Women Killed On Grade Sunday Night

A Lapwai woman was pronounced dead on arrival Sunday night at Tri-State Hospital after being thrown from a pickup truck on the Southwick Grade near Kendrick.

Darlene McConville, 34, Lapwai, was taken to the hospital by Kendrick ambulance and pronounced dead by Dr. C. S. English.

Mrs. McConville was driving a 1949 Chevrolet pickup truck down the grade between Kendrick and Southwick when the truck apparently lost its brakes, crashing into a guard rail and throwing Mrs. McConville onto some rocks, Nez Perce County sheriff's deputy Keith Hendricks said. He said the truck had no brakes at all when he investigated.

Two passengers in the truck were not injured seriously. They were her husband, Butch McConville, and a brother, Jasper Shipentower. The accident is still under investigation. The accident was reported at 9:31 p.m.

Steve Hoogland Leaves For Military Academy

Steve Hoogland, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hoogland, Jr., left Saturday by plane for West Point where he has received an appointment to become a cadet at the U. S. Military Academy. Steve, a May graduate of Kendrick High School, received his appointment to the academy from U. S. Representative Steve Symms.

Leaving Lewiston, he first flew to Salt Lake and then on to New York with another appointee from Reno, Nevada. In New York the two joined 500 other young men at the Picadilly Hotel. During the lay-over in New York City, Steve was able to do some sightseeing which included the Empire State Building, Statue of Liberty and Central Park, he reported to his parents in a telephone conversation.

From New York City, the Kendrick youth was one of 1400 other appointees to make a three-hour trip to the academy where he is now undergoing a period of testing and examination.

Only One Fire This Season In Kendrick District; Danger Level Increasing

Only one small grass fire has been reported thus far this season in the Kendrick Fire Protective District, said Fire Warden Richard Benjamin Tuesday morning, but he added that increasing temperatures and low humidity have pushed the Fire Index to "very high" and said unless rain falls the index will soon be at the critical level.

The fire last week was below Jullaetta and burned approximately one-fourth of an acre before the

crews extinguished it. Apparently the fire was started by a passing train.

Benjamin said he had dispatched his nine-man crew and one pumper truck over in the Craigmont area Monday to help fight the 50-acre forest and grass fire on Craig Mountain which burned trees and grassland before it was finally ringed Tuesday morning. Benjamin said the crew came back to Kendrick about 9 a.m. Tuesday morning after putting in a 17-hour shift.

Although the rain this spring was so far below normal that grass and weeds did not reach the same growth they did last year, the lack of moisture caused an early drying so the danger of fire remains great. Benjamin also said that the lack of snow and moisture during the winter kept last year's grass and weeds from rotting completely, so the added danger of dry undergrowth is present this year. "If that gets started," the warden said, "it'll burn like gasoline."

Benjamin said he hoped motorists, loggers, farmers and other who are outdoors, will use extreme caution to help prevent fires.

Strong Named Latah Assessor

With the retirement of Eugene Taylor, the Latah County Commissioners appointed Dwight Strong, Moscow, as county assessor to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Taylor.

Strong has served with the assessor's office since 1961, when Taylor first was elected to office, first on a part-time basis and in 1965 as a full-time deputy assessor.

Born in Montana, the new assessor's family moved back to Idaho when he was eight years old. He received his education in Spokane and Potlatch schools and in 1939 entered the lumber business with his father-in-law at the Nirk Lumber Co. in Potlatch where he and his family remained until 1965 when he began full-time work with the assessor's office and he moved to Moscow to make his home.

Married, he and his wife are the parents of four grown sons and one daughter who is a senior at Moscow High School.

Strong's appointment as assessor became effective July 1.

Warmer Weather Predicted for Area

After a week of cool, if not cold, weather temperatures were forecast to make an upward turn and provide the region with a hot Fourth of July holiday.

The month of June was hot and dry with American Ridge rainfall totaling only .72 inches, according to Dick Benscoter, who maintains a rain gauge for the Soil Conservation Service. The .72 recorded for June of this year is well below the 1.30 inches recorded for the same period in 1972.

Up on Big Bear Ridge, Charlie Bower reported recording .70 inches of moisture during June. This compares to the 1.24 of a year and the 4.05 inches in 1971. The driest June Charlie had on record was in 1968 when on .66 fell.

The mercury dropped down in the fifties and high forties last week during the evening hours and high winds buffeted the area on several occasions, but only slight scattered showers fell.

During the same week a year ago only 11 persons were placed on jobs through his office, he reported. 27 jobs remain open at the end of the week, the same number as a week ago. All require experience, skills and training, and include jobs for auto mechanics, a semi-driver, a cook, secretaries and bookkeepers, as well as housekeepers and babysitters.

31 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the past week. Many of these people were newcomers into the area, some to establish residence in order to go to school, and others who just decided to move to the area to seek work. The total number of persons seeking jobs pay benefits declined, however, from last week's 285 to the current 268, indicating that a number of workers did return to jobs during the week.

Harlstein reported that his office still has a number of young persons seeking summer jobs. The Federally Financed Summer Youth program, is at a standstill now, as all the allocated positions have been filled. There is some possibility that new positions might be allocated to Latah county after the beginning of July, if other counties throughout the State have not utilized their quotas.

Spaghetti alla Carbonara
(spaghetti with hame sauce)
3 slices bacon
4 tablespoons olive oil
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup julienne cut ham
4 tablespoons grated cheese (parmesan)
2 eggs, beaten
1 pound spaghetti, cooked and drained

In a skillet, brown the bacon lightly, pour off the fat. Add the oil, butter, and ham. Sauté 5 minutes, but do not let ingredients brown. Remove from the heat and stir in the cheese then the eggs. Pour quickly over the hot spaghetti and mix thoroughly.

Lasagne
1/4 cup olive oil
1 small onion
1 clove garlic
1/8 tsp. basil
1 tablespoon parsley
2 cans tomato sauce
3 tablespoons grated cheese
1/2 pound hamburger
salt and pepper

Lightly sauté onions, garlic in oil. Add meat and cook until brown. Add tomatoes, sauce, parsley, basil, salt and pepper and grated cheese. Mix well and simmer for 40 minutes.

Cook lasagne in 6 quarts of water and 3 tablespoons of salt for approximately 20 minutes. Arrange a layer of cooked lasagne in a greased casserole with several spoons of sauce on bottom. Cover with a layer of cheese mixture (mozzarella and cheddar and parmesan) and sauce. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Repeat until all sauce and lasagne is used. Bake for 30 minutes in moderate oven.

Chinese: Gourmet Cooking
Sweet and Sour Spareribs
(serves 4)

1 lb. spare ribs
2 Tbs. cornstarch
1/2 cup water
4 tsp. soy sauce
1/2 cup water
1/3 cup vinegar
1/2 cup diced pineapple
6 Tbs. pineapple juice
Combine spareribs and water in sauce pan. Boil uncovered until almost all water has evaporated. Coat ribs with mixture of 2 tsp. of soy sauce and 1 Tbs. of cornstarch. Fry

ribs in deep fat until golden brown, 2-3 minutes. Drain. Keep warm.
Sauce: combine sugar, vinegar, pineapple juice, 2 tsp. soy sauce and 1 Tbs. cornstarch. Blend well. Bring to a boil stirring. Simmer 1 minute. Add pineapple; pour over ribs.

Egg Foo Young (serves 6)

6 eggs
1 can bean sprouts
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 Tbs. minced onions
vegetable oil
1 cup crab meat or shrimp

Beat eggs well. Add drained bean sprouts, onion, salt, pepper and crab or shrimp. Fry in a little oil in a small skillet as you would pancakes. Turn and fry on other side. Serve with sauce: mix 1 Tbs. cornstarch, 1 Tbs. sugar, Add 3 Tbs. soy sauce, and 1 1/2 cup water. Cook until thickened, stirring.

Chinese Fried Rice (serves 6)

3 Tbs. cooking oil
1 large onion
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups cubed cold pork
1 Tbs. soy sauce
3 eggs, slightly beaten
2 cups cold cooked rice
Heat oil in skillet. Sauté onion until brown. Add meat and rice. Toss with fork until thoroughly heated. Add eggs and seasonings. Continue to turn gently with a fork until eggs have solidified.

YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

Judges Officiate Drawings A panel of three judges will officiate August 1 during the drawing of about 6,000 names of sportsmen who will be allowed to hunt trophy animals in Idaho in 1973. They are State Senator Mike Mitchell, Lewiston; Jim Felton, Burley, Idaho Wildlife Federation president; and Hal Turner, Boise, Assistant Director, Department of Administration. Since there is no space for public participation as in the past, the judging team will inspect the entire random selection system which will be handled for the first time at the data processing system in the Len E. Jordan state office building in Boise.

Catch-Release Fishing Fishermen are reminded that all trout caught from the Middle Fork of the Salmon River, and all fish caught from Kelly Creek and tributaries (excluding lakes) must be released immediately back to the streams. Angling with bait is prohibited on Kelly Creek, a tributary to the North Fork of the Clearwater and barbless hooks are recommended. Steelhead and Dolly Varden, a char, are excluded from the regulation as it applies to the Middle Fork of the Salmon River.

Sturgeon fishing on the Snake River—but not the Kootnai River—is controlled by catch-and-release regulations. Strictly for purposes of preserving the sturgeon in a healthy environment, current regulations clearly prohibit removing the sturgeon from the water. The fish must be released by angler immediately after being caught. Tagged Idaho Salm Chinook salmon anglers to assist fisheries management watching for and returning will be found on their catch. Fish Commission of Oregon funds provided by the U. S. Corps of Engineers, has been used on a large number of salmon and releasing them to the Snake River. The Dales dam on the Snake River is the primary purpose is to determine the effect of manipulating the water through the dams upon the survival of chinook salmon between dams and eventually the spawning grounds. Another purpose is to more accurately the harvest of chinook salmon by the Indian fishery above Bonner Falls.

MILLION POUNDS TROUT PRODUCED FOR ANGLERS

More than 1 1/4 million ponds of fish of assorted sizes and species are produced annually by all agencies and planted in Idaho for fishermen. In numbers, the count goes over 27 million fish, including 266,000 planted as eyed eggs. Species include rainbow, cutthroat kamloops, kokanee Dolly Varden, steelhead, spring chinook salmon, fall chinook, coho salmon brook, grayling, golden, brown, channel catfish and smallmouth bass. The Idaho Fish and Game Department operates 17 fish hatcheries and three rearing ponds. Over 33 million green eggs of all species were taken during the last fish year to supply the needs of these hatcheries and the statewide fisheries management program. Trout eggs are from broodstock or purchased from private dealers. When

the eggs are eyed, they are relatively tough and can be shipped to other hatcheries.

Development of the fish embryo depends largely on water temperature. When an egg has hatched, the tiny fish is called an alevin until the yolk sack is absorbed and it becomes a fry. Over 250 mountain lakes of the 1,700 in Idaho are planted with fry each year.

Hatchery fish are fed a dry diet, which is well balanced with protein, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins. A pelleted feed can be distributed by hand or by automatic feeder.
