## New Kendrick Bank Opens May 26th

First Security Bank will officially open their new bank in Kendrick Saturday, May 26th. An open house to celebrate the move to new and more spacious quarters is planned at the bank from 1 to 4 p. m.

"Although the bank is 99 percent completed, we have decided to wait until the afternoon of May 26th to have the open house," said James Hoogland, Jr., manager of the Kendrick office. "We wanted to join our open house activities with the annual Locust Blossom Festival."

"Everybody is invited to tour the new facilities and meet the friendly employees, who will demonstrate the modern banking machines," he continued.

The new bank is valued in excess of \$170,000 and shows the faith in the new three-block business district just two-blocks from the present bank.

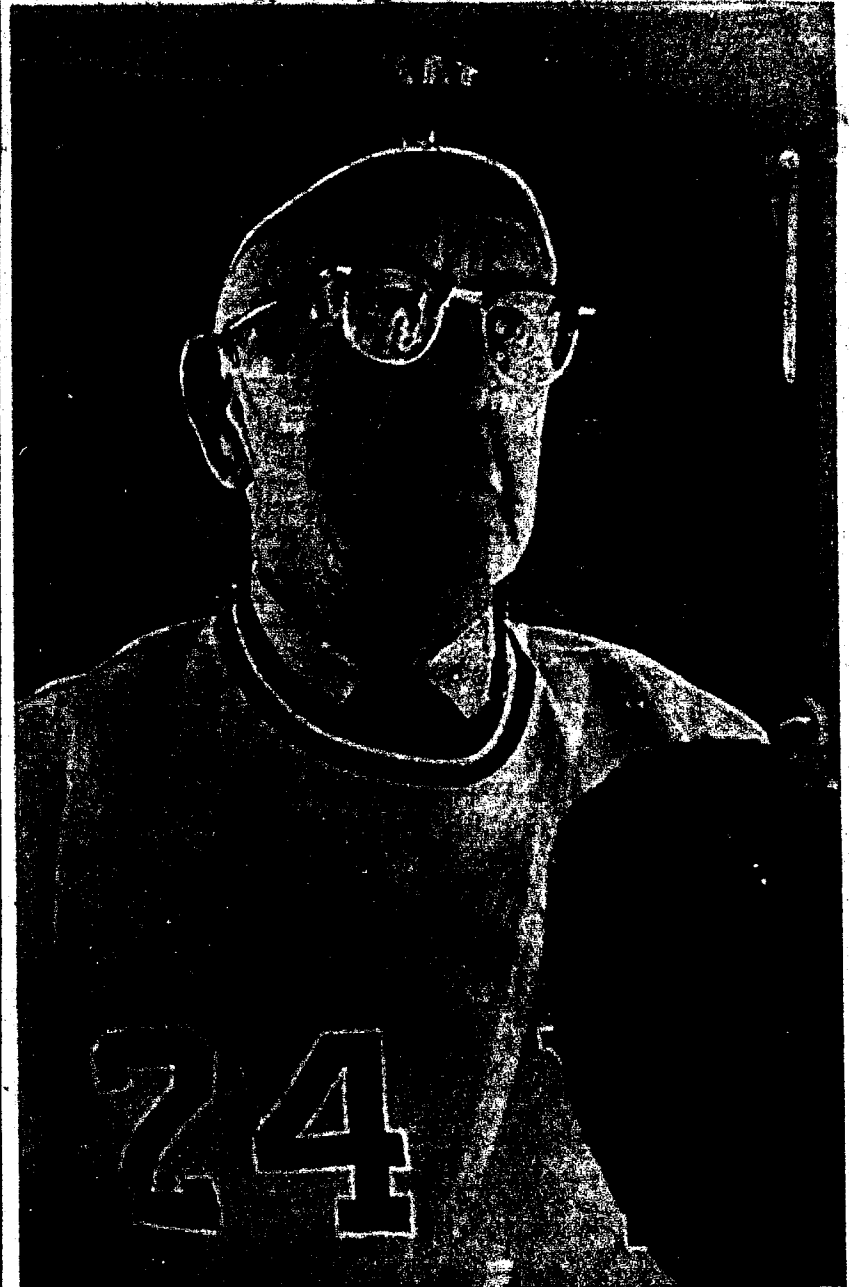
The single story structure was designed by Hummel, Hummel, Jones and Shawver, a Boise architectural firm, to include all the modern bank technology that is available.

The bank contains some 2,603 sq. feet of floor space and offers plenty of room for customers to feel comfortable in.

"Actually, everything in the bank is designed to help bank customers remember their time at the bank as an enjoyable experience," reports Mr. Hoogland.

Two brick and glass main entrances provide easy entrance to the single story building. The exterior of the bank is built of buff brick with wood trim. The two will throw out and catch the first ball in Friday's 3 p.m. opener to decide the Pacific-8 Conference baseball championship.

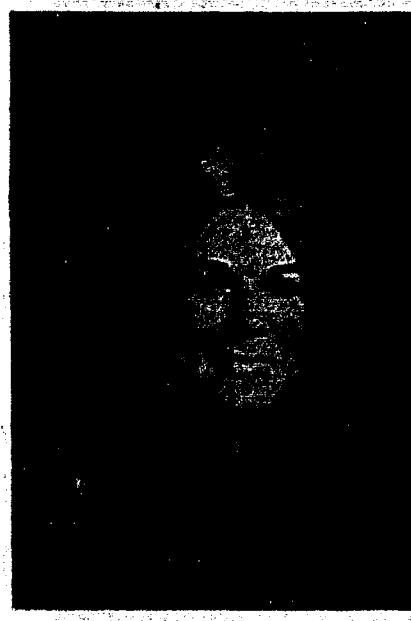
Kuehl, 31, and Hartman, 30, both long-time retired, still are as active as men half their ages. "Al has been loosening up his arm for the first pitch," Hartman's wife Grace confided.

Hartman, who played baseball until he was 50, still plays golf regularly, shooting a 44 for nine holes Friday. "I used to play 18 holes at a time until a few years ago," he said, "but you have to concede a little to age." He now lives in Dinuba, Calif.

The former Cougar pitcher, (1913-16) won a record 24 games during his career here and had another WSU high of 31 complete games. Kuehl, a letterman in the 1912, 1913, 1915 and 1919 seasons, caught Hartman in 1913 and 1915.

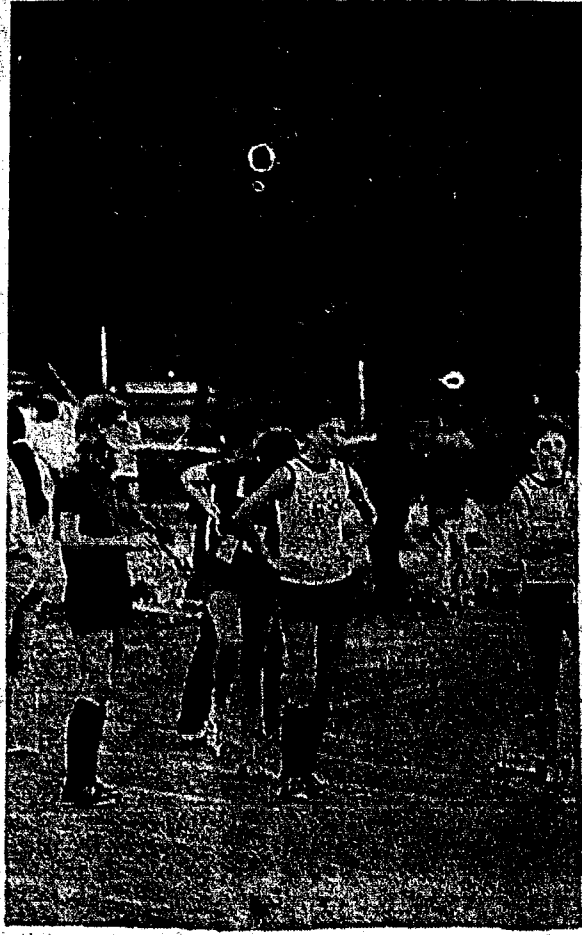
To aid in the spring cleaning, city clerk Bob Magnuson said there will be a special free garbage pickup on that day.

**Cindy Taylor, Sue McGary Competed In State Track Meet Saturday;  
Cindy New Class B State Shot Put Champion - Girls Placed Kendrick 7th**



Cindy Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Taylor of Juliaetta became the 1973 Class B State Shot-Put Champion Saturday with a throw of 32 feet, 10 1/2 inches. She also took third in the discus by throwing 91 feet, 1 inch. The state record in the shot-put is 34 feet, 4 inches. Cindy had a best on the year of 35

feet, 2 inches, but since a state record must be set in the State meet, her mark does not count. Sue McGary, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin McGary of Lewiston, was the fifth place finisher in the 100-yard dash finals with a time of 12.3 seconds, her fastest time this season.

**Natural Resources**

**Youth Camp**

A week-long outdoor camp offers Latah County high school students the chance to learn more about forest ecology.

As many as 125 youths from eastern Washington and northern Idaho will attend the Inland Empire Natural Resources Youth Camp, June 10-16 at Camp Twinlow, 15 miles north of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Deadline for applications is June 1, says Gordon Dalley, Latah county extension agent.

Fees are \$35 per camper; however, several scholarships are available from local sponsoring groups. One for 4-H members is due May 15 in

the county agent's office. The camp is co-educational.

Professional instructions from area universities, government agencies and industry will lead classes, many of them outdoors on forestry, soils and wildlife, range and watershed management. Ample recreational facilities are also featured.

Further information and registration forms are available at the Latah county extension office, Courthouse, Moscow.

The youth camp is sponsored each year by the W. S. U. Idaho cooperative extension service and the American society for range management the Society of American foresters and the Soil Conservation Society of America.

Many wildlife young-of-the-year are found in their hiding places this time of year and they are cute, cuddly and different . . . . The Idaho Fish and Game Department, however, warns that it is unlawful to pick them up or otherwise molest them or take them for pets.

Such "adoption" and removal from habitat and mother's care almost always leads to unnecessary death of wild babes. To molest them is a misdemeanor.

When found by intruders, such infants appear lost, hungry, forlorn, abandoned.

Wild parents, naturally spooky and reluctant to show themselves, often stand timidly nearby as their offspring are kidnapped by people who find them cute and cuddly. Moreover, the young of any species of wildlife require expert feeding and care. They usually won't survive away from their mothers. Some animals become extremely dangerous to humans as they grow up.

**Shortage Forecast**

Meat prices aren't the only thing climbing. Look for an increase in the price of fashion ready-to-wear too, says Joanne Anderson, extension home economist, U. of I. Not only will prices be higher, but manufacturers predict short supplies of apparel next year.

Why this increase? This time they're not due to rising labor costs but to a worldwide shortage of textile fibers and fabrics.

Raw materials for nylon, polyester and acrylic fibers are in short supply in almost all man-made fibers.

Basic ingredients for man-made textile fibers are chemicals formed out of coal, water, air, gas, petroleum, glass and wood cellulose.

The fashion trend is back to wovens. However, looms to make woven fabrics are in short supply due to the popularity of knits in the past. Until manufacturers can catch up, there will be a shortage of woven fabric supplies extending late into next year, reports Mrs. Anderson.

**Minnows Must Be Dead Before Using As Bait**

Bait fishermen are reminded by the Idaho Fish and Game Department that state law requires that minnows be dead before they can be used to conceal a hook to outwit a wily fish.

Some "purists" consider fly fishing to be the "poetry of angling." They use wool, silk and exotic feathers to make artificial flies—to make hungry fish want to eat them.

Both lures and baits must look like the real thing, a juicy morsel that could get away. It must be taken all in one gulp—hook, line and sinker. Bait fishermen seem to regard anything that flies, creeps, crawls

or hops as potential bait. Worms head the list early in the season. The reason is that worms can be found naturally in water because spring run-off floods many places and washes these creatures into the main stream, firm, shiny and lively. Such is not the case in the summer time or fall and fish become suspicious of worms even though worms do not encase ho oks. Moreover in summertime, worms are dull, mushy and unappetizing because of warm weather.

Salmon eggs in either singles or clusters and several colors come in variable consistencies from soft to hard. Fishing conditions and other factors control when to use them.

### Highway Crews Prepare For Summer Work

R. M. Stone, District Maintenance Superintendent for the Idaho Department of Highways in Lewiston advises that District Four with 786 miles of US and State Highways in the five north central counties are getting ready for summer oiling season which soon will be under way. Several projects are underway at this time, such as: resurfacing sections of gravel road on State Highway 14 from Mt. Idaho Bridge to Elk City by the Special Crew under the supervision of Werner Mayer and Erwin Howell. The added surfacing will be processed and shaped up prior to applying a dust coat. As soon as the contractor is finished with the bottom of Greer grade on State Highway 11, the Special Crew will place a gravel base and an oil mat on three-quarter miles of roadway. Local Maintenance forces in the Moscow-Potlatch area under the supervision of Charles Miller, Main-

tenance Foreman at Moscow, are widening and straightening out a curve on State Highway 9 on the east side of Yale underpass. Gravel is also being added to this road section from Harvard to Deary prior to applying a dust coat application.

Other Maintenance Crews in the Lewiston, Fleming, Orofino, Deary and Grangeville to Craigmont areas are cleaning ditches, repairing shoulders, cleaning guardrails, straightening signs, and bringing delinquent up to standard.

The Striping Crew got started a month earlier this year because of good weather and will be traveling to District Five in Coeur d'Alene as they stripe the 10 northern counties and will have the job completed before bad weather this fall.

A Maintenance training school was held in the District Shop last month for two days with all maintenance personnel taking part in it, with Maintenance Foremen as instructors with the District Maintenance Superintendent and Engineer-in-Training as coordinators. Some of the subjects taught were, safety, blasting operations, seal coating, roadside and

- (3 Bean) Barbecue Bean Salad  
 1 lb. can green cut beans  
 1 lb. can cut wax beans  
 1 lb. can kidney beans  
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 2/3 cup vinegar  
 1/3 cup salad oil  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1/2 tsp. pepper

Put all together and refrigerate overnight. Before serving, toss again and drain. Add sliced onion rings and 1 tsp. Worcestershire.  
 (Usually put onion rings in with rest of ingredients at beginning).

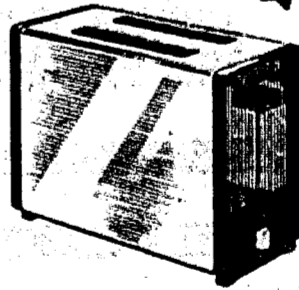
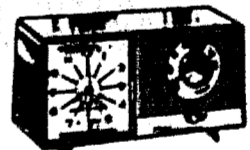
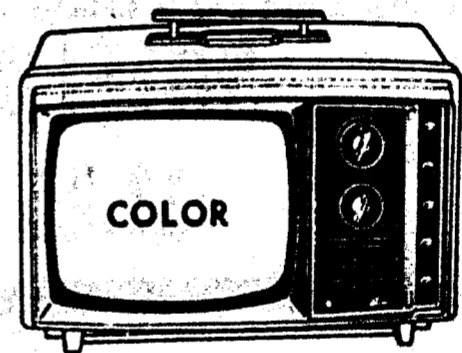

**Job Situation in Latah County Improves**

A marked improvement in the job market was noted by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager reported that his office found employment for 18 workers, during the week. This was double the number given job finding help during the previous week. At the end of the week there were 33 jobs still open down a few from the previous week's of 42. Still needed in the Moscow area were an auto body and fender repairman, an auto mechanic, several qualified secretaries, cooks, waitresses and domestic workers, as well as a number of others.

The number of persons continuing to seek unemployment insurance benefits continues to decline. Although 24 persons filed new claims during the week, the total number of persons receiving checks dropped from 385 persons in the county seeking 339 to 326. A year ago there were such benefits. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 144 idled workers filing claims, a week ago there were 136 and a year ago 137. At Genesee the total is now 7, last week 8, and last year 14. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total declined to 111 from 126 last week, and compares with 152 a year ago. At Kendrick the figures are 10 now, 10 last week and 8 last year. 54 checks are going into the Potlatch area compared with 61 a week ago and 86 at this time in 1972. Hartstein again indicated that he expected a continued moderate decline in the number of persons seeking unemployment insurance as more out-of-doors activities resume, taking advantage of improved weather conditions.

**FISHING SEASON SEEN ONE OF BETTER YEARS**

The general season for the taking of fish in the Idaho Panhandle region (area 1) starts April 28, nearly a month ahead of the statewide opening day, May 26. This is a "lakes only" season, since Area 1 streams also open with the statewide general fishing season, May 26-November 30.

The special season for Mackinaw a lake trout started April 15th in Priest Lake near the boundary line between the United States and Canada. This season also continues longer than the general trout season—December 15 Gaff hooks are prohibited in landing fish from a boat, April 15-30, and December 1-15.

Lake Pend o'Relle is open year-round for all species except trout. This includes kokanee and a daily bag limit for sport fishermen of 35 fish. The season for kamloops rainbow trout starts April 28.

According to James C. Simpson, chief of the fisheries for the Idaho Fish and Game department, anglers can expect waters to be more fishable earlier because of the generally lighter snowpack. A majority of streams this year should be stocked before opening day. The period of muddy runoff waters should be shorter. Barring heavy rains, all small reservoirs should be fishable.

**Pioneers Planted Frogs Community Recreation Service Program May 17**

Idaho fishermen are learning that bullfrogs are fun to catch, good to eat, legal year-round and may be taken with spears, bows and arrows or mechanical devices (as well as hook and line) during the season set for the taking of game fish in those waters.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department said today that the American bullfrog (genus rana), a giant member of the amphibians did not occur west of the Continental Divide originally. This species was introduced to the Boise Valley by an early settler, William H. Ridenbaugh, who became homesick for the unique deep throated "jug-o-run" song of the bullfrog he had loved and left in Missouri when he came to Idaho territory in 1872.

Ridenbaugh is remembered best for introducing bullfrogs—and black bass—into the Boise River, although he was also assistant superintendent of the Wells Fargo Company, early stockholder in the First National Bank, and foremost in construction of the Ridenbaugh ditch and Boise Water company.

Bullfrog mating starts in June and July when weather conditions are right. Frogs lay enormous amounts of eggs, ranging from 10,000-20,000 eggs on aquatic plants or brush. The eggs usually hatch into tadpoles or small, gilled larvae in a few days. In Idaho they remain tadpoles or in the pollywog stage for about two or 3 years before the metamorphosis or transition into frogs. The few that have successfully survived to this point must forage for food and elude death for another 2 or 3 years before they are ready to spawn in kind.

The sport of catching bullfrogs is growing in popularity throughout the state but probably pursued most avidly in the Panhandle region. Fairly large numbers of people in the Hagerman Valley area and in the lower Clearwater drainage also participate in this sport.

**ARROWS, SPEAR FISHING LEGAL IN OPEN WATERS**

Fishing with bows and arrows, spears or mechanical devices, is permitted for the taking of bullfrogs year-round and non-game fish in all waters during the season set for the taking of game fish in those waters, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded anglers to day. The bag limit is 12 bullfrogs.

This means that bow and arrow or spear fishermen can take nongame fish only when the waters they are fishing are open for the taking of game fish. They must also have valid fishing licenses.

Representatives of the Idaho Park and Recreation Department will be in Lewiston at 7:30 p. m. May 17, at the City Hall, Council Chambers to present a program on community recreation services available from the state. The program will present information on the Land and Water Conservation Fund, a recreation grant program available to cities, counties, school districts, and other public agencies, and will also include discussion of park planning and recreation programming assistance available from the State Department of Parks and Recreation.

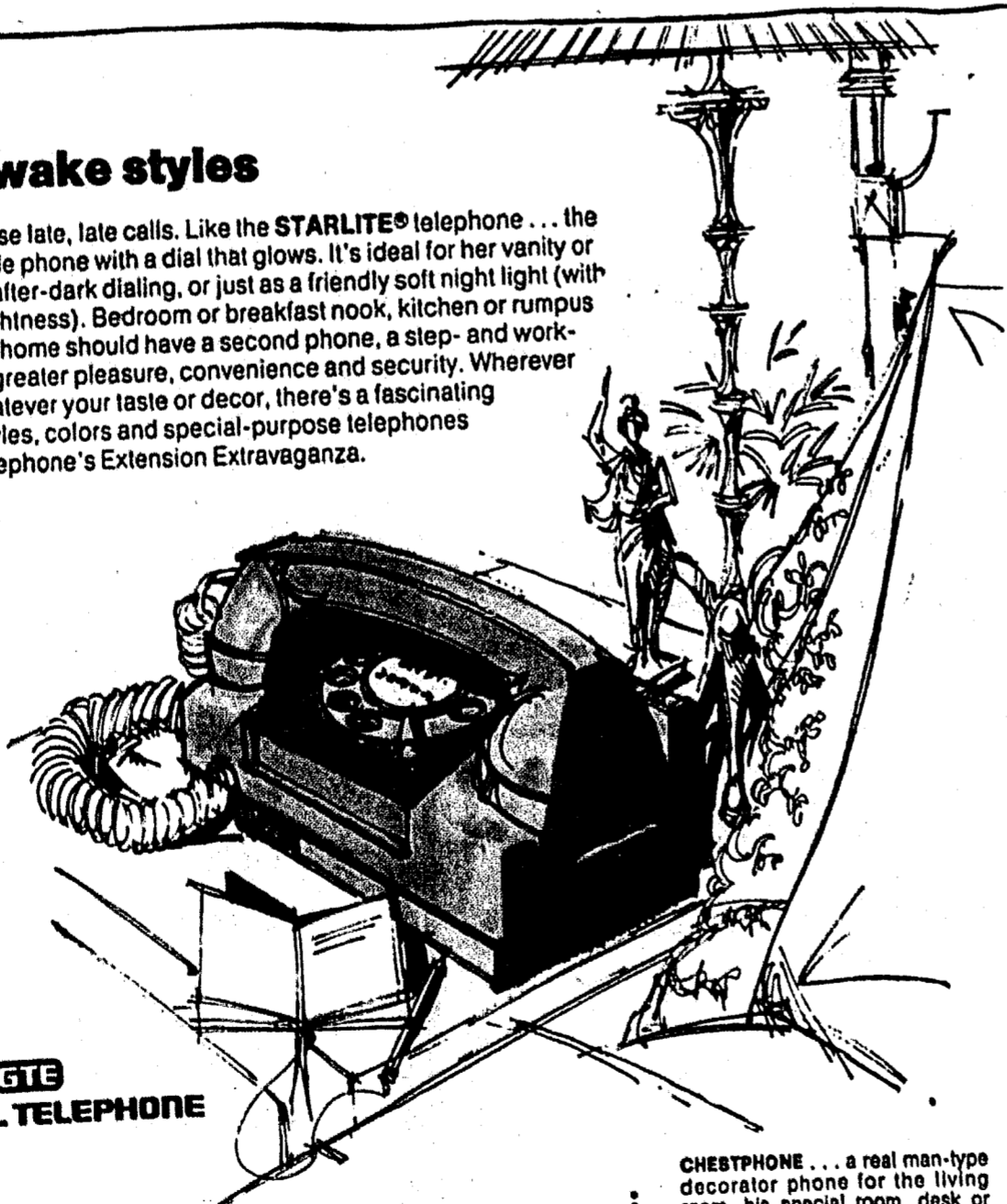

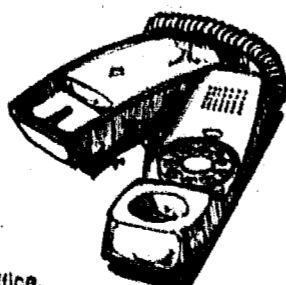

## LETTERS FROM READERS

Editor: I am replying to the letter in the Gazette-News by Mr. Brammer. The school budget as adopted this past year was \$273,260.00. The school board decided after this past year's budget was adopted, to start a resource center for learning disabilities, which is mostly funded at the state level. This actually added \$12,000 to this past year's budget to bring it to a total of \$285,260. The next year's budget is \$308,724 which includes the 6-mill levy that just passed and the \$12,000 for the resource center.

This leaves an increase of approximately \$23,500. The legislature mandated that teachers be given a 5.5 to 7% raise. The board increased the teacher's salary & fringe benefits by \$11,500 and the non-certificated personnel by \$1500. This left us with \$10,500 for the purchase of new equipment, maintenance and repairs, increase due to inflation and the many supplies that the school must buy.

Some of the new equipment we must purchase includes new desks for the 7th and 8th grade rooms for about \$2000, some adjustable typing stands, and the normal replacement of some other equipment that had been delayed. \$1000 was added to the budget for the expected increase in the price of gasoline. The music department's budget was increased to replace one of the large band instruments, which are worn out and unrepairable. These instruments cost up to \$850. The school has to furnish all the books for the students. Forty history books at over \$11 apiece soon add up. From this you can see it wasn't difficult to spend that \$10,500.

Anticipating the revenue the school will receive is like shooting in the dark. The school is now on current funding from the state, if our enrollment dropped 10 more students in the high school than we anticipated, the school would lose around \$8000. Between \$8000 and \$9000 has already been lost in federal funds and another \$5400 could be lost which means we would lose our remedial reading teacher.

The school tax anticipation notes have been reduced from \$59,000 in 1968, when the Vo-Ag Shop was built, to \$28,000 this past year. Any extra revenue that the school has received from increased valuation and other unexpected revenue has been used for this purpose. This year we have \$3000 in the budget for debt service.

Mr. Brammer implied that we were increasing the number of teachers. The school has not and has never considered it.

The school board would have liked to have given the taxpayer a 3-mill break in property taxes, but to continue our present curriculum without going further in debt, the board decided to ask for the same total mill levy as last year.

School budgets are difficult to understand and I hope I have cleared up some of the misunderstanding.

I was very disappointed that some people didn't have more faith in our judgment.
