





> BIG GAME TAGS SHOW WOMEN BAG MOST GAME By James Graban

Region 3 Conservation Educator

-did you know that on any opening weekend for big game that women consistently are most successful in bagging an elk or deer than are men If you don't believe it, spend a few hours at a check station and see for vourself.

Carol Prentice, Wildlife assistant at the Fish and Game laboratory in Garden City, did just that. While assisting at the check station at Mores Creek on the weekend opening Unit 39, Carol ran her own little

survey. "Six percent of the hunting population for that weekend were women she said. "Those same women killed 16 percent of the deer."

Another surprising result of her survey: "In every successful party that had women in it, the gals bagged the deer 88 percent of the time." What are the statistics in the Prentice family so far? Husband Mike, one deer. Wife Carol—had Mike, one deer. Wife Carol—had a clean shot but forgot to put a shell in the chamber. She tried to dry fire it to death.

Not only are women more successful in bagging a big game animal, but also they are much more tidy than men when dressing out an an-imal and more fashionable in their hunting apparel.


