

Weather Dampens Genesee's Community Day; Theresa Ison Chosen Jr. Miss

Cool temperatures and rain, varying from chilly drizzle to drenching downpour, swept across the crowds who came to Genesee last Saturday to take in the 15th annual Community Day celebration. An estimated 1,000 people came to town during the day. Despite the inclement weather, those who did stay, enjoyed the food and festivities.

Miss Theresa Ison, the pretty, dark-haired daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Gasaway, and a junior at Genesee High School, won the approval of the judges and the audience Friday night at the high school and was chosen as Genesee's Jr. Miss and Miss Genesee. Miss Ison

offered a humorous monologue as her talent portion of the pageant. Approximately 350 people filed through the serving line at the fire hall to be fed 140 pounds of sausage, 32 dozen eggs, plus many pounds of pancake batter, syrup, butter, coffee and milk.

The Bill Shirley family took first place in the children's parade with the Jess Johnson children winning second.

The Lutheran Church's entry was judged best in the main parade with the 4-H Club taking second and the queen float third.

Approximately 750 were fed at the evening barbecue, which had to be interrupted because of rain. The diners consumed 500 lbs. of rolled beef, 36 gallons of baked beans, 6 cases of cabbage and gallons of "trimmings."

The arts and craft display at the Legion building attracted many people who viewed local paintings, arts and crafts, hobbies, metal sculpture and old tools. Also on display was a quilt made in 1903 embroidered with the names of families belonging to St. Mary's Catholic parish.

In the basement of the Legion Building the Mariners Club held a carnival for children and on the streets there were square dancers and old-time fiddlers, but the fiddlers portion of the event was rained out.

Luther Parks Re-named School Board Chmn.; Learning Disability Program New

Luther Parks, Cameron area farmer, was re-named chairman of the Board of Trustees of Joint School District No. 283 at the reorganizational meeting of that board held Thursday evening June 14. Parks has been chairman during the past 1972-1973 school year.

Others elected were Douglas Harris, vice chairman; Ann Soudera, clerk, and A. O. Kanikkeberg, treasurer.

In other action that evening, the board voted to include a Learning Disabilities room in the curriculum at Juliaetta for the coming year which will serve grades 1 through 6. Negotiations are underway for a resource teacher holding a valid Exceptional Child certificate. Plans call

for an aide to assist the teacher at Juliaetta. Thus, the present aide at the high school level will be shifted to the elementary plant. Enrollment at Juliaetta is expected to be 18. The resource room at the high school will be continued and Shirley Heppner will again serve as teacher.

These special education classes are being financed by the State Dept. of Education and the district is reimbursed twice a year for salaries, supplies and any needed remodeling.

This program is known as the Northern Idaho Multi-District Learning Disabilities project. Presently Troy, Plummer, Kendrick, Bovill and DeSmet have resource teachers and classes. Lapwai is considering joining for 1973-74. The increase in expenses isn't costing district taxpayers anything extra and was not included in the projected 1973-74 budget due to needed extensive summer planning.

Supt. Don Blakeley reported all teaching vacancies filled with well-qualified people.

A revision of the administrative handbook is scheduled for July and August.

Regular school board trustee meetings will be held the second Monday in every month as of July, instead of the second Thursday as in the past. All trustee meetings are open to the public, according to Supt. Don Blakeley.

The superintendent was asked to contact the Glenn Utzman Accountant Agency of Moscow and make arrangements for auditing of all district and student body accounts after June 30. The legislative auditors pronounced all fiscal matters in good shape at Kendrick last April.

Charles S. Craig, 68, Victim of Cancer

Charles S. Craig, 68, 1515 15th Ave., Lewiston, died at 9 p.m. Thursday at St. Joseph's Hospital where he had been a patient the past three weeks. The retired Potlatch Corp. employee had had cancer since 1969.

Craig was born May 4, 1905, at Leland, Idaho, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Craig. He attended school and worked on a farm in the Leland area until 1938 when he married Leona Goffinet. They were separated in 1952.

In 1947 Craig moved to Lewiston and entered the life insurance business. In April, 1951, he went to work for Potlatch, beginning in the dress sheds where he cured lumber. He was transferred in 1968 to general office maintenance and held this position when he retired in 1970 after 19 years of service.

An avid fisherman and outdoorsman, Craig enjoyed being a member of the Kendrick Camp Karavan. He was also a member of the Leland Methodist Church.

Craig married Goldya Shawley on Dec. 23, 1954. Survivors include his widow at the family home; two sons, Darrel Craig, Switzerland, and Raymond Craig, San Diego, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. Anthony Grinolds, Spokane; three stepdaughters, Mrs. Wayne Huss-Royal City, Wash., Mrs. Walter King, Spokane, and Mrs. Ethelbert Scott, and two stepsons, Edgar L. Troy's Winery Is Idaho Newest Commercial Venture

In the northern part of the state, a little east of Moscow and the University of Idaho lies Troy, where Idaho's newest venture, a wine industry is under way.

This is the third winery the state has had over the years but the first and only one since prohibition. This made for lots of difficulties in getting laws made for a winery and it took a year and a half of red tape to get the licensing straightened out. Every time we made a move, new laws had to be made.

The winery started as a hobby in Bruce Higgin's basement, and grew into a bigger scale with the help of the Harvey Cooks and other friends. Higgins is the general manager of the Troy winery and is the assistant co-ordinator of research at the university and Cook is a truck driver for Forest Transport, so both are busy with their own jobs as well as working at the winery.

The right place had to be chosen first for the winery and after much looking we decided on Troy and chose an old store. After cleaning it up and putting in a floor drain and remodeling the front for a tasting room, we were all set to start. It was ideally big enough for all the equipment needed to make wine and the temperature was easy to maintain. The people in Troy have been receptive to the idea of a winery here and keep looking in on the progress.

The first batch of grapes to be crushed was Chelois, from the Mark Howell vineyards of Parma, Idaho,

in the summer of 1971. We didn't have a stemmer crusher then so it was all done by hand, 12 tons of it, and crushed in an old timer with a quarter horse motor. We were helped by our children and friends and this was a long, tiring process.

The crushed grapes go into stainless steel tanks and tested for sugar and yeast content. The natural yeast is killed by sodium dioxide and inoculated with special wine making yeast. This primary fermentation is allowed to go on until the alcohol content is 12 per cent, then stopped. During fermentation the crushed grapes are punched down to keep the batch working and so no crust will form on top. Next the juice is drained off and the must (grape skins and pulp) is pressed through a press. The red wines get their color from the grape skins and the white wines get theirs from white grapes but the juice is taken from the tanks before they get any color from the skins.

From the press the juice is used and the lees or remaining skins, is used for lawns or gardens for fertilizer, so there is no waste or pollution from a winery.

The wine is then put in 50 gallon barrels where more fermentation takes place, then the barrels are racked. Here the wine rests and the lees settle to the bottom, then the wine is transferred again. The barrels are topped or filled every week to keep out any air. Temperature is kept at a constant 60 degrees and the wine breaths through

the oak in the barrels.

There are several kinds of wine now aging at the Troy Winery including the dry, red Chelois, some Cabernet Sauvignon, and Zinfandel. The Chelois will be ready to bottle this fall after aging two years. It will be in special commemorative bottles of porcelain shaped like the state of Idaho. There will be a limited number of 5,000 of these and the mold will be broken, and these bottles will be a collector's item. A special certificate is given with each order and the name registered in the wine cellar records. The winery is preselling these inaugural bottles and taking orders now.

Higgins and Cook, under the name of Idaho Wine and Grape Growers, have the only importer distributor license in the state for wine and are supplying the northern part of Idaho with three premium wines from California, which are Cannonau, Beringer, and San Martin. These can be sampled in the Vine Sellar tasting room at the winery in Troy six days a week from 10:00 - 5:00. Ours will be of the same fine quality as these fine wines.

Wine is big business now in the whole United States and we would like to see Idaho become a fine wine state, with its own style and unique wine. In a few years we hope you see Juliaetta Chateau wines from the Troy, Idaho Winery in your favorite stores, and new tasting rooms in all parts of the state.

Cook at 300 degrees until hamburger is done. Drain and cool. Add 3 hard boiled eggs (chopped);
3 dill pickles (chopped fine)
1 cup celery (diced fine)
1/2 cup sweet pickles
1/2 cup ketchup
1 1/2 cups American cheese (cut up)
Moisten with 1/2 to 3/4 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise.
Stuff 12 hamburger buns.
Wrap in foil. Heat about 1/2 hour in 300 degree oven.
Can be frozen. Remove from freezer 1 hour before heating.

1 lb. cheese
3 eggs (hard boiled)
1 green pepper (chopped)
1 onion (chopped)
1 small bottle green olives chopped
1 small can tomato sauce
1 dozen hard rolls
Grate cheese and add to chopped green pepper, onion and olives. Add tomato sauce. Cut off top of rolls and scrape out inside. Fill with mixture. Put on top and wrap in foil. Bake at 325 degrees.

Nonresident Game Licenses Half Sold

Sales of nonresident hunting and fishing combination licenses have reached the halfway point or the authorized total of 9,772 for 1973. This number is arrived at based upon 5 percent of the resident hunting license sales in 1971.

A 3-ounce cooked serving of hamburger or the same amount of tuna fish will easily give you one-third of the day's protein need. Based on U. S. average prices this amount of protein would cost you about 20 cents, says Joanne Anderson, extension home economist, U. of I. cooperative extension service.
 To buy the same amount of protein in bologna, you'll need the buy almost twice as much at a cost of about 45 cents. In frankfurters, 3/4

ply an equivalent amount.
 When you buy thin-sliced bacon in terms of equal protein, it will take from 8 to 10 slices at a cost of 45 cents.
 For about 6 cents you can get a good protein equivalent from 1 and one-third cups of cooked dry beans or split peas. To complete the protein requirement, however, you should also drink some milk with the beans or peas, or add a sprinkle of cheese, a bit of ham or other leftover meat, Mrs. Anderson adds.
