





Area Economy Shows Growth, Reports Bank

Data on all major segments of Idaho's economy in the first quarter of 1973 show significant increases over a year earlier and at a rate slightly above the national average. This is the report of the quarterly

First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week, according to James Hoogland, Jr., manager of First Security Bank, Kendrick. The publication is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, First Security vice president and economist.

Total personal income for the first quarter of this year is estimated at \$74 million or an increase of 15 per cent over that reported by the Department of Commerce.

Outlook for the second quarter is similar to that in the nation including an upward trend in production, employment and personal income, as well as trade. Some additional stability in prices is hoped for and ex-

'Cash receipts from farm marketing in the first three months totaled an estimated \$180 million or 24 per cent above a year earlier. Usually, cash receips in the first quarter of the year represent 20 per cent of the year's total, but in 1973, such receipts are probably above this percentage of the year's total, says First Security.

Gross farm income for the year is expected to be higher, but production expenses will rise at a greater rate, meaning that realized net insome for the year may be approxi-

mately the same as in 1972. Prices of cattle in the first two months averaged approximately 40 per cent higher than a year ago, but slightly less than this March with some decreases toward the end of te month. This was related to a numher of factors, says the bank. Factors include an increase of about 4 per cent in cattle slaughtered and the socalled "consumer boycott" and the highly publicized meatless period of the first week in April.



Once again spring has advanced to the time of the first opening for fish-9:45 ing season in the Clearwater Region. 11:00 Some streams and most small reservoirs on April 28. The remaining will not open until May 26, when 9:00 the general season opens statewide.

Several small lakes and reservoirs areas will not open until May 26, include: Blue Lake, Manns Lake and Waha Lake in Nez Perce County; Campbells Pond and Elk Creek Reservoir in Clearwater County; Moose Creek Reservoir and Spring Valley in question. Reservoir in Latah ounty; and Winchester Lake in Lewis County.

There were several streams that have been taken from the spring opening this year due to juvenile steelhead in the stream at the time. The remain ing streams that will open April 28 are: Butcher Creek and tributaries; Cottonwood Creek and tributaries; Three-Mile Creek and Its tributaries: all tributaries to the South Fork of the Clearwater River; Elk Creek in Clearwater County will open from Elk Creek Reservoir upstream to Elk Creek Falls. Palouse Wheat Farmers Face Dilemma Says U. of I. Professor

Moscow — Palouse wheat farmers face a dilemma. If they intend to harvest a good winter wheat crop in August, they must hold off on seeding until about the first week in the preceding October.

But, if seeding is not done until that late in the year, the earth is not protected from fall rains. As a consequence, rain-softened soil of the Palouse hills is carried away by rivulets as they erode their way-someimes badly—to lower elevations

The obvious solution is to seed earlier, the forepart of September or even in August.

However, the obvious is not a simple solution, according to Dr. W. K. Pope, wheat breeder at the University of Idaho since January, 1947.

There are several factors that cause Palouse farmer to steer away from early fall planting dates. Footrots are one reason.

Even though some varieties have fair tolerance, they are still not good enough to permit first of September seeding without running the risk of unbearable economic loss due to footrot. Risk is reduced as seeding is moved to later in the season.

A legume in the rotation system reduces footrot enough to permit one to two weeks earlier seeding. Howver, even by using that cultural practice, a safe planting date is still only late September. This does not

produce good type wheats with still higher levels of footrot tolerance. Presumably, the wheat from this combination could be planted earlier than varieties and types now grown," Pope said. Plant breeders are aware of the




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
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
