

### First Security Plans New Bank Opening Saturday, May 26

First Security Bank opens the doors of its new bank building in Kendrick Saturday, and visitors to the bank will have a variety of interesting things to see and do, reports manager Jim Hoogland.

Highlights of the open house, scheduled between 1 and 4 p.m., will include a money-estimating contest with valuable merchandise prizes, a coin collection, demonstrations of modern banking machinery in operation, and free souvenir gifts for all.

The grand opening is an extra-special event in this year's annual Locust Blossom Festival.

On hand for the opening will be a number of dignitaries, representing both the community and the banking industry. Directors of First Security Bank of Idaho, N.A., from throughout the state will be paying a visit to Kendrick, among them, Ralph J. Comstock, Jr., Boise, president of the state wide banking organization.

Also present will be Mayor Robert E. Watts, Kendrick, and Kendrick city councilmen; Darrel Brocke, John Deobald, and Wayne G. Harris, City of Juliaetta officials also in attendance will be: Mayor Harold S. Freeman, and city councilmen Bruce Sherman, Richard Groseclose, Fred Clemenhagen and Douglas Johns.

All members of the First Security staff will be on hand throughout the open house to greet customers and friends, including Mr. Hoogland, assistant manager, James W. Floras; secretary, Lois D. Snyder; senior P and R teller, Marjorie F. Eldridge; P and R teller, Leola D. Mielke; senior bookkeeper, Ann K. Souders, and regular bookkeeper, Carolyn Brown.

The new building will be open for business following the Memorial Day holiday on Tuesday.

The history of First Security Bank in Kendrick goes way back to September 3, 1907, when E. P. Atchinson, John P. Vollmer and U.S.G. Evans were granted a state charter for the Farmers Bank and Trust Company.

In December 1913, the directors of the bank changed the name to simply—Farmers Bank. Although continuity was maintained, a new charter was obtained and the directors were re-elected.

The bank's initial capital was \$25,000 divided into 25 shares. The early years must have been prosperous, because the directors were able to declare an 8 per cent dividend the first year. A permanent building was then constructed for the bank.

When John P. Vollmer died in 1917 his son-in-law, Arthur E. Clarke, became president of the Farmers Bank. Clarke operated the bank as one of his growing chain in the northern part of Idaho. The Clarke people became discouraged when they received strengthened competition from a merged bank and the depression set in.

In October 1935, this group sold 90 per cent of the bank's stock to Herman Meyer and eighteen other local businessmen. In 1939, Meyer and his associates tried to buy their competitor, the Kendrick State Bank.

After polling the local merchants it was decided to merge the two banks. The merged banks prospered and dividends were as high as 20 per cent and even 30 per cent. In 1962, the undivided profit account reached \$187,545.

When Meyer died in 1963, his 244 shares were sold and in 1964 the Board of Directors decided to sell the bank.

On August 27, 1964, this newspaper announced that the bank was sold to First Security for a "whopping \$576,000" and became First Security's ninetieth office.

Everybody is invited to celebrate the grand opening of the new banking office in Kendrick, Saturday, May 26 from 1 to 4 p.m., according to bank officials.

The new Kendrick office of First Security Bank is a completely full-service bank that features the convenience of drive-in banking and the extra services of night depository drop, safe deposit facilities and free parking.

The latest innovations in the banking industry in both design and technology were drawn into the architectural plans by Hummel, Hummel, John and Shawver of Boise, according to James Hoogland, Jr., bank manager.

Hours for the new bank—beginning Tuesday, May 26—will be 9:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday and 9:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Friday. Drive-in banking hours are 9:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on all banking days.

"We are very happy to have the bank so close to being completed," said Mr. Hoogland. "And, we hope everybody will come to our open house, Saturday, May 26 from 1 to 4 p.m."

**Kendrick Pool Aims For Early June Opening**

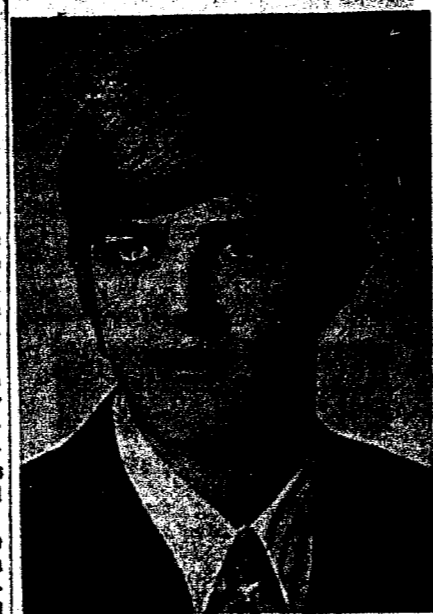

### Ron McCartney Latest KHS Teacher To Resign

Ron McCartney, science teacher at Kendrick High School for the past several years, informed the district that he will not be returning next fall, Supt. Don Blakeley informed the Gazette this week. This brings the total of teachers leaving the district to nine, thus far, the administrator said. In addition there are two other instructors who are also considering other positions.

"What's the problem? Basically it's money, says Supt. Blakeley, although some teachers have left because their husbands have completed schooling and others are just leaving the teaching profession.

The district has had good teachers, as the state audit and the accomplishments of the students bear out. That's where the problem begins, according to the superintendent. Good teachers get better offers from other schools. "The districts around us all have larger salary schedule," he said, "we can't blame the teachers... we just can't compete, money-wise, with the budget we have.

"We've been lucky so far to get good replacements," Mr. Blakeley continued, "but now we've exhausted all efforts for replacements within the area and now we're going to be forced to go looking for teachers out-of-state."

### August W. Brammer, 89, Claimed May 16

August W. Brammer, 89, a longtime resident of Cameron, died Wednesday, May 16, at 12:22 a.m. at St. Joseph's Hospital of infirmities of age. He had been ill for the past week.



He had lived at Cameron, in northern Nez Perce County, since 1918. He was a carpenter and, prior to his retirement in 1966, had been postmaster there for 28 years.

Born Oct. 24, 1883, at Hanover, Kan., he was the son of Henry and Katherine Brammer. As a child he lived in Kansas before moving to Cameron. He married Wanda L. Brunick there on Oct. 10, 1923. She survives at the family home. Brammer was a lifelong member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

Editor:

Wouldn't it have been nice if the chairman of district 283 school board had tried to explain the school budget before the election instead of after the election?

I am sure he would have aroused many more questions.

When I explained the school budget I said we had an approved budget of \$266,000 last year and a \$308,000 one for next year. When you deduct \$266,000 from \$308,000 the answer is \$42,000 increase in this year's budget. Very simple arithmetic isn't it?

As I read Mr. Park's explanation, he says the \$266,000 budget we approved for last year was not our expended budget of \$273,000. After we adopted the \$273,000 budget we decided to overspend that by \$12,000 for an added teacher and an aide. So since we overspent our last year's budget but it shows up as an increase in this year's budget you cannot count it as an increase this year because we already spent it last year without telling the people.

How does that explanation grab you for confusion?

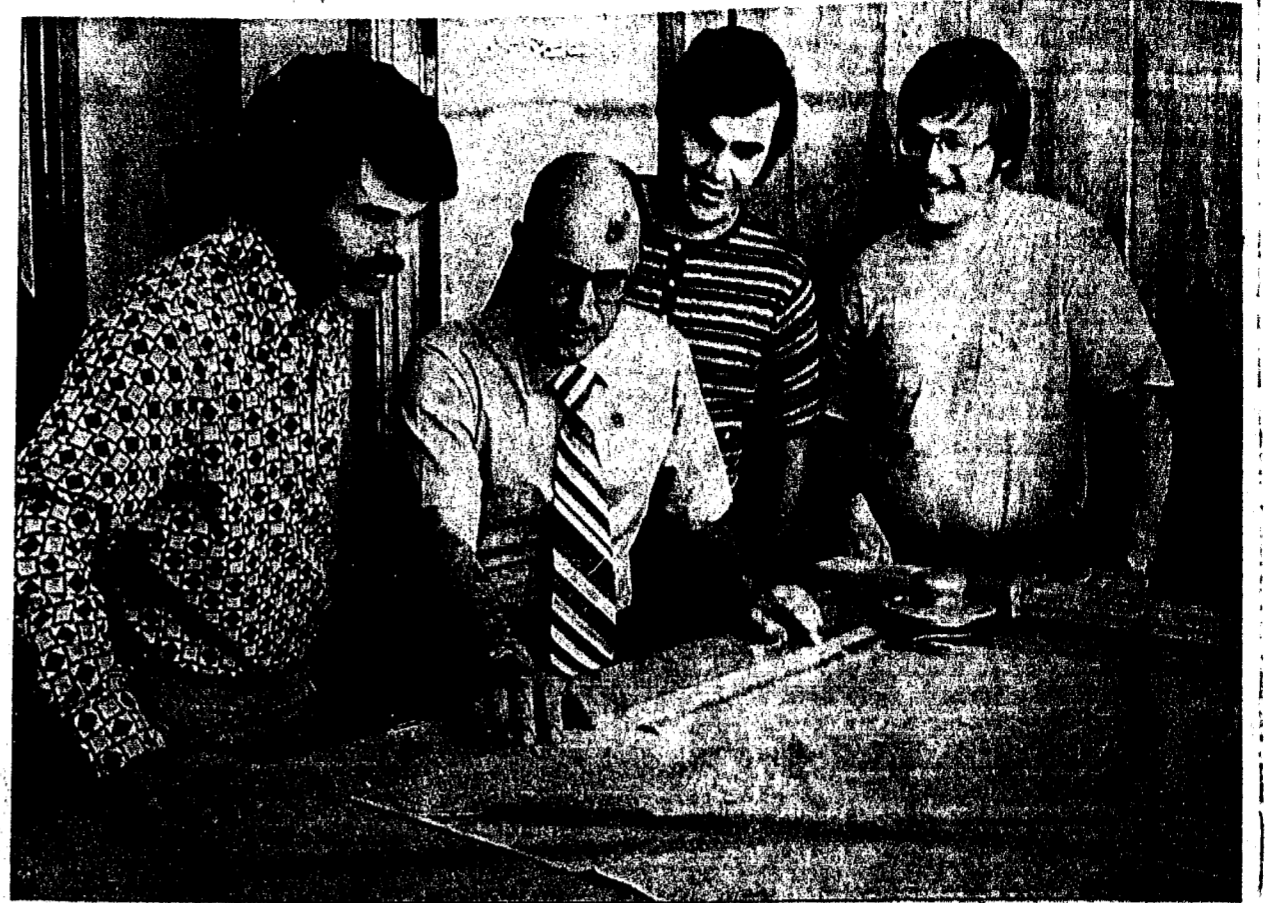

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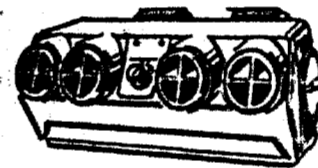

## IDAHO PARENTS ADVISED OF PLAYGROUND HAZARDS

"London Bridge is Falling Down" is a game children might be playing in public and backyard playgrounds throughout Idaho says the Insurance Information Institute. And now is the time to make sure playground equipment won't fall and injure children.

Hazards—many of which are around playgrounds—cripple some 40,000 to 50,000 boys and girls annually across the nation and kill more children than the 6 most deadly childhood diseases.

Playground equipment is especially hazardous at this time of year after having weathered the rain and wind of winter and early spring days. Parents would do well to check backyard playground apparatus for such defects as rusted-through supports and rotted-out legs. A neglected piece of apparatus can mean not only a hazard to a neighbor child but also a liability to the owner.

Also many of the younger tots are venturing to playgrounds for the first time and should be taught or reminded of proper use of playground equipment, especially for the public playgrounds where parents are often not present to supervise the play.

The Institute offers these suggestions for backyard playgrounds:

\* Sandboxes should be checked regularly for broken glass or sharp objects. Also the frame should be inspected for protruding nails, screws or splinters.

\* The height of ladders, bars and rings should be adjusted to the child's height. Children should not be allowed to use boxes as take-off boards or to place their heads or feet thru rings.

\* Sand or sawdust should be placed at the bottom of the slides. Children should be taught not to crawl up slides or slide down backwards.

\* Teeter-totter fulcrums should be shielded so that children cannot catch

fingers. Blocks should be placed under the seat so that the kids cannot get their hands or feet under the board.

\* Swing frames should be sturdied with anchored legs while the swing should be checked for defective seats, boards chains, or ropes and hooks. Children should be instructed not to climb onto swings which are too high for them to jump from swings or to hold other children on their laps while swinging. They should also be taught to stay clear of swings in use or motion.

Geighards said there was a very good carry over of water in most Gem State reservoirs so that fish populations should be at a good level for the beginning of the season. He also reported that the busy schedule of hatchery fish stocking is being met. Some waters that were not even reachable due to high water and wet roads early last spring are being planted on time this year.

It was also pointed out by Geighard that because the waters will be clearer sooner this year, sunlight will penetrate better to help produce a relative abundance of plankton. This means good production of natural fish foods that will in turn, result in very good growth for the fish.

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**General Fishing Season Opens Saturday, May 25 In Idaho; Prospects Said To Be Good**

MAY 26 IS A BIG DAY FOR IDAHO. Not only is it the beginning of the long Memorial Day weekend, but it is also the general opening for fishing season throughout the state. Although the lowland lakes and some streams opened in the Clearwater Region on April 28, the major part of the area will be open to fishing on the May date.

As a bonus for those in the area, the Clearwater River opens to fishing for chinook salmon for the first time in many years. This season is open from May 26 to June 30, 1973 for salmon and steelhead on the Clearwater River and the Middle Fork of the Clearwater. The major fishing will be on salmon, but there will be some steelhead in the area, due to the surplus of adult steelhead put back into the river system from Dworshak National Fish Hatchery. Anglers going out for steelhead and salmon should read the 1973 fishing seasons and regulations closely to make sure they are fishing in open waters. Also, a 1973 salmon permit and/or a steelhead permit is required before fishing for these species.

All anglers must have a 1973 fishing license or combination hunting and fishing license before going out on opening day. Pick up a copy of the 1973 regulations when you get your license and go over it carefully to check the areas you wish to fish in.

The regulations are broken down into several sections. A map of the state divided into six areas and a page of general information and general regulations form the front and back of the folder. Inside is a breakdown of the six areas in the state. First is listed the general season for 1973, which is May 26 to November 30. Then the exceptions to the general season are listed. These streams and lakes are in alphabetical order. If a stream has a special season or condition, it is listed here. Next is a list of all waters open to year-round fishing; then waters closed to all fishing; if a body of water or stream is not listed in one of these three categories, then it is open to general fishing season—May 26 to November 30, 1973.

Most of the mountain lakes in the region are open on the general season. However, access to these lakes may be blocked due to snow and/or bad road conditions; or they may be ice-covered on the opening date. Because of the mild winter most of the back country areas will probably open a couple of weeks ahead of last year for travel; however, many still will be blocked to vehicle traffic until about the first week in July.

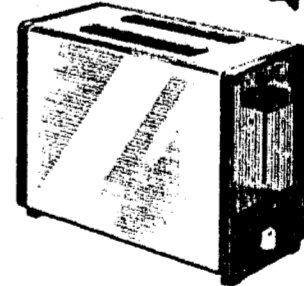
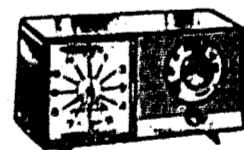
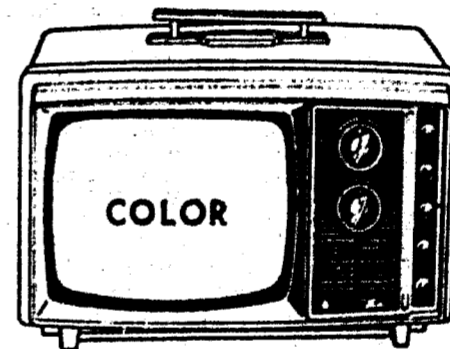

Current claims now total 281 in comparison to 326 last week and 365 during the same period a year ago. 18 new claims were filed during the week. Moscow area residents receiving jobless pay total 138 in addition to six in Genesee, 80 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, 9 in Kendrick and 48 in Potlatch.

During the past week, 14 area workers were placed on jobs. Twenty-four new jobs were received and at the close of the week there were 35 openings available. Current listings include domestic workers, restaurants workers, secretaries, office workers, bookkeepers, circle sawyer, faller, and mechanics. Many area youth are contacting the Department of Employment for summer jobs and employers are urged to contact the office if they have summer positions available.
