April Was Dry

April, the month of showers, failed to live up to its reputation in 1973, as SCS rainfall recorders in both Genesee and on American Ridge reported less than a half-inch for the 30-day period.

Dick Bessecker, up on American Ridge, reported a total of only .33 inches for April. The 1972 April rainfall was 1.65 inches on American Ridge.

John Luedke, Genesee, recorded .39 inches in that area; well down from the 1.83 inches in 1972. The total rainfall for this year is just 6.06; less than half the 11.82 which had been recorded at this time last year. At this time in 1970 there had already been 12.09 inches of rain recorded.

Genesee School Dist. Elections May 8

Two very important school elections will be presented to the district patrons, Tuesday, May 8th.

The election for a trustee for zone 2 and the 3 mill M & O election will be held Tuesday, May 8th from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the lobby of the gym.

Mrs. Irma Eglund and Mr. Ray Weidman are running for the board position. The M & O election is for 3 mills determined by the board that is necessary in addition to the 27 mills allowed by law to run the school district for the coming school year. This will represent a decrease of 3 mills over the last year's budget. The 1972-73 budget was set at 33 mills and the 73-74 budget will be at 30 mills. Also in the 1973-74 budget is a decrease in the Bond and Interest Fund of 6.5 mills. This amount will be for a one-year period only; as the district has enough funds plus the 2 mill levy to pay the obligation this year. Putting the two together this would give a total of 9.5 mill reduction in taxes this year only.

Patrons are encouraged to come out and vote for the passage of the M & O election in order that we can maintain a good school system.

The regular board meeting will be held May 8th instead of May 14th. The budget hearing will also be at the regular board meeting.

Dr. Christensen Home From Spokane Hospital

Dr. Christensen returned Sunday from a week's stay in Deaconess Hospital in Spokane for a heart checkup. His heart was monitored for two days when he was at rest and at exercise. It performed better when up and exercising. Then a temporary pacer (a little box containing complex electronic circuits which could regulate the rate of the heart) was strapped to the chest and a wire electrode was passed through the jugular vein into the ventricle of the right heart. After two days of monitoring, to see that a pacer was necessary, a permanent pacer was placed in a pocket in the upper left chest wall and the wire introduced through the cephalic vein into the apex of the right heart. The pacer will function for at least two years. The doctor is feeling much better and new needs no heart medication.

Kendrick School Audit Favorable

"... we believe the educational process is good. The district offers a large curriculum, usually small classes, several special program (speech therapy, disability learning, kindergarten, remedial reading, etc.) and a qualified staff." This was one of the opening statements in the audit report on Joint School District No. 283. The district was the first in the state to receive an extensive audit of all phases of operation last fall. The State of Idaho just made public the results of this audit April 28 following a committee meeting in Boise.

Supt. of Schools Don Blakeley was called to Boise to be present for this committee and returned home pleased with the results of the audit and the manner in which he had been treated. "I received the very finest treatment," he told the Gazette. Blakeley added that the auditors had informed him that this was one of the most favorable reports they had given.

Supt. Blakeley made available the results of the audit to the Gazette following the committee meeting and this report (consisting of 42 typed pages) covered almost every aspect of the local school. From financing down to small inventory records. It was on the matter of the inventory system that the school came into an area of criticism. The audit team recommended the present inventory system be completely revised.

It was on the opinion that the school board adequately carries out their functions. The superintendent and principals appear to be doing their functions adequately and the district's budget system appeared to be adequate for its needs.

District School Levy Election Tuesday, May 8; Voter Turn-out Urged

All qualified voters are urged to turn out May 8, and vote for the 33-mill maintenance and operation levy, 1 yr., and two-mill levy for a plant facility reserve fund for a period not to exceed 10 years.

It should be explained that the 33-mill levy is six mills above the 27 allowed by law, Forty-Second Legislative Session; however, this still isn't any greater millage than approved by the voters last May for the 1972-73 school year.

The total general mills for 1972-73 and 1973-74 (exactly the same for each year) is as follows: General School purposes, 23 mills; School Plant Facilities fund, two mills; Bond Interest and Redemptions, 8 mills. The total is 43 mills.

The plant facility levy will provide approximately \$4,053.04 per year for the purchase of a new bus every other year. Some of these funds are used for Elementary and Secondary equipment. Two thousand dollars will be used for the purchase of 7th and 8th grade desks, which are no longer usable.

A breakdown of all estimated budget receipts and expenditures for the General Fund and Plant Facility reveal a balanced budget. Receipts are estimated at \$308,724.65 and expenditures as \$308,724.65.

The main reason for the extra six mills above 27 mills allowed by law is to make up for the loss of Federal assistance under P.L. 874, which totals approximately \$9,000. These funds were allotted the District to compensate for the education of Dworshak Dam workers children. The dam is completed, so we can't count on these funds any more. Phase out sales tax money is also down by about \$1,500. On top of this, there is a loss of students at Julietta which will total approximately \$4,370. Title I funds which provides \$5,472 for a Special Reading teacher may be lost from Federal reimbursement which puts an added burden on the District.

Teacher raises were declared mandatory by the 42nd Legislature. Suggested raises were 5.5 to 7 per cent. Kendrick's anticipated schedule raises are averaged out at about 6.2 percent; however, the training bases are from \$290 to \$300 lower than the reported raises among the rest of Latah County schools except Moscow.

The salary schedule for adoption at Kendrick is as follows: E.A. \$6,500; B.A. plus 15 semester hours, 6,700; E.A. plus 30 semester hours, \$6,900; M.A., \$7,200; M.A. plus 15 semester hours, \$7,400. Increments for experience run from \$150 to \$200 per year up to 15 years.

Kendrick has a better than average school and is considered a model school. According to the Chairman of the Legislative Appropriation Committee after a review of the Legislative audit in Boise, April 23. Considerable praise was heaped upon St. School Dist. 283 for an outstanding vocational program, curriculum, and financial management. The auditors stated the educational process was good and the fiscal-record system more than adequate.

The people who voted the extra three mills above 30 last year deserve much of the credit for this great rating; also all employees, trustees, and every student.

We feel that this great support has enabled the District to place a goodly number of graduating students on the dean's list, enabled the vocational department to win numerous contests through the efforts of their instructor Doyle Whittig (Ag teacher of the year in Idaho, aided the Jr. High Band and Choruses to score superior ratings in District contests made it possible for the High School band to rate a No. 1 rating at Moscow, April 27, and provided an excellent Girls Drill Team.

Exciting special programs are offered such as speech therapy, remedial reading, resource room for learning disabilities, and kindergarten.

These require some local funds. The District can still continue their fine curriculum if they receive your affirmative vote May 8. The school

Dr. Christensen Home From Spokane Hospital

Dr. Christensen returned Sunday from a week's stay in Deaconess Hospital in Spokane for a heart checkup. His heart was monitored for two days when he was at rest and at exercise. It performed better when up and exercising. Then a temporary pacer (a little box containing complex electronic circuits which could regulate the rate of the heart) was strapped to the chest and a wire electrode was passed through the jugular vein into the ventricle of the right heart. After two days of monitoring, to see that a pacer was necessary, a permanent pacer was placed in a pocket in the upper left chest wall and the wire introduced through the cephalic vein into the apex of the right heart. The pacer will function for at least two years. The doctor is feeling much better and new needs no heart medication.

Kendrick School Audit Favorable

"... we believe the educational process is good. The district was the first in the state to receive an extensive audit of all phases of operation last fall. The State of Idaho just made public the results of this audit. April 28 following a committee meeting in Boise.

Supt. of Schools Don Blakeley was called to Boise to be present for this committee and returned home pleased with the results of the audit and the manner in which he had been treated. "I received the very finest treatment," he told the Gazette. Blakeley added that the auditors had informed him that this was one of the most favorable reports they had given.

Supt. Blakeley made available the results of the audit to the Gazette following the committee meeting and this report (consisting of 42 typed pages) covered almost every aspect of the local school. From financing down to small inventory records. It was on the matter of the inventory system that the school came into an area of criticism. The audit team recommended the present inventory system be completely revised.

It was the opinion that the school board adequately carries out their functions. The superintendent and principals appear to be doing their functions adequately and the district's budget system appeared to be adequate for its needs.

District School Levy Election Tuesday, May 8; Voter Turn-out Urged

All qualified voters are urged to turn out May 8, and vote for the 33-mill maintenance and operation levy, 1 yr., and two-mill levy for a plant facility reserve fund for a period not to exceed 10 years.

It should be explained that the 33-mill levy is six mills above the 27 allowed by law, Forty-Second Legislative Session; however, this still isn't any greater millage than approved by the voters last May for the 1972-73 school year.

The total general mills for 1972-73 and 1973-74 (exactly the same for each year) is, as follows: General School purposes, 33 mills; School Plant Facilities fund, two mills; Bond Interest and Redemptions, 8 mills. The total is 43 mills.

The plant facility levy will provide approximately \$6,053.04 per year for the purchase of a new bus every other year. Some of these funds are used for Elementary and Secondary equipment. Two thousand dollars will be used for the purchase of 7th and 8th grade desks, which are no longer usable.

A breakdown of all estimated budget receipts and expenditures for the General Fund and Plant Facility reveal a balanced budget. Receipts are estimated at \$308,724.85 and expenditures as \$308,724.85.

The main reason for the extra six mills above 27 mills allowed by law is to make up for the loss of Federal assistance under P.L. 874, which totals approximately \$9,000. These funds were allotted the District to compensate for the education of Dworshak Dam workers children. The dam is completed, so we can't count on these funds any more. Phase out sales tax money is also down by about \$1,500. On top of this, there is a loss of students at Juliaetta which will total approximately \$4,370. Title I funds which provides \$5,472 for a Special Reading teacher may be lost from Federal Reimbursement which puts an added burden on the District.

Teacher raises were declared mandatory by the 42nd Legislature. Suggested raises were 5.5 to 7 per cent. Kendrick's anticipated schedule raises are averaged out at about 6.2 percent; however, the training bases are from \$200 to \$300 lower than the reported raises among the rest of Latah County schools except Moscow. The salary schedule up for adoption at Kendrick is as follows: E.A. \$6,500; E.A. plus 15 semester hours, 6,700; E.A. plus 30 semester hours, 6,900; M.A., \$7,200; M.A. plus 15 semester hours, 7,400. Increments for experience run from \$150 to \$200 per year up to 15 years.

Kendrick has a better than average school and is considered a model school. According to the Chairman of the Legislative Appropriation Committee after a review of the Legislative audit in Boise, April 28. Considerable praise was heaped upon Jt. School Dist. 283 for an outstanding vocational program, curriculum, and financial management. The auditors stated the educational process was good and the fiscal-record system more than adequate.

The people who voted the extra three mills above 30 last year deserve much of the credit for this great rating; also all employees, trustees, and every student.

We feel that this great support has enabled the District to place a goodly number of graduating students on the dean's list, enabled the vocational department to win numerous contests through the efforts of their instructor, Doyle Whittig (Ag teacher of the year in Idaho, aided the Jr. High Band and Choruses to score superior ratings in District contests, made it possible for the High School band to rate a No. 1 rating at Moscow, April 27, and provided an excellent Girls Drill Team.

Exciting special programs are offered such as speech therapy, remedial reading, resource room for learning disabilities and kindergarten. These require some local funds.

The District can still continue their fine curriculum if they receive your affirmative vote May 8. The school

Editor:

I realize I am not going to win a popularity contest when I ask questions about the Kendrick school district budget.

As I was reading the budget in the paper it said the district is not asking for a tax raise—is this true? For several years the district has had a three mill override levy—this year the board is asking for a 6-mill override levy. This is an increase in taxes and mushrooming the budget which was not the intent of the leg-

isature. The legislature gave every school district enough extra money to raise the teacher's salaries six percent. This sounds fair.

The legislature also gave the district enough money to give the taxpayers a three mill reduction in taxes. This is not being done. I ask why not?

As I read the budget the expenditures are being increased over \$40,000.00 in one year. This certainly could lead to trouble.

With a drop in enrollment, do we need more teachers? If our school status on accreditation is alright now why add more courses?

Are we endangering the basic education of our children by over spending on frills or extras that are not

needed?

Is there concern for all the people in the district, including the taxpayers?

I am not opposed to paying for an increase in salaries or for all the essentials for our children's education, but the budget must also be held in line. I would like to point out the trouble that could develop in the following years.

This extra money the district received this year actually came from federal revenue sharing through the state budget. This could very easily be a one year deal. What if this happened?

The district would have to levy 15 more mills just to maintain this higher level of spending. Would this be acceptable to the taxpayer?

It is easy for the federal or state government to fund this increased spending the first year and then push it back to the property taxpayer.

So beware taxpayers. I suggest that the taxpayers take a hard look at this inflated budget and voice your opinion by voting on May the 8th. What are we buying with our money?

The intent of the legislature, which they provided the money for was that the teachers and the taxpayers share a small dinner together, so to speak—but the taxpayers did not get invited to dinner.

All of us concerned with the Little League would like to express our appreciation for the wonderful turnout last Sunday morning. A special thanks to Miss Stefonek, Blewett's Market, Nobles Grocery, and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Wolff for their donations. We hope that the people enjoyed their breakfast and got enough to eat.

The breakfast was originally a Juliaetta Fireman fund - raising event and when the Little League was organized in 1969, the firemen donated all the proceeds to the Little League. Since that time it has been known as the Little League breakfast with the Little League players making up and selling tickets and the firemen and Rebekahs obtaining, preparing and serving the food. In these cases one-third of the net proceeds has gone to the firemen, one-third to the Rebekahs and one-third to the Little League and Babe Ruth. This year we have had an opportunity to send a representative from our community to watch Skylab and astronauts being launched at Cape Kennedy. The representative will take extensive studies and be lectured by geologists on the flights down and back. The Rep will meet and dine with some of the astronauts and NASA scientists. This is an opportunity offered only 140 people in the U.S. There are two planes in the U.S. making the flight and one flies from Boise, Idaho.

The Firemen and Rebekahs have generously donated their shares of the proceeds from the breakfast towards this representative's expenses which were \$315 just for the flight,

one meal while at Cape Kennedy, three nights stay, and transportation while there. The individual also has to pay expenses for three trips to Boise on preliminary and follow-up sessions. For this reason the teachers handled the breakfast.

There were about 200 people fed at the breakfast with Floyd Williams and Mrs. Rose Brocke winning the ham.

The net profit was \$320.47. Little League and Babe Ruth got \$200, and Rep to Skylab received \$120.47.

The Skylab Rep did not take the two-thirds which would have gone to the Rebekahs and Firemen. Therefore this has been the best year for the Little League and Babe Ruth since 1969.

I hope the name of the breakfast has not been deceiving because no deception was intended and I do not know of any other place you can get that kind of a meal for the price and get out of dishes at the same time. The Little League needs your continued support in order to survive.
