Consolidation of Schools Issue Again

Battled down in the last Idaho legislature, school consolidation will apparently rear its head in the state Mr. and Mrs. Jody Fey and family this year, according to Mr. and Mrs. Luther Parks, who recently returned from a State School Board convention in Boise. The following is the Parks' report on what happened on this subject:

> We attended the State School Board convention in Boise in November and isarned of the plans the State Board of Education has for school district reorganization. Mrs. Janet Hay, state Board of Education member presented the report. She stated the reason to reorganize is to equalize the amount of money behind each child in each district. However, based on the property tax this still leaves some districts richer than others as some property is valued at more.

In California, the Seirano case de-cision forbid the linking of affluence and spending in school districts but did not require the legislature to impose uniform spending state-wide. A case currently before the United States Supreme Court will give us Trailing 32-26 at the final answer as to whether the local property tax is constitutional in funding local school districts. Most educators feel the court will rule as lower courts have done and school funding will have to come from other sources such as a sales tax, income

The report presented four plans for reorganization. Plan 1 calls for six school district in the state. Our district would have Nezperce, Latah. Clearwater, Lewis and Idaho counties. This plan comes closest to equalizing the money spent on each child. The other three plans, 26 districts, 44 and 52 districts, in our area all have been arranged in county units. Kendrick, Genesce, White Pine, Potlatch and Moscow are one district. Lewiston, Tammany, Lapwai and Culdesac another.

Mrs. Hay stated these would be only administrative districts. However, a county-wide school board would be elected and what would be done after reorganization is anyone's guess. A recommendation in the report calls for a minimum size for a general high school should be one which provides for a graduating class of at least 100 students.

Legislation recommended for school reorganization includes the same bill they presented last year calling for a plenning commission and an appropriation of \$51,000.

Attorney General Rules Juliaetta Sewer Issue Passed

JULIAETTA -In a letter to Mayor Harold Freeman dated December 18, W. Anthony Park, attorney general for the State of Idaho, issued sewer and water bond issue voted on by the City of Juliaetta should be considered as having been approved.

The issue, requiring voter approval for \$195,000.00 in revenue bonds to be issued for improving and enlarging the present sewer and water system in Juliaetta, received 116 "Yes" votes and 64 "No" votes. Under the previous law, a two-thirds suits did not give the issue this need-

ed two-thirds majority, But at the same time the city election was being held, the regular general election was also being conducted, and one of the constitutional amendments being voted on was one which would change the needed majority from two-thirds to just a simple majority, or over 50 percent, vot-er approval. This amendment carried





1978 LICENSES MAILED TO ALL BONDED VENDORS

Licenses were shipped last week to 250 vendors and orders are beings Game Department announced today.
