Economic Outlook Reported By Bank

The economic outlook in Idaho for 1973 is similar to that in the nation with increases in production, employment, personal income and trade. This is the report of the quarterly First Security Bank News Letter which is being distributed this week,

according to James Hoogland Jr.. The publication is edited by Dr. ElRoy Nelson, First Security Corporation vice president and economist. Total employment in November was reported at 229,100. This was an increase of 7,500 for the month over a year earlier and is rather typical of the pattern throughout the year. Employment in agriculture has con-tinued to decline with further mechanization on the farm. The decrease in 1972 was almost 1,500. Nonagricultural wage and salary employment by November had increased by 9,400 or 4.2 per cent above a year ago. Manufacturing employment was 1,400 jobs higher. Mining and railroad employment were both down. The ci-vilian labor force was reported as 314,200-an increase of 8,200 in the year. Unemployment at 15,100 was up slightly with 5.4 per cent unemployed.

Construction contracts in 1973 should be approximately the same or slightly lower than in 1972. the News Letter states. Total construction was \$262 million or 83 per cent above a year earlier. There was an increase of six per cent in the number of



IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment reported that the post-Christmas short work week reduced job placement activity in his office. He said that only 6 persons were placed on jobs during the week compared with 11 persons given job finding help during the previous week, and 10 so assisted during the same week a year ago. He said his office received 8 new job listings only 2 less than the previous week's 10; and that 31 jobs were still open at the end of the week. Most of the jobs require special skills, training or experience, he reported.

Although the number of persons currently filing claims for unemployment insurance increased from 335 last week to 369 this week, the total was considerably less than the 421 jobless pay seekers of a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area there were 215 persons claiming benefits compared with 201 last week and 209 last year. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the current t otal is 72, up from last week's 60 but little more than half of the year ending total of 123 reported in 1971. At Potlatch the total remained the same, 54, as last week, down from last year's figure of 68. Mellowing weather in the area permitted construction workers to return to their jobs although it did cause some curtailments among workers in the area's lumber producing industry.

Called "Your 1973 Social Security Deductions," the leaflet explains how payroll contributions to social security starting in January 1973 will build increased retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for employees, employers, and self-employed people.

"Employers with under 1,000 employees can get sufficient copies of the leaflet free on request," Shaw said. Employers with over 1,000 employees can get free "repro" proof to print their own copies for distribution in payroll envelopes.
