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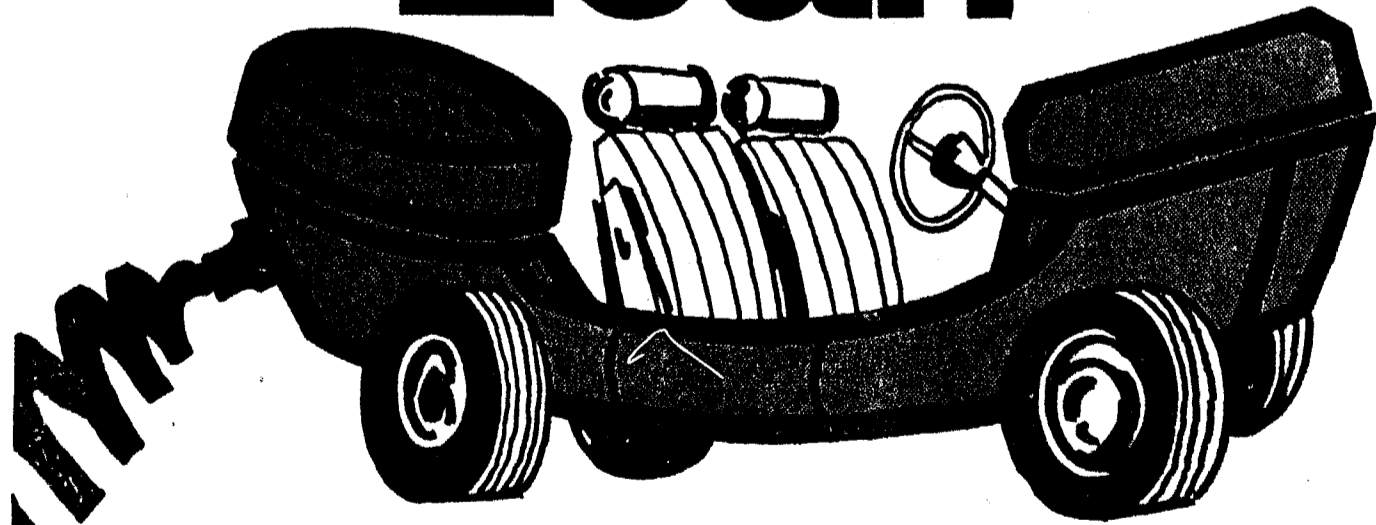
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**IT HAPPENED

It is estimated by warehousemen that there is something over 270,000 bushels of wheat stored in local ware houses and an estimated 15,000 bushels still held on the farms.

The State Relief committee, in a resolution made public, has affirmed its approval of the 30-cent an hour minimum wage paid by the county committees from funds available through federal, state, and local resources. This, the committee said, is in conformity with regulations set up by the relief administration. The statement continues, "Men receiving this pay are on relief lists. They are entitled to an amount ranging from \$12 to \$20 a month. They are required, where able, to work, to work for this amount and as soon as they earn it they are not to work any longer. If they earn the allotment at wages of 50 cents an hour they work only a few hours."

**Grace Wicks to Head
UI Alumni Fund Drive**

A woman who has lived at both ends of Idaho during her lifetime has been named general chairman of the 1933-34 Annual Fund Drive at the University of Idaho.

Grace Wicks, Moscow, whose late husband Guy was associate UI dean of students from 1936-38, has also

been made an honorary member of the University of Idaho Foundation, the corporation which accepts all gifts for the university. The Annual Fund last year raised approximately \$80,000 for the University of Idaho from its alumni.

Born at the top of Coyote Grade near Genesee in North Idaho, Mrs. Wicks also lived in Pocatello from 1931-41 while her husband served as head of athletics, basketball and football coach for the then Southern Branch of the University of Idaho.

Both UI alumni, the couple returned to Moscow after World War II, Wicks serving for a year as basketball and baseball coach and then for 10 years as a UI field agent. As field agent, he spoke to countless high school students about opportunities at the university. They traveled together through much of the U. S. when Wicks served as a field consultant for his fraternity Sigma Nu, after retirement from the university.

The Guy Wicks Award is given annually in his honor to an outstanding senior man.

But Grace Wicks has many accomplishments of her own. She is one of just two women to serve as a county commissioner in Idaho, being elected in Latah County in 1935 (the other being the late Laura Gough in Bannock County). She was appointed by former Gov. Don Sawyer to the Idaho Commission on the Status of Women in 1935 and in 1936 was an Idaho representative to the President's Commission on the Status of Women in Washington, D. C.

A charter member of the UI chapter of Alpha Phi social fraternity for women, she was first chapter president as an undergraduate and has been president of the house corporation several times as an active alumna.
