This does not apply to city or county zoos, pet stores traveling circuses. Permits are valid for one year but can be revoked whenever regulations are violated. In order to obtain a permit, the operator must agree to meet certain standards for confining.

78 Latah Co. workers filed new

claims for unemployment insurance during the week ending March 2, 1973 through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that this was triple the number filing new claims during the previous week and almost double the number listing new unemployment during the corresponding week a year ago. Hartstein said that lay-offs in the area's forests accounted for the largest share of the total. 3 or 4 major contractors shut down during the week, he said. Many other workers were affected the current 88, compared with 114 a year ago; and in the Potlatch area where the figure rose to 57 from the previous week's 45, but was below last year's 71. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 176 workers seeking benefits, up slightly from the 168 of a week ago, but down from 1972's figure of 227. Little change was noted in the number of claimants from the Genesee and Kendrick areas.

Hartstein indicated that his office found jobs for 7 workers during the provement over the 5 who were placed on jobs during the preceding week week. At the end of the week there were still 25 jobs open. Needed in the Moscow area were salespersons, farm workers, a nurse, receptionist, cafe workers and domestic workers.


#### GROUP CITATION MADE TO MINIDOKA FARMERS

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
