

## **Statewide To Vendors** License vendors for the Idaho Fish and Game Department through

out the state are distributing 1973 leaflets containing upland game bird seasons and regulations, which were mailed from Boise last week.

The format provides information for hunters on the cover of the 3-way folded leaflet with upland game bird hunting seasons and regulation de-tails on 2 of the "inside" pages. A map showing statewide seasons and regulation details for Huns, chukars and quail is printed on page 3. Two other page-sized maps provide seasons and regulation details for sage and sharp-tailed grouse, and ringnecked pheasants.

Important bird dates include the following: September 15: forest and sage grouse. See varying dates and exceptions with bag and possession limits.

September 16: mourning dove season ends.

September 22-October 5: Wild turey season. Limit one bird.

October 13-November 18: Pheasant eason (northern Idaho). Bag limit cocks.

October 27: pheasant season opens outhern Idaho.

September 1-February 28: Cottontail and pygmy rabbit seasons. September 15-Juanary 20, 1974

## **NR Elk-Deer License** Sales Quota Reached

Nonresident combination huntingfishing licenses (Class 10) were completely sold out at \$135 each August 29 this year, one week sooner than in 1972.

The supply of nonresident "buck only" licenses at \$75 is good and there appears little possibility of reaching the sales quota of 3,909 this year. Some 2,600 licenses remained unsold at the end of August.

A spokesman for the Idaho Fish and Game Department disclosed that nonresident big game license quota are approximately the same as last vear-9.772 for the \$135 combination license and 3,909 for the "deer only" license, which allows out-ofstate hunters to take one buck deer

anywhere in the state where a genrai deer season is open.

**Slipcover** Care Frequent Washing Preserves Fabrics With fall housecleaning just around the corner, it's time to think about

getting draperies and curtains in shape for winter says Joanne Anderson, extension home economist, U. vice.

Frequent laundering for home fashions means longer life and fresher appearance. Embedded soil, along with heat and sunlight, weakens fibers.

Before taking down draperies and curtains for laundering, vacuum with the dust brush attachment to get rid of loose dust. The alternative is to shake dust loose outdoors. Remove drapery hooks before washing Choose the correct washing pro-cedure according to fabric type and/ or its degree of deterioration due to exposure, in a mesh laundry bag for

washing. Avoid overcrowding in the ma-chine. Overcrowding causes wrinkling and inhibits thorough cleaning. Use ample detergent and water, Presoaking helps loosen dirt.

Wash approximately six minutes in hot water for white and colorfast

is needed, remove from dryer while

curtains and draperies should also be washable. If you are not sure, test a small section in an inconspicuous area first for color run, puckering or fraying. If the trim needs removing, consider replacing it with a colorfast type compatible with the

curtain or drapery fabric. Before laundering slipcovers and throws, check them for spots and stains and pretreat with liquid detergent or a detergent paste. Use a water temperature appropriate to the fabric and color and laundr 6 o 8 minutes.

Avoid overdrying slipcovers. This may cause slight shrinking or puckering at the seams. Slipcovers rarely need ironing if removed from the dryer while still slightly damp and replaced on the furniture. Just press pleats and ruffles where necessary.








#### Maude Singer, 95, Vormer Area Resident, Passed at Centralia
