

Blindness No Handicap In Hospital Darkroom For Former Juliaetta Resident

Mrs. Ruth Shove, 109 East Bannock, works eight hours daily in the dark—in fact, double darkness.

For 13 months, Mrs. Shove has been a darkroom technician in the Department of Radiology at St. Luke's Hospital. And this accounts for the first stage of darkness in which she works. But Mrs. Shove also is legally blind.

How can she operate as a darkroom technician under such circumstances?

"It's easy now," she explained, "because of the automatic processor. But I also can develop by running the film through the wet process. I depend on setting a timer aid and listening for the bell to tell me when to remove the film from the developer to the quick rinse, to the fix, and then to the final wash. In case of emergency, I will still develop by the wet process."

Mrs. Shove explained that although the automatic process is not difficult, "We still work hard, because we are on our feet practically the whole eight hours and we have to work fast because of the large number of X-rays that have to be processed each day."

"I have always kept up my home and done everything anyone else has done," she added. "I like to cook. I've been active in church work. And now I'm grandmother to an eight-month-old baby girl."

For Mrs. Shove working is a necessity as it is for most persons. But she has other objectives in her "extra curricular activities."

As president of The National Federation of the Blind of Idaho she continuously promotes equality, opportunity and security for blind individuals in the state.

"We attain quality through our programs of public education, calling attention to the basic normality of blind persons," Mrs. Shove said. "By establishing policies in law which recognize the ability of the blind to compete on equal terms with their sighted neighbors we help insure these rights."

Mrs. Shove said it was "our organization that went to state legislators to get the Commission for the Blind established in Idaho. This past year we were influential in getting the Randolph-Shepherd Act passed, which provides that blind persons be given the first opportunity to operate vending machines or cafeterias in state and federal office buildings."

"We feel with proper training, we have the social abilities and capabilities to do any kind of work"

1.73 Inches Rainfall During Month of May

Identical 1.73 inches of moisture were recorded by farmers in Genesee and up on American Ridge for the month of May, 1973. John Luedke and Dick Bencoter reported this week.

This was well below the amount of rain received in May of last year, said Mr. Luedke. In 1972 there was a total of 2.33 inches of moisture during May.

This month's figures bring the total moisture in 1973 to 6.79 inches in the Genesee area, less than half that of last year when the total at this time was 14.15 inches.

Horton Thompson, 86, Former Resident, Passes

Horton F. Thompson, 86, former Kendrick resident, of 1230 Monitor, died early Thursday morning, May 31, in a Wenatchee nursing home.

He was born on Dec. 6, 1886, at Horton, Kan., and was married to Rachel A. White in Delphos, Kan., on June 30, 1915. He owned and operated the Phoenix Hotel in Sanford, Iowa, then farmed briefly, later owning and operating a grocery store in Sibley, Iowa. He farmed for a number of years in Horton, Kan., and during the war years was employed in ordnance work. Following the war he purchased a poultry ranch, which he operated until his wife's death in 1949, when he moved to Kendrick, Idaho. He later moved to Arco, Idaho, where he worked in the forest industry. Returning to Kendrick, he was a night watchman for Mead & Howard Lumber Co. for eight years. He returned to Wenatchee in 1963.

Mr. Thompson was a member of the Horton Christian Church, Horton Masonic Lodge, and the Valley Church Bowling League.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Jasper (Laura) Nutting, Wenatchee; Mrs. Helen M. Jones, Crescent City, Calif.; seven grandchildren and five great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his wife and one daughter.

A graveside service was conducted Tuesday, June 5, at 1:00 p.m. at the Juliaetta Cemetery with the Rev. Norman Stueckle of the First Church of the Nazarene of Wenatchee officiating. Betts Funeral Home of Wenatchee was in charge of arrangements.

EARLY ALFALFA CUTTING REDUCES PHEASANT CROP

The Idaho Fish and Game Department today urged farmers to delay the first cutting of alfalfa hay when ever possible as a means of boosting this year's pheasant crop.

"Every day of delay beyond Memorial Day increases the potential bird crop" says Dick Norrell, state bird supervisor. "Cutting hay just before hen pheasants bring off broods of chick is responsible for one of the largest losses we take."

"It is unfortunate that the peak of pheasant hatching coincides with the first cutting of hay," Norrell stated. "Often just a day or two lag in mowing will allow a considerable number of additional nests to produce young."

Four basic techniques are used to obtain data to manage pheasants. These are: winter sex ratio counts, crowing count routes conducted in April and May, brood counts during the summer and the collection of harvest data at checking stations and from hunter questionnaires.

All of this information is compiled and the results are used as a basis for establishing fall hunting seasons.

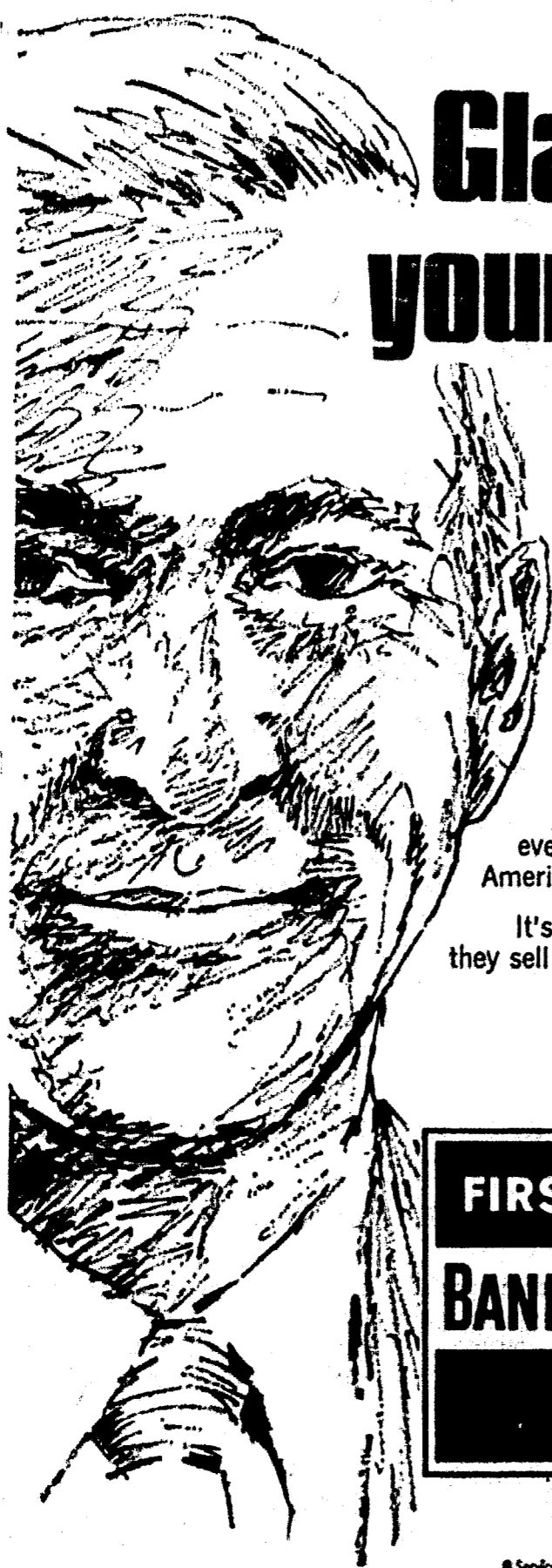

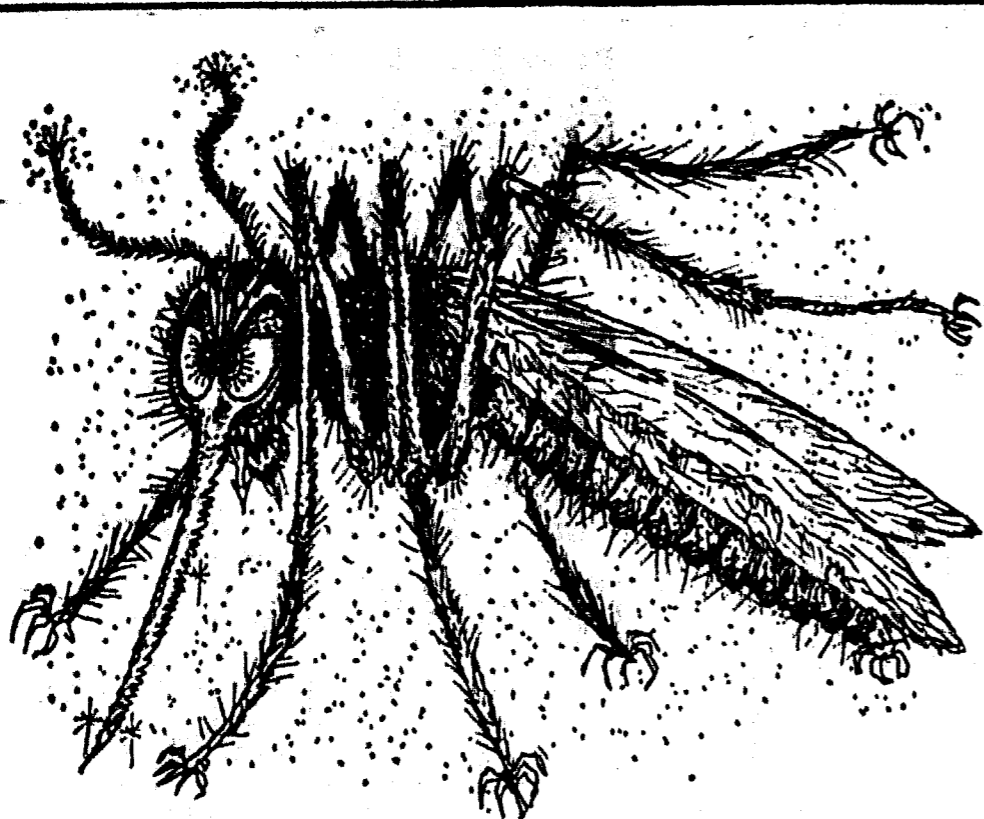

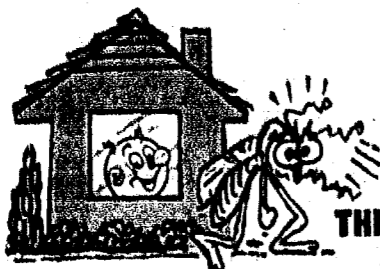

Job Placements Up Slightly In County

Placement of job seekers crept upward slightly in the Moscow area last week. Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment reported that his office found work for 9 workers during the past week. During the previous week the number so served was only 8. A year ago the total was 25. At the end of the week there were still 33 jobs available throughout the county. Secretaries (with shorthand) are needed, as well as a variety of other workers. Laundry workers are also in demand currently.

Resumption of work in the area's forests reduced the number of persons seeking jobless pay during the week, Hartstein also reported. He said that the total number of persons currently seeking benefits dropped from 297 to 282 during the past week. The number of persons filing new claims fell to 33 from the previous week's 37. Most of those persons filing new claims fell to 33 from the previous week's 57. Most of those persons filing new claims both weeks were either employees or students at the University of Idaho. Currently there are 156 persons filing claims from the immediate Moscow area, down slightly from the 163 of the previous week, but up from last year's 140. This reflects the increased number of school connected workers filing claims now. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the current total is 64, down from last week's 75, and from last year's 105. The situation is about the same as the Pottlatch area, where the number of benefit seekers declined from 47 to 33, and was less than half of last year's 69. The return of workers to the lumber industry caused the decline throughout the balance of the county. At Genesee there are now 4 persons seeking benefits, last week 6 and last year 10. In the Kendrick area the total is now 5, a week ago 6 and a year ago 7. Hartstein indicated that the curtailment of the mill operations by the Pottlatch Corp, at their Pottlatch operation may swell the ranks of the unemployed next week.

Just a note in response to Werner Brammer's letter to the editor in the May 24 issue of the Gazette-News. The \$12,000 which Mr. Brammer cites as an addition to the Kendrick school district budget for a teacher and aide, is actually part of a state supported excess cost special education program which is operated in cooperation with the Whitepine and Western Benewah school districts as part of an intermediate service organization for the education of exceptional children, called the Northern Idaho Multidistrict. These funds are specifically earmarked for special education and used only for that purpose.

Special education programs are usually authorized by the Idaho State department of education at the end of the year and operate on anticipated income which is guaranteed by the state through the regular foundation program which is funded on a current fiscal basis. New programs are normally initiated during the summer months and often are begun at mid-year if required in response to the diagnosed needs of exceptional children in local school districts.

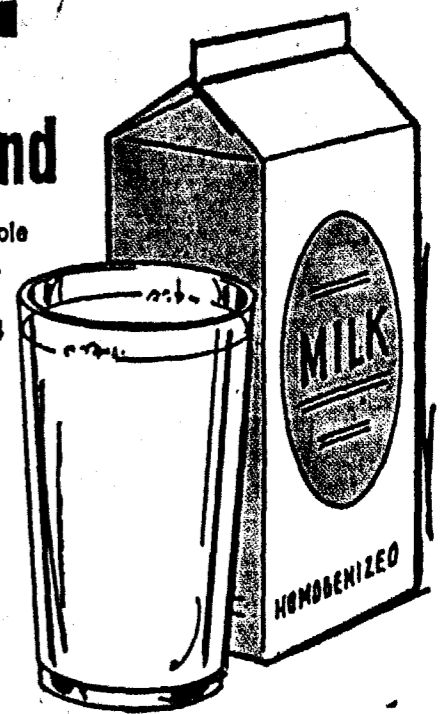

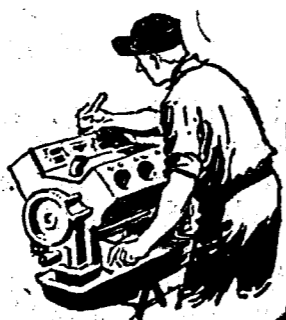

COUGHING UP

When you breathe normally, air goes through your windpipe at a speed of 10 m lies an hour. When you cough, you whip up hurricane wind speeds.

The blast of air is created in milliseconds in your windpipe by a rapid increase in pressure built up by powerful chest muscles. As the cough starts, your windpipe contracts one 1/7 its usual size. The amount of air in the windpipe increases 7 times. Then out comes the cough. At a speed of almost 500 m lies an hour.

The cough is a sign of distress, and an attempt to relieve the distress. Coughing is one way the respiratory system tries to get rid of excess mucus and irritants. But some coughs can be useless because they do not clear out mucus and irritants. They only add to irritation.

The time of day you cough can be a clue to what's causing it. A smoker's cough which can develop into chronic bronchitis usually occurs most often in the morning to clear out excess secretions that accumulate during the night. Coughs caused by TB may also be troublesome in the morning. Coughs caused by sinus conditions, however, often happen most at night when a person is lying down.

Whenever it happens, a persistent cough requires medical attention and should not be suppressed with the aid of home remedies.

ACNE

Acne is not caused by a vitamin deficiency, reports the Idaho Medical Association.

There is no scientific evidence to support claims that Vitamin E is helpful for acne or for scar treatment. In fact there is no evidence to show that Vitamin E is helpful for any common skin problems.

If acne does not respond to routine skin care, such as frequent cleansing and use of nonprescription products, consult a physician for treatment.

There is no cure for acne but proper treatment can help minimize the severity of the condition and subsequent scarring.

How long can we keep America beautiful? And how?

Just to mention one pollution problem, solid waste is overwhelming us. Each year we throw away 71 billion cans. Think of it. And we dump 7 million cars and trucks not to mention TV sets, refrigerators and mountains of other hard-to-demolish products.

Where does it all go? Too often into open burning dumps that pollute the air. Or into incinerators, in large urban areas that are already overfilled. And these incinerators, according to the government's Environmental Protection Agency, are becoming increasingly expensive to equip and operate because sophisticated air pollution controls are now required.

Incinerators, in fact, can reduce or destroy only about 50 percent, by volume, of the average municipal solid waste. There is just too much to chew up. And landfills are too expensive in congested cities.

As a result, the EPA, is sponsoring work to develop a new process that converts solid waste to gas and molten slag. First, wastes are dumped into a large shaft furnace called a gasifier, where there is practically no oxygen. Wastes are exposed to blasts of air which have been heated to high temperatures by natural gas. The organic portions then begin to decompose and most of the waste turns into gases. These gases can be burned to make steam for power generation the slag can be used for building materials.

Pollution from the new system is expected to be one half that from usual incineration methods.

If America can find a way to dispose of its waste products and keep the air clean too, we may stay beautiful a while longer.

WORDS BACKWARDS

It is not uncommon for 4-year-olds to write letters or words backwards, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

It is not until late kindergarten or the first grade that one needs to be concerned about it.

Older children who continue the trait should be examined for possible visual-perceptual problems. This does not mean that the child has a visual problem or is brain damaged, but it may indicate that the brain does not properly interpret what the eye sees.

Statistics indicate that learning disabilities occur more frequently in premature children, full term babies with low birth weights and children born of mothers who had toxemia during pregnancy.

JEWELRY ALLERGIES

Irritated skin around a ring does not necessarily mean that one is allergic to jewelry, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Sterling silver and gold rings do not contain nickel, the usual cause of jewelry allergies.

Such problems are often caused by soap, detergent, and other cleansers or irritating materials trapped under the ring.

To avoid the problem, the ring can be removed when the hands are immersed in water for extended periods, such as when doing housework. Waterproof gloves may be worn, but they could present another problem. Moisture from perspiration cannot evaporate and is trapped inside the gloves where it can eventually irritate the skin.

One can wear thin cotton gloves under the rubber ones, but even then they should not be worn for more than 15 or 20 minutes at a time.


