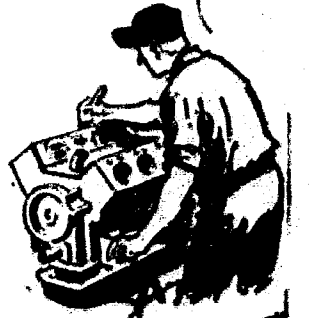

ORDINANCE NO. 172

AN ORDINANCE VACATING PORTIONS OF WARD STREET AND THIRD STREET IN THE CITY OF JULIAETTA.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the following described real property being portions of Ward Street and Third Street in the City of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho, be and the same hereby are declared to be vacated; said properties being more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

All that portion of Ward Street being South of the South line of the Southeasterly 25 feet of Lot 5, Block 27 and being South of the South line of the Southeasterly 25 feet of Lot 8 Block 21 running in a Southwesterly direction to a continuation line of the North line of the Northeasterly 25 feet of Lot 2 Block 26 and the North line of the Northwesterly 25 feet of Lot 11 Block 22 in the Original Town of Juliaetta, as shown by the recorded plat thereof.

ALSO that portion of Third Street commencing at the most Easterly line of Lot 6 and the South 25 feet of Lot 5 Block 27 and the most Easterly line of Lot 1 and the North 25 feet of Lot 2 in Block 28 running in a Southeasterly direction to a continuation line of the most Westerly line of Lot 7 and South 25 feet Lot 8 Block 21 and the most Westerly line of Lot 12 and North 25 feet of Lot 11 in Block 22 as shown by the recorded plat thereof.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its passage, approval and first publication thereof.
