Many plants found in homes and gardens, as well as in the forests and fields of Idaho can mean serious illness or even death to an exploring child or an unsuspecting adult. According to John M. Kingsbury's book, Poisonous Plants of the United States and Canada, the plant may be as common as the Poinsetta in the living room, or the rhubarb in the garden, or it may be as unfamiliar as the Water Hemlock that is so common in the Idaho woods. Each year hundreds of people are needlessly poisoned through ignorance or careless ingestion of a toxic plant.

For example, Poinsetta can be fatal One leaf can kill a child.

Mistletoe berries are lethal. Both children and adults have died from eating them.

Rhubarb green leaf blades are fatal even though the stalks are edible. But the leaves of rhubarb either cooked or uncooked, can cause convulsions coma or death.

Kingsbury lists five more common house and garden plants that are toxc and should be advertised because hey produce nausea, vomiting, diarthea, and sometimes death. These are yacinth, narcissus, daffodil, amarylis autum nerocus, and Star-of-Beth-

With a little care and attention, even an exploring child can learn to recognize and avoid these common poisonous plants that are so common-

There are similar wild animal parks located in Dallas, Texas; Atlanta, Georgia; Los Angeles, Call-fornia; West Palm- Beach, Florida; New Orleans, Louisiana; St. Louis, Missouri; West Milford, New Jersey; San Diego, California; and Cincin-natti, Ohio. The Oregon World Wildlife Safari is rated the most attractive park, and the one with the greatest emphasis on education and research. There are also parks in Canada, England (three or four), Germany, Belgium, France, Spain. Italy and South Africa.

Dr. Eaton says construction costs in southern Oregon amounted to \$1.25 million, \$200,000 for animal purchases, \$4,000/month for feed and \$25,000/year for veterinary services. 



- 1 pound spaghetti, cooked and

drained In a skillet, brown the bacon lightly, pour off the fat. Add the oil butter, and ham. Saute 5 minutes, but do not let ingredients brown Remove from the heat and stir in Pour the cheese then the eggs. quickly over the hot spaghetti and mix thoroughly.

Trout ggs are from broodstock or purchased from private dealers. When

the eggs are eyed, they are relativ-ly tough and can be shipped to other hatcheries.

Development of the fish embryo depends largely on water temperature When an egg has hatched, the tiny fish is called an alevin until the yolk sack is absorbed and it becomes a fry. Over 250 mountain lakes of the 1,700 in Idaho are planted with fry each year.

Hatchery fish are fed a dry diet, which is well balanced with protein, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins A pelleted feed can be distributed by hand or by automatic feeder.
