Queen Float Takes Festival Parade Honors . . .



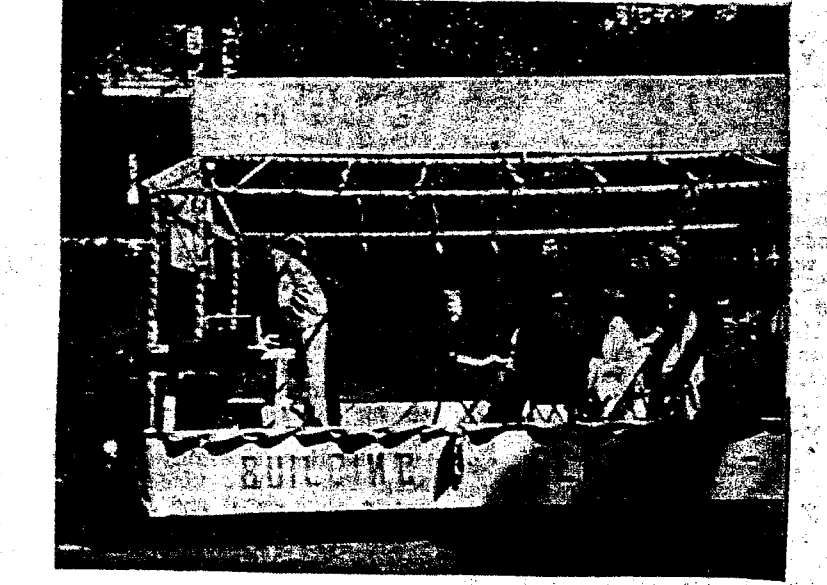

WRINKLE PROBLEMS?

If your easy-care garments don't always come out of your dryer looking wrinkle-free perhaps you're not drying them correctly suggests Joanne Anderson, Extension Home Economist, U. of I. Cooperative Extension Service.

For instance when you dry only one or two items at a time, are you baffled by the resulting wrinkles? Add one or two dry terry towels to the load, and see what a difference it makes! Terry towels prevent bunching and absorb moisture.

Non-permanent press sheets that wrinkle up in your dryer and probably being over-dried. Try removing them from the dryer while they

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FIELD CARE OF FISH

The main thing in field care of fish is to keep them cool and dry. Bacteria, the principal agent of meat and fish spoilage, requires moisture and warmth. Thus fish should be killed as soon as caught and cleaned at once. Remove entrails and gills and scrape out kidney tissue along the backbone. Fish need washing only just prior to cooking.

If the fish must be kept several days without refrigeration, hang out at night so that fish will cool, dry and "glaze." Wrap in newspapers during daytime hours and then in blankets or down sleeping bag to insulate against heat and keep out flies.

Some anglers dry fish overnight, then place in plastic bags and seal the ends with rubber bands. These are wrapped in wet burlap bags. Plastic bags keep fish dry and evaporation from the wet sack will keep them cool (fish in plastic bags should not touch one another).

CONTROLLED HUNT DATE GETS MACHINE BILLING

Sportsmen are reminded that drastic changes have been made by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission in controlled hunt procedures, including completely automatic machine billing notices to winners of permits within a few days of the drawing, possibly as early as the second day.

Applications for controlled big game hunts must be received at the Idaho Fish and Game Department headquarters office in Boise no later than 5:00 p. m., July 2, 1973, or postmarked by that date in order to qualify. According to A. Kay Belnap, chief of business administration, July 1 has been established by the commission as the annual deadline for receiving controlled hunt applications. Since July 1 falls on Sunday, applications will be accepted in Boise, on July 2.

Applications and other controlled hunt materials will be available about June 10 from license vendors, regional offices and department headquarters in Boise Belnap said.

Upon notification that he was successful in a drawing, any such applicant must transmit by return mail, a certified check, cashier's check or money order in the appropriate amount for his permit and tag. Permits for controlled hunts then will be issued.

Drawings will be held August 1, at 9:00 a. m. for all controlled hunts in the computer room of the Len B. Jordan office building, 650 West State Street, Boise, Idaho. Right after the drawing lists of the lucky winners will be posted in the Fish and Game Headquarters office, 600 S. Walnut Boise.

Instead of second drawings as in the past, each applicant may have 2 choices for hunts of the same species. If unsuccessful in the first choice drawing, the application will automatically be entered into the second choice drawing, provided it has not been filled with first choice applicants. (A second choice is not required).

Anyone who is drawn in any controlled hunt (except deer) must wait two years to be eligible to reapply for that species again. This has been the case in the past for elk and antelope. Now the new rules apply to moose, mountain goat and bighorn sheep, as well as elk and antelope. Once a permittee has killed a moose or a bighorn sheep, however, he is not eligible ever to apply again for that species.

Home Cookin'...

Mrs. Andrew Zenner recently received the following recipes from her daughter Denise (Mrs. Galen Driesel) and she has generously shared them with us. Mrs. Zenner reminds us these are two separate bread recipes. They are real time savers for those wanting fresh baked bread without taking a half day spent in preparation and baking time.

2 HOUR WHEAT & WHITE BREAD

This bread rises only in pans (Work in this order so bread will not cool too much).

3 Tbs. Fleischmans yeast (2 lb. can, not pk).
Dissolve in 1/2 c. warm water and 1/2 t. sugar (set aside).

Mix Well:
5 c. whole wheat flour
3/4 c. dry milk or 1 1/4 c. instant
6 Tbs. sugar
2 Tbs. salt

5 c. hottest tap water
6 Tbs. melted shortening
Stir in above ingredients—add dissolved yeast. Stir well—Mixmaster even better.

6 1/2 c. white flour
(This amount may vary with altitude. Dough should be slightly sticky. Dry dough makes dry bread.)

Put 5 1/2 c. in mixture, stir well. Put other 1 c. of flour on board. Scrape the mixture onto flour. Knead until flour is used up—about 3 minutes. Work fast to keep dough as hot as possible (If 100 per cent whole wheat, use 6 c. whole wheat flour instead of 6 1/2 c. white).

IMPORTANT: DO NOT let rise before putting into pans.
Make round balls 1/2 size of bake pan. Be sure all grease and flour are removed from hands and board.

Roll out with rolling pin, turn over, ease dough from board with other hand if it sticks (Do Not Roll again). Roll up like for cinnamon roll, pinch edges and ends together. Roll all loaves before greasing.

Grease each loaf well all around; place in pans and let rise double in bulk.

Put in preheated over 450 degree, turn down immediately to 350d. Bake about 25 minutes for a No. 2 or 45 minutes for a No. 5 pan or 30 minutes for the tiny tiny pan. (Climate may vary or altitude).

You can tell if your oven temperature is not accurate or if altitude makes a difference by the color of the bread. If a dark brown, oven is too hot. If still white oven is under hot. Bread will crumble if baked too long. Bread will separate if oil or flour is used on board or hand when rolling out for loaf.

Because it takes less time to cook some things at lower climate, you may not need to bake as long. You will have to experiment.

HONEY SCONES
2 pkgs. yeast
1 cup scalded milk
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 cup warm water
1/4 cup honey
2 eggs
2 3/4 cup flour

Soften yeast in warm water (110d). Combine milk, honey, butter and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 1 cup flour. Beat well. Add softened yeast and eggs to dough beating well. Add remaining flour to make soft dough. Knead about 10 minutes on floury board. (Don't knead in more flour than necessary). Roll dough 1/2" thick and cut into 2" squares. Let rise till very light, about 30 minutes.

Brown in hot fat. Drain and serve with honey butter.

Honey Butter
1 cube butter or margarine; 2 T. soft honey. Whip 5 min. with mixer.

CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY ACT, IS IMPORTANT NEW LAW

The Consumer Product Safety Act, signed into law by President Nixon in October, 1972, was the single most important consumer protection measure passed in the 92nd Congress, reports Mrs. Ruth Spidahl, state home economic leader, U. of I.

The Act established an independent Consumer Product Safety Commission which will regulate a wide-variety of consumer products, including toys and thousands of household products.

Some items not covered are motor vehicles, pesticides—aircraft—fire-arms—boats and tobacco products. Regulation of these items and food, cosmetics, medical devices and a limited number of other products are already regulated by other agencies.

Regulation of consumer household products really began in 1960 with passage of the Federal Hazardous Substance Act. This required that dangerous household product containers be conspicuously labeled. A 1966 amendment called the Child Protection and Toy Safety Act, expanded the law to cover electrical, thermal, and mechanical hazards in toys and other articles intended for child use.

In 1970 the Poison Prevention Packaging Act was another addition to Food and Drug Administration responsibilities.

Actually the need for the new law to protect consumers from unsafe products resulted from millions of injuries and deaths recorded each year from household products, Mrs. Spidahl says.

Congress, in passing this legislation, was very specific in the purposes of this act, which are to: protect the public against injuries associated with consumer products, assist consumers in evaluating comparative safety of products, develop uniform standards for consumer products, minimize conflicting state and local regulations, and promote research and investigations into the causes and the prevention of product-related deaths, illness and injuries.

Funding has been authorized for the Consumer Product Safety Commission through 1975. We as consumers, should all soon be able to relate to some of the Commission's responsibilities.

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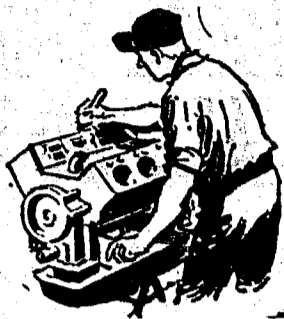
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POWER WITHOUT POLLUTION

Pollution is the price our society pays for the fuel of progress. But there are untapped sources of energy that would not despoil our air.

Nuclear power may solve our energy needs and pollution problems. Many experts predict it will. Others disagree. A staff report to the Public Service Commission in New York recently warned that nuclear energy cannot solve the power crisis swiftly and safely. The commission urged the development of nonatomic sources. One source of energy suggested was coal gasification. Coal is dwindling as a source of power now because it creates so much pollution. But polluting gases can be extracted from the burning coals in special refining plants. Then the gas can be burned in steam generating plants that spew little pollution.

Still a nother source of energy is advocated by former Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel. He has proposed that the government invest \$685 million in study ways to develop geothermal energy. This energy comes from tapping the heat of the earth's core to make steam to run electric power plants.

The most visible forms of geothermal energy are geysers, hot springs, and volcanoes. Much larger reserves lie in great underground regions of hot dry rocks and volcanic molten rock. If development begins soon, Mr. Hickel predicts that in another 25 years this form of energy could supply even more power than is produced by the entire electric power system in the United States. Developing ways to provide power without pollution is an overriding

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THE REVENGE OF THE RED MAN

The American Indians wrecked by the white man are having the last laugh in the Great Boyon.

Tobacco is the Indian revenge. Before Columbus, tobacco was unknown to the white man. But explorers soon saw that Indians smoked the leaf in a Y-shaped pipe called a tabaco. Each end of the double-forked pipe was inserted into a nostril. In some places the Indians smoked tobacco leaves rolled with husks of corn. The white man sampled the stuff, liked it, and thereby put a curse on coming generations.

The Indians smoked for ceremonial purposes and a symbol of good will. They also believed that tobacco had medicinal values. It was, in fact, primarily for this reason that explorers carried the weed back to Europe. The brainwash took so well that by the middle of the seventeenth century a London doctor wrote a whole book on the "Wonderful Virtues of Tobacco." The overzealous physician recommended a drop of tobacco juice in each ear to cure deafness, a green tobacco leaf flat on the head to cure headache, and a tobacco leaf tied over a tooth to cure toothache. For a cough, he advised boiling tobacco leaves, shaking the syrup and putting the mixture in the stomach.

Doctors have learned a lot more about the effects of tobacco over the last three centuries. Now they know that smoking is a leading cause of emphysema chronic bronchitis, lung cancer, coronary heart disease, and other diseases. But in the intervening centuries, smoking has spread around the world. And there are still 45 million Americans who smoke cigarettes.

* Next, add leftover meat (or luncheon meat) then one or more vegetables for color, texture and nutritive value.

* Top your casserole with some cheese, crushed potato chips, buttered bread crumbs or herbs and other seasonings to transform the dish into a delightful delicacy. And, you'll have a tasty casserole for around 14c per

serving! Another penny saver: Give second thoughts to food before you toss it away. Save it! Then see how ingenious and creative you can be in using things like left-over gravies, juices from meats, vegetables and fruits. You'll be surprised how fast usable amounts build up.

Gravies make fine additions to soups, stews and sauces. Fruit pulces turn into sauces for ice cream, cake or a glaze for ham. It's surprising what can happen to "nothings." And it's surprising, too, how these "nothings" can stretch the food budget.
