Bill Haxton Elected Genesee Union Pres.

Genesee—The 64th annual dinner meeting of the Genesee Union Warehouse Company was held Wednesday at the firemen's hall, with 131 of the 316 members attending. The annual report was given by Dean Jurgens, CPA, of Morris, Lee & Company of Lewiston. He reported that the total sales for the year ending May 31, 1973, totaled \$4,111,000, with net savings before income taxes of \$130,038.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 222
 AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND CREATING A PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION; PROVIDING FOR QUALIFICATIONS OF MEMBERS OF SAID COMMISSION; PROVIDING FOR THE TERM OF OFFICE, RULES AND ORGANIZATION, PRESCRIBING THE DUTIES OF SAID COMMISSION AND PROVIDING FOR MAPS, PLATS, AND REPLATS; FOR EMPLOYEES AND EXPENDITURES AND ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY.
 BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and Council of the City of Genesee, Idaho: Section 1. DEFINITIONS: As used in this Chapter—
 "Commission" means the Planning and Zoning Commission created by this Chapter.
 "Ex-Officio Members" means the members of the Planning and Zoning Commission chosen from among the officials or employees of the Municipality.
 "Appointive members" all other members of the Planning and Zoning Commission.
 "Governing Body" means Mayor and Council of the City of Genesee, Idaho.

Section 2. CREATION OF COMMISSION: There is hereby created an official Planning and Zoning Commission to consist of seven (7) members to be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Council. The Commission may consist entirely of appointive members or of both appointive members and ex-officio members.

Section 3. QUALIFICATIONS AND TERMS OF OFFICE: Appointive members of the Commission shall be eligible and registered voters of the City of Genesee, provided that one such appointive member may be a non-resident taxpayer. The term of office for the ex-officio members shall correspond to their respective tenure of office as an official or employee of the City. The term of office for the first appointive members of the Commission shall be two, four and six years, to be determined by lot and thereafter the terms for each appointive member shall be six years. Vacancies occurring otherwise than through the expiration of terms shall be filled by the Mayor and confirmed by the Council. Members may be removed after a hearing before the Council and by a majority vote of the Council. Members shall be selected without respect to political affiliation and shall serve without compensation.
 Section 4. RULES-ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS: The Commission shall elect its own Chairman and create and fill such other offices as it may determine it requires for the proper conduct of the affairs and business of the Commission. Meetings of the Commission shall be held when duly called by the Chairman by written or oral notice. A majority of the appointive members of the Commission shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at any meeting. All meetings shall be open to the public. Written rules consistent with this Chapter and the laws of the State of Idaho for the transaction of business of the commission shall be adopted and a written record of meetings, resolutions, findings and determinations shall be kept, which record shall be public.
 Section 5. DUTIES: It shall be the duty of the Commission to recommend and make suggestions to the Governing Body for the adoption of coordinated plans for the physical development of the Municipality; for the formation of zoning districts; to make suggestions concerning the laying out, widening, extending, and location of streets, roads and highways for the relief of traffic; to make suggestions concerning density of population and development of land; to make suggestions concerning the future growth, development and beautification of said Municipality in respect to its public buildings, streets, parks, grounds and inns; in order to promote the public health, morals, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of said Municipality; to give suggestions and advice to individual citizens concerning landscape and locations of buildings, structures or works to be erected, constructed or altered by or for such individual.
 Section 6. MAPS-PLATS AND REPLATS: Any and all maps, plats and replats of lands which require the approval of the Governing Body

 Section 7. EMPLOYEES AND EXPENDITURES: Any expenditures of the Commission (exclusive of gifts) shall be within the amounts appropriated and set aside by the Governing Body for the purposes of the Commission as set forth in this Chapter. Within such limits the Commission is authorized to employ such employees and technical advisors as it deems necessary for the accomplishment of its authorized purposes and work.
 Section 8. ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY: The Commission is authorized to acquire by gift, devise and bequest, lands and other property in the name of the Municipality to carry out the purposes of this Chapter. The provisions of this Chapter are hereby declared to be severable and if any provision of this Chapter or the application of such provision to any person or circumstances is declared invalid for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Chapter.
 Section 10. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect the 9th day of November 1973.

ORAL HISTORY SUPPORT STILL SOUGHT

Private donations sought by the Latah County Museum Society to equal a \$5,750 grant made earlier this year by the State from Centennial Fund monies for the Society's Oral History Project, still are needed, reports Society president Kenneth B. Platt. Responses to the appeal mailed last month to some 900 county residents and exresidents have been very gratifying. Platt states with 35 individual donations received since then totaling \$1,641 out of the \$2,650 goal. The remaining \$1,009, it is hoped will come in within the next 30 days to qualify the Oral History Project to use the full amount of the State grant.

To date, none of the grant money has been received, due to the time lag in satisfying Centennial Fund requirements for proof of the Society's non-profit and tax-exempt status. This was accomplished only recently and the first allotment of grant money may be received by the end of November, according to current word from Centennial Fund state director J. Meredith Nell, of Boise. Until then, all costs of the project must be borne locally. "Recently we have been only one

DINNERTABLE HAZARDS

Thanksgiving dinner means gravy and family get-togethers. But dinner table talk can be hazardous to your health.

Talking and eating—simultaneously—can cause havoc. Ordinarily, both food and air go into your upper throat. But at a critical point they take two very separate pathways. If there is a mixup in directions, the results can be disastrous.

Just before you swallow anything, including food or saliva, you take in a little air and then hold your breath without even realizing it. When you

do, this closes a valve in your throat called a glottis. Then, everything you swallow is forced down the tube to your stomach. Only after you swallow is finished does the glottis reopen. You start breathing again.

On the other hand, when you breathe, the air goes through your nose or mouth, down your throat, then into your windpipe. From there it moves into two main tubes, called bronchial tubes, which branch into smaller and smaller passageways. The passageways end in hundreds of millions of air sacs, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged. The minute you talk, you start to

breathe. Try holding your breath and see how hard it is to talk. Then food can "go down the wrong way." If food completely blocks the windpipe and cannot be dislodged in minutes, then Thanksgiving dinner and everything else is all over. Steak and big portions of food are the major offenders. If the food travels past the windpipe into the air passageways, it can cause a lung disease called bronchiectasis.

To survive Thanksgiving and all other meals be sure you talk only after you finish swallowing.

If the fever is high, or if it persists, a serious disease may be present and a physician should be consulted.

HUNTER SUCCESS RATIOS MEAN MOST WON'T SCORE

People who go out in the woods and fields this year with the sole idea of harvesting wildmeat to stock home freezers should take a second look at hunter success figures for elk and deer.

Statewide hunter success figures show that about four out of five elk hunters are unsuccessful and that only about one deer hunter in two bring home venison.

Game managers say that both elk and deer success ratios would be better if hunters would stay with it longer. Experience shows that the number of hunters who kill deer the first time out in a season is about 10 percent of all the men, women and youths who are out hunting. The ratio is much less for elk hunters.

This means that 100 hunters will bag 10 deer on the first trip out. If all 90 of the unsuccessful hunters try at least once more—which won't happen—and 10 percent of them find game, 81 still will have unfilled tags. By the end of the season, slightly more than half of the starting Idaho hunters will have shot deer. Most of the others made just one or two starts.

Other considerations include cost of gas to and from hunting areas, cost of tent or camper; cost of equipment and clothing and gear; cost of guns and ammo; cost of camp groceries and a host of other items most hunters don't even think about. These all add up to make game dinners for successful hunters the most expensive meal of the year.


of farm program adjustments.

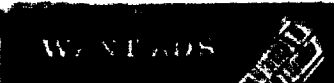

Charles Stratton Celebrates—

Eighty years may seem a long time to most of us, but to Charles Stratton, who turned 80, Thursday, Nov. 8, that time has been so busy, he's scarcely kept track.

Mr. Stratton's grandparents came out here from South Dakota in 1873 in a covered wagon. His parents, Albert and Maud, homesteaded in Avon where Stratton was born.

"We lived about a mile from town," he said, "there was one store and a little school house—there's nothing there now."

He attended the Ackeridge school in Moscow for one term (then went with his parents to Kingston, near Kellogg, when he was five).

The family then moved to Harrison, near Coeur d'Alene, where he grew up and went to school.

Stratton served as a blacksmith in France with the army during the First World War, and then "went into the logging business" at Pelee, a station on the Milwaukee Railroad near Lake Chatolet.

He married the former Thelma Campbell in 1927 at her parents' home in Pelee, and in 1932 the couple moved back to Park and started farming.

The couple still live on their farm at Park, southeast of Helmer. Although he retired 13 years ago, Stratton chops all the wood, as during the winter they heat their home and cook with a wood stove. He helps his wife raise the large garden they share with their family.

Because his hands are no longer nimble, he had to discontinue his hobbies of woodcarving and carpentry.

Much of the furniture for their home was made by Mr. Stratton, including a rocking chair fashioned from a birch tree which grew outside their home.

The family celebrated Stratton's birthday Sunday with a potluck dinner at the farm. The couple have two daughters; Mrs. Elmira Gudmundson of Colfax and Mrs. Eunice Rusch of Moscow, nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Other celebrations included a string of visitors during the week and neighbors in Park bringing a decorated cake Saturday evening.
