**ABOUT YOUR BREAKFAST**

Danish pastry or doughnuts may be considered breakfast by some people, but it probably won't get you through the morning, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

Two Danish pastries, with two pats of butter, contains about 400 calories, but only five grams of protein. This negligible amount of protein in a high calorie breakfast may provide a quick pickup, but can result in symptoms of hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) in two or three hours. This would leave a person feeling tired.

Once for ounce, doughnuts have even less protein. Two plain doughnuts, with 250 calories, provide three grams of protein. Two raised doughnuts, also with 250 calories would supply about four grams of protein. From the standpoint of nutrition neither Danish pastry or doughnuts adds up to an adequate breakfast.

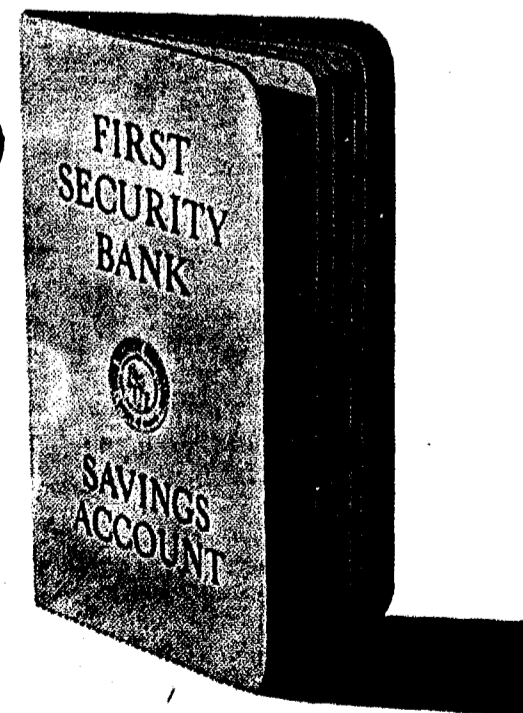
