the face. Carefully consider the child's age. An 8-year-old will know not to swallow marbles, but a two-year-old might think they are candy.
 If you're buying an electrical toy, get a battery operated one for a small child. Be sure electrical toys for older children have the Underwriter's Laboratory seal.
 Use caution when ordering a toy by phone or mail unless you are familiar with it. Read all labels carefully. Note any guarantees and precautions. Always save purchase receipts. Keep in mind that children really like toys that let them use their imagination.
