

State Forests Closed Aug. 5; Fire Danger High

Because of critical fire danger from the lack of moisture and high temperatures, Idaho forest protective districts north of the Salmon River and that part of the Craig Mountain Forest Protective district south of the Salmon River were closed to entry except by permit, it was announced August 5. The closure was effective beginning Sunday at 11:00 p.m. and will continue until otherwise ordered. The closure was announced by Gordon Trombley, State Land Commissioner.

No permit will be required of actual residents going to or from their home or summer home. Travel is permitted on main county, state and federal highways not otherwise posted to closure. State parks and developed campgrounds adjacent to main county, state and federal highways are excepted from the closure unless they are otherwise posted. Previously issued burning permits were also suspended.

Applications for entry permits are to be made to the fire warden of the forest protective district on the land to be entered.

Fires This Week

Thursday a fire at the Fredrickson farm located on the Kendrick-Troy cut-off road destroyed over 20 thousand dollars worth of buildings and machinery before it was controlled.

A spot fire up at Gold Hill on the Darrell Edgar place did little damage.

Sunday a fire at the R. G. Rasmussen place southeast of Troy burned 60 acres of wheat, barley and stubble plus three acres of timber.

Weather Cools Slightly; A Few Drops of Rain Fall

Temperatures across the area took a drop from last week's 100-plus readings and even a few drops of rain fell Sunday but with the exception of some widely scattered fields, the rain didn't delay the harvesting very much.

The temperatures Monday night of this week took a dip down into the high fifties during the evening hours but had begun to climb back up into the mid-eighties by noon Tuesday with weather forecasters calling for a return of warmer temperatures.

None and a Trace

Dick Benscotter, who maintains rainfall figures on American Ridge for the Soil Conservation Service, reported no measurable precipitation for the month of July, 1974. This is the first such reading Benscotter has had in the ten years he has been recording rainfall.

John Luedke, who keeps the rain gauge in the Genesee area, reported a trace of moisture in Genesee for July and turned in a total rainfall of .01 inches. This was down from the .58 inches in June and brought the total moisture to date in the Genesee area to 7.38 inches. This less than half of the 16.59 inches recorded last year for the same period. In 1971 the total at this time was 15.91 inches and in 1970 the reading was 13.28. Unless an ample fall rain and heavy snow falls this winter, 1974 growing conditions could be, and will be, critical.

The water table levels over much of the Northwest is low and in this area stock ponds have dropped greatly and many springs have just ceased flowing. The Pollatch river has been reduced to a mere trickle.

Ruth Hoofman Participated In Survival Education Session

July 30 through August 4 was a week of Survival Education sponsored by the U. of I. in which Mrs. Howard Hoffman participated. A day-and-a-half of classroom instruction in equipment, edible plants and animals, fire starting aids, etc., was followed by five days in the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness area. The group of 12 hiked in ten miles to a base camp called Horse Camp and from there separated into small groups for two days to live "off the land." Mrs. Hoffman feels such an experience is an excellent image builder and can be used as teaching experience.

Attended Drug Abuse Workshop In Spokane

Mrs. Howard Hoffman attended a week-long workshop concerning drug abuse, July 23-27. The workshop was held in Spokane and sponsored by the Spokane County Mental Health unit. Experts in human relations, family counseling, law enforcement, pharmacology and former users were some of the resource persons.

The recent bedrock canyon fire reminds us that crises are always close at hand. Sudden fire caused a quiet, peaceful grain field to become a noisy, raging battle field. As the word spread, three pumper trucks arrived and gallons of chemical retardant were dropped by planes. Neighbors and friends dashed to the scene in a matter of minutes. Fighting in the heat of the day with 20 mile per hour winds and swarms of yellow jackets hampering their efforts, the men miraculously controlled the fire in about two hours.

Regret was voiced over the loss of some acres of grain and grassland, but mostly there was praise for the fire fighters and their equipment. Of the more than 35 men who fought the blaze, not one person was injured. The combines and trucks stood undamaged. Fields of ripened grain had not been destroyed. The fat cattle grazing on the grassland escaped to safe pasture.

Undesirable as crises are, they often reveal hidden blessings. Sometimes God makes progress through crises. Could it be in the thankfulness we express? Could it not be in our better understanding of each other's needs? Hopefully, in it all, there's a new realization of our immeasurable blessings.

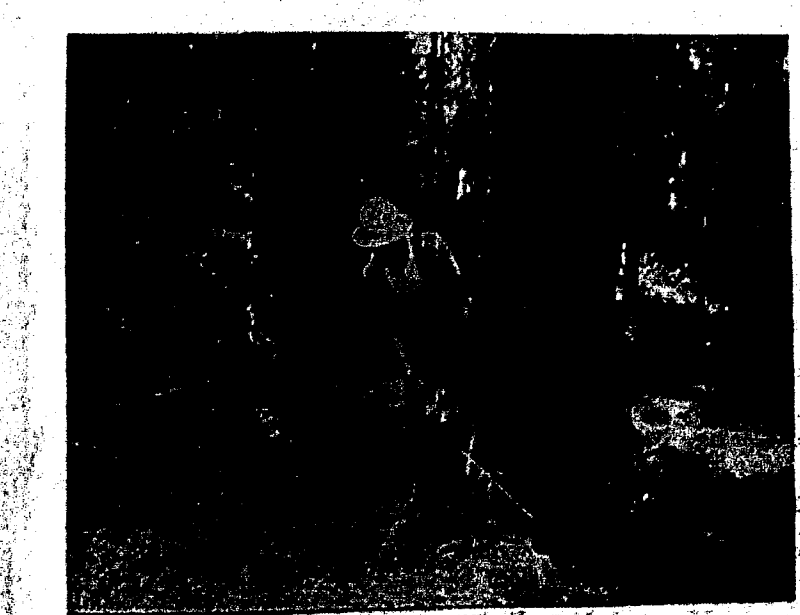

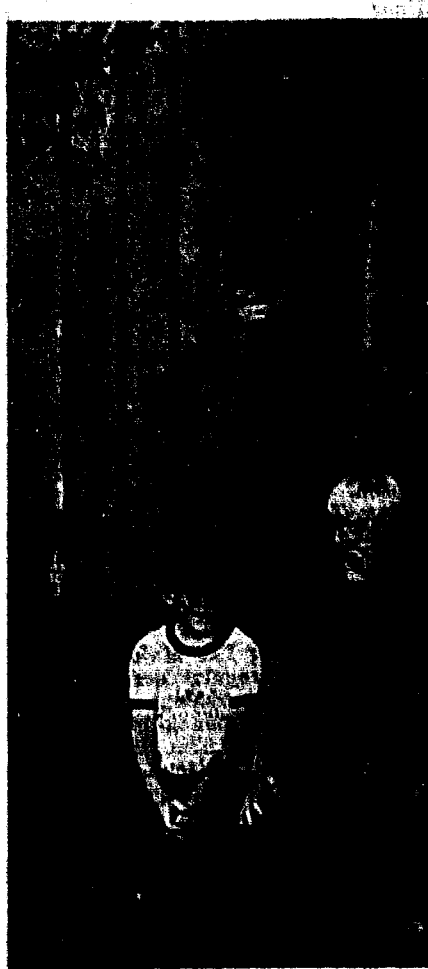

Harvest Passes Peak; Weather Holds Good

While the weather may be too hot and dry for others, it was just right for the area's farmers as they were able to rush ahead with the harvest and all indications still point to the fact that this will be one of the earliest harvests on record. This is because of the extreme heat and lack of moisture.

A few sprinklings of rain fell in the area Sunday and in Genesee it was enough to halt the cutting, but it was also time to quit for the day, anyway, and the moisture wasn't enough but what most were able to be back in the fields threatening again Monday morning.

Brooke and Sons in Kendrick reported spring peas as finished, winter peas about half done and the same for lentils. "We're past the halfway mark," reported Geo. Brooke, Jr., who added that the quality of just about all the crops were still looking good.

"About two-thirds done and we're slowing down," was the report from Kendrick Rochdale manager Bob Watts. Bob said at the present rate most of the crops will be finished up next week, weather permitting. This year's harvest will be average or above.

About 60 per cent complete was the estimate of the harvest from Mike Martinez at Genesee Union Warehouse Tuesday afternoon. The peak has been reached and now the farmers are in the last stretch.

It might be interesting to note that the current quote on wheat was \$4.37 from Genesee Union Tuesday afternoon. Barley closed at \$102.00 and oats at \$72. Last year during the second week in August wheat was \$1.48, barley \$54 and oats \$46.

U of I Economists Say Food Supplies Ample

Does the United States face problems of food shortages in the months ahead?

No, says Dr. Robert L. Sargent, University of Idaho extension agricultural economist. Not unless people themselves are scared into hoarding and inflationary, unnecessary buying.

"Despite the frequent reports of food scarcity that we've heard since Phase 3 1/2 went into effect, the figures just don't indicate we actually have shortages in this country," Sargent explained.

For example, current U. S. Department of Agriculture projections point to record or near-record production of our major food and feed grains. Harvest of these crops has already started.

Sargent noted that July projections show corn production will be up 6 percent over last year. Soybean production will be 24 percent higher, wheat 13 percent, sorghum 5 percent and barley 4 percent more than last year's crop.

Many years ago a young man was elected to the state legislature. He had but one qualification for the job—he was an accomplished speaker. In other respects his knowledge was limited to say the least.

Brought up in extreme poverty, he had not even finished grade school. His father had died when the boy was quite young, and the family was so poor they could not even afford a coffin. Friends chipped in and paid for it.

After the father's death, the mother worked ten hours a day in an umbrella factory, then brought piecemeal goods home at night, working until eleven or later six days a week.

To escape from this grinding poverty the boy became interested in amateur theatricals put on by his church. He had a natural flair for it and this led him into politics and public speaking.

At the age of thirty he ran for the state legislature and was elected. He was totally unprepared. The complicated bills he was supposed to read and vote on were nothing but Greek to him. He was made a member of the State Banking Commission though he had never had a bank account himself in his life. To make matters worse he was appointed to the committee on forests. A city boy, he had never been in a forest. He was so discouraged he wanted to resign, and he would have except that he was even more ashamed to admit defeat to his mother. What to do? There was little he could do except to set out on a course of self-education.

For the next few years he studied, he read—sixteen hours a day. Eventually he became the greatest living authority on the government in his state. He was elected governor and served four terms, emerging as the most popular governor the state had ever known.

Shortly thereafter he ran for President of the United States. Though defeated he was one of the most loved citizens ever to run for that office. Though he had never finished grade school, he picked up honorary degrees from six universities, including Columbia and Harvard. Who was he? Al Smith!
