Kendrick Kindergarten Begins Monday, Oct. 15

A privately operated kindergarten for area five-year-olds will begin Monday morning, October 15, in the basement of the Kendrick United Methodist Church, reported Mrs. Anita Beebe, school director.

Classes will be in session four days a week, Monday through Thursday, from Oct. 15 to the first of November, then will go to a three-day-week, Monday through Wednesday, Mrs. Beebe said. Classes will begin in the mornings with kindergarten children being able to ride the school buses. Classes will be dismissed at 11:30 and parents may pick up their children at the church.

There will be a meeting at the Church basement for parents Friday morning, Oct. 12 from 9:00 to 11:00 and parents are asked to bring a picture of the children who will be attending. There are also forms which will need to be signed at this time.

Mrs. Beebe reported that there are 18 children enrolled for the session. Cost of the kindergarten is \$15 per month plus an initial fee of \$5 for needed books and equipment.

Mrs. Beebe, a 1973 graduate of the U. of I., will teach the kindergarten, assisted by mothers when needed.

Sorensen Files For Genesee Mayoralty

One petition for mayor and three for councilmen were filed at the regular Genesee city council meeting in the basement Monday evening, Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst, incumbent, announced he will not seek re-election at the November 6th city election. L. W. Sorensen, retired SCS technician, has filed for that position. Sorensen is currently a member of the council.

Incumbent councilman Walter Morden II has filed for another four-year term and declaring his candidacy for council seats are Jack Spangler, rural route mail carrier and Robert Borgen, local area farmer. Tuesday, October 9, at 9 p.m. was the final day for filing.

In other action the council was presented with a petition signed by 32 citizens of Genesee which read in part: "We, the undersigned, residents of the City of Genesee, request the removal of a house and general clean-up of the property located on lots 8-9-10 and 11, block 5, north addition to the city of Genesee (this is the late Geo. Fox home) . . . we believe this property to be an eyesore as well as a health hazard." The petition was turned over to city attorney Lloyd Martinson, Moscow, who will find out what steps are to be taken as it is difficult to demolish a property if the owner wishes to oppose it. The health department had been contacted at one time about this property.

The council appointed a constable, judge and four clerks to preside at the Nov. 6 election. D. G. Kuehl was named constable; Janet Wishard, judge and Hazel Schooler, Amy Brown, Cleo Edwards and Kathryn Springer, clerks.

The city discussed contacting the J. D. Junk & Salvage of Lewiston in regard to smashing junk cars, hauling them away and cleaning up.

Coach Dick Ruark's Kendrick Tigers continued their winning ways last Friday evening, rolling up 41 points to a 55-14 victory over the out-gunned in the first half and then coasting Culdesac Wolves for the sixth win in as many starts. The victory kept the Tigers tied for first place in the White Pine League as Genesee pushed past Deary the same night.

Cousin Marty Clemenhagen came back to the Culdesac goal line minutes later and went the final ten yards off tackle to score. 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News Items From Genesee Schools

NO SCHOOL this Friday as all teachers of the district will be attending area and State Teachers conferences.

The yearly audit was presented to the Genesee school board Monday by Glen Utzman, the district auditor. Mr. Utzman stated that the district is in good financial shape and that it kept a good set of records.

In other business the board received a communication from the Region II Trustees stating that a meeting will be held in Moscow October 17 to elect new officers and review all resolutions that will be brought up at the state meeting in November.

All board members said they planned to attend. Three requests for early graduation was approved by the board and sent to the State Department for approval.

Two members of the Genesee Education Association met with the board requesting permission to hold meetings and confer with the board on matters of mutual concern. The board approved the request and will start holding meetings with the representatives of the local association.

Chairman Boyd appointed Mrs. Irma Eglund and Ray Stout to represent the district in negotiations with the group. Mr. Boyd also appointed Mr. Hampton and Mr. Holben to serve on a building committee, to make short and long range goals for the district pertaining to the building program.

Supt. Diehl gave a report on the progress of the districts plan for Planning and the Testing Program being carried on by the district. Supt. Diehl also reported on the New Elementary Approval Plan approved by the State Board of Education, for Elementary Schools within the state. Supt. Diehl reported that the district has completed most of the requirements and should apply to the State Board for an approved Elementary School.

A report was also given on the status of the lunch programs operation for the month of September.

A letter was read from the State Department stating that the district would not receive any Title I funds for the operation of the Kindergarten program. Supt. Diehl reported to the board that he had met with kindergarten parents last week and explained this to them. Most parents were still in favor of the program and are now looking for ways of financing the program.

The September bills were paid and the board adjourned.

Who used the first flag? Why can't we sit and say the pledge? What do the stars and stripes stand for? What do the colors mean? Why do different countries have different flags? Who designed the flag? What does the "Stars and Stripes" mean? Each day we think of other things we want to know about our flag. We are writing about it and looking up

information about all these questions. We are also making a bulletin board showing maps of many nations. It is interesting. It is entitled Flags—Flags—Flags.

In math we are working on story problems and the ideas used in addition and subtraction. Last week Mrs. Blair, a senior student from the U. of I. came to be our aide. She will be with us every Monday afternoon for 10 weeks. We are already enjoying her helpful ideas.

In science we are studying about Living Things and their needs. Today we will do some observations and take notes telling what we learn by using our 5 senses. We will work in some groups on this assignment.

We know a comma is for a pause and a period to stop to get our breath for a new sentence.

I-W Resource Council Met In Coeur d'Alene

The Idaho-Washington Resource Conservation and Development Project Council met in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Oct. 4. Lester Clemm, Troy, Idaho, chairman of the Project Council, presided at the meeting.

John Martin, Executive Director, Idaho Forest Industry Council, spoke on the "Forest Practices Act." Mr. Martin said in the early history of the nation that cleaning up the forest and the use of the forest were the main points of concern to the people. The greatest concern was how the forests were harvested. After World War I, the public became interested in reforestation and the Forest Practices Act as we know it today came into being on a national level. Mr. Martin covered such areas as the pur-

pose of the Forest Practices Act, definitions of the terms in the act, the duties, powers and responsibilities of the advisory council, etc. He pointed out that the two major problems involved in getting the bill passed were the leans on private property rights and the fines for misdemeanors. The balance of the proposed act was gone into in detail covering the regulations, penalties, etc.

Larry Beck, Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, spoke on the current "Farm Bill Status." Mr. Beck first reviewed farm legislation and programs dating back many years to provide a background for the new legislation entitled "Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973." Details of the new act were given through an ASCS narrated slide presentation.

The Project Council approved sending out the Project Plan for review. A committee was appointed to study the quality of education in our primary, secondary and college level public supported institutions. The Idaho-Washington RC&D Project Council is concerned that property tax revenue supporting public schools are not offering equal education opportunities to all people.

Latah County is completing a Spoken Record of Project Area History Measure. This is done by interviewing residents who are 70 years or older. After preliminary interviewing, their interesting and valuable recollections of past history are taped. The Council feels that all the counties in the Project area should do this before the people are gone. Historical societies, cities or county museums are the local groups that sponsor this project.

Funds Sought

Renewing an effort begun last June, the Latah County Museum Society this week is launching a letter campaign seeking donations for its Oral History Project fund. The Project during July and August fielded nearly 100 interviews and tape-recorded almost 50 hours of pioneer recollections from 25 people, involving 3,420 miles of travel. Interviewers Rob Moore and Sam Schragger have been working mostly in outlying locations in order to cover them as well as possible before bad-weather sets in. More rapid progress is expected as interviewing trips become shorter.

The project is funded on a 50-50 basis by local contributions and matching Bicentennial Fund grant of \$5,750. Some \$3,250 of cash and pledges was obtained in a brief person-to-person solicitation in June to start the project. Most of this has been used for operating costs of the project since then. The \$2,500 still needed to match the Bicentennial grant is being sought at this time to assure orderly continuation, states Kenneth B. Platt, Society president, who succeeded Wm. T. Jacobsen of Moscow in this position upon Jacobsen's recent transfer to Wallace, Idaho.

Progress on the project to date has been excellent, Platt feels, especially in view of the need for Messrs. Moore and Schragger to get acquainted around the County, as well as to work out operating procedures, assemble working equipment, etc. They first operated out of the Museum office in McConnell Mansion where a summer secretary was provided on a cost-free basis by the Youth Development Program. Upon termination of this summer program they moved into Office 1 of the second floor, Latah County Title Co. Building, Moscow, which is being furnished on a utility-cost basis by the Architectural Workshop firm of Thomas and John Berg. At this location a cost-free secretary is being supplied under the training program of the State Employment Office.

Much interest in the project was shown by Latah County Fair visitors at the Museum booth, Sept. 13-15 Platt reports. There a taped recollection by Mr. Herman Schupfer of Kendrick discussed his early experiences in the telephone business, which related directly to antique phones and accessories on display from his collection.

Although many names of older residents for interviewing have been listed in the course of the Project so far, the Museum Society urges all interested persons to submit the names of any they believe would be good sources.

An elector for said general city election shall not be required to again register if he or she voted at the general city election of the City of Genesee, in the year 1971; so long as he or she shall continue to reside within the corporate limits of the city. If a registered elector shall have failed or neglected to vote at the 1971 city election in the City of Genesee, the name of such elector will have been stricken by the City Clerk from the electors' register, and such elector in order to vote at the general city election to be held on the 6th day of November, 1973 must again register.

A. Residence for voting purpose shall be the place in which a qualified elector has fixed his habitation and, to which, whenever he is absent he has the intention of returning.

B. A qualified elector who has left his home and gone into another state or territory or county of this state for a temporary purpose only shall not be considered to have lost his residence.

C. A qualified elector shall not be considered to have gained a residence in any county or city of this state into which he comes for temporary purposes only, without the intention of making it his home, but with the intention of leaving it when he has accomplished the purpose that brought him there.

D. If a qualified elector moves to another state, or to any of the other territories, with the intention of making it his permanent home, he shall be considered to have lost his residence in this state.

The City Clerk as registrar or the City Treasurer as deputy registrar, will register electors between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., during the period of registration and on November 1, 2, and 3, electors may register at the residence of the City Clerk between the hours of 7:00 p. m. and 9:00 p. m.

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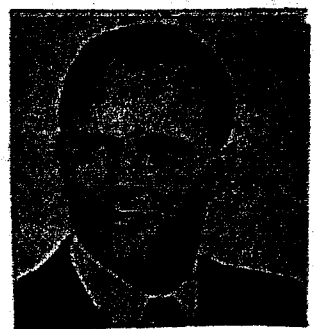

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Consumer and Homemaking Education Classes at KHS Explained by Principal

(This is the second in a series of articles prepared by KHS principal Robert Heppner to explain some of the courses of education and programs currently being offered students at the local school.)

The purposes of Consumer and Homemaking Educations are as follows:

- Encourage home economics programs to give greater consideration to social and cultural conditions.
- Prepare youths to become effective homemakers.
- Instill healthy attitudes toward work and family life.
- Provide consumer education.
- Encourage preparation for professional leadership.
- Provide supportive services to insure quality in homemaking education.
- The home economics program includes all components of home econ-

omics for which the school assumes responsibility and gives guidance. The high school provides learning opportunities in all areas of home economics, through home experiences and Future Homemakers program. The following units are covered: Child Study, Home Design, Modern Meals, Modern Clothing, Family Health, Family Finance and Life Management.

The Homecoming program at Kendrick High School begins in the 8th grade by providing an introductory course that basically covers child care, handling of personal resources, learning to sew, good grooming, responsibility in the home, planning and preparing nutritious snacks and crafts.

The curriculum for Homemaking I is an overview of all phases of Home Economics Education. It is hoped that by introducing students to all phases that they may be more aware

of the role of a homemaker. It also reaches into the interest areas. The curriculum is as follows: Caring for Children; Management of Resources; Planning, Purchasing Simple Family Meals; Nutrition; Buying and Making Clothes and Art Principles and Practices in Home Decoration.

In years passed, we have offered a course in Boys Home Ec. that parallels the Homemaking I class with special adaptations for the boys' needs. This year classes were in conflict with it and it wasn't offered. A group of boys who had been in the class wanted an advanced class. This particular class has been designed so students can gain job experience in the classroom by setting up simulated experiences in clothing, foods, management, and home care. They will gain experience in such activities as factory-type production of clothing; restaurant management by organizing a short order unit and other related activities. These will be taught in about a nine-week cluster of activities and will give the boys the experience of job training through specialized activities.

Another advanced homemaking class being offered this year is Housing and Home Design for the first semester and Modern Clothing for the second semester. Housing will be using the basic text, "Home with Character" by Craig and Rual. It is primarily concerned with the needs of a home; how to plan and finance a home; how to select colors and furnishings; furniture styles; how to choose accessories; how to furnish a home wisely; and how to reduce the cost of maintaining and improving your home.

The semester on clothing utilizes no basic text but will allow the student to begin where skills command and work to gain new skills. Projects may be related but all are different. They will also be doing consumer buying of clothes and coordinating their wardrobes.

The class in Sociology or Social Living is being offered through the Homemaking department. The text for this class is "Sociology" by Paul H. Landis. It covers such areas as Man and His Environment; Culture; the Man-made World; Man in Society; Problems of Government; Problems of our Economic Order and the Conservation of Human Resources. These individual topics will be brought into individual focus and examined as they will affect the everyday lives of the students.

The enrollment of ANY student in a home economics class automatically allows them to be eligible to join the Future Homemakers of America. This is a national organization that helps train young people to become leaders in their community, now and in the future, to become a worthy home member and to stimulate personal and individual growth and development. It is an integral part of the homemaking curriculum and has much to offer the BOY or GIRL who becomes a member.

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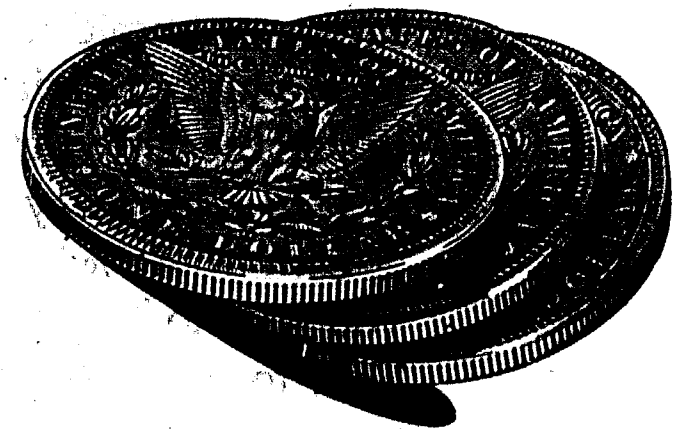

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
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
