By the year 2000, a 30-hour average work week is predicted.


Retirement at age 55 (or less) will be commonplace. There will be some 50 million retired persons in this country. That number is approximately equal to the present popula-tion of such nations as France, Italy or Britlan, reports Ruth Spidahl, state home economics leader, U. of Idaho cooperative extension service.

Retirees will live to age 80 or 90 and retain middle age health and vigo virtually to the end of their lives. Mrs. Spidahl quotes a Washing-ton, D. C. development consultant who says, assuming we find ways to contribute more healthy years to mature adult life, we still must give nurpose to these added years.

In this connection, an important distinction must be made between free time and leisure. The former is primarily recreation, the latter is creative.

When Americans use the word 'leisure' they usually have free time in mind. True leisure is different. Its a state of doing, free from everyday necessity. It requires freedom from time and work; not hourly or daily freedom, but freedom from need to work, preferably over a lifetime.

In a leisure society, the only work we do is that of our own choosing. We are free to cultivate our minds, to devote ourselves entirely to ideas and creative activity in the arts, politics, and other areas.


